

# Referendum to Increase Student Activities Fee

## Are You Going to Vote "Yes" on October 28 & 29?

**Fact:** The Student Activity Fee has not been increased in three years.

The Student Activity Fee is a fee all fulltime Bryant day students pay and the monies collected make up the Student Senate budget.

The Senate is charged with allocating these funds in the best interest of the Student Body.

If next week's referendum to raise the SAI by six dollars is approved by the Students, the Senate budget will be increased from \$78,000 to about \$97,200, on a scale of 2,700 students. Most of this increase will go to the Student Programming Board.

Last year, a similar referendum to raise it five dollars was rejected in a vote by the Student body. Paul D'Adamo, Senate President, said this referendum was rejected last year because not enough people were informed of the purpose of the referendum.

This year the Senate is undertaking an extensive promotional campaign to make students more aware of the importance of the issue.

Approximately six-hundred "YES" votes are needed to pass the referendum. All students are urged to vote "YES" on the issue on Tuesday and Wednesday, October 28 & 29, in the Rotunda from 10-3 p.m.

## Separation Proposal Approved

At Wednesday's Senate meeting, the Student Programming Board and the Student Senate officially became separate and independent organizations. Junior Senator Jeff Boesch entered a motion calling for the separation and Sophomore Senator Tracy Cusack seconded it. A roll call vote was then taken, resulting in unanimous approval of the proposal.

Previously, the Student Programming Board existed under Senate control. This brought about never ending paper work, conflict and red tape.

The revisions that coincide with the new proposal will make life much easier for both student organizations. The SPB Treasurer will no longer be responsible to the Senate. Separate books will be kept and presented to the Director of Student Programs and Services.

Furthermore, the new proposal allows the SPB to elect their own Executive Board, previously chaired by the Vice-President of the Senate. It also abandons the statute which states that two Student Senate Representatives shall serve on the SPB to act as a liaison between the SPB and the Senate.

### Future in Question

## Finances Troubling WJMF Expansion

WJMF is having financial trouble in their effort to increase the power level of the station to 225 watts. The Radio Station at Bryant was granted a construction permit to increase the station's power to 225 watts at the beginning of July. The drive to get the FCC application had first begun in February of 1979.

In 1979, the Board of Directors at WJMF, realizing that a substantial amount of money would have to be spent to purchase new equipment necessary for the power increase, applied for the Class of '79 Senior Gift. The Gift was granted to the station. Members of the class pledged to donate \$9,000 over a two-year period to pay for broadcasting equipment that the station would require. In 1979, both the Radio Station and the Administration at Bryant felt the \$9,000 would be sufficient to cover the cost of increasing the wattage. Because MAC was still in the thinking stages, no money was allotted to help the station make their move out of the Unistructure into the new location.

This September the dollar amount necessary to increase wattage has increased considerably. The estimated cost of the new equipment is now \$13,500. When the cost of moving into MAC is added, the dollar figure for WJMF's proposal comes to about \$24,000. The rise in cost for equipment has been attributed to the low supply and high demand for broadcasting equipment. WJMF is only one of many radio stations that opted to increase their power level.

As of now, there are three options for the radio station. They are the following: (1) move into MAC at present 10 watts, (2) move into MAC at 225 watts, or (3) stay in the Unistructure at 225 watts.

WJMF would like to move into MAC at 225 watts. If the station stays at 10 watts, there is a very real possibility that the station will have to go off the air. The equipment asked for, according to Duane Lefevre, General Manager at WJMF, is the minimum that the FCC requires in order for the station to be a Class A station (a station between 100-3,000 watts).

Where the money to fund the station's proposal will come from is undecided at this

point. The Board of Directors of WJMF made it clear in their Letter to the Editor in The Archway last week that they feel the College has a moral obligation to financially support the station. The students at Bryant manage the station, but the College holds the license to the station. Although WJMF members feel this way, they are not expecting a total handout.

