## Peace Will Come 'Within a Matter of Weeks or Less'

(Washington)--One more meeting...and it could all be over...America's longest war.

A rather tense Henry Kissinger today briefed reporters in the White House on the terms of a negotiated settlement to the Vietnam War...an agreement lacking only clarification of specific details, and signature, for it to take immediate effect.

A radio Hanoi broadcast Wednesday night revealed the meat of the nine-point cease-fire agreement ... and accused the US of delaying next Tuesday's signing ceremony.

White House negotiator Kissinger called the briefing to explain that the US considers one more negotiating session...the date and place to be set by Hanoi...as necessary before signing the document. One point to be decided is whether South Vietnam will participate in the ceremony.

Kissinger says the breakthrough in the negotiations came on October 8th in Paris when the Communists agreed to work for a separate military settlement before a political agreement. Dr. Kissinger also denied the timing of the settlement...just days before the Presidential Election... was tied to partisan political strategy.

The terms of the peace agreement announced by Hanoi include...an immediate cease-fire in Vietnam and an end to the US bombing and blockade of the North within 24 hours of the signing...complete withdrawal of all US forces from the South--but not from off-shore and the rest of Indochina--within 60 days, and the return of all prisoners of war in that period...and the establishment of a National Reconciliation Commission--- not a coalition government---to direct national elections in the South.

The US has halted most of its bombing of the north as an indication of its good faith in the negotiations.

The main obstacle to peace now appears to lie in Saigon. President Thieu doesn't want to be forced into a peace...or a coalition government. The South Vietnamese delegation in Paris has demanded formal guarantees against a Communist takeover or cease-fire violations.

But Kissinger says he is confident Saigon will join in signing the agreement...and that at long last... Peace Will Come--in his words--"Within a matter of weeks or less."

## Steps To Peace

Main points of agreement in Vietnam, according to the Communists:

1. The United States respects the independence, sovereignty, unity, and territorial integrity of Vietnam as recognized by the 1954 Geneva Agreements.

2. Twenty-four hours after the signing of the agreement, a cease-fire shall

be observed throughout South Vietnam. The United States will stop all its military activities, and end the bombing and mining in North Vietnam. Within 60 days, there will be a total withdrawal from South Vietnam of troops and military personnel of the United States and those of the foreign countries allied with the United States and

with the Republic of (South) Vietnam...

3. The return of all captured and detained personnel of the parties shall be carried out simultaneously with the U.S. troop withdrawal.

4. The South Vietnamese shall exercise the right of self-determination through genuinely free and

I have talked to many students who have slept right through fire alarms and were surprised to hear of the alarm going off the next morning. The alarms are badly located and two alarms to one floor just isn't enough. If the architects wanted to use only two alarms, they should have placed them in the halls or between the fire-doors where both suites could hear them. I have an alarm in my suite and have no problem hearing it, but when the alarm system went off last week in my dorm, we had to go next door to wake up the guys who live there. Also it is the school's policy to evacuate the Dorms after the alarm goes off. If the students would try to understand this policy and leave on their own accord, it would be a great deal easier on the RA's and security personel who must check each room before they are allowed to leave the building. I am writing to the Archway in the hopes that this letter would get published and the problems concerning the alarm system could be brought to the attention of the administration.

President Evarts earned his Bachelor's degree at Ohio University in 1951, and his Master of Science degree at the same institution the following year. He took his doctorate at Harvard

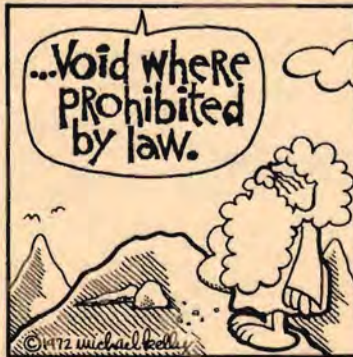
University's Graduate School of Business Administration in 1959, majoring in Production Management.

## Eugene McCarthy to Visit Bryant

Former Senator Eugene McCarthy, one of the U.S.'s first and strongest critics of the Vietnam War, is coming to Bryant College on Monday to promote the candidacy of Sen. Clairborne Pell, who is seeking a third term. McCarthy will be in the Rotunda from 9 to 10 o'clock Monday morning, meeting and talking to Bryant Students.

Sen. McCarthy, two term democratic senator from Minnesota, was one of the few senators to speak out against the war policies of the Johnson administration. He's the man who in 1968 defeated Lyndon Johnson's chance for a second term, when he defeated Johnson's hand-picked favorite sons in several state primaries, such as New Hampshire and Nebraska. McCarthy is said to have been a man strong enough to challenge and topple from office, the biggest man who was at the height of his power. McCarthy, because of his views on the war and his fight for change, has become increasingly popular with the young people of this country. In 1970, McCarthy retired from political office to become more involved, and better able to continue to fight for his beliefs.

## Campaign Special

Sizing up the 1972 election campaign. In today's campaign special report, UPI Political Analyst George J. Marder sizes up the outlook for the House.

The old order changes; and in the U.S. House of Representatives, the changes come more from attrition than from reform or elections.

Attrition--that is: retirement, resignation, death and defeat in primaries--will remove one out of every seven members elected to the House two years ago.

It guarantees that the House in the next Congress will be much younger and have some more blacks.

