## Bryant Takes the First Step Declares Leadership For the 90'S

The academic year began with the annual Convocation ceremony as President Trueheart addressed the Bryant community in the gymnasium at 11 a.m. yesterday. Trueheart said the underlying theme of the Convocation was "leadership for the 21st century and that is what Bryant is committed to doing. Leadership which will prepare us, the students, and our faculty for the challenges in the academic, business, and public policy worlds in the coming decade and beyond."

College communities come together at the beginning of each school year for the same reasons as clergy in England did many years ago when the tradition began, Trueheart said, "first, to refresh their rhetoric, second, to renew their friendships and third to reaffirm their fundamental values and to reaffirm their faith and commitment to their professional objectives."

Trueheart began by welcoming "special guests and good friends who have enlarged and enriched the Bryant community."

Trueheart then introduced six new faculty members: Bruce Buskirk, Paul Dion, Joseph McCarthy, Judith McDonnell, Joseph Urgo, and William Graves. Trueheart took the opportunity to "pay tribute to President Emeritus Bill O'Hara and his wife Bobbi O'Hara, who gave so selflessly for 13 years to Bryant College."

Trueheart praised Dr. Earl Briden and Dr. Laurie MacDonald for receiving the Award for

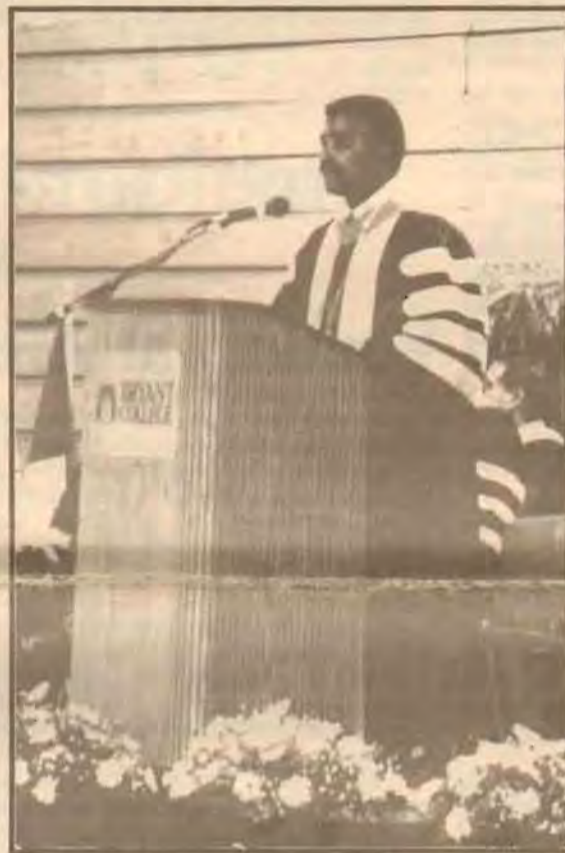
Teaching Excellence and recognized both Dr. Judy Litoff and Dr. Mary Lyons on receiving the Alumni Association Distinguished Faculty Award.

Trueheart also noted the 39 faculty members that have had works published this year and praised the 670 students who made last semesters dean's list and the 88 students inducted into Delta Mu Delta this year.

Trueheart then introduced Board of Trustee member Charles Healy, President and CEO of the Bank of New England-Old Colony. Healy stated, "those of us who are gathered here today are participating in an exciting event - the beginning of a new era at Bryant. As this academic year begins so to begins the era of William E. Trueheart, Bryant College's sixth president. We all look forward to Bill's leadership. And through our understand of Bryant's mission, we, all of us, have the opportunity to carry the college into the 1990's."

Following Mr. Healy's address, Senate President Harry Franks '91 spoke on being a prepared business leader of tomorrow. Franks said, "There is no doubt a new era will soon be upon us," referring to changes in overseas competition, rapid technological changes, the deregulation in markets, and labor-management relations. "And it is those leaders who possess the ability to foresee the future who will succeed," Franks said.

Mahoney, Associate Professor of Finance presented Joseph Ilacqua, Associate Professor of Economics, with the Distinguished Faculty Award. Ilacqua accepted the award, stating, "While I am proud to receive this honor today, I have to think of it really as symbolic of all the faculty who have been here with me over the past 21 years."

