

Verdict of Guilty Delivered Sexual Assault Mock Trial...

Janikies Auditorium was filled to capacity Tuesday evening as many turned out for the Sexual Assault Mock Trial. "You be the judge" was the theme of this program which President Trueheart referred to as "an enlightening and thought provoking evening."

The evening began with a welcome address from President Trueheart who informed us that "although it is a mock trial, the message of our personal commitment to safety and respect on campus is real."

"As we struggle to find the right way to make contact with one another, to say things, to act, and to build relationships, we must remember that respect is the foundation stone of every relationship. We must re-examine this concept of respect as we realize the serious and important purpose of tonight's program."

Judge O. Rogeriee Thompson presided at the trial. In addition to serving as Associate Judge in Rhode Island District Court, Thompson is co-chair of the Sexual Assault Task Force at Bryant. This Task Force, also co-chaired by Rosanne Dana from Counseling Services, was appointed by President Trueheart to educate the community about the reality of sexual assault and the options available.

Resident Director Mike Reilly commented, "We want victims to know they have choices. On-campus hearings are available to give them a say in how their problem is handled."

Attorney Mike Freel served as the prosecutor and Gina Vigliotti

was the defense attorney. They worked to bring out the facts necessary to allow the jury to reach a decision. This twelve member jury, referred to as "Finders of Fact," was composed of six male and six female students from the audience.

The evening continued with the testimonies of various individuals. Patrolman Richard St. Sauveur, a police officer for the Town of Smithfield, testified concerning his role in the investigation of the crime.

Maria Bras, a junior at Bryant, played the role of the victim in the assault, and Tim Bovat, a 1991 Bryant graduate, played the role of the perpetrator. Each gave their version as to the occurrences of the night the "rape" took place.

Brett Sandman, a sophomore, acted as the examining doctor and Joanna Hinds, also a sophomore,

played the role of the victim's roommate. Their testimonies uncovered more detail and fact with which the jury could make a decision.

When the jury was dismissed to reach a verdict, the audience was polled to get their opinions as to what they believed the outcome should be. Ultimately, the audience was found to be split as to whether or not they thought the perpetrator was guilty.

Also during this time, representatives from the Rhode Island Rape Crisis Center, Counseling Services, and Brother to Brother were on hand to answer questions and respond to comments from the audience.

After a ten minute deliberation, the jury resumed with a verdict of guilty. Once again, the audience was equally divided as to their reaction to the decision.

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Controversy Forces Newspapers To Review Policies

On Friday, February 4, 1994 the *Good 5¢ Cigar*, the student newspaper at the University of Rhode Island, ran an ad which questioned the existence of the Nazi Holocaust and criticized the U.S. Holocaust Museum that opened in Washington, D.C. last year.

The ad space, purchased by Bradley R. Smith of California, questioned gas chambers and solicited donations for his research on the subject.

Since the paper ran the ad, the editors of *The Cigar* have received a plethora of responses. Letters to the editor conveyed outrage towards URI's student newspaper for permitting such an advertisement—especially without a disclaimer from the editorial board.

The Cigar's Editor-in-Chief, Jim Beardsworth, told *The Archway* yesterday that he stands behind his decision citing the First Amendment's freedom of speech.

In an interview with *The Providence Journal*, Beardsworth stated that since the ad did not contain any "offensive epithets or slurs, running it was part of the mission of the college paper."

This controversy has caused the editorial board of *The Archway* to reexamine our own policy on accepting advertisements. For instance, this past week the editorial board had to consider the placement of a potentially controversial ad.

In the past, we have accepted ads based on the discretion of the editorial board. We did not have any specific policy in place.

Due to *The Cigar's* experience, we are now more focused on the general interests of the student body. In an age which calls for increased sensitivity through the political correctness movement, we realize we must be careful to avoid offending members of the Bryant community. For this reason, the editorial board will take a closer look at advertisements of a private and personal nature.

