## First four graduate students among

# 525 To Receive Degrees At Commencement

The Honorable Helen Delich Bentley, Chairman of the Federal Maritime Commission and the first woman appointed by any President to serve as Chairman of a regulatory agency, will be the Speaker at the 108th Commencement of Bryant College on Saturday, June 12, 1971. Her Address will be entitled, "Graduates of America: Legacy and Leadership." Dr. Harry F. Evarts, President of Bryant College, will preside at the Commencement Ceremonies which are scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. at the Meehan Auditorium in Providence. Mrs. Bentley will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters at the Exercises.

At the same time, honorary doctorates will be conferred upon four other distinguished citizens, including Dr. Fred G. Burke, Rhode Island Commissioner of Education, and Alton

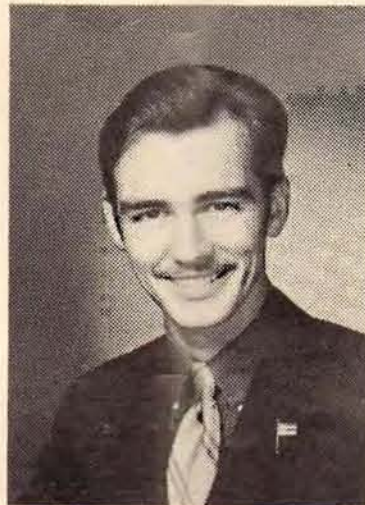
W. Wiley, Esq., Rhode Island attorney and civic leader, both of whom will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

The honorary degree of Doctor of Science in Business Administration will be conferred upon Gerhard R. Andlinger, Chairman of the Board of Esterline Corporation, New York, and Samuel Leviten, Chairman of the Board of the Big G Discount Food Stores.

Baccalaureate and Associate Degrees will be conferred upon 525 graduates of Bryant College. Dr. William P. Robinson, Jr., Associate Commissioner of Education for the State of Rhode Island, will present provisional teachers certificates to graduates of the Business Teacher Education Department.

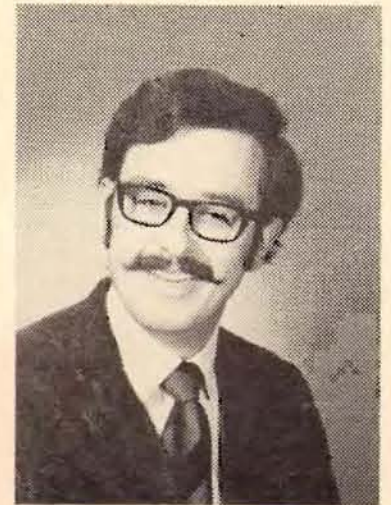

# Five Honoraries To Be Awarded

## Doctor of Humane Letters



Commencement Speaker  
Mrs. Helen Delich Bentley  
Chairman of the  
Federal Maritime Commission

Mrs. Helen Delich Bentley, a former newspaperwoman who held down the post of Maritime Editor of the Baltimore Sun for 18 years and now Chairman of the Federal Maritime Commission, is the first woman to serve in a key Government position in the maritime field and also the first woman to be appointed by a President to serve as chairman of a regulatory agency.

She was first nominated by President Richard M. Nixon on August 9, 1969, to be a member and chairman of the FMC for the remainder of an unexpired term, and then renominated for a full five-year term eight months later. She took her first oath of office on October 13, 1969.

A native of Ruth, Nevada, a copper mining town high in the mountains of White Pine County, Nevada, Mrs. Bentley is a paradox in that she grew up 8,000 feet above sea level, but now is recognized world wide as an expert on the sea.

Because of her unusual ability and record, the University of Maryland last year conferred an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws upon Chairman Bentley. This was the first time in American maritime history that such an award has been bestowed upon a Federal maritime official. Mrs. Bentley is the first woman to be so honored.

Inasmuch as Mrs. Bentley covered maritime events all over the United States and elsewhere in the world, she became almost as well known in most shipping offices as on the Baltimore waterfront.

Mrs. Bentley produced a half-hour television series on shipping in Baltimore and Philadelphia, which ran on Sunday afternoons for fourteen years.

Chairman Bentley has received numerous honors from various maritime institutions. In 1954 she received an award from the Steamship Trade Association of Baltimore for distinguished work on labor matters concerning the port. She twice has received the Women's Advertising Club of Baltimore

"Woman of the Year" award. In 1957 and 1958 she received the American Merchant Marine Institute special award for television shows on maritime activities.

