1982 Senior Class Gift:

## Kevin McArdle Scholarship Established

The Senior Class Gift Committee unanimously voted Monday to establish a \$10.000 endowed scholarship in the memory of Kevin P. McArdle. As the gift from the Class of 82, the scholarship would be awarded each year to an incoming freshman based on criteria to be decided upon by Mr. & Mrs. McArdle.

The committee, chaired by Senior Senator John Stockholm, has set March 1, as the fundraising "kickoff date." During the month of March, each senior will be asked to pledge as much as he or she can afford while resident students will also be able to donate the remainder of their dorm deposit to the scholarship fund.

Through the efforts of Tom Foley and many other friends of Kevin McArdle, approximately \$2,500 has already been raised. A total of \$10,000 must be raised before the scholarship can be "endowed"-in other words,

awarded each and every year. The actual amount would then depend on the interest earned on the base amount. The higher the base amount is, the more the scholarship award will be. At today's interest rates, the interest on \$10,000 would be approximately \$1,500 with the potential to grow each year.

The committee believes that the remaining \$7,500 is an obtainable goal that can be realized through pledges and a number of other fundraisers that have been planned. These include steak raffles, the raffling of a trip to Florida, a "Funrun", and a marathon softball game among others. In order to reach its goal, the senior class must cooperate and be generous.

## Rhode Island Scholarship Pageant Slated

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## Closer look at the Unemployment Rate

Welcome back to another semester at Bryant College. If you have been overwhelmed by recent economic event don't be dismayed as I am sure that there many people, including economists, who are just as confused as you are. But, rather than wander in the dark or turn an apathjetic ear to all that surrounds you why not attempt to tackle a few of the economic issues of the day, one at a time. To begin the 'education' let's take a look at the problem of unemployment.

Let's look at the numbers. Currently the unemployment rate is reported as 8.7% of a labor force of approximately 110 million Americans. This results in 9.5 million Americans classified as unemployed. To bring this up to date, one million more people were out of work in November than in September of 1981. This is no small sum especially if it happens to include you! But, let's not stop here, we should definitely take a closer look at these numbers to reveal a more hidden detail

about the 'unemployment problem' in the

The unemployment rate measures the number of unemployed people as a percent of the labor force. But the way the government defines what it means to be "in the labor force" and "unemployed" actually excludes many people who suffer the hardship of not being able to find work. To be counted as a member of the labor force, you have to be either working or actively looking for work. To be unemployed, you have to be in the labor force. But, if you've given up looking for work, then you're not a member of the labor force and don't show up in the official statistics.

Now, the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) does publish quarterly information on "discouraged" workers. As recently as September, 1981, 1.1 million people were recorded as having said they they have given up looking for work because they could not find a job or thought no job was available to them. Include these discouraged job seekers in your statistics of unemployment and the ranks swell to over 10 million and an unemployment figure of approximately 9.4%

Now, for the case of the part-time worker. The BLS considers all workers it surveys to be fully-employed, even if a person works only one hour a week! So a part-time worker who wants a full-time job but can't find one is still considered fully employed. Four and one half million part-timers translates into 2.25 million full-time workers and another 2.25 million unemployed. We have now pushed our total of unemployed to almost 13 million or 11.5%.

But, what do all these numbers mean. How can we put these into perspective so that we can fully comprehend their impact? Could we possibly start with "The Great Depression" as a point of reference. Undoubtedly the worst economic event of this century. Unemployment peaked at 25%, but only of a labor force of 36 million. In total numbers we have already eclipsed that amount (9 million).

Better yet one can fully appreciate these numbers if one thinks of the social implications of a nation confronted with over 10 million people unable to find employment, especially in a society geared towards consumerism. Can the American people cope with "limited horizons" or in this case with "bleak horizons"? Will the social unrest in the U. S., which has been contained by unemployment compensation programs, explode into a social revolution as the unemployed form along class and race lines and confront the 'haves' with the 'have-nots'.

Is the current Administration in Washington ignorant of this growing threat and unconsciously reducing the number of federal employees by half a million to add to the mounting unemployment rolls, or are they fully aware of their policy implications and planning on some how manipulating this growing social unrest to achieve some devious

Nick Lowe, former member of the defunct Rockpile, attempts to renew his solo career with his new album Nick the Knife. Actually, two of the other three Rockpile members (Terry Williams, Billy Bremner- no Dave Edmunds) play with Lowe. The record lacks the constant rock-a-billy and spunk found on Edmunds and Rockpile's recent albuns. Even the entertaining, fun atmosphere found on Lowe's other albums seems to be gone

The songs that near that level of past achievements are the ones that stand out. They are "Let Me Kiss Ya", "Stick it Where the Sun Don't Shine", and "Burning". ## Run for Your Life, Bryant College!!!

