The office had once been home to The Gertrude Meth Hochberg Women's Center—back when it was just getting started. Needless to say, the space has good history.

The GLBTQ Center also has the help of Ashley Malenfant, a graduate student at URI. She's working towards a Master's degree in College Student Personnel. She's interning at the GLBTQ Center as part of her practicum. She's also a Resident Director at Rhode Island School of Design. Ashley has done extensive research on what other GLBTQ centers have done at other schools and what we can learn and apply from them.

Over 200 colleges and universities in the United States have some sort of established center for the GLBTQ community. Among them are 8 schools in Massachusetts and Brown University in Rhode Island.

An intimate look at where our tuition money goes



It has been brought to my attention that students are curious about our tuition breakdown. The students want to know where our tuition goes and have it published in the Archway for the general student body. I proceeded with this proposition by emailing our Vice President of Business Affairs/Treasurer for this information. Vice President Barry Morrison immediately provided me with the following pie chart and information.

"Our tuition dollars (tuition, room and board revenues) do not cover all university expenses, as we have to take out 5% of our trailing 3 year average endowment asset value to help

meet our budgeted expense base. The value of this amount this past FY11 (fiscal year July 1, 2010 – June 30, 2011) was \$7.6 million. Our tuition (Undergraduate, Graduate and Executive Education), room and board revenues, net of financial aid amounted to \$106 million in FY11. Our expense base total for that year was \$118 million. That is one example of how our tuition, room and board revenues do not total our expense base. As with most schools of higher education, we need to take funds from our endowment fund to help fund the budget gap." -Vice President of Business Affairs/Treasurer Barry Morrison

Some of you may be wondering why the numbers



don't add up. They are not supposed to add up because there are also other University revenues, for example, the Bryant University Bookstore revenue, interest income, annual giving, and

government grants, etc. which is not included in the tuition, room and board revenue number shown above.

EU debt crisis continues to unfold

The European Union's debt crisis is still plaguing the region, and it will soon have an adverse effect on the rest of the world, unless it is resolved. The first country to have really fallen victim to this was Greece, so it is fitting that Greece would be the battle ground in an effort to resolve the crisis

As the Wall Street Journal reports, the Greek Government is trying to pass a piece of austerity legislation. However trade unions have denounced the legislation as a "tombstone for Greek society". A senior

socialist party official has said, "If they had the choice, no one would vote for the austerity bill." But even if there were no protests, it may not matter.

This is because other Euro-zone governments consider the austerity legislation not enough to persuade them to approve a 130 billion euro bailout for Greece, according to the Wall Street Journal. According to finance minister Evangelos Venizelos, "Greece must choose between the lesser of two humiliations: totally give in to the creditors' demands or let Greece default and be kicked out of the euro," (Wall Street Journal). And there are even more problems than

this

Another major problem occurred when four members of Greece's nationalist Laos party, who so happen to have been members of Prime Minister Lucas Papademos' party, have resigned over the austerity package (Wall Street Journal). The party spokesman Haris Kaloudis has said, "From the moment we said we would vote against the package, one of the main reasons for which this government has been formed, it was necessary for them to submit their resignations."

Also, according to the Wall Street Journal, more resignations came from a deputy labor minister and "several members of parties that promised to support the new cuts were wavering."

Even with all this said however, the austerity legislation seems almost guaranteed to pass. This is because, "the government of Mr. Papademos is backed by 252 deputies in a 300-seat parliament, supported by both the mainstay socialist Pasok party and the conservative New Democracy."

However, there is still mystery about how it will go down with the Greek people, with an election tentatively set in late Spring. One thing remains certain however, the crisis does not look like it will be resolved anytime soon, if it even will be resolved.