Professor Robert Hehre,

accounting department chair, introduced Dr. Charles Bowsher '84H, Comptroller General of the United States. Bowsher congratulated all the students for having made the decision to further their education. According to Bowsher, we cannot be afraid of our competition; instead, "we have got to train our young people." Bowsher also said we must "read

and do our homework and study all through our lives. Because if we are not willing to do that someone else will."

Finally Dr. James Robinson, Vice President for Academic Affairs, concluded the convocation by wishing everyone a year of "challenge, success, and enrichment in all their endeavors."

## Local Politicians Lecture at Bryant

Monday was indeed a rare day on the Bryant campus. Why, one might ask? Because two Rhode Island state representatives were here on separate missions.

Representative Claudine Schneider sponsored a forum on water conservation to urge for tax rebates for installing water-saving devices. To support her point, she spoke of a personal experience of wanting to replace four water-wasting toilets at her house in Narragansett and the great expense that this would entail. It was mentioned that the idea of rebates had been brought up in several bills in the House but had never resulted in a favorable outcome.

Schneider was one of five who urged 60 industry representatives to join the water conservation crusade for both profit and the environment. Schneider has also been active in co-sponsoring a bill to set national plumbing fixture standards. She set the tone of the forum by saying, "It is becoming painfully clear that

American business has to tap every chance for reducing costs. There are also great environmental benefits."

The other representative on campus was Congressman Ronald K. Machtley. He came to Bryant to team-teach a junior/senior government and business course with President William E. Trueheart and economics professor Joseph Ilacqua. The course examines the impact of government policies on business. Machtley will be teaching the Monday class of the Monday/Wednesday/Friday course and will be focusing on specific public policy issues ranging from health care to national defense. The main purpose of the course is to fill in the blanks on how government policies affect business operations and the economy.

He stated "As a member of Congress, it is my responsibility to enhance education and to underscore the importance of higher education. It is a privilege for me to help train tomorrow's leaders, and I hope I will be able to inspire the students at Bryant to bring their education, talent and dedication to the public sector."

# It's Not Cool To Live On Campus

Summer decided to make another appearance late last week and early into this week. With the hot and humid (93 degrees and 78% relative humidity) weather conditions came air conditioning problems here at Bryant. Some resident students lost their air conditioning entirely for a day or so. Others had to contend with on-and-off air conditioning. Meanwhile the townhouse residents had their air conditioning units padlocked in an attempt to prevent them from using the units. And over in the MAC, students were attempting to put together a newspaper, conduct radio shows, and participate in sports practices, all without air conditioning. Needless to say, these conditions made for quite uncomfortable living for a few days.

The problem resulted when the college reached its energy demand peak during the day on Monday. Physical Plant decided that certain buildings' air conditioning would have to be shut down until the conditions improved. Considering that Bryant can be compared to a small city in terms of energy use, one can understand how this could develop into a serious situation. Yet students pay a great deal of money to attend Bryant. Is it too much to ask that our living conditions are comfortable, and more importantly, conducive to learning? Ever try reading (and understanding what you've read) in a room that is 90 degrees, humid, and doesn't have a breeze?

At least three questions arose from the situation. Why weren't students told the reason behind the air conditioners being turned off? Was poor planning responsible for the situation? And, most importantly, what's going to be done to avoid a similar situation in the future?

Students are an important part of the Bryant community. Yet by not telling them what is going on in their dorms (which are, incidentally, their homes) students are given the message that maybe they aren't that important. The padlocks gave the townhouse residents an even more negative message.

If Bryant is indeed like a small city, then as students we can be considered citizens of the city. Citywide announcements are often communicated to residents over radio and television stations. Why shouldn't Bryant citizens/students be communicated with? Radio and television station broadcasting probably wouldn't have been feasible in this situation. But Residence Life and the resident assistants could have been told, and in turn could have informed the students. Or teachers could have made announcements in class. By not telling students what was going on, Physical Plant invited people to start rumors which supposedly

explained what was happening. And of course, rumors were started and spread quite rapidly.

Dorm 16 has been, for the most part, completed for awhile now. Of course minor adjustments are still being made, which is understandable. But when the plans were put together for the dorm, didn't anyone consider the additional energy demands that would result? Dorm 16 was not the first new dorm that was ever built on this campus. Didn't anyone have an experience in this type of thing? Or was it just assumed that the 284 new residents wouldn't use more energy? Considering that the people responsible for the construction of Dorm 16 are called professionals, it seems a little surprising that they didn't plan on this. This was a situation which required immediate action. Hesitation may have led to more problems. However, you can't help but wonder if the problem could have been avoided with a little more planning.