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Students Angered by College's Snow Cancellation Policy

To the Editor:

On behalf of the Commuter Connection, I would like to thank Julia Arouchon and Angelo Corradino as well as the entire *Archway* staff, for last week's editorial on Bryant's snow policy. There has been an improvement in the policy, but more work is definitely needed. We had two major snowfalls last week and the most Bryant did was postpone [the opening of campus] for two hours or wait to cancel classes until the snowfall was so bad that it was impossible to get home.

Tuesday's and Wednesday's storm was bad and only Bryant was open - with a two hour delay, but Friday's storm was impossible. Bryant officials put out the word that the school would close as of 2 p.m., later re-evaluating their decision and closing at 1:15 p.m. Anyone with access to a window during the morning could easily see that the storm was going to get worse. By the time the school was closed, all of the major highways were already down to a snail's pace

causing people to abandon their cars on the highways.

When I left campus, it took me 30 minutes to get to a friend's house only 3 miles away. Bryant officials need to think about their faculty and staff as well as the students. I know of many faculty members who have to drive over an hour to get home. I wonder how many made it home on Friday?

Rhode Island is in the middle of its worst winter in 16 years (since the infamous Blizzard of '78) and it doesn't look like it's getting any better. So my suggestion for Bryant is to put themselves in all of the commuters' shoes (including the faculty and staff) and see how they would like to spend two hours driving to get 15 miles away. Maybe next time the right decision can be made earlier.

Once again, thank you *Archway* and may summer be upon us soon!

To the Editor:

As a minority student on Bryant College's campus the "Black History Month" menu naturally caught my attention. After reading the article in last week's issue of *The Archway*, I could only take it as an offense (and many others agree with me). Not to the act itself, but to the stereotypical attitude that seemed to have resulted. I think it is time to confront these stereotypes and give a minority point of view.

The menu that I read last week was anything but a fair representation of people of color or Black History Month. Even if it was, would it not be fairer or should I say more subtle if the menu was instituted year round and the foods prepared as they should be? Why just for a few days in the month of February?

Not every black person is African American, but we are classified as such. Then it seems that because we are black we are expected to eat red beans and rice, collard greens, sweet potato pie, etc. I, however, along with many other black people, have never eaten grits, collard greens or anything on that menu in my life! The menu, in actuality, is a representation of Southern cooking that was then associated with blacks after

slavery. Southern Blacks may like such food, but they are not "black dishes."

My roommate, who is white, did not see the reason for my anger because she also associated those dishes with black people. I wanted to tell her that it was just as bad as saying all black people are in gangs or on drugs. However, instead of becoming angry with her I explained the truth to her.

While I could classify myself as West Indian, I choose to say that I am black. Why? Not because I look it—or that's how we should all be classified—but because black is a feeling and a way of life that I am proud to be a part of.

My roommate and I participate in some Black History Month events so that she can get a better understanding of who we are as black people, not just to see a show. I think that just getting one person to learn something new about me and my culture, instead of being fed stereotypes, is what ARA and Bryant should do. After all that is what Black History Month is here for.

Rape Aggression Defense Program To Be Initiated

A new crime prevention program to be taught at Bryant will cater to all women looking to develop and enhance their self-defense skills.

The program known as Rape Aggression Defense or RAD is the only self-defense program to be sponsored by a prestigious organization known as the International Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators.

According to Public Safety's Virginia Bowry, the program's purpose is to equip women and teach them the different devices and techniques that will give them the confidence and control to handle an assault situation.

Students enrolled in a RAD class will learn self defense methods such as: running safely from an attacker, where to strike an attacker and also how to talk yourself out of a potential assault.

RAD teaches women how to avoid being the victim while simultaneously boosting self-esteem and physical strength. Ninety percent of the course teaches avoidance techniques while ten percent teaches how to physically defend yourself.

Bryant's RAD instructors aim to teach women to be keenly aware of their surroundings, to realize that no one decision is right for all women in all situations, and to use one hundred percent force in defense moves if needed.

Bowry stresses that although the program is designed for women, it is not insensitive towards the needs of men. She hopes enough students will show an interest in the program in order for the program to be offered.

This summer the Hodgson Memorial Library installed Power Pages, a custom article delivery product, on a local area network. The network consists of workstations #1-9 located on the far wall of the main library floor.