Whether it will be more Republican than Democrat, or more liberal than conservative, will be decided on election day.

But regardless of the way it goes November 7, 65 members elected to the 92nd Congress, which is just going out of business, will not be in their seats when the 93rd Congress convenes next January.

That number is somewhat higher than the norm for attrition in recent years. Two years ago, the comparable figure was 43.

The increase can be traced to three developments:

- Redistricting on the basis of the 1970 census;
- Granting of the vote to 18-year-olds;
- The attractive pensions now available to ex-members--it could run as high as \$34,000 a year.

But it isn't so much the numbers as the character of

the turnover already in store for the House which is generating change. The 65 who will not be there represent cumulatively more than five centuries of service in the House and include some of the most powerful veterans--the Bulls, as they are not-so-kindly called.

Among those leaving, either voluntarily or otherwise, are six Democratic Committee Chairmen. Their names may not be nationally known but their power was great and recognized by any who had to deal with Congress. They are:

Wayne Aspinall of Colorado, 76 years old; John McMillan, of South Carolina, 74; Emanuel Celler of New York, 82; Edward Garmatz of Maryland, 69. Aspinall, McMillan, Celler and Miller clung to their seats of power until forced into retirement by primary voters who chose younger candidates. Colmer and Garmatz decided the time had come to step aside.

To the list of retirees can be added nine Republicans with potential power equal to the Democrats. All nine had top seniority on key House committees and would have become chairmen next year, if the Republicans won control of the House.

To win control, the Republicans have to make a net gain of 39 seats.

Democrats are confident the G.O.P. will not make it; Republicans are hoping that a Nixon landslide will carry over into the Congressional elections and bring them in too.

It is a hope more than an expectation. Because one, the same polls which point to a Nixon landslide put Democrats ahead of

Republicans in the battle for control of Congress; two, the Nixon re-election strategy limits the drive for Democrats to support of the National Ticket only; and three, Nixon coattails have meant little in the past.

The Republican hope, however, is matched by Democratic anxiety that despite the polls, a big landslide for the Republican National Ticket could bury marginal Democratic candidates. And so some Democrats are running for cover, educating the voters in the complications of ticket splitting, to divorce their chances from the head of the ticket. It is survival politics such as showed among Republicans in 1964 when Barry Goldwater was headed for a debacle.

The Democrats believe the real battleground for House control will come in 87 contests out of 435 seats to be filled. Even if there is a Nixon landslide, the Democratic professionals figure they can hold their losses to a net of 15 and retain control of the House.

Republican campaign managers are in general agreement with that sizeup, seeing a possibility to pick up 18 to perhaps 25 House seats; but still short of control.

But whichever party wins control, the faces will be changed much more than usual. After the elections two years ago, only 67 newcomers came to the House. Four years ago, the figure was 39. This year it's going to be 65 plus those who don't make it on November 7.

### V.A. Checks

A survey was mailed recently to over two hundred former evening students. Several currently enrolled students received this survey. These students are probably officially registered but did not appear on the certified registration list at the time the mailing list was compiled. If you are one of the above, call the Evening Division for confirmation of your registration.

Certificates of eligibility have been completed for V.A. students. You should get your first check in November. If you do not receive a V.A. check by November 6, stop by on your way to class. Mrs. McDonnell will be able to verify certification by your registration card. **DO NOT CALL THE EVENING DIVISION OFFICE FOR THIS INFORMATION.**

Although it appears that the certification process is unnecessarily delayed, this is not the case. Registration cards and V.A. enrollment forms must be matched. With late registrations, courses canceled, courses added and courses dropped it is impractical as well as almost impossible to process this work before the end of the fifth week of classes.

Supplements and registration material will be available after December 1. These materials will not be mailed to presently enrolled students, but they will be available for distribution in the Evening Division Office.

He'll be coming up shortly on the Bill Cosby Show but he isn't sure he'll do any more TV appearances.

Spitz says he hasn't been in a swimming pool since the

Olympics and he's in no hurry to get back into the water.

The Olympic swimming star tugs at his mustache and speaks slowly in well-modulated tones. His eyes are quickly intelligent, slightly brooding. His mien is contemplative except when he flashes a brilliant white grin.

The greatest swimmer in history also is acutely aware of saying the wrong thing or giving an erroneous impression. He may think a question through for a half-minute before framing an answer.

He says he's just taking things from day to day--hasn't accepted anything definite. But it's fair to say he'd rather appear in a movie than in something like Mark Spitz' aquacade.

## The Great Wall

UPI's Charles Smith reports from Pataling, China that if he were doing a feasibility study for the big hotel chains, he'd advise them to build there--if they could.

They cannot, of course. The Communist Chinese are not ready for Hilton Hotels or Holiday Inns.

Pataling is a tiny village, 25 miles North of Peking, where the Great Wall is closest to the Chinese capital.

Everyone knows that the Great Wall is one of the world's greatest tourist attractions. The Chinese make sure most visitors to Peking get to see it. But they are not promoting it in the sense that most other countries are their most scenic spots.

This is the spot where President Nixon observed that the imposing gray granite structure was "truly a great wall." (The President's remark still is quoted by foreign residents in Peking for laughs.)