What is more important, however, is whether or not something is being done to avoid this situation in the future. Why wait for the problem - why not act now to avoid it? They say prevention is the best medicine. This is especially important if Bryant's plans include more on-campus housing.

There really are no excuses for the situation happening this time. But there will be even less excuses if it happens again. The people in Physical Plant who made the air conditioning decision may have kept us out of the dark. But the question is, are they still in the dark? Maybe Physical Plant could shed some light on the subject for us.

on the ARA meal plan. This new inflow of students puts a tremendous strain on all ARA dining locations.

He also took student suggestions seriously and made an attempt to fill them. The only problem is, is that Tim Grant and some other important employees are no longer working for ARA at Bryant.

With new employees, ARA has to face their staffing problems. More workers should be placed on the serving line to insure quicker service, especially on the weekend.

When ARA went on strike last semester the management finally got together with the employees to settle. I think the students suffered the most from that strike and that they are suffering now because of poor staffing.

It is no secret that there is a need for more employees at almost every business establishment. But when you look at the amount of money we are paying for a meal plan, there is no excuse for poor service.

ARA's service contract was recently renewed. I would suggest that next time it expires, the college remember how students were previously treated.

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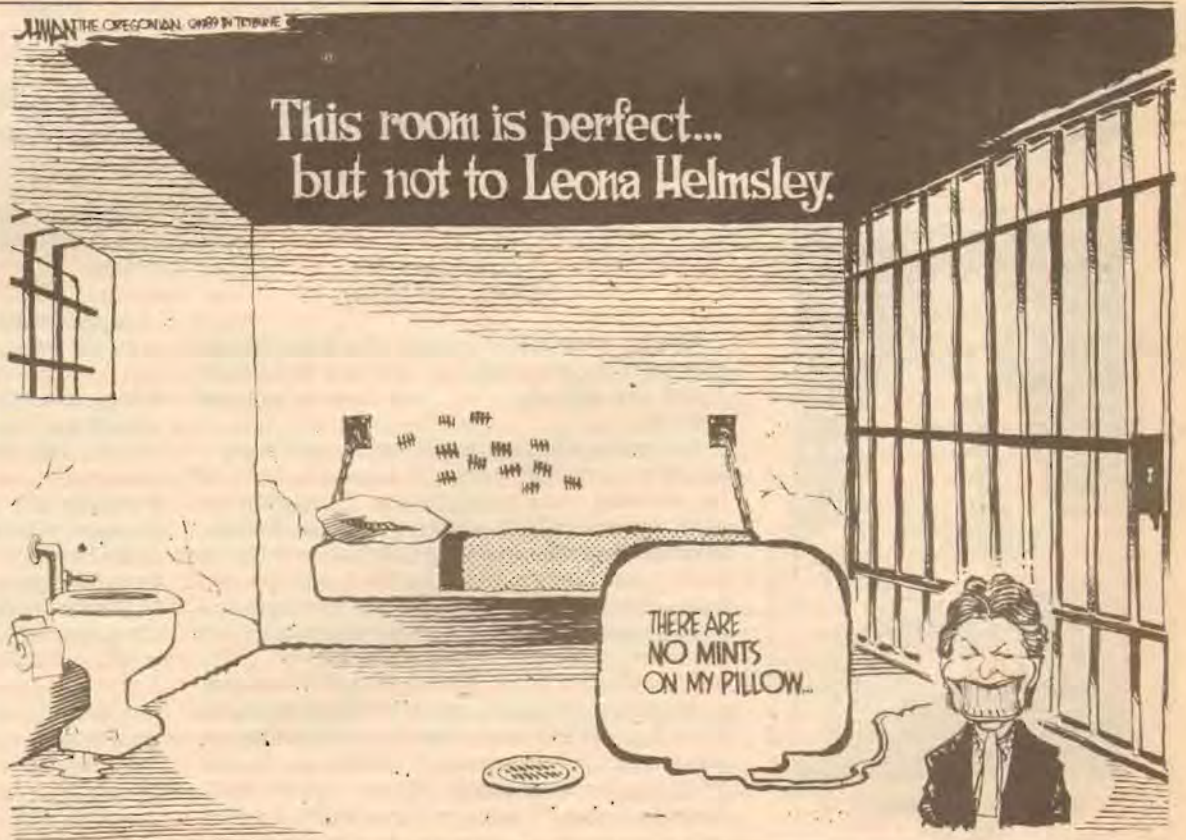
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## Meet Some New Faces

The office is always staffed from 10am to 2pm, Monday through Friday and can usually be found open at other hours during the evening. We welcome new ideas and new faces, as well as all suggestions. We need your support! Bryant is here because of our needs and our tuition. We have the potential of becoming a very influential lobbying group on this campus, however, there is only so much a group of 28 senators can accomplish alone. Take advantage of the opportunity to join a committee - attend a Senate meeting - run for a Senate position. You can help to determine your fate. Don't let fate determine your destiny.