She received the AFL-CIO Maritime Port Council of the Maritime Trades Department of the Port of Greater New York award for meritorious service to the Nation's maritime industry. In 1967 and 1968 she received the Propeller Club of the United States American Merchant Marine Writers award.

After brief stints with the United Press and Lewiston (Ida.) Tribune, she joined the Baltimore Sun in June 1945. Initially she did general reporting. As soon as the war was over and labor strife began overtaking the Nation, she was assigned to assist on the labor beat and shortly became the labor reporter. In 1948 she requested a change and was told to "go down and look at the port, we've had nobody there since before the war."

Actually, award-winning on a national scale began with her in 1941 when the Elks National Foundation selected her as the

Mr. Samuel Leviten was born in Fall River, Massachusetts. He was educated in Fall River grammar schools and graduated from B.M.C. Durfee High School in Fall River. In the late 1930's he formed a wholesale grocery business with his brother and later opened his first super market. Presently he is Board Chairman of Big G Food Stores, a chain of twenty-two super markets operating in Rhode Island, Massachusetts, and Connecticut. He resided in Fall River until approximately ten years ago when he moved to Providence. He is active in the Israeli Bond and U.J.A. campaigns both in Fall River and Providence. He is a 32nd degree Mason and a member of the Aleppo Shrine of Boston, Massachusetts.

## Doctor

Dr. Fred G. Burke is commissioner of Education of the State of Rhode Island. As chief executive officer of the Board of Regents and chief administrative officer of the new State Department of Education, Dr. Burke is concerned with all phases of education from kindergarten through graduate school and beyond.

In his Inaugural Address of February 1971 Dr. Burke stated:

"I am here because I am excited about the possibilities for educational innovation offered in Rhode Island. We have a broad cross section of educational activities underway, yet the state is small enough—in terms of geography and population—so we can test new concepts and ideas... Education must be uniquely future oriented, for the significance of what and how we teach and learn, lies far into the future... The parent and citizen has a right to insist that education develop the young to be the kind of men and women they wish them to become. We cannot, however, ignore the aspirations and values of our students, of the young, for in the last analysis it is they and not we who must live to manage the future..."

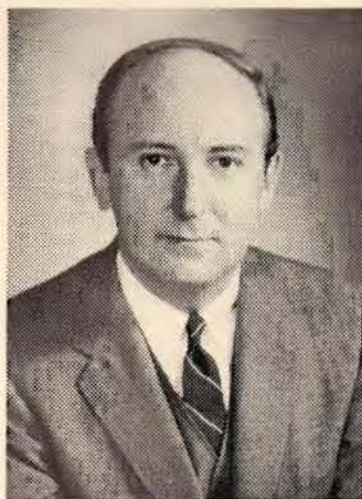
Dr. Burke was born in Collins, New York. He received his B.A. from William College in 1953. He received his M.A. at Oxford University, Nuffield, in 1957 and a Ph.D. from Princeton in 1958. He has been Dean of International Studies and Professor of Social Sciences and Administration at the State University of New York in Buffalo. He served as consultant on Urgent African Administrative Problems for the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa. He was a Professor of Political Science at the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs of Syracuse University a member of the faculty of Ohio Wesleyan, and on the staff of Princeton Surveys. He has over thirty publications in journals and edited volumes including seven books.

## Dr. of Science In Business Administration

Mr. Gerhard R. Andlinger was born in Linz, Austria. He was raised there and went to school in Linz and Vienna. After graduating from high school, he won a scholarship to Princeton and finished the four year program in two years, graduating with a B.A. in Economics. He received his master's degree from the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration in 1954.

He served two years in the U.S. Army, where he obtained his U.S. citizenship and joined McKinsey & Company, management consultants, in 1956 remaining until 1960. A great deal of time in the army was spent on the development of war games. Later he began to apply the same principles to the development of business games. He is listed in a number of books published on business games as one of the early pioneers of business games in this country.

He joined ITT in 1960 as Director of Planning for the corporation and developed the basic system of business planning which is still followed today. He became Group Executive of ITT with complete management responsibility for

all ITT's Far East operations. Soon thereafter he was made a Vice President at age 34—the youngest Vice President at ITT. During his last two years at ITT, he had responsibility for all of ITT's Latin American operations.

In 1967, he joined Esterline Corporation as Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive, which at that time was a privately owned company with sales of \$7 million dollars. In three years Esterline grew to a company with sales of \$93 million and a listing on the New York Stock Exchange.

