

Cosby Announced As Commencement Speaker

Hamblett to Speak at Graduate School's Commencement

Bill Cosby, one of the most influential entertainers in America, will address the Bryant College Class of 1994 at commencement exercises on Saturday, May 21.

Although Cosby may not be considered a traditional business leader, he is responsible for pioneering efforts which paved the way for such entertainers as Oprah Winfrey and others who, like Cosby, own their own entertainment corporations.

Bryant will also bestow an honorary doctorate of business administration degree on Cosby, whose 1984-92 run of "The Cosby Show," and his books Fatherhood and Time Flies, established new benchmarks on how success is measured in both genres. In addition, his aura of credibility has not only made him an outstanding spokesman for just one company, but several, including General Foods, Kodak, and Service Merchandise.

"It is a distinct pleasure to honor Dr. Cosby. His achievements as an entertainer, entrepreneur, and business executive serve as a model for our students," commented President William E. Trueheart.

"Bill Cosby demonstrates to our students how you can be a successful business person and give something back to the community. He supports children and education, and demonstrates good, solid values," added Trueheart.

In 1990, Cosby attained the number one position in Forbes' list of on May 20, will be addressed by top earning entertainers with an estimated take of \$115 million for 1989-90. In 1993, with over 26 years in comedy, Cosby was still among the top three of Forbes' top earning entertainers.



While in high school, Cosby often neglected his studies for athletics and left school to join the Navy. He later finished- high school through a correspondence course while still in the Navy. After his discharge from the service, Cosby earned an athletic scholarship to Temple

University where he received a Bachelor's Degree.

Cosby earned a Master's Degree in 1972 and his Doctorate in Education in 1977, both from the University of Massachusetts. His doctorate thesis was titled, "The Integration of Visual Media Via Fat Albert and the Cosby Kids Into the Elementary Schools Culminating as a Teacher Aid to Achieve Increased Learning.

In 1983, Hamblett advanced to the position of executive vice president and assistant publisher of the Journal. He was once again promoted in 1985 to the position of president and chief operating officer. Hamblett was appointed to his current position in 1987.

Hamblett sits on the board of diectors for a variety of professional organizations including the Associated Press and the Newspaper Association of America. Imagine being an international student at a college where most of the students come from the Northeast. Imagine being an international students, who has the opportunity to go to any school in Europe, but chooses to come to Smithfield, RI.

For the international students at Bryant, coming to college in the U.S. means gaining a new perspective on the global environment.

Four Italian students who are studying on campus as part of an exhange between the University of Italy and Bryant. The students are completing a few undergraduate courses before starting the MBA program.

Christofer Wibisono, who is from Indonesia, says he heard of Bryant's reputation as one of the top business schools. He also liked the New England area. "I think New England is beautiful, especially during the autumn months."

Karemie Williams from Australia says, "As we enter the business world we will be in a more global environment. It is important to know about other cultures.'

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from Sweden, says he tries to include a European angle in most of his papers.

However, the international students admit some disappointment when it comes to studying international business.

"Sometimes it is put on the syllabus, but it is not discussed in class," saidSuzanna Simas of Bermuda.

Some Bryant students are unaware that their fellow classmates come from a country other than the U.S

"Many students don't know there are international students on campus because we are a small population," adds Simas.

All agree there is a need for more openness and acceptance of international students on campus.

"Students at Bryant have everything to gain from learning about a different culture. It will ultimately

make a difference to them," said Bergstrand.

The students also noted the differences in the educational system. For example, in Brazil, Italy and Switzerland students must attend school for thirteen years and take oral and written exams to get into a University.

In Sweden and Europe multiple choice tests and the concept of scaling grades is not a part of their educational system.

The Italian students say they notice the differences in behavior between American and Italian classrooms.

"In Italy we interact more with each other in class. American students seem embarrassed to speak up in class," says Luca Di Fede of Italy.

"There is definitely more class participation among students in Italy," adds Alberto Molteni-Corbellini, who is from Italy.

Wibisono says he likes the educational system in the states because students don't have to carry an overload of courses. In his home country, students typically take eight courses a semester.

In addition, there are some unique qualities Bryant can offer international students.

Bergstrand says he likes the small classes because they allow for more student and teacher interaction.

"The professors get to know your name," adds Bergstrand.


Although they are all receiving a business education in the states, what will be the advantages of international students out in the business world?

"Some of the bigger companies want individuals with international experience and who have the ability to speak several languages," says Souza.

However, adds Tissot, "We have just as much difficulty as anyone else trying to find a job."

The International Students Organization (ISO) has approximately 30 members.