The Power Pages main menu presents 5 products that can be accessed: ABI/Inform, an index to 800 national and international business journals; Business Dateline, an index to 350 local, regional and state periodicals and newspapers; Newspaper Abstracts Ondisc, an index to 10 of our leading national newspapers; Periodical Abstracts Ondisc - Research II, an index to 1500 popular and scholarly periodicals covering 5 subject areas; and The Wall Street Journal Ondisc fulltext.

The articles indexed by Business Dateline and the Wall Street Journal are available in ASCII text and

may be printed out, free-of-charge, at the printers attached to workstations #1, 2, and 9. More than half of the articles on the ABI/Inform index, and 300 of those indexed on Periodical Abstracts Ondisc - Research II, are linked to full journals on CD-ROM disks. These articles can be printed out within a few minutes at an Image Print station with the use of a vendor card.

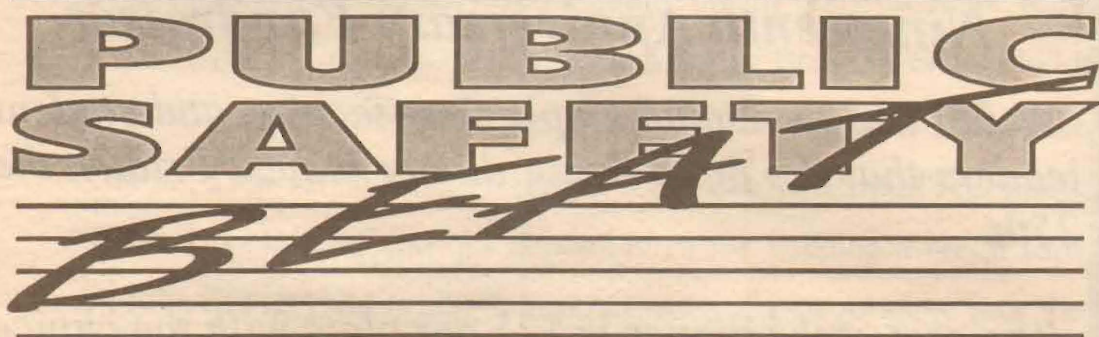
Power Pages contains some new features that make searching a subject or a company easy and efficient. Each database has its own set of indexes (F6). Also, Library Holdings software has been installed on the ABI/Inform, enabling

searchers to tell if the article they need is available on the network on CD-ROM, or in the library on paper or microfilm. Retention dates are given for paper and microfilm holdings.

This semester 4 student assistants and an intern from URI's School of Library and Information Science will be available each week to give peer training on how to search Power Pages. They have all gone through advanced training on the network, including its new search features. Peer training will be available for 5 hours per week according to the following schedule:

- Mon: 2-3 p.m.
- Tues: 10-11 a.m.
- Wed: 2-3 p.m. & 10-11 p.m.
- Sat: 2-3 p.m.

What Do Employers Look for In College Students?

Whether you are uncertain as to what career you wish to pursue or are very targeted in your goals, it is important to be aware of the employability factors. No matter what field you decide to enter, three major areas will demonstrate your potential and aptitude to a prospective employer - academics, work experience, and activities.

Employers want students to demonstrate oral and written communications and analytical skills. These skills are most often reflected in the grades achieved during undergraduate study. The concentration you choose will provide you with academic knowledge required not only in the work world, but also in society. If grades were low but showed a steady incline as you progressed in school, recruiters see maturity and a seriousness that they want in their workplace. Ability to work in teams is one attribute we are hearing more often as the work setting is changing. Providing examples of team projects done in the classroom, presentations given to promote a concept, or written reports on a timely topic help the interviewers understand the talent you can bring to their organization.