It's also the place where Japanese Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka visited. While strolling along the top of the wall, Tanaka compared it as an engineering feat with Japan's accomplishment in building the so-called "Bullet" express rail line between Tokyo and Osaka.

The Great Wall not only is one of the ancient world's most impressive engineering feats, it also is one of the world's longest graveyards.

What today is the Great Wall originally was a series of walls built long before the birth of Christ to keep barbarian Hun tribes from the North at bay. The Wall was completed about 211 B.C.

Buried in the clay fill of the structure are the bones of tens of thousands of impressed laborers, some put there to allay the superstitious fears of the emperor.

The Great Wall varies in height from 15 to 50 feet. It ranges from 15 to 35 feet at the base, tapering to 12 feet or more at the top. Guards or signal towers are spaced about 120 feet apart on the top of the wall.

As at most such scenic spots around the world, graffiti mars the wall. Initials and other memorabilia are scratched on the wall in Chinese, Russian, Japanese, Polish, and other languages, including one in English which says, "Kilroy Was

## Valachi Papers

In show business... a review of THE VALACHI PAPERS by Lawrence Falk of U-P-I in Chicago:

Its kind of a shame that THE VALACHI PAPERS comes to the screen some months after THE GODFATHER made such a smash hit. There will be a natural tendency for many to view it as "just another new-wave gangster movie." It certainly isn't.

For the record, producer Dino DeLaurentiis and director Terrance Young say the book by mobster-turned-stoolie Joe Valachi was purchased and written into a movie script long before the advent of THE GODFATHER. But, various legal complications arose and production was held up for years... until some of the principle characters died-- in prison.

Well, that's really no matter-- because THE VALACHI PAPERS is an excellent film. And, it is the kind of motion picture which is difficult to do because the facts are, after all, the facts... and there are many, many people who know them.

You remember Valachi, of course. He was the Mafia hood who turned stool pigeon before the McClellan Committee and gave the world its first real inside look at the Mafia... or La Cosa Nostra... or whatever you want to call it.

THE VALACHI PAPERS starts with Valachi in prison, and, by effective use of flashbacks, traces his history with the mob.

And its all there, too. The Apalacia meeting... the Albert Anastasia barbershop "hit"... the "Matress Wars"... and many more details.

Yes, and details. Director Young-- who's chalked up another excellent film to his credit-- went so far as to find out the brand of wine which was on the table when Joe "The Boss" Masseria was "hit" in a Coney Island restaurant in 1931... and exactly how the Mafia "induction" ceremony is performed.

Indeed, it would be hard to praise Young enough. He has undertaken the extremely difficult job of re-creating historical facts in a way which will inform... entertain... and chill the viewer at the same time. That he has meshed all of that together is a magnificent achievement... and one which should bring him further honors.

# Student Government Fighting To Have Indent Monies

Bellingham, Washington (CPS)--The Washington state attorney general has advised the administration of Western Washington State College to cut off all spending by the WWSC student government pending the results of a law suit against the school.

The Associated Students filed suit against the school last June. The point of contention is whether or not the AS is an "arm or agency of the state or a separate organization." The suit also asks for clarification of the campus co-operative bookstore and for AS to be awarded control of the \$178,000 of the bookstore reserve fund.

Since the AS budget is collected by the state, the WWSC administration considers it to be "state money" and will not release the money to an agency which claims to be a separate entity.

The administration is "very desirous to see that student government is carried

on and activities continue," a WWSC spokesman said recently, "but in light of this law suit they find themselves in a peculiar position, in that they cannot fund a corporation separate from the state."

"The cutting off of our funds is a pressure that's been hanging over my head all along," As Chairman Jim Kennedy said, "but I'm not going to let it affect my judgment of what we may get out of this (the lawsuit)."

Although Kennedy expects an out-of-court settlement, he is not willing to drop the case at the expense of the students. Meanwhile, the state attorney office officials and AS attorney John Anderson, who is being retained with a contingency fund of \$2000 taken from last year's AS budget, have been working on a list of stipulations to be used as a working agreement.

The legality of Anderson's salary is also in question--that of using state funds to sue the state.

The conflict between AS and the administration began last spring when AS claimed complete control of the co-operative bookstore and all of its assets, including the \$178,000 reserve fund. The AS board of directors dissolved the bookstore board and established their own. The administration told the bookstore manager to disregard the instructions of the new board and to follow the existing board.

The AS created a negotiating team to come to an agreement with the administration and other matters concerning a revamping of that student government. The team maintained that the administration had nothing to do with the incorporation of the AS. AS, they claimed, was incorporated in the same manner as the Boy Scouts, the YMCA, or any other non-profit organization.

The negotiations came to an impasse in June when the suit was filed.

# There's A Difference Between Campus Cops And Regular Cops, You Know

Buffalo, New York (CPS)--"Campus Cops" aren't cops at all, a New York judge has determined.

Judge William Ostrowski made the distinction between "peace officer" and "security officer" recently when he dismissed charges of disorderly conduct, third degree assault and resisting arrest against a student at the State University of New York at Buffalo.

The judge cited a recent ruling by the SUNY Board of Trustees which declared that security officers employed

by the university are not authorized to arrest an individual.

According to Ostrowski, security officers can only "issue and serve a simplified traffic information and appearance ticket."