## Doctor of Laws

Mr. Alton W. Wiley was born in Waukesha, Wisconsin. He attended school in Warwick, Rhode Island, graduating from Nelson W. Aldrich Senior High School in Warwick. He received his B.S. in Business Administration from the University of Rhode Island. He then spent time in the service and is still active in the U.S. Army Reserve with rank of Major.

Mr. Wiley received his LLB degree from B.U. Law School in 1956 and was admitted to the Rhode Island Bar Association in 1957 joining the firm of Votolato & Connors. In 1959 he went with the law firm of Kiernan, Connors, and Kenyon. He spent four years—1963-1967—as Assistant United States Attorney for the District of Rhode Island. He was named Man of the Year by the Rhode Island Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1964. He became Vice President of Student Affairs of the University of Rhode Island from 1969 until he joined the Law firm of Abedon, Michaelson, Stanzler & Biener in 1971.

Among his many activities he has been chairman of the Legal Redress Committee of the Providence Branch of the NAACP. He has been a member of the Rhode Island Advisory Committee to the President's Civil Rights Commission, Chairman of the Board of Marathon House and member of the Corporation of People's and Old Stone Banks. He has also been very active in planned parenthood, the Legal Aid Society and the Narragansett Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

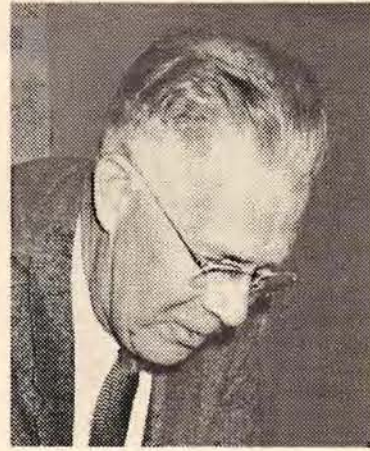
Louise Halsted Cronk

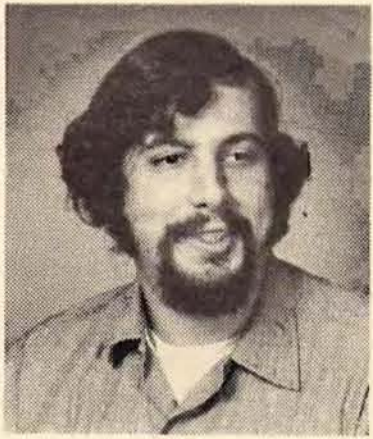
relations and demonstrated a capacity for business leadership. This award was inaugurated when the late Mr. Curtis was Vice President of the United States.

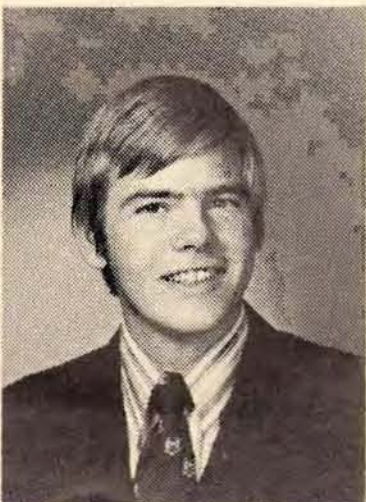

### Self Reliance Award

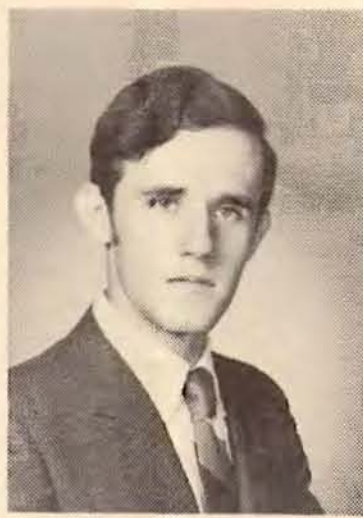

### Vincent Votolato Scholastic Athletic Award

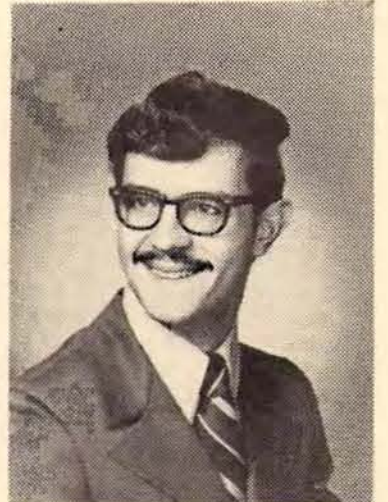