Practical work experience is another factor that plays an important role in seeking employment. A summer job, an academic internship or volunteer activities provide 'real world' knowledge of a particular field. Some examples: a student interested in advertising has spent a semester at a public relations firm, worked part-time in retail sales, and has volunteered on several fundraisers writing press releases for local newspapers and radio stations; an accounting major wanting to become a CPA secures a summer job for two years with Arthur Anderson, served as treasurer for three years for

his fraternity, and works as a part-time bookkeeper in a local gas station; a liberal arts student is interested in government and has completed the Legislative Internship Program at the State House in Providence, was a campaign worker for a local politician and was a clerk in Town Hall. These examples cite what some students have undertaken to gain experience.

Activities is the most underrated category by students. Many times students can't believe the numbers of interview questions surrounding their activities and not concerning their grades or work experience! Employers want to gain a sense of social, professional and ethical responsibili-

ties a candidate has. Discussing activities a student chooses to do and why they value those commitments provides an insight into the type of citizenship one can expect to find.

The employability factors are not exclusive of one another. Having strengths in each category will appeal to an interviewer.

Some students are weak in the activities category because they work 20-30 hours a week and have little time to become involved in activities. Others are weak in work experience, but have strong leadership skills and respectable grades. Students should know their strengths and weaknesses and demonstrate that to a prospective employer by providing examples from their academic studies, work experiences, and activities.

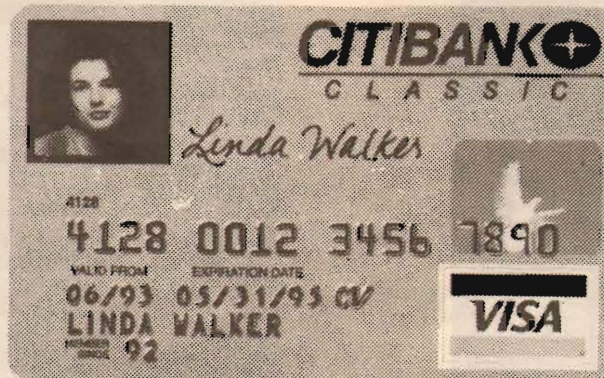


Subject after receiving Citibank Classic Visa Photocard.

