Mayor recognizes interns from Bryant

Interns from Bryant were presented citations for their volunteer efforts in the Mayor's Office by the Providence Mayor Vincent ("Buddy") A. Cianci, Jr. The presentations were made by the Mayor at a reception for the interns on May 10.

Internships in the Mayor's Office of Providence enabled students to gain first-hand knowledge of local government. Interns were assigned to various departments including Special Events, Communications, Photography, Administration, Policy and others to complement student interests, strengths and experiences.

Working in the Mayor's office with the Bryant students were other interns from various educational institutions in RI, including Providence College, University of Rhode Island, Roger Williams University, Johnson and Wales University and Rhode Island College.

The responsibilities of an intern included researching data for policy programs, compiling information for city publications, preparing for press conferences and special events, arranging photo shoots, and gathering information from officials throughout the state and around the country. The interns gained valuable experience and knowledge while applying what they learned to their targeted major.

Several students from Bryant served as interns at the Mayor's office throughout this past year.

Rodney Lumley, a junior marketing major from Andover, MA, worked for the Special Events and the Citizens Assistance Office. He assisted with the research and coordination of special events including press conferences. According to Lumley, "The Special Events team was the most enjoyable and enthusiastic part of the office to work with. We helped with numerous press conferences and functions that we also attended."

Kathleen Mullaney developed her skills in the field of print media, including the production of flyers, newsletters, and display ads. "My experience in the Communications Department has provided me with an opportunity to apply the communication skills I have learned during my four years at Bryant," she said, "as well as to learn first-hand how city government works." Mullaney is a se-

nior business communications major from Atlantic Highlands, NJ.

Also in the Special Events Office was Michael Rondinelli, a junior marketing major from Norwood, MA. Rondinelli learned many of the necessary steps to prepare and present

team. He gathered information prior to an event for the mayor and produced numerous advertisements for publication in the local newspaper and in event booklets at local organization functions. "I enjoyed seeing the ads that I produced appear in

the *Providence Journal*," Keefe said. "I felt that I played an active role in effectively presenting the ideas and views of the city of Providence. Working with the advance team I found that each is integral in the preparation of a successful event."

Robert Eddy, Jr. also assisted with Special Events and Communications. He learned the techniques that the city uses to inform residents of upcoming events. According to Eddy, "My internship was a learning experience. Although I do not aspire to be a politician, the semester I spent in the Mayor's Office provided me with an opportunity to observe and learn effective leadership skills." Eddy is a junior marketing major from Pascoag, RI.

Kerry Adams, a junior marketing major from Weymouth, MA, also worked with Special Events. She

assisted with the planning and coordination of events in the city. She said, "I found the internship extremely exciting and challenging. I worked closely with Joan Skeffington on the coordination of the St. Patrick's Day Celebration, sending invitations to department directors and other invited guests, and called to confirm their attendance. I also assisted with the necessary steps to confirm the performance of the Irish Step Dancers."

According to Lisa Marie Camastro, a communications major from North Smithfield, RI, "Working with the Mayor's photographer, Isabelle Taft, in the Communications Department, I was able to attend many special events. I was present at the State of the City Address and found it most interesting. I had always heard that Mayor Cianci had a lot of charisma and a wonderful talent for speaking. Watching the Mayor speak to people allowed me to learn how one should present a speech effectively."

Others who worked in the mayor's office included Mark England, Jodie Czeglédi, Brian Epro, and Kara Nemeth.

The Office of the Mayor will accommodate students seeking university credit for their services as well as those who simply volunteered their time. All students are encouraged and welcomed to apply for internships at the Office of the Mayor.

This past week, Professor Doug Levin rode his bike through the winds of Hurricane Fran for the worthy cause of Fenway Community Health Center's Boston to New York AIDS Ride II.

Having seen an ad this past June in the Boston Globe for the bike ride, Prof. Levin immediately began training and obtaining sponsors. He cycled more than 1,000 miles throughout the summer in preparation for the 300 mile expedition, with much support from his wife and children.

Though he states, "I don't really like bike riding," Levin felt compelled to join the trek because it was

for a worthy cause. Much in the way that the AIDS sufferers do not wish to contract the virus but are doing their best to survive, Levin saw this opportunity as something he should do rather than as something he would enjoy doing.

