New Potato Plan Proclaimed

Branching out-or at least down - is the way Bryant will move into the future, according to the newest version of the college's strategic plan. Bryant President William E. Trueheart called the new plan, titled Potatoes - A Powerful Economic Resource (PA-PER), "an effort to raise revenues, conserve energy, improve the environment, and increase social

responsibility all at the same time." From crops in the fields to computers in the classroom, potatoes will pervade every part of campus life with new activities ranging from promotion through production. Besides the promotional campaign begun earlier this year, Bryant will use its crops to sell three new products, raw potatoes, vodka, and french fries, and to produce energy to power the campus.

"Potatoes are the fourth largest crop in the world," Trueheart said, but the leading potato growing countries are Russia and Poland, with the U.S. only in third. As a business school, we have a responsibility to show U.S. industry the way back to number one.'

Raw potatoes will be the first product Bryant produces, once the campus conversion process is complete. Potatoes will be grown on "every square foot of available land, including the track. It'll take about 3 months to switch over to potato production, but we can do it on time



if everyone cooperates," said physical plant director Ed Richards, who added that he was looking forward to the change because it would bring his responsibilities closer to nature. "Growing potatoes puts the plant back in physical plant," he said.

Vodka and french fries will have to wait until completion of the Potato Processing Plant (PPP) later this year. The PPP is currently under construction on the other side of Route 7. Marketed under the new Bryant's Own brand name, vodka will be "the flagship in a new line of collegiate affiliation products, the fastest growing segment of the alcohol industry," Marketing Professor Frank Bingham said.

French fries should do nearly as well, say analysts who are betting that the recently signed contract with Nicholas Janikies, Bryant alumnus and leading Burger King franchiser, will put Bryant "on top of the french fry heap."

Energy production can begin almost immediately, though, as soon as the potatoes begin popping out of the ground. "All we have to do is stick two electrodes in each spud," Richards said, "and we'll have plenty of juice in no time." The first project scheduled for completion is the Potato Powered Information Super Highway (PPISH), the new campus computer network funded by a grant from the Clinton Whitehouse under the supervision of Vice President Al Gore, who is rumored to have

two electrodes himself.

To promote PAPER, Bryant is changing its look, with a new advertising campaign and a new spokesman, Mr. Potato Head. Critics charge that although PAPER may look good in print, it will never fly because of the down-to-earth nature of Bryant students, several of whom have already voiced their disapproval of "such a half-baked scheme.

According to critics, no normal human being could come up with such an idea. In fact, some believe the potato phenomenon to be of extraterrestrial origin, prompting Trueheart to deny rumors that the campus potato frenzy was started by a group of aliens who have secretly taken over the college, despite repeated unconfirmed sightings of an unusual potato-like object hovering over the Unistructure.

"I like Mr. Potato Head," Trueheart said, "but I'm not about to become one.



Spuditis Epidemic Hits Bryant

Health Services has recently announced an epidemic of spuditis on Bryant's campus.

This disease is caused by the toxic chemical called solainin, the green substance sometimes found on potato chips.

Brazilian Soccer Legend Pelé to Take Helm as Men's Soccer Coach

The men's soccer team ended their long search for a coach when soccer legend Pelé accepted the job vesterday.

Pelé will be taking over for Len Mercurio who stepped down after last season.

"It was hard to lose Len, but I think Pelé is just what Bryant needs," Dr. Linda Hackett said. "The soccer program is definitely heading in the right direction."

Shortly after Pelé accepted the job, New York Yankees owner George Steinbrenner offered to build a domed stadium for the home games. This stadium, which will be modeled after Toronto's Skydome, will be located on Route 7 next to Parentes.

"If you have a big star like Pelé, you need an even bigger stadium," Steinbrenner added. "Besides, if Pelé decides to leave I could always move the Yankees to Smithfield."

Pelé will not officially start until next month, but the campus is already preparing for his arrival. The men's and women's soccer team are already gearing up for next season.

"It is great to finally have a coach who knows what he is doing," one soccer player, who chose to remain nameless, said. "All Mercurio did was fight with his players and he could not coach in the playoffs."

Pelé's first test will be an indoor tournament prior to Spring Weekend. Division I and II powerhouses will be at this tournament and Bryant can really make a name for itself if they are successful.

"I am sorry I am graduating, and

will not be able to play for him next year," goalie Scott Calabrese commented. "Pelé is the best player to ever play the game, Bryant will only become better with his help."

In addition to Pelé coaching the soccer team he will also teach a cooking class specializing in Brazilian cuisine.

"Potatoes are big in South America, we use them in almost



ever dish," Pelé stated.

As for the soccer aspect of Pelé job, he is looking to take Bryant to a national championship in the next few years.

"Once the word gets out I am coaching at Bryant, players will be flocking to Bryant to play for me," Pelé added.

Next year's captains are already preparing for the upcoming season. They will be returning to campus before the rest of the fall athletes to get a head start on Pelé's programs.

"Coach Pelé will expect us to be

in top shape. If we are not, he will look for other players who are," sweeper Damon Del Monte stated.

Once the season begins there will be a few more changes to the program as a whole. Reebok has offered to supply the team with brand new uniforms. These uniforms will have the traditional Reebok symbol in addition to the potato head label.

"We expect these jerseys will take the San Jose Sharks' spot for the most wanted sports jersey in the country," one Reebok spokesperson said

Other changes include WJMF increasing their power in order to broadcast home and away games.

"We don't have a football team, so soccer is the next best thing," Scott Terrien, WJMF general manager said

The team also plans to travel to Brazil, Pelé's home country, to play the national team in a charity game. The proceeds from this game will go to the Dan Quayle's Potatoe Fund, which benefits the victims of the potato famine of the late 19th century.

The NE-10 also announced changes in the season itself. Bryant will now only play each team once, and will automatically host the playoffs.

"With the talent they will have, they should walk away with the conference," an NE-10 official added.