Prof. Roberto Blogspot: Larry Page reforms decision-making at Google

Google Vice President of Operations Kristen Gil has written a terrific memo explaining how Larry Page changed decision-making at Google when he took over again last year. Page worried that decision-making had gotten bogged down at Google, that the firm wasn't acting with the same agility as in the past. What did Page do? First, he outlined some new rules for how and when meetings should take place. Here's an excerpt from Gil's memo:

For starters, we noted that every decision-oriented meeting should have a clear decision-maker, and if it didn't, the meeting shouldn't happen. Those meetings should ideally consist of no more than 10 people, and everyone who attends should provide input. If someone has no input to give, then perhaps they shouldn't be there. That's okay – attending meetings isn't a badge of honor – but the people who are attending need to get there on time. Most importantly, decisions should never wait for a meeting. If it's critical that a meeting take place before a decision is made, then that meeting needs to happen right away.

As I wrote in a recent blog post, Alan Mullaly also changed decision-making at Ford by setting out some new ground rules for his key Thursday morning business review meetings with his senior team. Clearly establishing new ground rules and shared norms can be very important for altering patterns of behavior that have become dysfunctional. Page made a second change at Google that I find even more interesting and potentially quite effec-

tive. He recognized that, as a firm grows in size and complexity, senior executives often find themselves disconnected. Senior teams become fragmented. Travel schedules, meetings, and the needs of their particular units take them away from their peers.

As a result, members of the senior team do not communicate often enough. They don't share and integrate information effectively. Page set out to change that dynamic. Here's another excerpt from Gil's memo:

Besides fast decisions, another key hallmark of start-ups is their fast-paced, densely populated offices. We've always promoted this approach at Google, organizing around small teams and working in close proximity to one another. Even Eric Schmidt shared his office with an engineer when he first joined the company. But as Google grew, the executives spread out to the far reaches of our campuses so they could work side-by-side with their teams. To make sure our key decision-makers could work and make decisions in an environment more reminiscent of a start-up, we created a 'bullpen' in one of the buildings on our main campus, which was specially designed as a place for members of our executive team to work and talk in an informal setting. 
- Gas Prices continue to rise; the national average has hit \$3.52 (I wish, Smithfield). The increase in prices is speculated to be from the long term oil futures being purchased, driving up the price, even though demand has remained stagnant.
- The U.S. manufacturing industry has brought a serious boost to the American economy. Factory output increased 1.5 percent from December to January. The increase can be linked back to an increase business investment into property and equipment.
- •General Motors said Wednesday it will end traditional defined benefit pension plans for workers, and few, if any, workers will see pay increases throughout 2012.
- On Wednesday, Kellogg CEO John Bryant announced that his company will be purchasing Pringles brand for \$2.7 billion purchase from Procter & Gamble. Pringles are sold in

150 countries and the brand gets two-thirds of its \$1.5 billion in annual revenue from overseas.

- According to AmericanSchoolSearch.com, full-time Bryant faculty have an average compensation of \$97,000; right behind Brown University whose average compensation is \$105,000 annually. Bryant outpaces RISD, PC, RIC and Johnson and Wales for compensation.
- While Google (GOOG) has turned Android into the most popular operating system as far as users in today's market, Apple's iOS software has been gaining serious market share in the form of new applications. Over the past year, Apple has outpaced Android in new applications at a rate of 3 to 1.
- Comcast Corp. reported a 26% higher 4th quarter profit than quarter 3. This is due to the inclusion of NBC Universal entertainment business in their base package. The increased profits lead to a 44% dividend increase on their stock and a 6.5 billion repurchase agreement.

With mounting concerns over both the U.S. and EU debt crisis growing greater by the day, markets around the globe are still very volatile. However, since Jan 1, U.S. markets have been performing well due to higher hopes on a debt resolution with Greece along with strong domestic economic numbers.

The graph above shows the superstars and the super-flops of the past decade. Bulldogs tabbed to finish fourth in NEC

Led by the return of first team all-conference selection David Soltis (Plainville, Conn.) and top pitcher Peter Kelich (Jackson, N.J.), the Bryant University baseball team has been selected to finish fourth according to the Northeast Conference Preseason Coaches' Poll, the league announced Wednesday.

A year after capturing the NEC regular-season championship, the Bulldogs finished 19-12 in conference play in 2011 and won 30 games for the fifth consecutive season. This year, head coach Steve Owens returns six starting position players and three starting pitchers to a team that won five-straight games, and seven of eight, to end 2011.