**Hello From Hodgson**

This semester the library staff, upperclass students and new arrivals on campus will be working with enhanced or newly acquired services/products in the Hodgson Memorial Library. In the next few issues of *The Archway* I will present a few introductory explanations to help prepare you for the smooth uses of the VENDACODER machine and the latest versions of the electronic information access products (GENERAL PERIODICALS INDEX and BUSINESS PERIODICALS ON DISC).

**THE VENDACODER MACHINE**

Earlier this summer the library director placed a free standing black vending machine on the main level of the library. The Vendacoder machine replaces the coin boxes on the microfilm machines. It allows us to recover a small fraction of the

usage and supply costs of the newer compact disc computer workstations. It does not relate to the operation of the separately serviced copy (Xerox) machines in the library.

Briefly, the Vendacoder machine allows you to add dollar values to a card (student ID or Vendacard) when hard copy of magazine and newspaper articles is desired.

**USING A STUDENT ID**

1. Your student ID should be presented first to a staff member at the Circulation Desk. Your ID will be formatted for the Vendacoder machine.

2. Insert your student ID at the top of the machine next.

3. Add dollars to the center of the machine. The read-out at the top of the machine will show that the inserted dollar value has been added to your card.

4. Press a button at the top of the machine to eject your ID and you will now be ready to insert the card

into the small boxes near microfilm and compact disc workstations. Nominal fees per page will be deducted from the value registered on your card as you make copies from these machines. Please note that there is still no charge to read pages from the screens.

**USING A VENDACARD**

1. Dollars in the denominations of one, five, ten and twenty may also be inserted first into the machine. In this case the Vendacoder machine will issue a fresh white card or Vendacard from the bottom of the machine. A readout at the bottom of the machine will display that fifty cents has been deducted for a one time purchase of this card.

2. Take the new white card from the bottom of the machine and insert at the top to register the new money value of the card.