Mr. Lefevre stated that the station is pursuing ways to raise money through such activities as Bryant night at McDonalds, a bigger Holiday Craft Festival, and selling T-shirts. Because the station is in a non-commercial band, they are at a disadvantage in that they can't raise large revenues through advertising. Although a \$1,000 goal has been tentatively set for the planned event with McDonalds, he does not foresee any other fundraising event as bringing in a large amount of money.

Work has also begun on actively getting in the outstanding pledges with the help of Karen Beaton-Simmons, Director of College Resources. The station is in the process of applying for various grants.

The Board of Directors at WJMF applied for a special money request from the College last April at budget time. They felt that their special request had been refused, and at present, the College is reconsidering their appealed proposal. Ms. Gerri Hura, Director of Student Programs and Services, explained that the request was never turned down. The request could not be analysed because it was not detailed enough, nor was all the necessary information provided. Thus, the College could not make a decision on it.

Mr. LaFond, Vice President of Student Affairs, said that in April the Institution was

not exactly sure what WJMF needed the money for. Before the special request could seriously be considered, Mr. LaFond requested from WJMF a written 5-year plan of where the radio station is, is going, and hopes to be.

The plan was submitted in September of this year. Mr. LaFond feels that now with the detailed proposal, members of both sides will be able to get together and understand each other. Hopefully they will put together an operating plan so that WJMF will be able to continue with their activities.

In response to WJMF's Board of Directors statement that Bryant College is morally obligated to provide funds for WJMF, Mr. LaFond said that it is WJMF's responsibility to provide a reasonable leadtime as to what their needs will be. He expressed that if the College had known that the station would need a total of \$24,000 at the time of the power increase application with the FCC in 1979, things might be different now.

Both Mr. LaFond and Ms. Hura stressed that Bryant is committed to serving the interests of the total student organization, of which WJMF is only one component. Both also explained that this does not mean that the College does not support and appreciate the individuals of WJMF who are trying to insure continued growth for the radio station.

The Administration and members of WJMF both agree that the radio station needs to be supported by all members of the Bryant community, financially, as well as through direct involvement in activities. The only purpose for the station is for the Bryant community. The more that the people at Bryant support WJMF's efforts, the better off the station will be.

There was another kind of air pollution during the recent political campaign.

One of the fringe candidates focused attention on himself by including dirty words in his radio and TV commercials.

And before you ask, "Who says the words are 'dirty'?" — I do.

I am not unaware of what's being called "the language of the streets."

I was long enough in the Air Force to have heard all those words; the bedroom words, the bathroom words, the gutter words.

And I am aware that there is an inevitable evolution in patterns of propriety.

Anybody three decades in broadcasting can remember when we never used the word "cancer"; we said "malignancy."

We never ever used such words as syphilis and gonorrhea; we said "social disease."

We accepted no advertising for toilet tissue, feminine hygiene items. I recall a time when Kotex was unofficially offering a million dollars to any ad man who could get their product past the network censors.

It would have been inconceivable for the electronic media to advertise hemorrhoid remedies.

The change came rather abruptly. When

President Eisenhower was hospitalized with ileitis he left instructions that the "people should be kept precisely advised" of his condition.

During the recent World Series, the discomfort of George Brett was described in unnecessary detail.

Now self-examination for mammary cancer is demonstrated on TV with live human breasts.

During the government's indictment of Tampons, the specific function of that device was demonstrated during TV interviews.

And now we come to the use by a pipsqueak presidential candidate of barnyard vulgarisms in his campaign oratory which the networks and stations, by law, are not allowed to excise.

Congress, intending to prevent media censorship of a politician's opinions, has mandated a degree of air pollution it never intended.

In this campaign there were 14 legally qualified presidential candidates — Libertarian, Citizens, Labor, Communist, Socialist, whatnot ... The potential for further and even more flagrant air pollution is obvious.

Historically our country, by law, has confined to sewers what some countries allow to run in open gutters for reasons of health and to stifle the stink.

That may violate the rights of some stinkers, but so what?