Because arrests can only be made by "those deemed peace officers," Judge Ostrowski ruled that Jim Britt, the SUNY security officer in question, was not employed to place the defendant, L. C. Smith, under arrest or charge him with resisting arrest.

The case which fostered the decision began last summer when Smith allegedly refused to produce identification upon entering a dormitory on the Buffalo campus. An argument between Smith and a security aide ensued. Britt intervened and asked Smith for identification. After another verbal exchange, a physical confrontation reportedly took place between the two, culminating in Smith's arrest.

Contending that Judge Ostrowski ruled on a discrepancy in the language, Lee Griffin, Assistant Director of Campus Security at SUNY at Buffalo, said he is certain that the district attorney will appeal the decision. Griffin claimed that the law clearly states security officers have peace officer powers.

Griffin also said that the security officers in the SUNY system would continue to act as peace officers "until the Trustees clarify the law one way or the other," in writing.

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# Californians Vote On Pot: History In The Making

Los Angeles, CA (CP) About four and a half million votes are needed to legalize use of marijuana in the state of California this November.

Nine million registered voters are expected to either narrowly approve or defeat Proposition 19--to "decriminalize" production, possession and use of marijuana.

Proposition 19 has an excellent position on the 22 position ballot--wedged between a number of referendums expected to return positive replies.

Acceptance of the proposition by California could have far reaching effects within the United States, and around the world in countries which have repressed marijuana under American pressure.

Latest state-wide polls show 33 percent in favor of the proposition, but surveys in the cities of Los Angeles and San Francisco show favor running as high as 57 percent.

The California Marijuana Initiative (CMI) is described by Los Angeles County co-ordinator Lawrence Skinner as "one of the most ideal solutions for one of the greatest problems in recent times."

The proposition does not affect present laws governing



selling of marijuana. It does not deal with the complexities of trafficking marijuana, and avoids the problem feared by many people that marijuana will be eventually advertised as being sexy, or something similar.

Some supporters believe that approval of the referendum will give police a mandate to concentrate on trafficking of marijuana and narcotics.

Of a total of six marijuana initiatives in the U.S. this year, only the California initiative achieved a position on the ballot. Attempts failed in Washington, Oregon, Arizona, and Florida, but the Michigan initiative may be able to collect sufficient signatures for a place in the

1970 state referendum.

CMI has not only achieved what many regarded as "impossible" with the actual initiative. In the drive to register voters, they trained 411 deputy registrars, and registered more than 20,200 voters.

At first, early this year, people were "paranoid, and thought they would be arrested," says Skinner. But working within the law this time has avoided any bother with the police.

A sign on the steps up to the CMI office pleads with visitors to "leave your stash outside" and the only plants in the building are those supplied by one of the group's officers.

Support has come not only from underground

media, but also from two television stations--KNBC in Los Angeles, a network affiliate, and KPIX in San Francisco--which have broadcast editorials condoning tolerance of marijuana.

And Skinner predicts that a number of police officers may also support the proposition by attesting through a judge so that they can retain their anonymity.

The initiative has already received support from the Police Officers for Justice and the San Francisco Deputy Sheriff's Coalition.

The campaign has spent a total of \$80,000 on the initiative, and plans the same expenditure during the last two weeks on a final burst which will include radio spots

Most of this has been raised through small private donations, and an additional grant of \$15,000 from Amorphia, the marijuana foundation. The remainder should be covered from the showing of the film REEFER MADNESS by the PLAYBOY-backed MORML organization.

But the private donations still count--a leather bag hangs in a corner of the Los Angeles office collecting Blue Chip trading and postage stamps.

# Will Nixon Debate As He Said Four Years Ago?

If President Nixon accepted Senator George McGovern's offer for face-to-face debates, no one would be more surprised than George McGovern.

There just aren't going to be any debates, no matter what commitments Nixon made before he became President.

The McGovern headquarters dragged out television tapes and magazine articles of and by Nixon four and eight years ago to show that he had agreed "unequivocally" to participate in presidential campaign debates.

Plenty of those Nixon quotations are around from former years.

"I would be willing to debate..."

"I will go into debates..."

"T-V debates would serve the public interest..."

Those quotations and many more were played for newsmen at McGovern headquarters.

The only qualification Nixon made in the past was that he would not agree to a three-way debate. That was when George Wallace was running for president.

But somehow the debates never came off in 1968, and everyone knows they will not be held in 1972.

If there were the slightest chance of debates being held between Nixon and McGovern, congress would have paved the way with special legislation this year, as it did in 1960, when it made available free network time for debates between Nixon and John Kennedy.

But the White House successfully blocked passage of such a bill this year, insisting that the president would not sign it unless it applied to congressional candidates, too.

The ploy was successful, just as the Johnson Administration was able to block debate legislation in 1964 so that President Johnson would have an excuse not to debate Senator Barry Goldwater.

The fact is that regardless of the public interest in debates, few

expect an incumbent president to meet his challenger face to face. Kennedy made that flat commitment after he was elected, but he is the only one.

The argument is made that an incumbent president should not indulge in free-for-all debate because he could make a slip of the tongue which would seriously affect foreign relations.

But that isn't the real reason for an incumbent president to avoid face-to-face political debates. After all, it could be just as risky for a president to answer questions at a news conference.