The trip took Levin and some 2,000 other cyclists four days to complete. It was not a race of any sort, but more a collaborative effort to fight the deadly AIDS virus. In evening or night—depending how long the prescribed course held them for the day—tent cities were raised on campgrounds, and tractor trailer trucks from a company in Missouri provided food and hot showers.

Levin comments that the diverse group of people who accompanied him was very colorful, and that ages

ranged from mid-teens to late sixties. He stresses that AIDS does not just affect the gay and lesbian communities; the straight community is just as susceptible to contracting the virus. From his experience with the Hole in the Wall Camp throughout the years, he has also seen many children infected with AIDS, due mostly to unchecked blood transfusions.

Overall, Levin wants to stress that in order to make a difference in the lives of others, people as individuals must find it within themselves to help a worthy cause; take the initiative for change. People can be successful in terms other than money. "Being successful," asserts Levin, "is making enough to give back."

I'm not saying you have a serious drinking problem—that's not for me to say. I'm saying that you could have been hurt that night, or worse, hurt someone else...maybe even me. I'm saying that maybe you ought to take a close look at what is happening. I'm not the only one who thinks these things. Maybe I'm the one who cares enough about you to do something. I care about you, really I do. But you scared me last week, and I thought you should know.

Thanks to an anonymous donor for this week's question, "Does mold on marijuana pose any additional risk to the smoker?"

Being a non-smoker, I had to turn to my ol' buddy, Hemp Dogbane, for some advice on this one.

Hemp says very calmly that there's nothing to worry about (but he would say that, I suppose).

I do know about several nasty fungi that grow on crops and cereal grains, especially those used for livestock feed. Aflatoxin, from the fungus *Aspergillus flavus*, is perhaps the most potent known liver carcinogen and is constantly screened for in US agriculture programs. A flour fungus, *Claviceps purpurea*, causes the convulsions and hallucinations known since the middle ages as "St. Anthony's Fire" (I wonder if St. Anthony did any weed). Various fungi of the genus *Fusarium* are responsible for severe disorders of the digestive system in farm animals. Altogether, nineteen different toxic fungi which can contaminate feeds and grains are listed in agriculture books.

A lot of marijuana is grown among other crops since, as you know, it's illegal. For instance, on

my farm in Kentucky, which I visited during August, the state police uncovered about eighty plants being grown by intruders in secluded places among the other crops. Even if toxic fungi don't normally inhabit *Cannibis sativa*, there are ways they could get mixed in. Would the fungal toxins remain potent after smoking?

Heat and oxidation damage many organic molecules such as fungal toxins. For example, a lethal dose of nicotine for most adults is about 50mg but the heat of smoking a

tobacco cigarette oxidizes most of the nicotine, reducing it to sub-lethal, addictive levels. Not knowing

the chemical structures of fungal toxins, I can't predict whether they would remain toxic if smoked. It's clear to me, however, that smoking any plant material exposes the lungs to toxic chemicals which are oxidative byproducts of combustion. "Horsefeathers" says Hemp, coughing a bit and smiling a big yellow smile...

In 1988 I was the youngest Senator in Louisiana. I was so young that on my first day in the chambers, one of the senior Senators, mistaking me for a page, asked me to get him a cup of coffee. "You're a page, aren't you?" he asked me. "No," I said, "but if you find one, get me some coffee too." So you know I know what it's like to have people disrespect you because of your age.

I ran for Congress in 1992 and won. I will complete my second term this fall. So that you understand why the youth is so important to me, I need to tell you a little about my background. I attend Southern University, a historically Black College in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, where I served as Student Government President during my senior year. After graduating from Southern, I decided to run for State Senator at the age of 24. During that election, I went to my alma mater to ask for the students' support- and they gave it to me. I registered 7,000 out of 10,000 students and, with the help of those students, won by a close margin of just 215 votes.

Throughout my two terms in Congress, I've never forgotten the people who put me in office. I've never forgotten the importance of the student vote. I wouldn't be where I am today without student organizing and am going to make it my focus this fall. So as the election approaches, I will be reaching out to students at colleges and universities all over the country, encouraging them to fulfill their civic responsibility and vote in the November elections. I want to ensure that young people have a voice in our

government and am devoting the next two months to achieving this goal.

I think some students have the feeling that the government and what it does has little to do with them. Well let me tell you, and I've been there, it matters who you send to the Capitol to represent you. It matters a lot. The issues that will be debated in the election and then in the Capitol building and the White House will affect you personally—I guarantee it.

