Students will bear 'frustrating' noise during Unistructure addition of conference/library space, classrooms

Daydreaming in class and staring out the window is not the pleasure it used to be. One would have to be a real heavy daydreamer not to notice the construction behind the unistructure. The contractors started work on the addition July 7th.

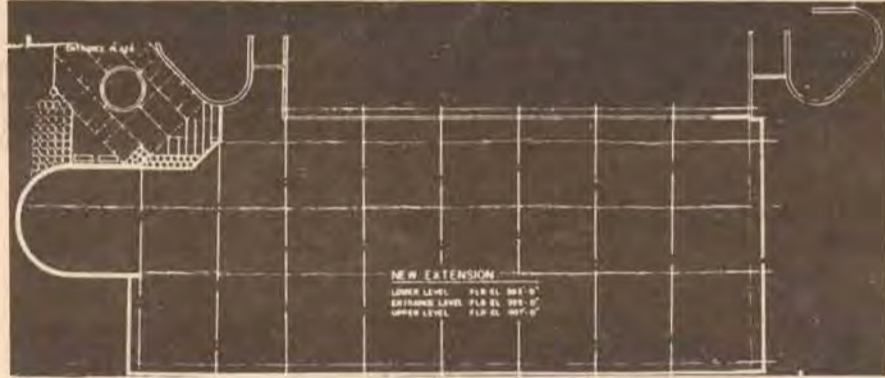
According to project director manager Brad Draycott, the addition will have three levels with the 15 thousand square feet on the bottom floor going to the library. The middle floor will consist of Conference Rooms and offices, and the top floor will have 8 classrooms. Offices that are going to relocate to the area are CMD (Center for Management Development), the Graduate School, the Evening Division, and the Small Business Development Center.

Draycott states that the goal is to have the glass installed and the exterior of the building finished by the first week in November. The

project should be completed by Spring Break next March. The work is being done by Turgeon Construction Company. According to Draycott the cost for construction is \$2,157,000.00.

Draycott comments that the problem of disturbing classes with all the noise is "frustrating", but that the noise level will be improved once they put up a second wall. He also warns that since the glass is out of the windows it "may get cold" in some of the classrooms, and that students should dress accordingly.

As far as any future plans for expansion, Draycott states that the administration is looking at expanding the dining hall and have some proposals already prepared, along with plans for a Dorm 15 for sometime in the future. Finally Draycott assures students that the addition will match the rest of the Unistructure and that the hill behind it will 'still be good for traying.'

Petrello announces new faculty

Bryant College, Smithfield, R.I., has announced new full-time faculty appointments for the upcoming academic year. The new faculty members at Bryant are the following:

Mr. Jean P. Boyer, Visiting Executive in Residence in the Department of Finance. Mr. Boyer holds a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Paris. He attended the Harvard Graduate School of Business and is an MBA graduate from New York University. This past year he was the Distinguished 3-M Professor of Management at the College of St. Thomas, St. Paul, Minnesota.

Mr. Boyer's previous teaching experience includes serving as a Professor of Management Controls at the Hautes Etudes Commerciales, Paris, France. His executive experience in the business world includes appointments as Vice-President of Finance and Controller with W.R. Grace Corporation, Sperry Rand Corporation, and Westinghouse International. Professor Boyer is bilingual in French and English, and he is fluent in Spanish, German, and Portuguese. He has authored several publications in French and English.

His teaching responsibilities at Bryant College will include Multinational Finance, Interpretation of Financial Data, and Financial Management.

Dr. Thomas E. Burke, Distinguished Visiting Professor in Computer Information Systems. Dr. Burke has served as Associate Professor in the School of Engineering at Clemson University. Prior to joining the faculty at Bryant, he served on the faculties of Cleveland State University; Boston College (School of Management); the University of Texas (College of Business); and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (Instrumentation Laboratory), receiving the Tau Beta Pi National Fellowship. Before his academic appointments, he served as President of Format, Inc. and Inter-Technology, Inc. He was also Laboratory Chief of the NASA Electronics Research Center and Section Head at Minneapolis-

Honeywell.

Professor Burke received a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering from M.I.T., and a Ph.D. in Business Administration and Computer Science from the University of Texas. In addition to his teaching responsibilities, Dr. Burke has conducted eight workshops during the past two years correlating professional presentations and the use of audiovisual techniques in various management development programs.

Cynthia Johnson, Assistant Professor in the Computer Information Systems Department. Before joining the Bryant faculty, Johnson had served as a graduate teaching assistant at Oklahoma State and as Head of the Department of Secondary Business Education at Ripley Public School in Ripley, Oklahoma. Her experience also includes the position of sales executive for MacCrank and Associates Advertising Agency.