The real reason an incumbent president avoids facing challengers in face-to-face debates is political--the president has a political advantage over the opposition...he's well-known and is usually the favorite...the challenger is the underdog and is trying to establish himself. Face-to-face debates are bound to help the challenger with any identity problem which may exist.

And so why does McGovern go to the trouble of challenging President Nixon to a debate at this late date, offering to foot the bill despite his shortage of campaign funds, and offering to exclude any sensitive subjects?

The first reason is to put the President on the spot...Public support of political debates has been overwhelming over the years...the people find debates much more interesting to hear than the paid political commercials.

And so the McGovern gambit is being tried to force the President into a flat refusal and show that he is ducking out on debates, despite the overwhelming public support for them.

But that isn't the only reason. The debate challenge is part of the McGovern effort to show that Mr. Nixon's word means little and that his commitments of four and eight years ago are forgotten when political fortunes change.

# Skiing In Colorado

(DENVER)--The nation's skiers flock to Colorado resorts in increasing numbers each year, seeking the Rockies' famed powder; but frequently they encounter hour-long lift lines instead.

But it's been a summer of feverish construction around the state, and the situation could be easier this winter.

Three brand new ski areas are awaiting the winter onslaught, and seven other major areas have constructed a total of eight new lifts. The grand total is 18 new lift facilities, most of them double chairlifts.

The new names to be added to the list of Colorado ski areas this winter are Copper Mountain, Telluride, and Sunshine Peak.

Copper Mountain--less than two hours' drive west of Denver--is a large, new area with a 2350-foot vertical drop, four chairlifts (including an enclosed double chairlift) and a poma.

Telluride is an equally promising area. Although a little more off the beaten track, it will open with five double chairlifts in operation. It is located in Southwestern Colorado, five miles from the sleeping mining town of Telluride, where Butch Cassidy robbed his first bank.

Sunshine Peak is a new expansion area with two chairlifts located immediately next to the existing Steamboat ski area in Northwestern Colorado.

Other areas which have added one or more new chairlifts over the summer are Vail, Lionshead, Ski Cooper, Keystone, Steamboat, Crested Butte, Breckenridge, and Purgatory.

Keystone--which was forced to close early last year because of bare spots at the base--also has invested in \$350,000 worth of snowmaking equipment on the lower third of the mountain.

Thanksgiving is Colorado's traditional season opening--and eight areas are aiming for the November 23rd date again this year. They are Arapahoe Basin, Aspen Highlands, Mountain and Snowmass, Breckenridge, Purgatory, Steamboat, and Winter Park.

Areas opening earlier or later than that are Aspen Buttermilk, December 16th; Copper Mountain, November 15th; Crested Butte, November 22nd; Keystone, November 10th; Vail, November 17th; Telluride, December 16th; and Lake Eldora, November 11th.

Perhaps the earliest-opening ski area in the nation this year is Loveland Basin. It scheduled an October opening. UPI 10-22

democratic general elections under international supervision. The United States is not committed to any political tendency or to any personality in South Vietnam, and it does not seek to impose a pro-American regime in Saigon. National reconciliation and concord will be achieved; the democratic liberties of the people ensured. An administrative structure called the National Council of National Reconciliation and Concord of three equal segments--Communists, Neutralists, and Saigon Government--will be set up to promote the implementation of the signed agreements and to organize elections. The two South Vietnams will decide the question of North Vietnamese troops in the South, without foreign interference.

5. The reunification of Vietnam shall be carried out step-by-step through peaceful means.

6. There will be formed a four-party joint military commission and a joint military commission of the two South Vietnamese parties. An international commission of control and


supervision shall be established and an international guarantee conference on Vietnam will be convened within 30 days of the signing of this agreement.

7. The governments of North and South and Vietnam, the Viet Cong and the United States shall respect the fundamental national rights of Laos and Cambodia as set forth by the 1954 Geneva Conventions and will undertake to refrain from using the territories of Laos and Cambodia to encroach on the sovereignty of other countries. Foreign troops will withdraw from Laos and Cambodia and those countries shall settle their own affairs.

8. The ending of the war, the restoration of peace in Vietnam will create conditions for establishing a new, equal, and mutually beneficial relationship between North Vietnam and the United States. The United States will help with postwar reconstruction through Indochina.

9. This agreement shall come into effect as soon as it is signed. It shall be strictly implemented by all parties concerned. UPI 10-26 10:10 a.m.

