With the assistance of their sister sorority, Beta Sigma Gamma, Sigma Lambda Pi has once again done a remarkably efficient job in organizing all the arrangements for this year's Sno' Queen.

The excitement of the week started on Monday as all the fraternities began to work diligently on their displays to urge all students to vote for their particular candidate. The various displays were started at noon on Monday on the back lawn of South Hall. Earlier Monday morning each fraternity put up posters around the campus. The setting up of posters and displays began at 6:30 a. m. The work done by the fraternities on the displays showed much originality and thought.

Tuesday was a continuation of the diligent work on the displays. With only a few days remaining before the judging and the final decision, it seemed as though all the students as well as the individual fraternities are caught up in the excitement of the events of the week. Each of the fraternities worked harder in hopes of effecting eventual victory for their candidates.

One of the most effective highlights of this memorable week was the finishing of the displays on Wednesday. The displays were not only impressive but beautiful in their appearance. It was clearly evident to all that each fraternity had worked many long hours on these displays. Wednesday afternoon at 4:00 p. m. the judging of the displays was held. Naturally, tension mounted among the hopeful fraternities and their candidates at the time of the judging. After the judging a rally was held in the Gardner Hall area. All these events are leading to the long-awaited decision on Saturday night, and the excitement on the campus is building up rapidly.

Last night was a big night in the events of the twenty-fifth Sno'

Queen story as each candidate was questioned in four areas as the judges sought to choose a well-rounded candidate for the position of Sno' Queen. Each girl was asked a personal question, a question on current events, a question that would test her sense of humor, and finally a question that would test her ability to describe something in one sentence. Today the events of the week are fast coming to a conclusion. Voting by the students is to be held in the gym from 11 a. m. to 2 p. m., and all students are urged to vote for the candidate and the display of their choice. Tonight, beginning at 8 p. m., a variety stage show will be held in the auditorium, providing three groups of entertainers for all those who wish to attend.

Tomorrow night will bring to a final conclusion the excitement and hard work put into this year's Sno' Queen. The Sno' Queen Dance will be held at the Colony Motor Hotel from 8 p. m. to 12 p. m. with entertainment provided by Buddy Abbott and his orchestra. At approximately 10 p. m. the queen will be announced, bringing to a close the high-spirited feelings and hard work of each fraternity. 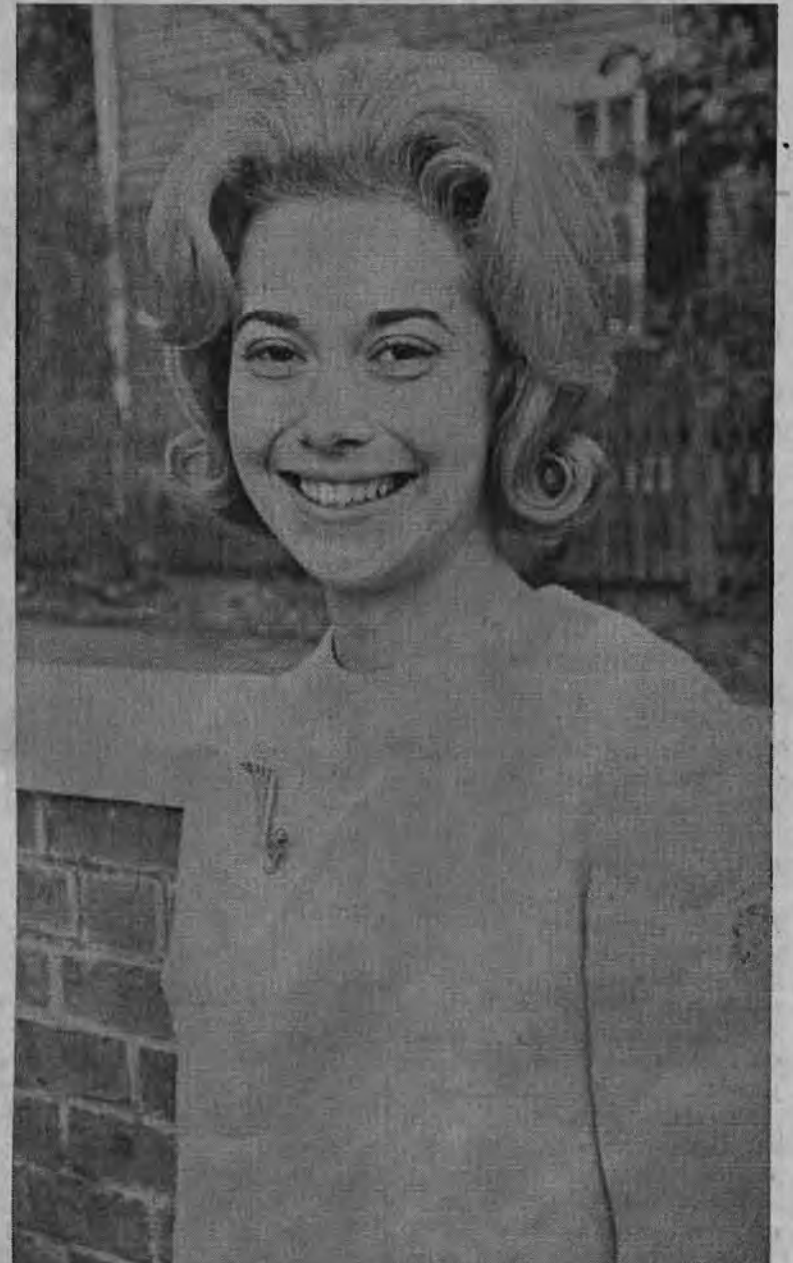
