U.S. Accounting Head to Speak at Convocation

America's outspoken chief accountant, dubbed the "congressional watchdog," helps Bryant College celebrate the start of another academic year September 13 by speaking at the annual fall Convocation.

Charles A. Bowsher, comptroller general of the U.S. and head of the General Accounting Office, gives the keynote address at the 11 a.m. Convocation in the Gymnasium. The recipient of an honorary doctorate from Bryant in 1984, Bowsher began his 15-year term as one of Washington's most influential people in October, 1981.

The Convocation also will include the faculty's annual recognition of a colleague. Joseph Ilacqua, associate professor of economics, will be honored this year with the Distinguished Faculty award.

Bowsher's appointment by former president Ronald Reagan was described by him as one of the most important he would ever make. The GAO is an independent, nonpartisan legislative agency with a mandate to assist Congress by examining and reporting on essentially all government activities.

In essence, Congress rarely moves on a major program without consulting Bowsher and the GAO, which also acts as a fiscal watchdog.

Before moving to the GAO, Bowsher was a partner with Arthur Andersen and associated with that accounting firm for over 25 year. He is a graduate of the University of Illinois and the University of Chicago Graduate School of Business, where he earned an M.B.A.

Professor Ilacqua has been teaching at Bryant since 1968. He came to Bryant from Providence College, where he taught for four years after earning an M.A. from Clark University in 1964. His A.B. is from Stonehill College.

Ilacqua is the former president of the Faculty Federation, a post he held for more than 10 years. He has served also on numerous college committees and has been involved with a variety of state and local organizations. Papers he has written or co-authored have been published in leading journals or presented nationally at association conferences. He lives in Providence.

So that students and faculty can attend Convocation, 11 and 12 o'clock classes are cancelled.

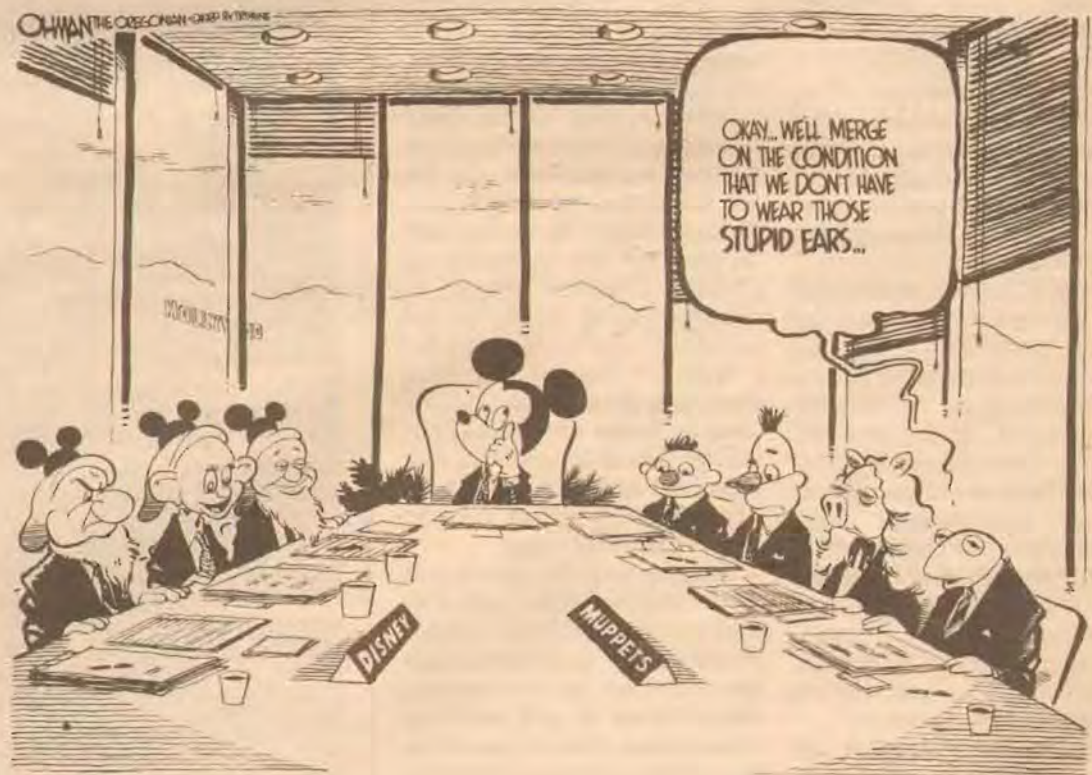

5. Advertisements are due no later than midnight on the Monday before publication. Rate sheets can be obtained by calling the office (232-6028).

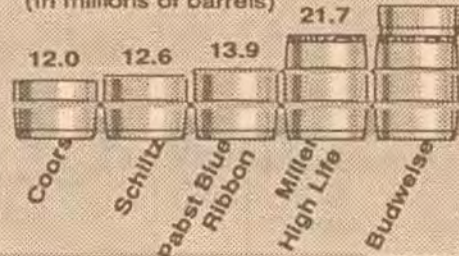
6. Letters to the Editor must be signed. Names will be withheld upon request.