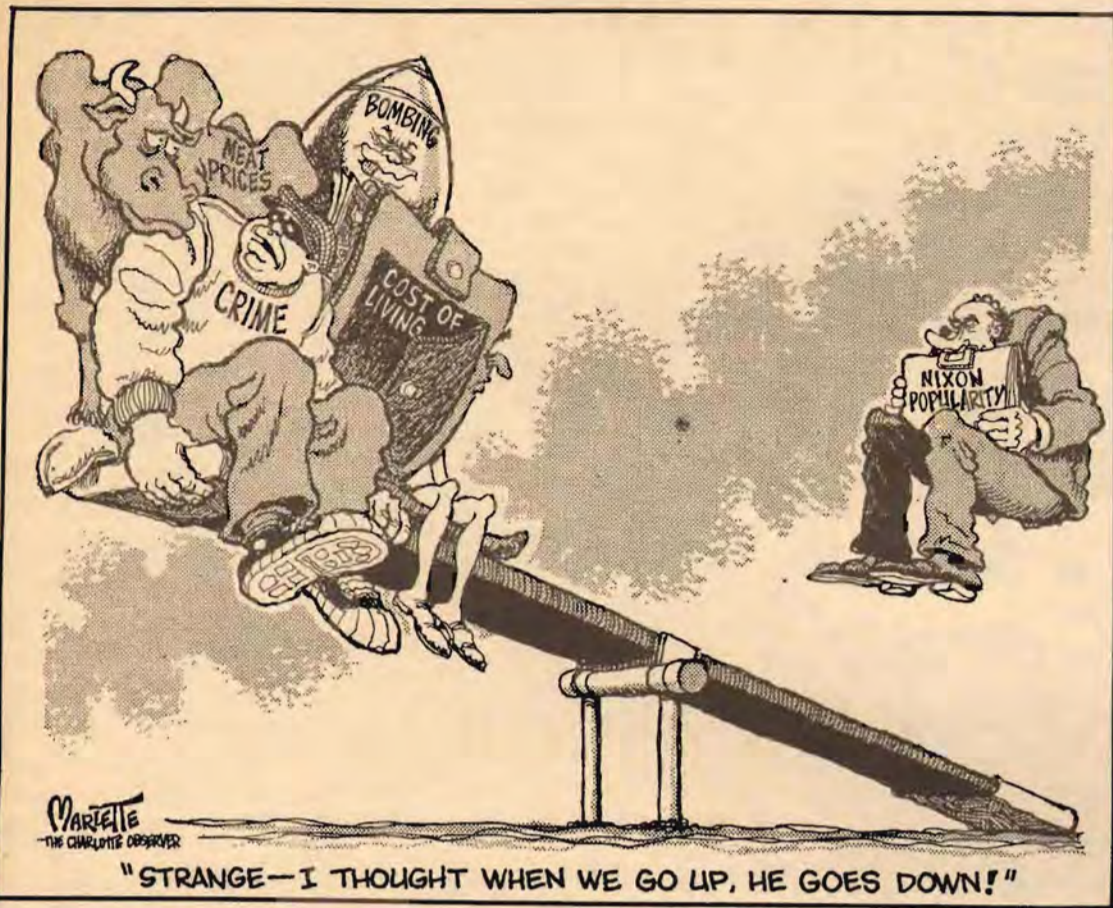

A look at the new Park Regime in South Korea—with UPI's Robert Crabbe in Seoul.

A tank is parked in front of South Korea's Parliament building and Military Police in olive drab stand motionless as statues in "present arms" posture at the doors of Seoul newspapers.

They are the Honor Guard at what appears to be the funeral of the parliamentary democracy the United States tried to bring to South Korea 27 years ago.

President Park Chung-Hee proclaimed martial law last week, suspended much of the Constitution, and said wholesale revisions of it will be announced this week. The sharp criticism of parliamentary government by the 55-year-old president and other government spokesmen seems to forecast a shift to a more authoritarian rule.

The soldiers are strictly show business—symbols of Park's new order. Outside of universities, government buildings, and news media offices; one can drive miles around Seoul without seeing a Life is absolutely normal for everybody except politicians, professors, newsmen, and students of the now-closed universities.

Anxious not to turn off the flow of tourists and to reassure foreign businessmen, the government does not even have troops at Seoul's International Airport. Customs checks are light and cursory.

Still, it is the second blow to Western-style democracy in Asia in less than a month.

On September 23rd, Phillipines President Ferdinand Marcos placed his country under martial law and began a sweeping program of political reform, whose final shape still is far from clear.

South Korea's 204-seat National Assembly was one of the targets of Park's announcement.

Park said, "disorder and inefficiency are still rampant around us. Political circles in our country are obsessed by factional strife. They already have lost their sense of

mission. The (National Assembly) was made the scapegoat of political struggle."

The day after Park's announcement, the government issued a booklet to explain its actions. It cited Thailand, which dismissed its Parliament and began experimenting with martial law a few months ago, as a model country which took measures to assure its security.

A seoul newspaper had some even unkind things to say about Parliamentary government the day after Park's edict. The paper, which has been sympathetic to Park, said in an editorial:

"Amid the boisterous dance of disorder and inefficiency the fact is that the benefits of Western-style Parliamentary Democracy were enshrouded in doubt."

"Anyway, the present reality is that we should hurry to make a sweeping reform of the struc Park and the coterie of generals and businessmen who surround him were certainly in no danger of losing their jobs under the present constitution, which Park helped draft in 1963.

The former army general took power in a military coup in 1961 and won Presidential elections in 1963 and 1967. After amending the Constitution to permit himself a third term, Park won re-election again in the spring of 1971.

The government Park and his associates gave Korea until last week kept many of the trappings of democracy. The opposition New Democratic Party held 89 of the 203 seats in Parliament. Its deputies were immune from arrest. Their criticisms of Park and his associates from the floor of the National Assembly were regularly reported in the newspapers.

However, Park was solidly entrenched. His Republican-Democratic party had a commanding majority. The President and his associates controlled a 600,000-man army and the country's central intelligence agency. Park's present term does not expire until 1975.