Johnson received a Bachelor of Science in Business Education degree from Oklahoma State University, where she is currently a candidate for a doctorate in Computer Information Systems. She has been elected to the Beta Gamma Sigma Honorary Fraternity and nominated to the Phi Kappa Honor Society. In addition, she has served as past president and vice-president of Delta Pi Epsilon.

Johnson is the author of several articles published in *Business Education Forum* and *OBEA State Reporter*, etc. While at Bryant, she will teach Computer Information Systems courses on the undergraduate level.

Dr. Robert Giacalone, Assistant Professor of Management. A Cum Laude graduate of Hofstra University with a Bachelor's degree in Psychology and English, he received his Ph.D. from the State University of New York (SUNY) at Albany. He was nominated to the Psi Chi Psychological Honor Society. His teaching experience includes courses in psychology at SUNY-Albany, Skidmore College, the Junior College of Albany, and the

Jobs game: Bryant, 18.5; competition 15.0

Interviewing for jobs can be a frightening experience; but, it does not have to be. Bryant is fortunate enough to have a very competent Career Services Office.

The bidding system might at first glance seem unnecessarily complicated and involved. It is however, the most equitable solution to the problem. The system replaced a random selection procedure similar to the Pre-Registration. Although random selection might seem to be the fairest, it often matched students with their eighth or ninth choices. The obvious result is a large percentage of no shows. This made the Career Services Department look inadequate and cast a poor light on the College in general. Prior to the random selection, the interviews were handled on a first come, first serve basis. When better than two hundred seniors lined up at the same time to schedule interviews the ensuing chaos must have been impossible.

The present system was adopted two years ago and is modeled after the University of Chicago Graduate Business School procedure. Aside from seeming the most equitable, the system forces the student to become more involved in the whole process. The results have been impressive. Last semester six hundred and fifty interviews were conducted and 18.5% of those interviewing were placed with companies. The national average was 15.0%.

Most students at Bryant will participate in this system before they graduate. Without it, many would not have as good of a chance at getting an interview with the companies they want the most.

To The Editor,

I appreciate the thoroughness of Steven Medin's article of September 9, 1983. Please note the following points, however, which are offered by way of clarification:

I. This semester we shall observe three types of microlab usage:

A. Faculty involved with and students enrolled in the regular microcomputer course offerings of the Center (for Management Development), the Day School, and the Graduate School. Each area currently sponsors one course.

B. Faculty developing courses based exclusively on the microcomputer.

C. Faculty involved with and students enrolled in courses which occasionally use microcomputers.

II. While the College's investment in microcomputers has been very substantial and its acquisition of hardware and software undoubtedly rapid, further developments of this resource are under study and cannot be translated into a cash basis.

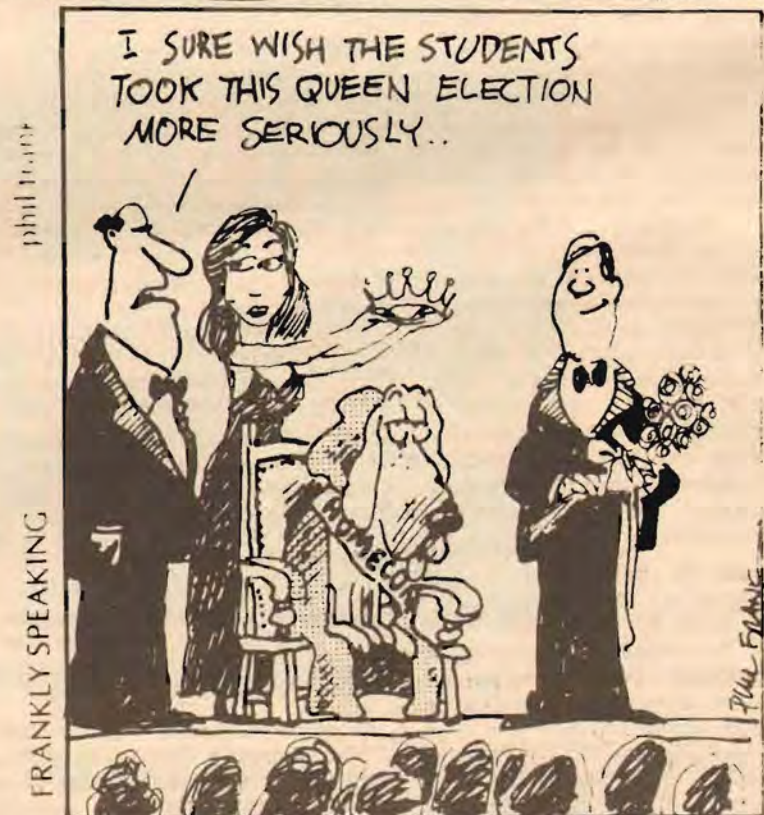
III. My office and that of Business Affairs

are responsible for implementing the microcomputer academic budget. The actual operations, management, and student-employee supervision lie under the jurisdiction of Mr. Neal Koski, Director of the Data Center.