Hops on Down to The Union Station Brewery

Beer and college have always gone hand in hand (or hand to mouth). But, how many of us really know our beer? To the average college student, beer is something bought as cheap as possible to immediately be consumed in astronomical amounts for the sole purpose of getting drunk.

If you think you might like to enlighten your taste buds, then try the Union Station Brewery, established 1993. It was constructed from a once bustling train station to a unique eating and drinking place. The beer is brewed on the premises just as restaurants did long before there were breweries.

Four friends and I got there at about 9:00 on a Saturday night. There were people sitting, leaning, and mostly standing. The tables were reserved until 10:00 for those dining. We gave our name, although we hadn't planned on eating, and went to find a place to stand by the bar.

Behind the more than adequate sized bar is a window offering a sneak peak into the brewery. A large displays itself there.

The decor of this remodeled train station is a granite wonder. The walls are stone and the floor cement, but it is far from being gray. The green leafy plants in all of the indoor window boxes make it feel bright and alive.

The hostess called us about a half hour from the time we entered and seated us in a booth by a large halfcircle window surrounded with brick. There are also high round tables with bar stools around them and regular sized tables and chairs.

On the beer menu, they offer four kinds of homemade beer. Golden, Amber, Porter (which is made with chocolate), and Pale Ale.

I tried the Golden, which was tart at first. As I drank a few sips more, I found it to be a refreshing taste somewhere between a Bud and a Heineken. The Amber beer was a darker ale, a little heavy, but would appeal to drinkers who fancy imported beer.

I didn't try the Porter or Pale Ale because they were out of those that night. According to Yankee Brew News, beer sales at the Union have been a lot higher than were ex-

metal structure used in beer making pected. They have been having problems keeping up with the demand and have recently added a new brewer to their staff.

As I looked over the appetizer menu I found that many of their dishes were made with beer. Brewer's Chili, Spicy Wings marinated in Ale, Clams and Mussels steamed in Ale, and Gourmet Pizza, its crust made with malted grain from the brewery, are just a few.

The five of us shared three orders of Gourmet Pizza #6 with marinated chicken, eggplant, peppers, onions, and provolone. The flavoring was a healthy mixture of fresh veggies and herbs. The crust took some getting used to. It was thin and crunchy and just yelled out, "I'm good for you!"







What's Hot, What's Not for **Bryant Sports**

"I knew I wanted to direct, and I am willing to try new things," says Bryant's Director of Athletics explaining why she took on the challenge of a Division II athletic program with 14 varsity sports, 12 club sports, and a comprehensive intramural program.

Linda Hackett, whose academic credentials might suggest she is a faculty member (she holds Ph.D., MBA, and M.S. degrees), came to Bryant College in the summer of 1992.

Hackett's goal is to make the athletic program of Bryant College more visible. For example, this year's basketball team began with Midnight Madness, which featured a 3-point contest, entertainment by Zeta Phi Beta sorority, the Bryant cheerleaders, and hundreds of enthusiastic fans. The event apparently brought the team good luck. They finished the season with a 15-14 record, finishing just one point short of winning the NE-10 championship and of qualifying for an NCAA post season tournament bid.

In 1989 Hackett established the first "Homecoming" weekend at Smith College, where she was responsible for the operation of a Division III women's athletic program. Hackett would like to bring some of that spirit to Bryant by placing more focus on Homecoming. She would like to coordinate Homecoming with the annual Hall of Fame Inductions.

Hackett looks forward to extending her relations with Bryant alumni and hopes they have input on Homecoming and Hall of Fame events.

Meanwhile, in Hackett's administration, basketball continues to be

in some areas. Hackett has, however, "put into action" two new sports: men's lacrosse and women's field hockey. They are both being offered as varsity sports, pending appropriate funding.

One thing that is not in Linda Hackett's plans is the perennial issue of starting a football team. Hackett says she is not interested in varsity football because of "the amount of resources it would take." There are personnel costs, such as additional coaches and trainers, and equipment and uniforms would also require funding, she notes. "Why spend money on that when we don't even have enough money as it is," says Hackett.

"Students generally don't want their tuition to increase for football," she adds.

Another issue Hackett is tackling is a new name for Varsity teams at Bryant, currently known as the "Indians." An advisory committee sug-

gested the change because, according to a recent Archway article, the students do not identify themselves with the Indian and the name is also degrading to Native Americans. The new Mascot name will be decided by the students.

Linda Hackett came to Bryant after serving in administrative positions in the athletic departments of Smith College and the University of Iowa. Hackett, who began her academic career as a German teacher, says she has always had a personal interest in sports.

Hackett says, her goal continues to be expanding financial support for a variety of sports because, she says, "all sports are of particular interest."