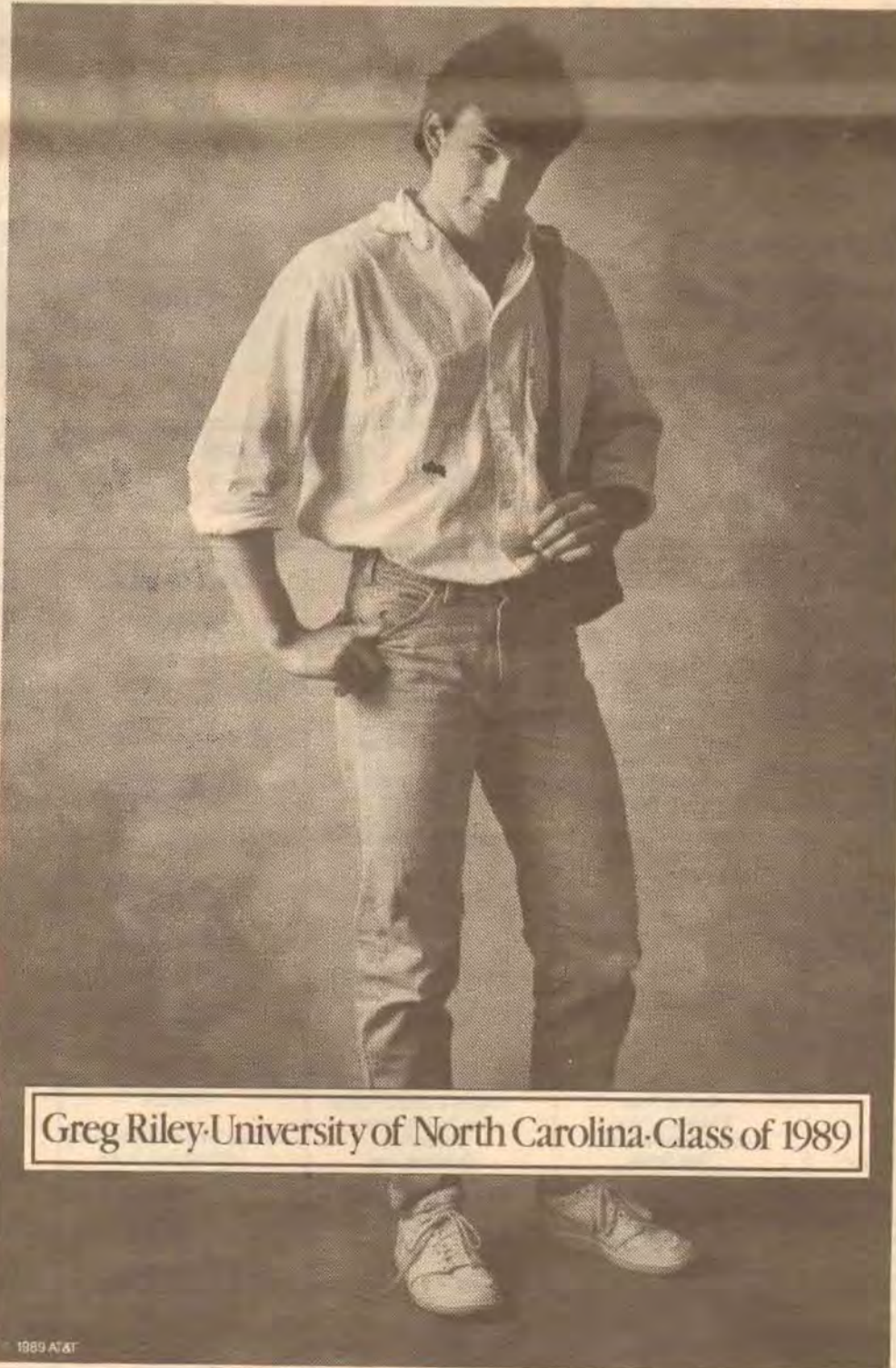

far. The idea that "the people know best" is only true in a general way. Specifically, "the people" are idiots who don't know much about anything.

This thought came to mind this morning while I was reading about the latest "poll." One of the big polling organizations asked people this question:

SHOULD THE U.S. SEND TROOPS TO HELP THE COLOMBIAN GOVERNMENT WITH ITS WAR ON DRUG LEADERS?

The results of so many polls are being published or shown on television these days that you'd think we'd turned over the democratic process to the polling companies that regularly ask a few hundred people what they think about something and then conclude, from the results, that it's what everyone thinks. The suggestion is that's what people think, Congress or the President should act accordingly.

There are several kinds of poll questions. A poll that asks people their reaction is harmless:

DO YOU THINK PRESIDENT BUSH IS DOING: A) A GOOD JOB B) A GREAT JOB or C) A POOR JOB? CHOOSE ONE.

That's fine. No harm done, but a poll that suggests advice to elected officials is dangerous.

SHOULD WE WITHDRAW AID TO THE CONTRAS?

Americans don't have enough information to answer that question intelligently. The job of an elected official is to become knowledgeable about issues for us so that he can take the right steps. That's what elected officials are for in a representative government.

The average American doesn't have the foggiest notion what the contras are all about. He doesn't have any idea what the political

problems are in Colombia and whether U.S. troops would make them better or worse. This is no question to ask an American citizen. We have people who are paid to know these things. That's who the President and Congress should listen to, not the rest of us.

The idea that everyone should have a vote on everything is crazy.

When a father is taking the family somewhere and the car breaks down, he doesn't pull over and take a poll of the passengers to find out what's wrong. If he has any sense, he gets the car to a garage where they have an expert, a mechanic.

The danger in all these polls is not that average people read the results for amusement. The danger is that politicians read them and act on them in a way they think will please their constituents. Politicians are so conscious of the next election that many of them will do anything, even something they know is wrong, if they think it will please a large number of voters. Many politicians pay more attention to the polls than to the facts.

In Congress, they understand that members of the Committee on Agriculture know more about farm issues that come before them than the rest of the members do. Congressmen who serve on the Armed Services Committee have spent more time studying the pros and cons of the Stealth Bomber than members who serve on the Merchant Marine Fisheries Committee. You can't expect an ordinary American citizen to answer a pollster's question on farming, bombers, or fisheries with anywhere near the expertise that a Congressman on a committee would have.