After finishing 25-7 and earning the top-seed in last year's postseason tournament, Monmouth has been selected to repeat in 2012, receiving four first-place votes. The Hawks return 18 letterwinners from a year ago, including the conference's top Major League prospect, right-hander Pat Light.

Last year's conference champion, Sacred Heart is slated to finish second and also received four first-place votes. The Pioneers beat Monmouth twice in last year's tournament and bring back nine-game winner Troy Scribner and seven-game winner Nick Leiningen. Central Connecticut was picked to finish third, receiving the final firstplace vote. LIU Brooklyn, Mount St. Mary's, Wagner, Quinnipiac and Fairleigh Dickinson round out the poll, slated to finish fifth through conference-only games last season and was selected to play in the New England Intercollegiate Baseball Association (NEIBA) All-Star game.

The Bulldogs also bring back 2010 NEC Rookie of the Year Kevin Brown (Northborough, Mass.), the Black and Gold's leader in doubles (16),





ninth, respectively.

Bryant returns a strong core from last year's team including one of the league's best pitchers in Kelich. The right-hander has won 15 games in his first two seasons, going 5-2, including complete game shutouts of Sacred Heart and Mount St. Mary's, last year. Soltis finished third in batting average (.392) and on-base percentage (.468) in

triples (4) and home runs (5) last season.



The latest king of the everglades

It's not the first time that an invasive plant or animal has made it over the U.S. border and it won't be the last time either. However, pythons are not a natural wild species in the United States for a reason—they don't belong here.

The American pet trend, specifically in the last two decades, has been the domestication of Burmese Pythons. According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, approximately 99,000 of this species were imported into the U.S. from 1996-2006, which doesn't even take into account the amount of pythons imported in the last six years.

Pet owners are able to purchase pythons for as low as twenty dollars for a twenty inch-long hatchling. The catch: within two to three years these little guys grow into eight-foot long predators!

What's happening is that when people finally realize that their pets are going to grow much larger than previously expected and don't have enough space in their homes, they dump them in the wild. The Everglades, a vital element to local ecosystems that has required a lot of

time, effort, and money to ensure its preservation, now faces ecological devastation due to irresponsible discarding of these non-native creatures.

Burmese pythons are extremely invasive animals. Here's why:

1. They have long life spans of up to fifteen to twenty-five years.

2. They have a high reproductive output—a mother was found nesting eighty-five eggs.

3. They have the ability to move long distances.

4. They are excellent swimmers

5. Most importantly, however, is the fact that in Florida they have no natural predators.

In the Everglades there have been sightings of these pythons that are up to fifteen feet in length. They have the ability of consuming animals as large as deer and alligators. They also eat rodents, birds, and other smaller snakes. With this in mind, they have the capability of consuming entire woodland or marsh ecosystems. According to a study in Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, observations of many mammals such as raccoons, bobcats, and possums have declined by more than 85% in



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the south.

This issue is not limited to Florida. They can move long distances, can survive in warm climates, and are capable of inhabiting the entire bottom third of the United States. Additionally, these snakes are "near threatened" in Southern Asia due to their value as an export as pets and being hunted for their skin.

Many state governments, specifically Florida, have implemented stricter pet licensing laws. In Florida it costs around \$100 a year to own a python. Unfortunately, owners continue to feel the need to dump their pythons, this

time due to the financial burdens of both permit and maintenance fees.

I understand it must be pretty cool to show off an exotic pet in your own home, but first you should do some serious research. Buying and maintaining exotic animals comes with a vast amount of responsibility. People shouldn't feel entitled to own a pet just because.

The governments, both federal and state, should also be held responsible. There is a possibility that pythons will be prohibited from being imported or brought across borders, which I personally agree

should be the case. Why do we really need pythons in our homes anyway?

These pets were being handed out like candy at a parade. We take a driving test before we get our driving license. Why? Because being irresponsible behind the wheel affects more than just the driver. Exotic pet owners should be educated about their responsibilities, rather than simply be asked for a \$100 permit fee. It's not that the actual python is the true danger, but more specifically the social responsibility of the people who choose to own

Sprint, their next largest competitor, has not been profitable since 2008, when the company broke even for a single quarter. Seeking Alpha, a prominent equity analysis blog,

says that, "you might want to think about this industry as a two person race where either company can bring you significant success."