## Casey Kelly

"A good love is like a good song  
It grows on you 'til it's so strong  
It never leaves you  
It never goes wrong  
You know a good love is like a good song."

Such are the sentiments of Casey Kelly who is currently making his solo LP debut on Elektra Records. The 23-year-old Kelly, a musician since almost the day he was born (piano at age four, to be exact), has been through all the schools of experience and hard knocks that are necessary to turn a musician into a polished professional.

His credits include a stint as a member of an obscure rock band called "The Greek Fountains," who played in and around the Baton Rouge, Louisiana area. While with the "Fountains," Casey decided to drop out of pre-med studies at L.S.U. to devote his full-time attention to music. Once the "Fountains" met their demise, Kelly split to New York where he did A & R and played sessions on various albums.

This was followed by the customary dues paying; Nashville, gigs around the country, and then in L.A. he got a job playing with Tom Rush. A year later, Casey was out on his own again to write his music and perform it in the style he has evolved for himself.

The manufacturers of election campaign buttons are in a strange business. Election hobbyists like the losers' buttons as much as the winners...or even more.

Take the case of Senator Thomas Eagleton of Missouri. When he withdrew as a senator George McGovern's running mate, he touched off an immediate stampede for scarce buttons and bumper stickers which carried his name along with that of McGovern.

A firm in Hernando, Mississippi, announced it would issue only 75-thousand special "McGovern-Eagleton Commemoratives" to create an instant rarity.

One lucky collector in Charlotte, North Carolina, was able to get one-thousand of the authentic double-name buttons before the supply was exhausted. In Covington, Kentucky, the McGovern-Eagleton buttons can be obtained by contributing two dollars to the McGovern-Shriver campaign.

rate was one dollar a button with the candidates' names but they sold out within a day.

The rush to acquire McGovern-Eagleton buttons points up the mushrooming popularity of collecting American political campaign items and memorabilia.

The losers often are the most eagerly sought and consequently those buttons are the most expensive. Some of the rare ones are worth more than one-thousand dollars.

Top hats from the James Blaine campaign of 1884 in a light fawn color also are sought by collectors as well as canes, torches used in political parades, banners, badges, umbrellas and other memorabilia.

An unusual turn-of-the-century campaign item consisted of nixed three-inch-long soap babies. Depending on your political persuasion, you could buy one with a tag reading "My Papa will vote for McKinley", or "My Papa will

## New Program Helps Minority Groups

PRINCETON, N.J.-A new program designed to help the nation's graduate schools seek out potential students from minority groups is underway this fall.

Called the Minority Graduate Student Locator Service, the program is offered by Educational Testing Service. ETS estimates that about 10,000 to 15,000 students could initially use the new service which is offered free to both students and institutions this year.

According to J. Bradley Williams, ETS director of the project, "One of the problems facing graduate schools seeking to increase enrollment of students from racial and ethnic minorities is that of identifying potential students."

Now students will have a chance to voluntarily complete a special 17-item questionnaire as one step towards entering graduate school.

Information about the academic interests and goals of Black, American-Indian, Asian-American, and Spanish or Mexican-American students who wish to pursue graduate level education, will be available to those

institutions seeking to bolster minority enrollment.

Admissions officers may then contact students directly and invite the applications of those whose particular interests could be served by their schools' graduate offerings.

The locator service will be used first by graduate schools in December. According to Williams, some 300 schools are expected to join this year with more offering the program later.

The locator service is open to second-term college juniors, seniors, and college graduates.

Nearly 2,200 counselors at undergraduate schools across the country have received information about the program and can supply questionnaires to interested students, whatever their racial background.

The student response form is also available with information bulletins describing the Graduate Record Examinations (GRE). But ETS said GRE scores are not included in the locator service and that a student need not take the exams in order to participate in the locator service.

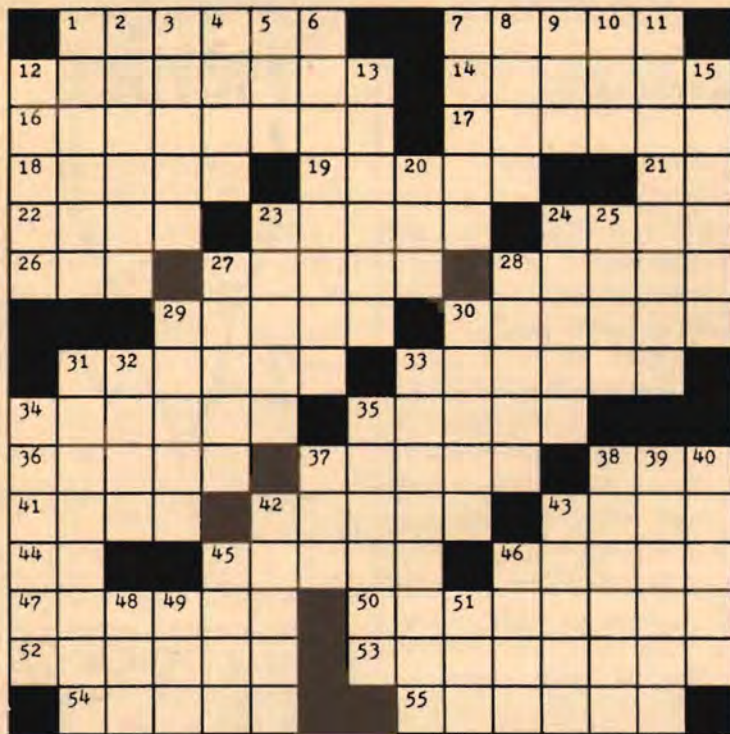

#### TENNIS

John Newcombe outdueled Marty Riessen to win the fifty thousand dollar Rothmans Tennis Tournament at Vancouver. British Columbia. The win was worth ten thousand dollars to the top seeded Australian, who was extended to four sets by Riessen, winning 6-7, 7-6, 7-6, 7-5.