President Clinton and Vice President Gore will be talking about education, the environment, reproductive rights, the economy, jobs, crime, and violence—all of the issues that affect you on your campus. It's time to pay attention.

The youth vote will be crucial in the upcoming election. The candidates know it, and you should too. Don't squander this opportunity to make your voice heard. As election day approaches, I want you to think about the issues that you care about. It's up to you to choose the candidate who you think will serve you best. And then get out there and cast your vote.

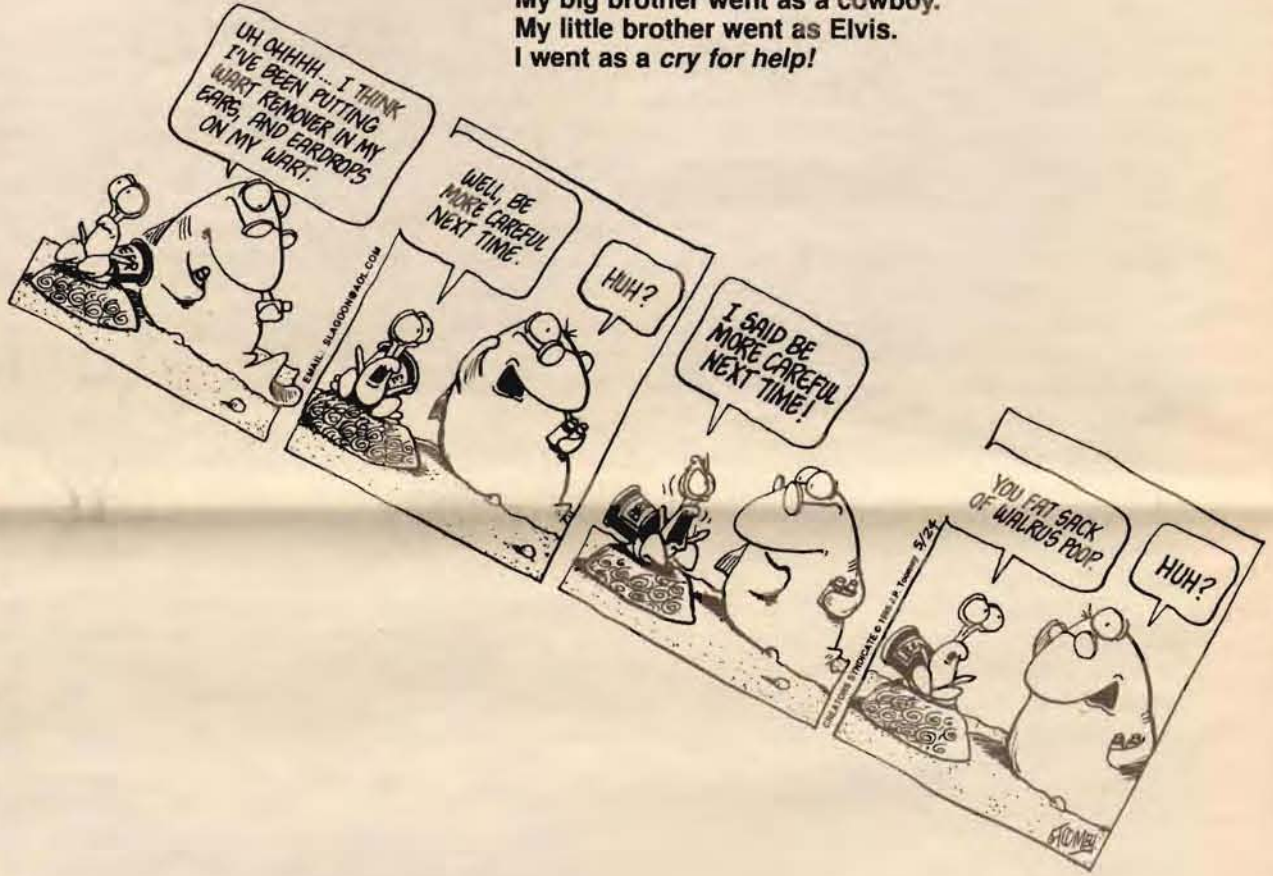

ROHYPNOL

(Roofies)