In early October of last semester, the Athletic Department and the Department of Military Science introduced the "Run for your Life" program to the Bryant campus. At the present time, the program has approximately thirty-four participants.

"Run for Your Life" is a prospectus of aerobic exercise open to all students, faculty. administration and staff of the Bryant community. The program caters to both the begining and the seasoned runner and includes and award system to add motivation and recognize achievement. Award certificates and patches are issued when participants complete a designated number of miles. The following mileage totals qualify for awards; 50, 100, 200, 300, 400, 500, 750, 1,000, 2.500, 5,000, 7,500, and 10,000.

Joining the "Run for Your Life" program is easy. Registration forms, running programs. distance and certification sheets, and instruction can be obtained from Charlie Mandeville in the MAC Training Room or from Captain Jim Koch in Room 370: "Run for Your Life" is unique, in that it has three distinct running programs that one can enter. These three running programs (or phases) are the Preparatory phase, the Conditioning phase and the Sustaining phase.

The Preparatory phase is tailor made for non-runners or beginning runners of any age who wish to attain greater physical fitness through aerobic exercise. Beginning a program of aerobic exercise can result in development of the heart, lungs and circulatory vessels. This strengthening of the cardio-vascular system can prevent coronary disease, aid the body in dealing with physical and emotional stress and just plain make you designed to increase stamina. This programs easy pace makes it ideal for anyone interested in beginning a consistent exercise routine.

The second phase one can enter, the Conditioning phase, is well suited for

feel better and healthier. To get beginners off on the right foot, "Run for Your Life" has a six week Preparatory schedule available to all interested individuals. This schedule consists first of walking, then walk run combinations

beginning runners of all ages who wish to improve their endurance. This schedule. which lasts 9 weeks, provides distances ranging from 1-2 miles and slowly progressive time goals. The Conditioning phase, provides adequate preparation that will enable one to reach the third or Sustaining phase, where maximum mileage allowed per day is 5 with a time goal of 8:30 per mile.

The "Run for Your Life" program at Bryant is sponsored by the Military Science Department and managed by the U.S. Army Infantry School (USAIS). Fort Benning. Georgia. The USAIS maintains a master file of participating schools, arranges funding for the program and created and distributes awards. The Bryant College Athletic Department is also very involved in the "Run for Your Life" program. This department is responsible for providing measured running areas, distributing and collecting forms (along with the Military Science Department) and providing space for the posting of achieved goals and other program notices. Individual records for the program are maintained by the Military Science Department.

Any and all members of the Bryant commuity interested in running the road to greater physical fitness should consider joining this unique program. Additional information, registration forms, and mileage logs can be obtained from either Charlie Mandeville at the MAC Training room at extension 404 or Captain Jim Koch at the Military Science Office (Room 370) at extension 275. Incidently, joining the program is absolutely free, with no hidden costs. At a price like this, isn't about time you did something good for yourself? 

## The Law of Gravity Studied During Wintersession or

What goes up must come down.

While most people were spending their intersession either shoveling snow or delving into the books, sophomore Dan Powers was becoming intimately familiar with Newton's Law describing gravitational forces and acceleration through space by jumping out of aircraft flying at altitudes of 1500 feet. He did. of course, wear a parachute while all of this was going on, but in those first four seconds before he felt the opening shock of his main parachute, he learned the lesson of a lifetime which will ever remain indelibly etched on his

Dan was given the opportunity to undergo three weeks of rigorous training at the Army's Airborne School at Fort Benning, Georgia, at no cost to himself (except for those few. precious, startled moments of descent) and no obligation to the Army. The opportunity to attend the training was made available through the Army ROTC program here at Bryant College. Dan was one of the two students chosen from among nine applicants from Providence College, RIC, and Bryant.

The Airborne School teaches military parachuting, which differs greatly from the sports parachuting most are familiar with. The program stresses though physical conditioning so the your body is capable of absorbing the pressures associated with ground impact. It also stresses mental alertness sot that, in the unlikely event of a parachute malfunction, you know exactly what to do and can do it quickly.

Most of the first two weeks are devoted to training in simulators to teach aircraft exit techniques and safe landing positions: The third week is devoted to actual parachuting from military aircraft, both prop and jet engine driven. If you successfully make five jumps, one of which is at night, you will be

qualified for the coveted US Army Parachutist Badge.