# Winning the Estate Planning Game

So there you have it—another cog in your quest to become a millionaire. However, remember to play your estate planning cards correctly so when an untimely event happens in your family, instead of inviting Uncle Sam over for a steak dinner all you'll have to do is toss him the bones.

**PREREGISTRATION ALERT!**

Twice a year, usually in November and April, the students at Bryant are given the opportunity to select courses for the ensuing session and semester. Generally, each student should review the College catalog to ascertain which courses are required in a major concentration, which courses are desired to meet needed professional and liberal arts electives, and what prerequisites have been established for the course.

The mast schedule of classes reflects in interrelationships of (a) the total number of students in terms of class (Freshman, Sophomores, Juniors, Seniors) and major concentration; (b) the mix of courses required in the various curricula; (c) the Faculty, in terms of discipline and specialty; and (d) the

desired average class size. These factors generate a list of courses.

Many courses are offered every fall and spring. Some courses are offered at selected intervals as determined by the departments, and in such cases, the students should check with the department chairman.

Admittance into the registration room is determined by the Student Classification Number (SCN) and birthdate (randomly selected). The first student admitted has practically unlimited choices. The last student to preregister has very limited choices. However, it should be kept in mind that in an ensuing semester, the SCN should be higher and the registration number should be different.

Juniors and Seniors select upper division courses, i.e., 300 and 400 numbered courses. The 200 level courses are generally reserved for Sophomores. In some cases, sections are reserved for students in certain major concentrations.

If you have a question about scheduling, please check with your department chairman and/or with an academic advisor in the Registrar's Office.

N.B. Do not confuse Liberal Arts Electives and Professional/Business Electives. You must fulfill the distribution requirements.

# Economic Corner

Presidential elections are a time to reflect upon the previous four years and evaluate the economic policies pursued. This is a time when the magic of statistics is made to work both for and against the current administration. Both presidential candidates will formulate their platforms built with economic, as well as political, promises for the future. Fed by the genius of the economic advisors surrounding them, the candidates will place themselves in front of the public as medicine men selling "a cure for what ails us."

Well, what ails not only the U.S., but also the major industrialized Western nations, is the double-edged razor of inflation and unemployment—both capable of shredding any hopes, dreams and promises of economic prosperity. Previous attempts at alleviating one problem has only aggravated the other.

Well, what is a presidential candidate to do—especially if one is the incumbent seeking re-election faced with double-digit inflation and rising unemployment? Now, if this candidate happens to be a Democrat, he/she had better start putting some of his electorate back to work. (To have a job and be faced with the cruelty of inflation is one thing; to not have a job makes inflation a moot issue.)

Traditionally the Democratic Party has sought and received a great deal of support from the working class—from the auto workers, the homebuilders, etc. Many

economists concur that in order to revive these essential segments of the economy, a policy of lower interest rates and "easy money" is necessary. Some of these economists belong to the coveted Council of Economic Advisors—chief counsel to the President.

