Until recently Bryant College has been operating with a late 1960's IBM 1130 and the BTI 4000 computer. Most students after taking SM 102 are left disillusioned with the Systems Management major because of the numerous difficulties: computer breakdowns, slow terminal response and, in slow terminal response and, in
general, the common day nusances of the computers. To alleviate these problems the College is updating the system to increase its

## "Management Forum"

Dr. Theodore F. Gautschi, Associate Professor, Management, at Bryant College, has recently had a collection of his writings published by Ginn and Company in a book entitled Management Forum. He had extensive experience in on-line program management as Mission Operations Systems Manager for the Jet Propulsion Laboratory Pasadena, CA, a position he held during the laboratory's successful unmanned lunar landing (Surveyor).

96 times larger than the 1130 and about twelve times larger than the BTI.It will carry thirteen academic packages and three administrative packages. Although the new computer is much more efficient than the old, its cycle time will be about the same.
Brian Richards,an operations systems analyst, says that the computer's responce time is an increase over the old. That there will be a faster turnover of students programs which will give Systems Management an increase flexibility in the structured curriculum. Also the new computer will do away with the unit record machines.

## Jan 3, 1979 might not be a historic

 day in the minds of mos Bryantonians, or even most Americans, but in the mind of Charlie Mandeville, the Gymnasium manager of Bryant College, it was a historic day.It was on that day that Charlie began to run. In the first part of the film, Kimberly Wells (Jane Fonda), a popular feature reporter on a television station, uncovers a major nuclear accident which almost led to a core meltdown. the inspectors. Lemmon decides to tell the public about the potential danger but must first face the harrassments and threats of executives who underestimate the danger and try to cover it up.
As a result, The China Syndrome suggests that as long as there is human error and money and greedy people who are concerned only about themselves, there exists an inherent danger in nuclear power. inherent danger in nuclear power.