For Dan the hardest part of the training was practice jumping from a piece of apparatus called the 34 foot tower. "They get you 34 feet off the ground on a platform, stand you in a mock aircraft door, and tell you to jump. Even though you're caught by a cable attached to your parachute harness before you hit the ground, jumping from that little 34 feet is the scariest thing I've ever had to do. It's standing on the structure that scares you." The fact is that more people fail out of training on the "tower" than anywhere else in the course. "Jumping a plane is a piece of cake after the 34

Although the Army paid for all of Dan's training he is under no obligation to continue with ROTC in the future as a result of that training. His decision to go on and get an Army commission as a Second Lieutenant will not be make until next semester. But Dan does freely admit that he is seriously considering continuing with the Army after college. "The challenge of doing new things every day is a real driving force in my life."

Army ROTC also offers other types of adventure training for people interested in the Army aa a career. These include winter survival training at the Northern Warfare Training Center at Fort Greely, Alaska, and the US Army Air Assault School at Fort Campbell, Kentucky. If you're interested in any one of these programs you can contact any member of the ROTC Department.

Dan Powers' accomplishment in earning the Parachutist Badge has gone a long way in showing him that the Army slogan. Be All That You Can Be, carries real meaning. During this intersession. Dan learned a lot about himself! Congratulations on a job well done. PARATROOPER

## Indians Looking to Chiefs...

The Bryant College Men's Basketball team will look to better its Northeast-8 Conference record tomorrow night, when it travels to Springfield College to play the 14-2 Chiefs.

When the two teams met earlier in the season, Springfield wallied away with a 74-50 victory.

Just as soon as the Indians broke a twogame losing streak on Saturday (beating Bentley 68-65), they started another, losing to AIC on Tuesday, 69-57.

The loss dropped Bryant to 11-9 overall, and 3-6 in the Northeast-8 Conference. Bryant has lost seven out of the last ten games, but the three wins did come at the expense of Northeast-8 opponents (Bentley, Assumption, Bentley).

Bryant shot 50% from the floor (25-50), as did AIC (28-59), but was plagued by turnovers throughout the game, committing 11 per half.

AIC jumped out to a 32-28 half-time lead.

behind Tony Thomas' 16 point performance. Bryant led only twice in the game, at 12:40 (18-17) and again at 12:51 (20-19). In the second half. Bryant had AIC's lead down to two points, at 6:11 (38-36), but AIC scored seven straight points to ice the win. Bryant was never able to cut the lead past three for the rest of the game.

At this point in the season, Bryant is playing for position in the Northeast-8 play-offs. Seven of the eight teams will make the playoffs, as St. Anselm's is not eligible this year.

The top team in the Conference gets a bye in the first roung, and the rest of the teams square off (2nd and 7th, 3rd and 6th, 4th and 5th) to decide quarterfinal positions.

In the quarterfinals, the Conference winner plays the winner of the game between the 4th and 5th place teams, and the 2nd and 6th winner's plays the 3rd and the 7th winner, at the sight of the higher ranked team. Currently, Bryant is 5th in the conference.

Father David Norris speaks of his programs and goals for the Spring Semester.



Among Father Norris' activities is his participation in Priests for Justice, a fairly new organization which attempts to tackle such issues as the trouble in El Salvador and the Reagan budget cuts affecting college financial aid. The Chaplain spent his winter break in Switzerland pursuing a long-lived interest in psychology.

Father Norris says that he develops campus programs "by ear" - he depends on the results of surveys, in addition to casual suggestions, to convey what needs Bryant students indicate they have. Particularly in demand is a counseling service dealing wiht death and dying, developed to help those who are coping with grief due to the loss of a relative or friend. Students also requested discussions on sexuality and morality. A marriage preparation seminar, intended for engaged couples, is coming up in April. Speakers and religious counselors will offer advice to married-to-bes on family life and other aspects of marriage. Father Norris has found that forming a program as the need arises is more effective than permanent formal programs such as the rap/open-discussion meetings which bombed last semester. In other words, he relies on feedback from

A life-long resident of Rhode Island, Father Norris has spent time as a hospital chaplain and has also practiced at the Rhode Island School of Design prior to coming to Bryant. He enjoys the small college atmosphere here, and observes that Bryant students are enthusiastic and concerned about their future careers. Father Norris will have been ordained a priest for 8 years come April.