#### HORSERACING

Two thoroughbred ponies were found lying one on top of the other in Philadelphia Sunday, apparently stoned to death by a group of vandals who broke into the stable during the night. Officials of the Pennsylvania Chapter of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals call it the worst case of animal brutality they had ever seen. All 27 of the horses in the ramshackled stable in the port Richmond Section of Philadelphia had been stoned. Two horses were struck with large chunks of concrete slab and another horse had been beaten with a board that had nails protruding from it. S.P.C.A. officials said the two dead ponies apparently collapsed in terror during the rampage. "This is a crime," says Pennsylvania S.P.C.A. director William Haynes. "I never seen anything like it." Haynes says he has not determined if the ponies were killed by the rocks, or if they had stampeded themselves to death.

#### AUTO RACING

Jean-Pierre Beltoise of France held off a challenge by Brazilian Carlos Pace to win the John Player

Formula One Auto Race at Brands Hatch, England.

Bobby Allison drove his Chevrolet to a two lap victory over Richard Petty in the American 500 Stock Car Race at Rockingham, North Carolina. Allison, the leading money winner on the NASCAR CIRCUIT, picked up a check for more than seventeen thousand dollars for the win.

Richard Petty can wrap up an unprecedented fourth NASCAR DRIVING CHAMPIONSHIP with a high finish in the Texas 500 to be held at College Station, Texas in November. The race is the only race remaining on the NASCAR schedule. Bobby Allison, who trails Petty by 125 points, still has a shot at the title, but Petty would have to fall out of the race early for Allison to win.

#### GOLF

Don Masengale of Greenwich, Connecticut, has won the hundred thousand dollar PGA Club Professional Championship at Pinehurst Country Club in North Carolina. Masengale shot an 68 to finish with 280, two strokes better than Don Bruno.

George Knudson, without a tour victory in 25 months, captured the 150 thousand dollar Daiser Open at Naipa, California. Knudson wound up with a total of 17 under-par 271 and a first place check of thirty-thousand dollars. Bobby Nichols, who shot a course record 64 in the final round, tied for second with Hale Irwin.

#### HOCKEY

Vancouver Coach Vic Stasiuk is known around the National Hockey League for his unorthodox hockey strategy. In a contest with the Boston Bruins this past Sunday, Vic used five defensemen against Phil Esposito, to protect a Vancouver lead. Stasiuk has already pulled his goaltender in a previous game this season in the second period. The reasoning behind that move was this, there was only three seconds left in the period, and the faceoff was deep in their opponents ice. The only way their opponent could have scored was off the faceoff!

The undefeated Buffalo Sabres have three of the top six scoring leaders in the National Hockey League after Sunday's paly. Gilbert Perreault leads the league with 19 points. With teammate Rene Robert close behind with 15. Rick Martin is sixth in the league with 12 points.

The Swedish Ice Hockey Association is concerned over the scouting of players by professional leagues in North America. The Association plans a supporting money fund in an effort to keep the Swedish players at home.

The President of the defending Stanley Cup Champion Boston Bruins flatly denied a published report that his club was up for sale. The Boston Herald Traveler and Record American said in its Tuesday editions that there were reports that the Bruins were up for sale and that Toronto Attorney Alan Eagleson was a prospective buyer. Weston Adams jr., President of the Bruins, issued a statement in which he "absolutely denied" that the Bruins "have been or are presently up for sale." He said the club "is not for sale, nor are we presently entertaining any offers." Eagleson, too, denied that he ever considered an effort to purchase the Bruins.

All of the players worked hard and one special case should be cited. Glen Cantin, a 6'3" guard from Waterbury, Connecticut has been declared academically ineligible. Glen was the leading scorer on the '70-'71 Freshmen team and received valuable varsity experience as a sophomore. Coach Folliard showed great concern for Glen's loss and said that Glen might have become the best shooter in Bryant history, but most sources feel that Glen will take care of his academic problem and be back on the Indian basketball team.

The front line of the team includes seven players with an average height of 6'6" ranging from Henry Gonzales at 6'4" to Charlie Armstrong at 6'9 1/2". Among the returnees is guard Ned Bohan who fractured his right wrist five weeks ago. His cast should come off by October 25. This team is healthy and is looking forward to improving on its 13-10 record of last year. Here are the returning veterans:

Raymond Depeltau:

Bruce "Chip" Stewart is 6'4" and hails from Washington, D.C. He is the other half of our famous forwards. One of the main reasons for Bruce's improved play is the fact he reported fifteen pounds lighter this season. He and Ray will be starting for their third season