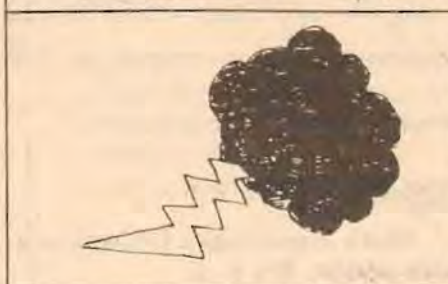
IV. The formulation of all academic computing policy, procedures, and guidelines--including that related to microcomputer labs--will rest with the Director of Academic Data Processing, who, when hired, will report to Dr. George J. Petrello, Vice President for Academic Affairs.

First SEAL event of the semester planned for October 5 in Pub

The SEALs (Student Enforcers at Large) program will be back in force on October 5, for the first SEAL-controlled Wine and Cheese event of the school year.

The SEALs program allows students of all ages to attend a typically majority-age event. The success of the program last year prompted school administration to reinstate the policy this year, and permanently, until an illegal incident occurs.

The program will be essentially the same as last year; Minors will wear white wristbands and those over 20 will wear colored or striped wristbands (the color will be decided upon 10 minutes prior to the start of the event by the SEAL supervisor). Five SEALs will patrol the crowds at each event, enforcing alcohol policy based on the wristbands. Students will prove age based on their Bryant ID and will be checked against a master list and guests will require two forms of identification, one with a picture.

Violators of the alcohol policy will be confronted by one of the SEALs and asked to show identification. Names will be taken and the guilty parties will be removed from the event.

Disciplinary action at SEAL controlled

events include the following:

First Offense - \$5.00 fine

Second Offense - \$20.00 fine and Pub privileges revoked for the remainder of the semester.

Third Offense - \$50.00 fine and an appearance before the College Disciplinary Board.

Students must return their wristbands upon leaving the event. Failure to comply will result in a \$10.00 fine. All fines will be collected by the SEAL Administration and used only for expenses at SEAL controlled events. The SEALs are not intended to take the place of Security at Wine and Cheese events.

The SEALs program was developed last year by the Quality of Student Life Committee and supervised by Greg Otterbein, a QSL committee member and Former Director of Student Activities, Gerri Hura. Greg will run the program again this year in coordination with the new Director, Lori Nash.

Greg currently has five SEALs who will continue this year, and estimates that 15 more are needed. Students of any age may apply for the positions. Otterbein asks for the cooperation of the entire student body; selfishness of only a few people can ruin the program and social atmosphere of all events.

The College Scene

THE TOWING POLICY at Michigan State U. was declared illegal by the state Supreme Court recently, because it permitted towing of any illegally parked car. The state Uniform Traffic Code only permits towing of vehicles that are obstructing traffic or are illegally parked in loading zones, handicapped or rental spaces. The ruling came in a 1979 class-action lawsuit filed on behalf of 3,000 towing victims. A state claims court will now decide damages and could instruct MSU to refund \$20 towing fees to nearly 24,000 people.

AN UNDERCOVER PROBE of the U. of Houston registration office produced conviction of one employee for altering records for a fee. The woman was sentenced to three years probation and fined \$400. A fellow employee awaits trial on similar charges. Both were arrested after offering to change the records of undercover officers, posing as students. The undercover operation began after a student reported the employees offered to change records for \$30.

GREED AND SELF-CENTEREDNESS are the basic problems of humanity, Michigan Tech U. students said in a Campus Crusade for Christ survey. The survey, conducted annually for the last five years, involved 750 students, 90% of whom said they are or were involved in a church or religious group. Over half said they had a philosophy of life that answers the basic question: "What is the purpose of life and human existence?"

HOW DO YOU DEAL WITH SEXUAL HARASSMENT? While many schools are creating institutional policies, a national women's group is offering a simpler approach: Write a letter to the harasser. The letter should briefly tell the facts of what happened, describe the writer's feelings, and state what the writer wants to happen next. The letter writing strategy has proven successful in the business world, and on campus. (CONTACT: A one-page paper, "Writing a Letter to the Sexual Harasser," by Bernice Sandler, is available for 50c from the Project on the Status and Education of Women, Association of American Colleges, 1818 R. St. NW, Washington, DC 20009. Bulk copies are available.)