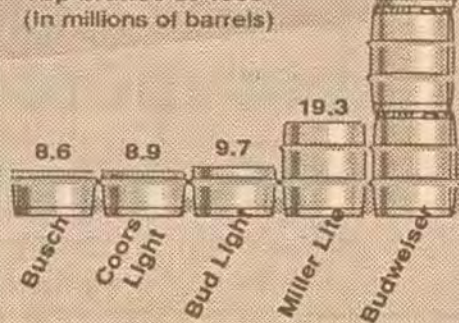
Beer evolution:

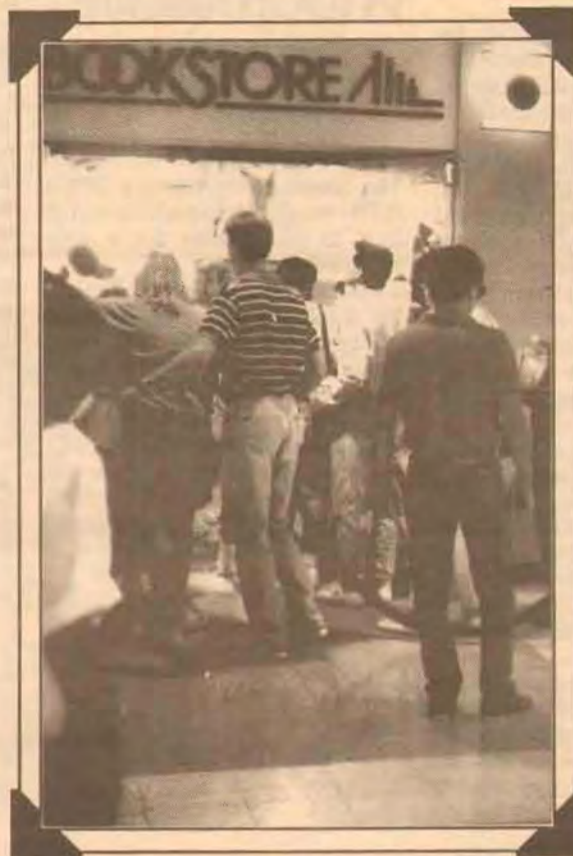

The Student Senate serves as a liaison between the student body and college officials. The Senate acts as a governing body for the students. One of the major responsibilities of the Senate is to

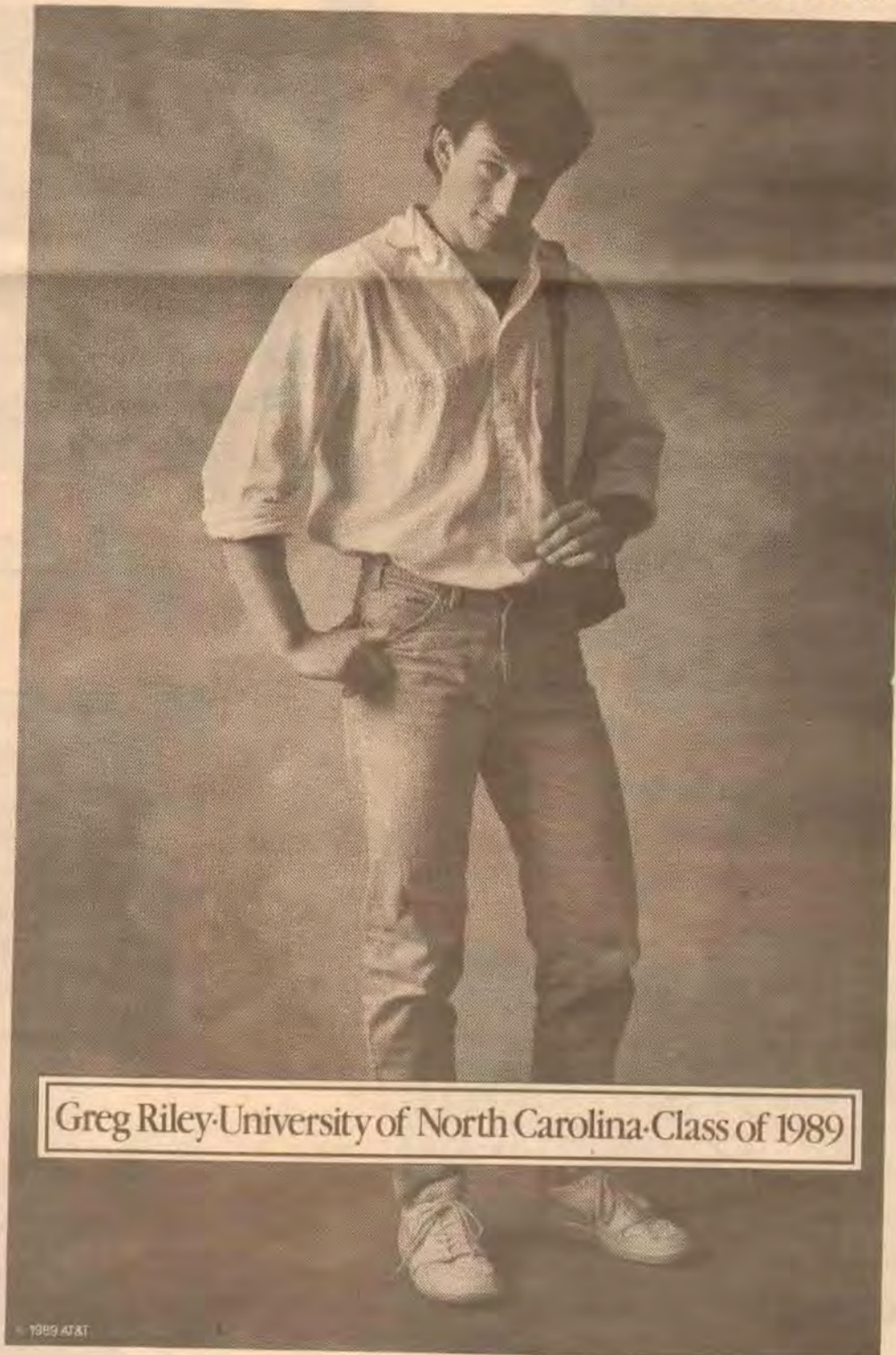
recognize all student organizations and allocate the student activities fee to these groups.

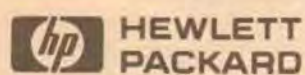