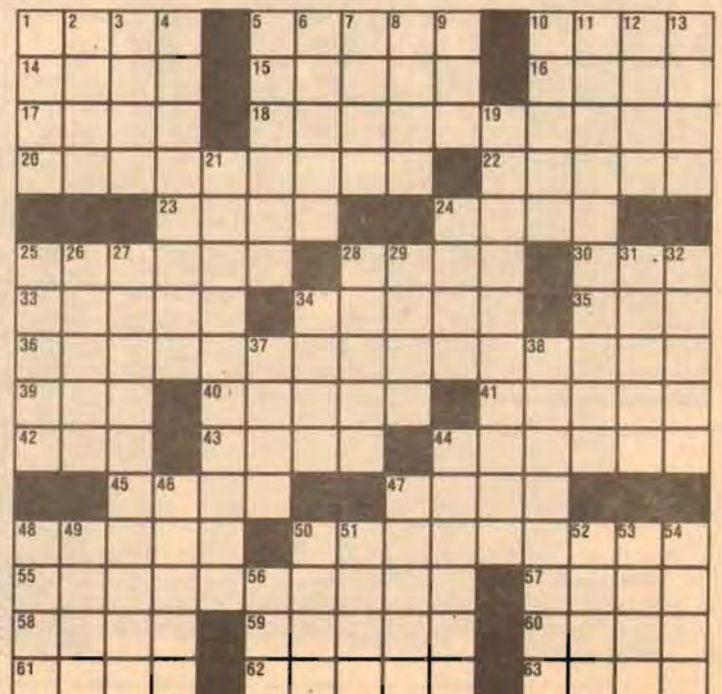

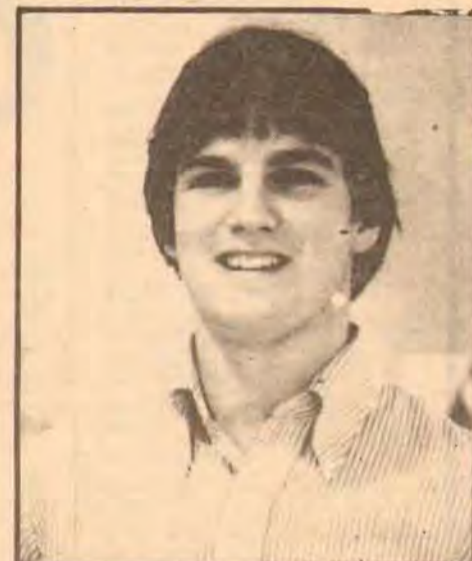

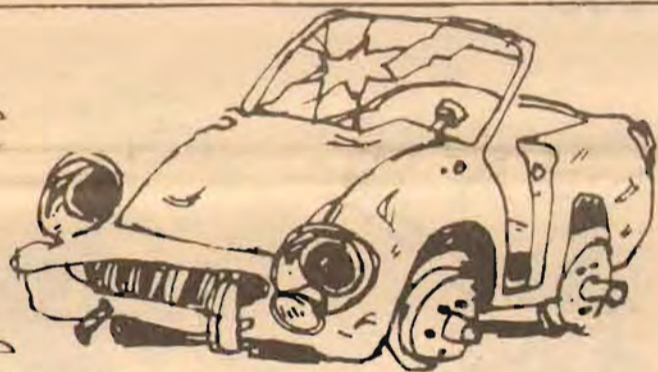

Fast Lane

It was terrible. The '66 Excalibur that once graced the top of this column was wiped out by an 18-wheeler. It now appears in its current form, a '53 MGB with some minor structural handicaps. The Baron who was at the wheel will be cremated and the ashes will be released along Route 7 in a ceremony to be held Monday, October 27 as I commute to my 9:00. The wreck shall remain atop the column as a memorium.

Although I said that this week's column will cover used cars, I must educate you in the field

of new cars first. If you want to buy a new car, you have many people you will come in contact with. First of all, there is the salesman, the one who says that the \$10,000 Pinto with deluxe rear view mirror trim, rally sport radio knobs, custom tuned dashboard, electronic trunk defogger, quartz-halogen dome light, AM/FM stereo hubcaps, air-conditioned glove compartment and da leetle dawgie in duh back with da head dat bounces up and down in the perfect car for you.

Then they make you feel like they are going far out of their way to give yo the "greatest

deal of the week," but, actually, they are still able to afford the payments on their financed Lamborghini Countach with the commission from selling you a car. ### Soccer Coach Refuses Interview

The Sports Page of our paper has as its prime objective the task of covering the progress of the School's teams. Also, some added coverage of what is happening in the outside sports world is essential.

The soccer article written in the October 10 issue of *The Archway* had as its headline "Can't Win Syndrome Plagues Soccer Team." Notice the date of the issue, as I had assigned a staff sportswriter to write a story on the further progress of the soccer team for this issue just two weeks later. Yet, when the writer approached Head Coach Louis Verrochi, he was turned away because *The Archway* had not stressed the "lack of fan support" as Verrochi had wished.