Rohypnol (row-hip-nole) is a sedative-hypnotic drug similar to Valium but 10 times more potent. It is illegal even for medicinal purposes in the United States but approved in other parts of the world (Mexico and Sweden). Rohypnol is currently being used by students in combination with marijuana, cocaine, and heroine, but, most commonly, it is mixed with alcohol. This combination is particularly hazardous because together, the effects of alcohol and Rohypnol on memory and judgment are greater than the effects resulting from either taken alone. The following are some effects:

- extreme feeling of drunkenness
- slurring of words
- difficulty walking
- effects are heightened within two hours and with alcohol can last 24 hours
- amnesia
- respiratory depression
- seizures

Students may have come in contact with Rohypnol if they traveled to Mexico. It is manufactured in Mexico and cost between \$1.00 and \$5.00. It looks like a Tums tablet with the #2 on it (2mg) and comes in a bubble packet—giving a false sense of safety. It will dissolve within 10 seconds in any liquid. Students should take caution about accepting drinks that are opened even if they are not alcoholic. Drinks should not be left unattended. Rohypnol has a bitter taste when added to a beverage. Please take caution: **If your drink doesn't taste as it should, stop drinking it! Do not accept opened drinks from strangers!**

One Card update

We are happy to inform you that the Department of Public Safety is now accepting points for payment of fines or to pay for lost or destroyed ID Cards. Other locations that accept points are SUBWAY, Images, The Scoop, Bookstore, Bagel Express, Heritage Room, South Dining Hall, Faculty Dining Room, Salmanson Dining Hall and the Info Desk in the Bryant Center.

Your points may be transferred to the vending stripe on your BRYANT ONE CARD. Once you have transferred your points to the vending stripe, they gain monetary value on this stripe and may be used on all laundry equipment and Coke vending machines (on-campus).

You may transfer points or add dollars to your vending stripe by using either of the CVC machines located in the Bryant Center and the Unistructure.

It is important to remember that before using your BRYANT ONE CARD on any vending equipment (laundry or coke machines) you need to have dollars on your vending stripe. Anyone having points on their card may TRANSFER them to this stripe. If you do not have points or if you do not want to use your points for vending, you may add up to \$20.00 to the vending stripe on your card.

Election related activities at Bryant this semester

This is to inform you about some important and exciting activities that will be happening at Bryant this semester in relation to the upcoming state and federal elections. These events will help to generate more of an intellectual climate at Bryant.

First, there will be a voter registration drive. It will kick-off in the Rotunda on Wednesday, September 18, at the 12:00 p.m. class break. Bryant President Ron Machtley and Student Senate President Heather Heartwick will speak. Immediately thereafter and during the following two weeks, students will be able to register in the Rotunda during lunch hours. The voter registration drive is sponsored by the Student Senate and the students in my "Electoral Systems and Electoral Reform" class.

Second, two weeks after the elections, Bryant will host a Public Forum entitled "The 1996 Elections and Beyond: Where Do We Go From Here?" with the subtitle, "The Future of Economic Policy and the Two Party System in RI and the US." It is scheduled for Tuesday, November 19, at 7:30 p.m. in the Papitto Dining Room, and will feature the following three speakers:

*Darrell West, chair of the Political Science Dept. at Brown University and a frequent commentator on the elections in the local and national news media. Prof. West will discuss the likely impact of the federal elections of future national economic policy.

*M. Charles Bakst, the political commentator for the Providence Journal. Mr. Bakst will discuss the Rhode Island Congressional elections and the elections for the state's General Assembly, with emphasis on their implications for the economic policy and the future of the two-party system in Rhode Island.

*Rob Richie, Executive Director of the Center for Voting and Democracy in Washington, DC, will speak on the role that third parties and independent candidates have played in federal elections, and the likely outcome of the future of the two party system in the US.

This forum is funded by the Academic Affairs Division. Refreshments will be provided at its conclusion, courtesy of the Historical/Social Sciences, Finance, and Economics Departments.