EDUCATION WILL SOON BECOME the largest industry in the United States, as displaced workers seek retraining, and industry tries to incorporate new technology. That prediction came from David Pierce Snyder, a futurist, in a speech to the American Society of Association Executives. Snyder encouraged association leaders to use information technology to expand services to members and to expand member awareness of such technology.

Campus dry after pipe break

A number of dorms were without water for almost nine hours last Friday, due to a break in a campus water pipe.

According to Bryant Physical Plant Director, Brian Britton, large rocks surrounding the pipe shifted, crushing a section of pipe. The subsequent leak was discovered when Bryant maintenance men noticed water, "welling up around the basketball court near Dorm 11."

The water supply was immediately shut off and maintenance men dug to the pipe underneath the basketball court. An eight foot section of pipe was required to replace the

Britton explains the cast iron pipe was crushed when rocks surrounding it shifted. This shifting, he says, was a result of poor installation originally.

The leak was discovered sometime before noon and the water supply was returned by 8:30 P.M.

This incident is similar to another leak which occurred last year in the same area after a contractor apparently buried an already severed section of pipe. Both incidents appear to be the result of faulty workmanship.

Britton is hopeful that the basketball court can be resurfaced this fall or early next spring.

Military Science Department awards students for past accomplishments

The Department of Military Science at Bryant, in conjunction with the Providence College ROTC, conducted an awards and swearing-in ceremony to recognize ROTC students' past accomplishments and to emphasize the importance of the oath which all new ROTC cadets swear. The ceremony was conducted at Providence College last Wednesday afternoon. Lieutenant Colonel Jack Kennedy, Professor of Military Science Providence, presided over the ceremony and opened the proceedings with a few laudatory remarks concerning the importance of the excellence demonstrated by the cadets.

Colonel Kennedy explained to the audience of approximately one hundred that the accomplishments of the ROTC cadets have implications that go far beyond the realm of the Department of Military Science and the ROTC program. The students' accomplishments "demonstrate leadership, a trait sought by industry and the military alike." He went on to explain that these cadets are set apart from their peers because they have already demonstrated the ability to lead.

A number of Bryant students were recognized at this ceremony for their accomplishments during the past summer. Cadets Mike Bradley and John Caramadre were recognized for their completion of Airborne training following their completion of the ROTC Advance Camp this summer. Both are now qualified to wear the coveted jump wings of a US Army paratrooper. Mike Bradley was also recognized for his sterling performance during the last year in the ROTC and was named the Deputy Commander of the ROTC student battalion at Providence College. This carries with it the cadet rank of lieutenant colonel and is the highest rank or position ever held by a Bryant ROTC student.

Several other awards were also presented. Seniors Mike Corriveau and Mike Murphy were awarded the Military Proficiency Awards earned at the ROTC Advanced Camp. These two Bryant students were the only two cadets from a group of more than fifty attendees from the Providence College detachment to receive this award. Mike

Bryant Shuttle offers rides to Lincoln Mall

Mall on weekends was favored over buying a van and hiring drivers through the school.

Northwest Transportation service, based in Woonsocket, has the contract rights for service for the Fall semester on a conditional basis, depending on the popularity of the program. The vehicle is a 19 passenger

Mercedes-Benz, painted dark blue. According to Assistant Director for Student Activities, Norm Parenteau, the Fall semester service will cost the college \$2,200 for 20 round trips per weekend, covering the driver and insurance. Students using the bus will pay 25¢ each way, no tickets need to be purchased in advance. On Tuesday, September 6, the BTA offered free rides to the Mall, and 120 students took advantage of the opportunity to start their shopping sprees early. With the fare in effect, 174 students used the bus last weekend. Several trips were standing room only according to Parenteau, commenting that positive results like these will keep the bus in service for a long time.

The bus picks up students at the phone booth in front of Dorm 12 and drops them off at the Cherry & Webb entrance to the mall, which is also the Rhode Island Public Transit Authority (RIPTA) depot. Parenteau notes that the current schedule is temporary and that it will be coordinated with RIPTA's service to Providence to provide a timely transfer into RIPTA's main transfer point, location of the Amtrak terminal and Bonanza/Greyhound Bus terminal. Careful coordination of the two schedules will get students in and out of Providence for day trips and suitcase weekends.

Special service will be offered on the holiday weekends at extra cost based on how many student sign up for a ride in advance.

Parenteau sees several features in the future if the service remains successful, ranging from expanded hours to a bus shelter and sign to sales of Riptiks, the ride ticket books for RIPTA service.