However, both the first and last paragraphs of that article were dedicated to the idea that the fans had not been turning out for their games. I feel *The Archway's* Sports page for the first time since I've been here has given adequate coverage of all of Bryant's teams including women's volleyball, tennis, and cross country and the more obscure men's sports such as golf, bowling, and cross country. Intramural and club sports have also received a fair amount of publicity. The soccer team had almost the whole sports page of the opening issue dedicated to them and the team's schedule was printed in the second issue. This week's article would have been the third in the seven weeks of this fall sports season.

As a lot of teams do, the soccer team could have one of the team members write an article if they wish to have game by game coverage. While Coach Verrochi tries to set back *The Archway* by not granting an interview, the real result is obvious...he is only hurting his soccer team.

Carlton scattered four hits and struck out seven. He was charged with the Kansas C City run in the eighth inning when U.L. Washington singled off Tug McGraw scoring John Wathan.

Mike Schmidt drilled a two-run single off K.C. starter Rich Gale in the third inning. Schmidt, who was the series MVP, drove in seven runs during the series and hit .381. He also hit two of the Phillies three homers. Larry Bowa played well collecting nine hits and starting seven double-plays. Bob Boone led all the Phillies with a .412 average, collecting seven hits.

The Bull, Greg Luzinski, went 0 for 9 during the series and expressed resentment for not playing more often than he did. Luzinski hit .228 with 19 homers and 66 RBI during the year. The Phillies have been talking to the Cubs about Bruce Sutter, their ace in the bullpen. The Cubs would like to unload Sutter's big contract and Luzinski would find left field in Wrigley Field very inviting on a windy day. Luzinski, only 29 has been bothered by injuries over the last two season..

Bryant battled teams from Dartmouth, Army, Princeton, Bently, Central Connecticut, Gannon, Rochester Tech, California (PA) State and Indiana (PA) State. Bryant qualified by placing 2nd to Central Connecticut in the Southern New England regionals. Hallet and freshman Bill Walthouse, from Longmeadow, Ma., led the team with a pair of 79's in this tourney.

Joining Hallet and Walthouse in the ECAC's were sophomore Rick Edwards, from South Yarmouth, MA; junior Toni Gerordi, Danielson, Conn.; and sophomore Mark O'Brien, Centerville, MA.

This marks the first time Bryant has been in the title round in more than a decade. In addition to the ten, five-man teams, sixty individual qualifiers rounded out the 110-man field.

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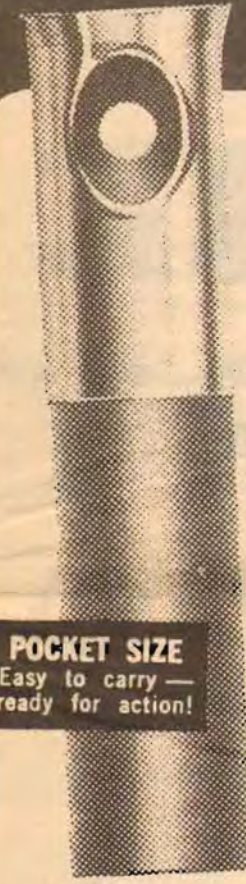
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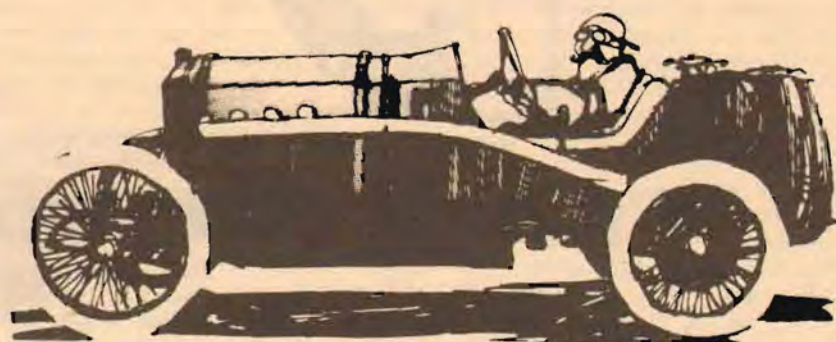
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
