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Campus "movers" to be honored at Alumni Weekend '92

A little more than 20 years ago, Bryant dedicated its Smithfield campus. Fourteen persons who played major roles in the move to Smithfield from Providence will be honored Friday (June 5) at an Alumni Weekend '92 ceremony.

Receiving honorary MBA degrees "for their energy, dedication, and determination" during the move:

- Frank A. Delmonico '62, president of Butler Hospital, Providence, who was vice-president for business affairs at Bryant in 1972. He negotiated the sale of the former campus to Brown University, handled all financial matters, and was secretary of the building committee.

- Nelson J. Gulski '26, Bryant dean in 1972, who was acting president and a building committee member during construction.

- J. Robert Hillier, a trustee who is chair and CEO of the Hillier Group, one of the country's top architectural firms. The Bryant campus was Hillier's first major project, and he lived on campus during its planning and construction.

- Walter Smith, Bryant physical plant director 20 years ago. He also lived on campus during construction.

- Joseph Hagan, president of Assumption College, who was vicepresident for public affairs in 1972. He also served on the building committee.

- Thomas A. Manion, president of St. Norbert's College, who was vicepresident for academic affairs and

Commencement '92: The Robert, Georgette, Rocco and Jeannette show

Robert and Georgette gave the address, but Rocco and Jeannette grabbed their own share of the headlines at Bryant's 129th undergraduate Commencement May 16.

Robert and Georgette Mosbacher, husband and wife, were the speakers. Senior Rocco Veltri and his future bride, Jeannette Sedlak, used the graduation exercise to announce their engagement.

Actually, Rocco popped the question by way of a banner towed behind a small airplane that read: "Jeannette, Will You Marry Me, Love Rocco." She accepted his proposal, which was announced by Governor and Trustee Bruce Sundlun '80H in his remarks. Sundlun got the scoop from Veltri on his way to the platform during the Commencement procession.

After the immediate future of Rocco and Jeannette was determined, Robert Mosbacher, who chairs President Bush's re-election campaign, used the address to push several international trade accords being touted by the White House. And Georgette Mosbacher, a cosmetics company entrepreneur, pushed power sharing and worker empowerment as management techniques that must be utilized in today's marketplace.

The U.S. has the world's largest economy, and it is the world's largest exporter, said Robert Mosbacher, Commerce department secretary before moving to the re-election campaign.

"But I'm convinced that the best is yet to come," he said, using two Latin words, "plus ultra," to sum up his remarks. The words mean "more beyond."

"Great events are taking place right now that will greatly enlarge the sphere of opportunities open to America--and to you," he told the seniors, using as examples the trade accords.

Each accord would significantly increase U.S. exports, which would benefit the whole economy, Mosbacher said, because every billion dollars in exports means the creation of 20,000 new jobs.

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"Sometimes people criticize President Bush for supposedly spending too much time on foreign affairs and not enough time helping Americans to find jobs," he said. "Yet, the fact is that in an increasingly globalized economy, tending to foreign affairs very often is helping Americans to find jobs."

Sounding totally upbeat about the economy, Mosbacher ticked off a list of economic strengths that he said gives this country "a brighter and more expansive future than many people realize."

Georgette Mosbacher opened her half of the Commencement address by saying that "Robert had two Latin words for you; I have three. They are: 'E Pluribus Unum'."

"One out of many' or, as we might say, 'diversity within unity'," she said, "is a good motto for a country like ours....It's a good motto for a business corporation today. And, in an era of two-career couples, it's a good motto for marriages and for families."

She said also that "Like Robert, I'm upbeat about America's future...We have the ingredients for continued success...What I want to do is to talk about the recipe."

That recipe, she said, must include delegation of authority by management and a sharing of decision-making in the workplace.

"It is not enough to talk about 'worker empowerment'," she said, "they have to mean it."

Beyond power-sharing, companies also must "establish genuine two-way communication between management and employees. They must encourage mutual respect among the people of different backgrounds who make up the work force..."

"Above all," Mosbacher said, "we cannot waste our human resources...'E Pluribus Unum' once again--diversity in unity--is more than a motto on our coins. It is the key to our future."

The Mosbachers also received honorary doctorates at the Saturdaymorning ceremony. They were joined in receiving honorary degrees by Harvard University African-American studies professor Henry Louis Gates Jr.; Ernst & Young partner Cornelius E. Tierney '58, and Pawtucket business executive Clarence J. Jarvis '36. Beverly F. Dolan, chair of Textron, Inc., also was recognized for receiving his doctorate the day before. The honorary degree recipients gathered Friday evening for dinner with trustees and other College officials and Saturday morning for breakfast with faculty and staff. Early-morning showers gave way to cloudy skies, but the sun did make an appearance by the recession.

The procession of 1,011 seniors was led by a class flag-bearer and a band. Thousands of family members and friends greeted the seniors at the track as Rocco's plane circled overhead.

The Hon. Bruce Selya, Judge, U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit and chair of Bryant's board, convened and adjourned the ceremony for the last time. He is retiring from the board.

After President Trueheart conferred degrees, seniors received diploma cases by major. The platform party and faculty led the recessional from the track to separate receptions in the Rotunda, the Koffler Center Plaza, and the Bryant Center Plaza.

Free trade under dual threats: Dolan

Free trade is threatened both by the economic confusion in Europe and the highly organized economy in Japan.

So said Beverly F. Dolan, chair of Textron, Inc. at the 10th Commencement of Bryant's Graduate School on May 15. He gave the address and was awarded an honorary doctorate.

In particular, Dolan said, Japan is "out of step with the rest of the trading world. It must adjust."

"Japan must either open its markets or voluntarily restrict exports," said Dolan, who accompanied President Bush to Japan on the much-publicized trade mission.

Japan believes the world is one market, Dolan said, but 70 percent of its \$540 billion trade surplus is from the U.S.

"This is an extremely serious deterrent to the economy," Dolan said, and because "the market is closed" in Japan there is no offset to this deficit.

"Economic change is inevitable and welcome," Dolan said, "but the rate of change today is almost beyond comprehension, perhaps beyond control."

Still, the acceleration of economic change, particularly in Europe, does mean that "there is plenty of action for everyone...with many chances to convert energy into opportunity," said Dolan. President Trueheart presided over the late-afternoon ceremony, which was moved from Janikies Auditorium to the Gymnasium to accommodate a largerthan-expected crowd of family and friends. The board's vice-chair, Charles Collis '83H, convened and adjourned the ceremony.

After Commencement, the new alumni joined families and friends at a reception on the lawn outside the gym. Approximately 185 graduate students received MBA and MST degrees.