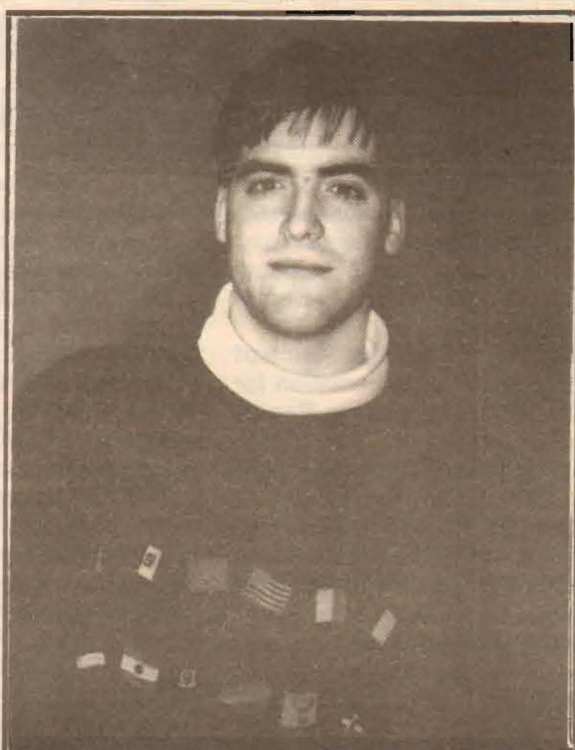

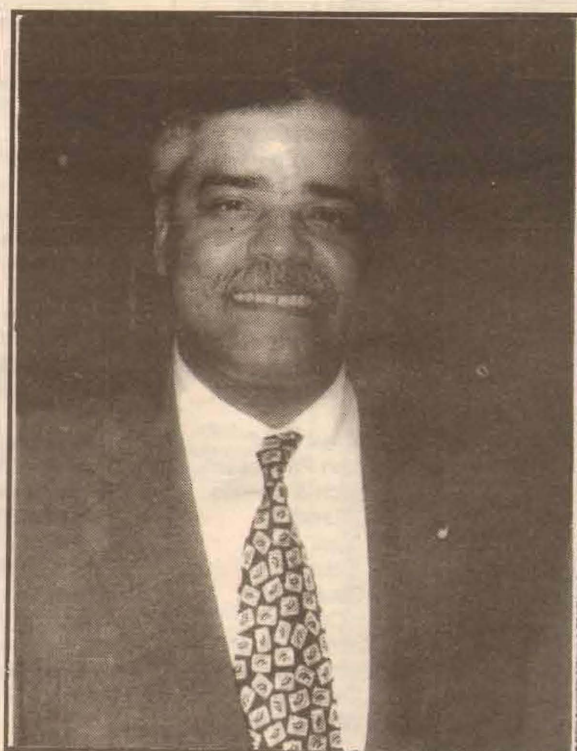

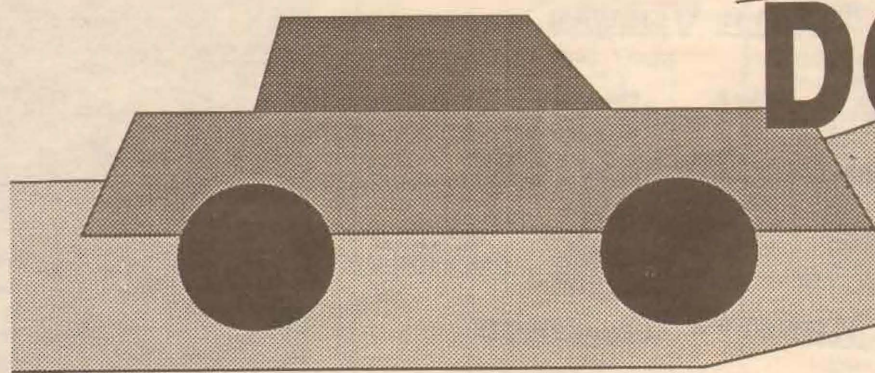

Through Tuesday, Russia is in the lead with 8 medals. Norway is second with 5, Italy is third with 4, and coming in fourth with 2, is the United States.

However, Scottie Pippen deserves to be looked at just as much. He has proven he is here to stay.

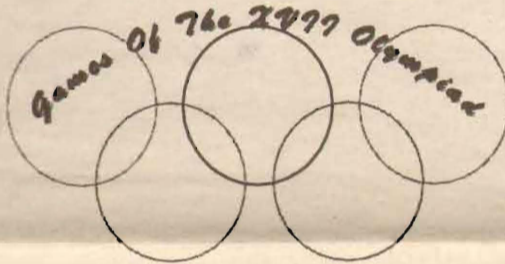
The young man who was taught by one of the greatest players to ever step on the court has now grown up.

"We have been getting great play from our seniors; Burrows has been playing outstanding. Berntsen has done a nice job as our primary rebounder," Reilly added.

"The freshman have also stepped up their play and have

shown great maturity and confidence with the increasing minutes."

poor performance shooting 2 of 12 from the field and 4 of 11 from the foul line. Shaq finished with eight points but did however manage to pull down 10 rebounds.

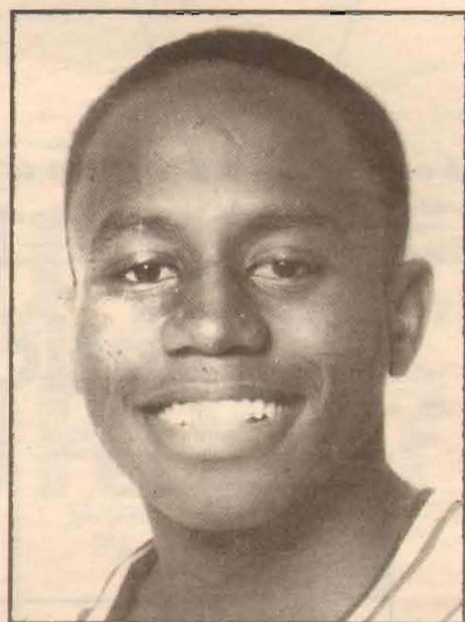
Leading the West were David Robinson and Hakeem Olajuwain with 19 points each.
