Bryant's 86th Commencement

LARGEST CLASS IN HISTORY OF BRYANT

The 86th Commencement of Bryant College will be held on Friday morning, August 5, in the Albee Theatre.

About 900 students will be graduated, the largest class in the history of the College. Despite the large seating capacity of the Albee Theatre, the very big class makes it necessary this year to limit strictly the number of tickets to the exercises, but alumni and others who may not have tickets, will be able to hear the Address to Graduates by President Jacobs and the address of the Guest Speaker, Mr. Benjamin F. Fairless over radio station WEAN.

Benjamin F. Fairless, President of the United States Steel Company, is one of the most important of many distinguished Commencement speakers Bryant has had. He is unquestionably the leading industrialist of the United States, a brilliant and inspiring leader to speak to graduates about to go into the business world.

Mr. Fairless is an amazing example of the boy who earned his college education. The man who is now head of the most powerful industrial corporation of the country is the son of a coal miner. After completing school in Justus, Ohio, he taught school for two years to earn the money to go to college. In 1913 he was graduated with a degree in Civil Engineering by Ohio Northern University. His business career began as Civil Engineer for the Wheeling and Lake Erie Railroad, the same year he graduated, and two months later he became Civil Engineer for the Central Steel Company of Massilon, Ohio. In rapid order he advanced to Mill Superintendent, General Superintendent and Vice President of Operations. When the United Alloy Steel Corporation and Central merged

in 1926, Mr. Fairless, then only 36, was

made Vice President and General Manager, and two years later President. The astonishing success story continued when two years later he was made Executive Vice President of the powerful Republic Steel Corporation. In 1937 he had been made President of United States Steel.

In 1942, Mr. Fairless was appointed a member of the Advisory Staff of

Major General Levin H. Campbell, Jr., Chief of Ordinance of the War Department. He is also a member of the Iron and Steel Industry Advisory Committee of the War Production Board and was awarded the Medal of Merit by the War Department in 1946. In 1949 the American Iron and Steel Institute presented him with the Gary Memorial (Continued on Page 2)

Leaving Bryant

Clara Blaney, for twelve years a member of the Administrative staff of Bryant, leaves the College at the end of the college year, her resignation effective August 5.

Miss Blaney came to Bryant College in May, 1937, as Director of Public Relations. In 1944 she combined the duties of that office with those of Director of Placements, but as the enrollment of the College grew and the number of graduates to be helped to find positions became so great, she gave more and more time to that part of her work. After five and a half years as Director of Placements, Miss Blaney this year returned to her former position as Director of Public Relations.

During her twelve years at Bryant, besides her regular duties as Director of Public Relations and Director of Placements, Miss Blaney has been active in many other affairs, chief among them, in her opinion, was the Bryant Service Club. At the beginning of the war, Miss Blaney conceived the idea of an organization OF Bryant men and women FOR Bryant men and women in the service. The students then in Bryant liked the idea enthusiastically and all during the war years this strictly student organization. guided and coordinated by Miss Blaney. sent thousands of letters, cigarettes, packages of candy and knitted articles to Bryant men and women in service all over the world. "It is the thing I am most proud of having had a part in", Miss Blaney has said. In 1938, Miss Blaney wrote the first issue of the Alumni Bulletin. All but two issues of the Bulletin since then have been written by her.

Miss Blaney resigns from Bryant to do some writing she has long wanted to do, and some travelling there has been no time for during her twelve busy years at Bryant.

Medal "for outstanding achievements in handling problems of steel supply for war and peace, and in fostering a better understanding of the iron and steel industry".

Other honors have been heaped upon this remarkable man. In 1935, his Alma Mater awarded him an honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering. In 1937 he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Science from Kent State University, Kent, Ohio. The University of Pittsburgh bestowed the honorary degree of Doctor of Science. Other honorary degrees he has received were the degree of Doctor of Engineering by the Stevens Institute of Technology and the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by Bethany College, Bethany, West Virginia.

Bryant has a reputation for the famous men it has been able to offer as Commencement speakers. Mr. Fairless

will add to that reputation.

Other special features of the 86th Commencement exercises will be the Address to Graduates by President Harry L. Jacobs, and an Address of Welcome by His Excellency, John O. Pastore, Governor of the State of Rhode Island.

Dr. Michael F. Walsh, Director of Education of the State of Rhode Island, will speak briefly to the graduates of the School of Business Teacher-Training in Bryant and present to these young teachers the Professional Teachers' certificates which are given each year by the State of Rhode Island.

The Invocation and Benediction will be given by the Reverend Richard Alban Johnson, St. Martin's Church, Providence.

At the Commencement exercises, Bryant will honor three distinguished men with the honorary degree of Doctor of Science in Business Administration. They are Benjamin F. Fairless, guest speaker of the day; His Excellency, Governor John O. Pastore; and Colonel Clement Kennedy, well-known hotel President, banker and business man. Col. Kennedy has been a lecturer on hotel management at Boston University and Cornell University. He is Vice President of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital of Boston and a member of the Army Advisory Board. He was awarded the Legion of Merit medal in 1946 for meritorious duty as Chief of the Planning Division and Director of Troop Training in the First Service Command. He has also been decorated by Pope Pius XII with the Sovereign Military Order of Malta.

Class Day

Class Day exercises at Bryant this year will be held Thursday morning at 10:15 o'clock on the campus.

The Academic Procession will leave South Hall promptly at 10 o'clock, lead by the Marshalls Robert Hobday, '50, and Herbert Mason, '50. President Jacobs will give a brief address to the graduates, following the Invocation by the Reverend William F. Murray, A.B., S.T.B., Vice-Chancellor of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Providence.

The Guest Speaker of the day will be Judge William E. Powers, Attorney-General of Rhode Island whose subject will be: "Tomorrow In Your Hands".

Seniors chosen for Class Day speakers are Thomas John Gilfillan, of the School of Accountancy and Finance, whose speech will be titled: "For Value Received, We Promise to Pay——". Grace I. Dunton, of the School of Executive Secretarial Science, will be the other graduate speaker, her subject to be "Looking Backward Toward the Future".

Wendell Herbert Cheney, President of the Student Council, will be Chairman of the exercises.

The Senior Prom

The Senior Prom will be held on the evening of Commencement Day, Friday, the fifth of August. Again the size of the class makes a deviation from custom necessary. For many years, the Senior Prom has been held in the Sheraton-Biltmore Hotel. This year, the larger Rhodes-on-the-Pawtuxet will be the scene of this event, the climax of the commencement festivities. Tommy Masso, Bryant's favorite maestro, and his Orchestra will play for dancing from 8:00 to 12:00 p.m.

Bryant College has many alumni who distinguished themselves during World War II, but few who have been given more honors than Robert Marshall, '41.

In an impressive ceremony at Fields Point late in April, Captain Marshall, USMC, in recognition of his participation in 50 aerial missions in the Pacific theatre during the war, was presented with two Distinguished Flying Crosses and eight air medals.

Bryant Alumni all over the country were shocked and grieved to learn of the tragic death of Jane Healy, '48, in a terrible automobile accident on July 2. Jane had gone to Washington as a secretary in the Navy department after graduation from Bryant, and was on her way home with three friends to



spend the three-day holiday weekend at her home in Cranston when the tragedy occurred. All four passengers in the car were killed.