That's why it's dangerous to suggest that politicians should pay any attention to polls that express the opinions of a lot of us who don't know that we're talking about.

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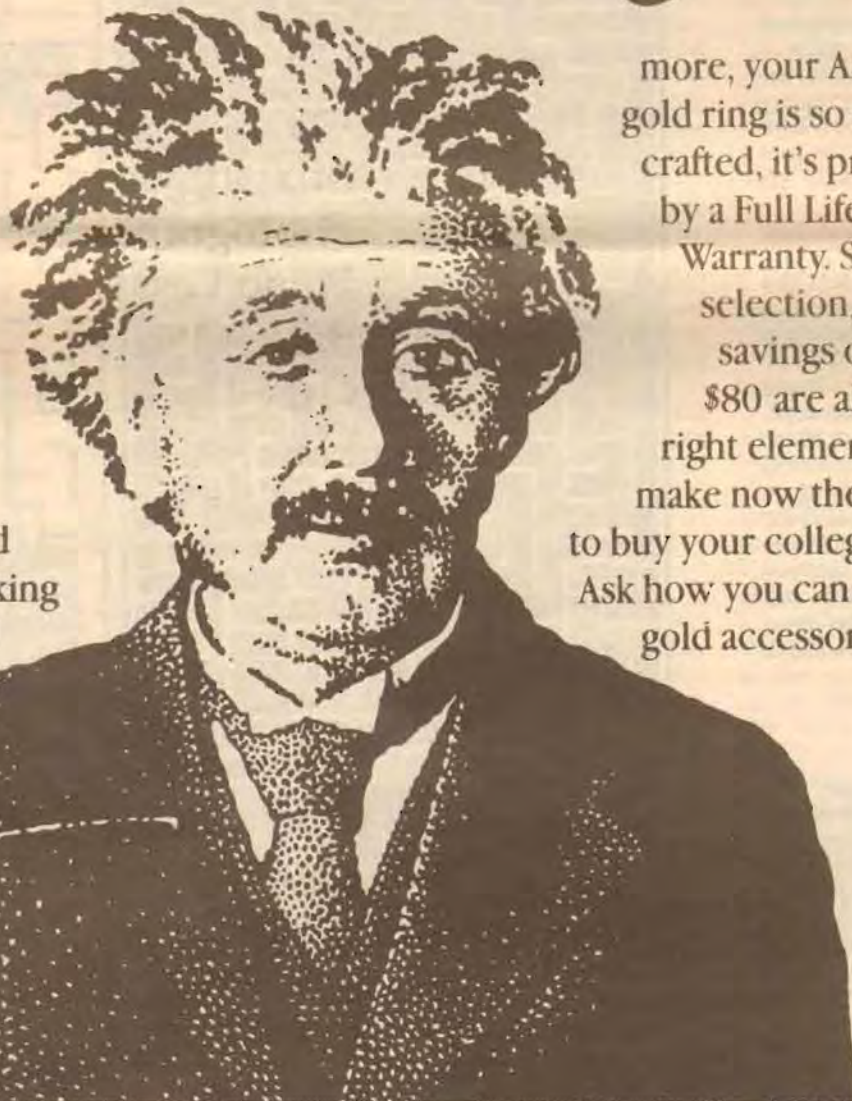



# Beldy Beats Best, Wins ACU National Bowling Title

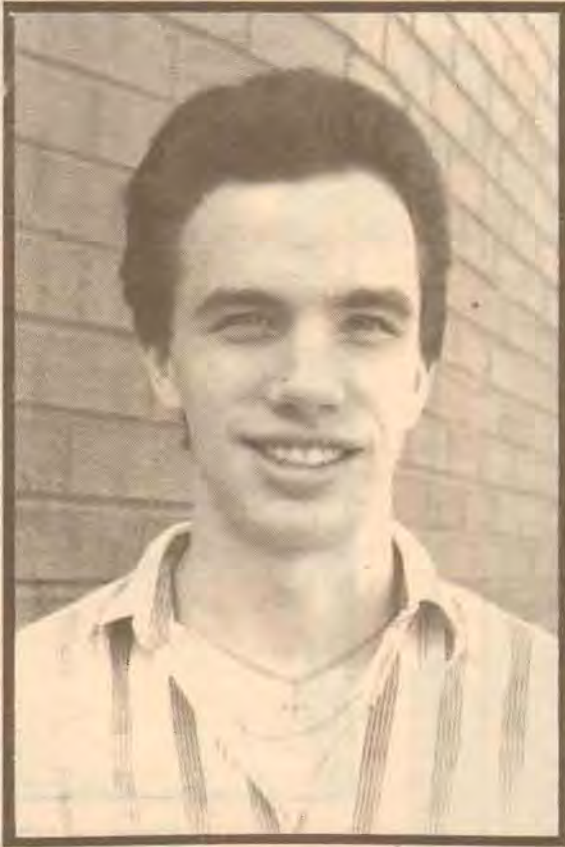
Not many people take their bowling as seriously as John Beldy. But then, not everyone wins the Association of College Unions National Bowling Tournament as a Freshman.