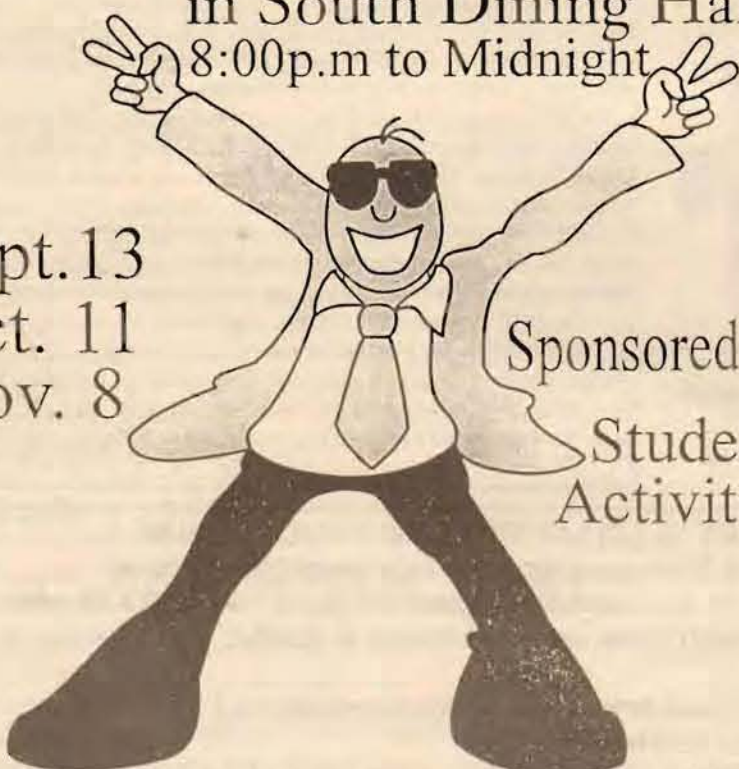

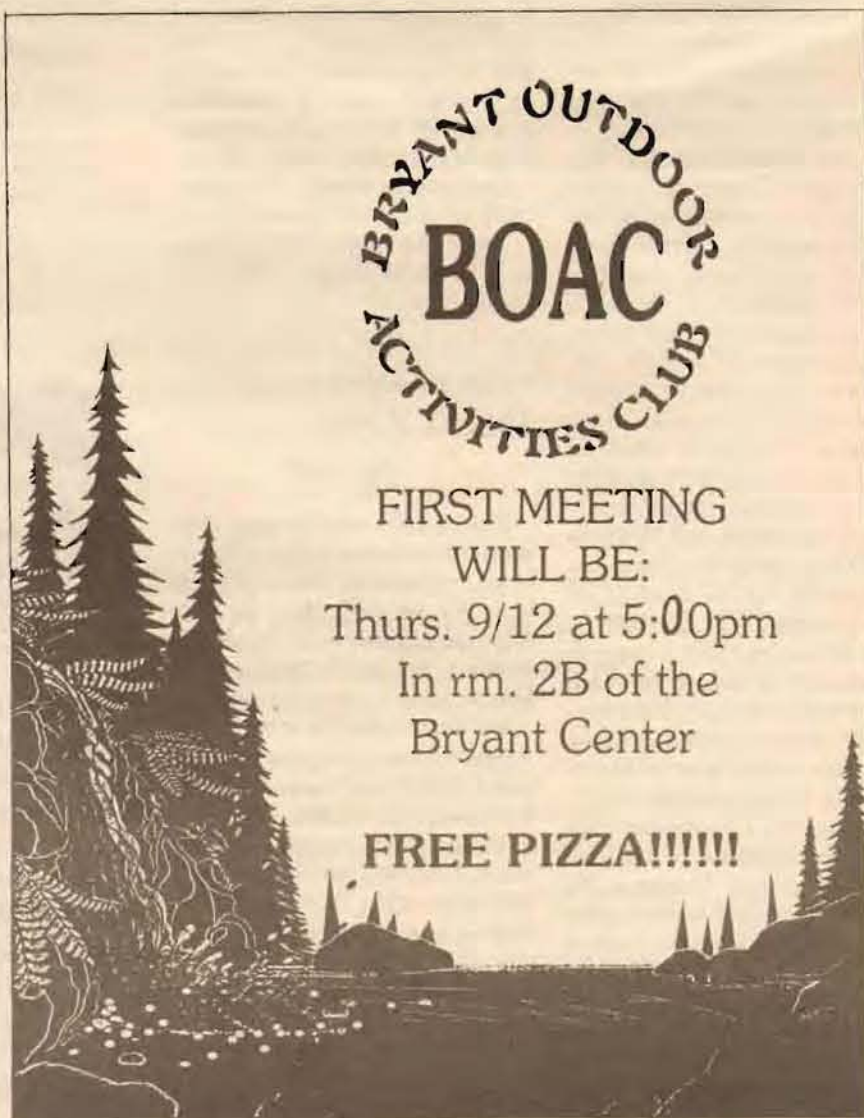