Last semester, as everybody was tearing their hair out over finals, John was in Wichita, Kansas, bowling his way past 31 of the top bowlers in the country. The 32 tournament berths are determined from the top two qualifiers in 15 regional tournaments. Two at large selections also earn berths in the only tournament for the nearly 2,500 bowlers on the nations 300 college bowling teams. There are six qualifying games on the Friday of the tournament, which pairs the field down to 8 for Saturday's championship round.

He was lucky to make the tournament at all. During the regular season, Beldy bowled a 192

average, good for fourth on the team. But the mark of a champion is the ability to get it done come crunch time, and in the regional qualifier, he finished second to teammate Scott Gonzalez, 1,896 to 1,846, and he was on his way to Wichita.

Beldy started bowling at the age of 15 when his father got him involved in the game, and has been on a roll ever since. Going into the last game of the tournament, he had

"I really tried to stay completely in the game mentally. It's not like baseball or football where you have to work yourself physically. Bowling is 90% mental, so when I was up there I was just concentrating on good position."

Beldy rolled a 250 in the last game, to beat out former national bowling champion Scott Scroggins of West Texas State by 30 pins. Scroggins rolled a perfect 300 game. "It didn't really hit me that I had won until after I got back here and people started congratulating me."

Over the summer, John didn't let up at all. "By winning the tournament, I qualified for the Team USA National Final in

Milwaukee. I finished like 35th out of 2000."

What's in the future for Beldy? "I'd like to repeat, but since I've already done it as a freshman, I have to look for other goals. I've considered the pro tour once I graduate, but that's three years away."

He can just sit back for a while and bask in the light of being a national champion.

# Where do we go From Here?

When you left campus at the end of last semester, there were two issues in the world of Bryant sports whose fate had yet to be decided by the powers that be around these parts. One was "Will Bryant ever see football other than at the New England Patriots training camp?" The other was whether or not Bryant will ever have a fitness center.

For new students, and for those of you who may have forgotten just what all the hoopla was about, let me refresh your memory. Just before Christmas break last year, senators Rob Covino and Kristen Hatch spoke to me regarding a proposal for a football program. Surveys were done, the proposal were presented to the Board of Trustees, and things were looking good. However, towards the end of the semester, no real progress had been made. Athletic Director Leon Drury had said that much of the weight of the decision rested on whether or not schools such as MIT and Bentley would be willing to form a new Division III football league with Bryant. In the end, everything was up in the air, and no one could say when, if ever a decision would be made.

Now, things seem to be heading forward once again. Meetings were held over the summer regarding the program, and a new student survey is on the table for this semester. The

new Division III league has been formed. "I'd like to bring it to a head this semester," stated Drury. "The teams that formed that league over the summer are willing to wait for our program to get off the ground. They want us in the league."

Drury also revealed that it is now in the hands of an Athletic Advisory council. "President Trueheart wants to know about the expense of such a program."

Not to be forgotten in this proposal is the admissions viewpoint. "A lot of students who played (football) in high school aren't coming (to Bryant) because there is no varsity football. They are all going to your Nichol's and MIT's. But if we get a program, a lot of players will see that and say 'let me see your school's brochure'," commented Drury.

Turning our attention to the fitness center, considerable progress has been made over the summer. Funds were approved on May 11 for a new fitness center, and three life cycles have already been received. The center, scheduled to be opened on October 8 will be located in the basement of the MAC. Mr. Drury stated that "carpeting and mirrors have already been installed down there. This will be state of the art equipment and this is the reason for the delay - it hasn't been assembled yet."

"The student fee will be minimal," commented Les LaFond,