Demand is increasing so much that these two companies will not cannibalize each other's market share and both be able to grow. I see parallels in their competition to that of Coke and Pepsi where there is room for both to

profit without having to engage in price wars.

Accompanying the strong earnings and minimal competition is a 5+% an-

nual dividend for both companies. Verizon has actually increased its annual dividend by 3% over the past 2 years showing it is still growing and committed to shareholders, even through a recession

On top of that, both
AT&T and Verizon have
low betas signaling that
they are less susceptible to
shifts in the overall market,
making them a safer investment in today's volatile economy. Such a high dividend
and the real potential for



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stock appreciation make AT&T and Verizon strong long-term plays.

Instead of looking at these companies as competitors in a

zero sum game it is best to group them together and own both in your portfolio for maximum return.

The story is familiar. Beautiful, talented singer, actor, dancer, and on down the list, succumbs in a tragic likely accident that may have involved drug abuse. Whitney Houston was added to that roll call Saturday. She was 48. Like so many others, she is gone too soon, and yet she will always be with us.

Almost from the time the little girl from Newark, N.J., opened her mouth in song, it was clear she would one day be a star. And why not, given her lineage? Gospel great Cissy Houston was her mother, pop music icon Dionne Warwick her aunt, and the queen of soul, Aretha Franklin, her godmother. Houston's life may serve as a cautionary lesson to some, and that's fine. It's a lesson that can't be taught too often, or too early. But that's not the only Whitney Houston who should be remembered.

Remember her as the only pop singer to have seven consecutive No. 1 singles on Billboard. Remember her as the singer who put Francis Scott Key on the Top 10 charts as a lyricist for her thrilling rendition of "The Star-Spangled Banner." Remember her as the talented actress in films like "Waiting to Exhale." Remember her as the voice heard on tape in countless weddings, singing her signature hit, "I Will Always Love You."

Remember her as the memorable singer she was.

NYALA, Sudan _ It's an all too common sight in this city in the western section of the country: Women weighted down by the heavy buckets as they work at construction sites. "This work is very hard. Most days, we stay on the site from six in the morning to six at night without eating anything," said Aisha, a worker at one of the building sites. "We drink water perhaps once or twice a day. Anything we do

Khadeja, another construction worker in Nyala, said, "We earn about 50 cents a day, and sometimes we don't even get that. There are men working with us, but they earn \$1.25 a day or more. We asked if we could be paid the same as men, but our employers refused."

Ahmed Musa Adam is a primary school teacher in Kabkabeya, a region of northern Darfur; his wife works in construction in the town of El Fashir.

Building work and making bricks and concrete is very hard for women," he said. "Sometimes she has fever and pain all over her body, and she is stressed all the time

from thinking about the work that she has to do. For two to three days she doesn't feel good at all, and when she starts to feel better she goes back to work again."

Even getting to the job site can be a hazard for women. They're often subject to attack as they make their way to and from work.

"The security situation isn't very good and there is always danger," Adam said.

Adam says his wife's job is taking a toll on the entire


> After I come back from school, I'm forced to stay with them and organize their things until she returns," he said.

> But there is no alternative, Adam explains.

"Circumstances mean that we have no choice but to let these women work in these kinds of jobs," he said. "My basic salary isn't enough for someone with a family. This is why I let her work. The money she brings home is barely enough to improve our lives, but it is better than nothing."

Laws intended to prevent employers from hiring women and children to perform arduous or dangerous work are routinely ignored.

'In Sudanese labor law, there is a provision to prevent the employment of women and children in arduous



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labor," said Omer Musa Omer, a local labor lawyer. "However, there is nothing in the text that provides for specific criminal responsibility for those that hire women.'

Adam Fadoul, an employer in the construction sector, defended the policy of hiring women.

"If a woman comes to us and says, 'I have nothing, my children need to eat and they need clothes to wear' what can we do?" he said. "We just tell her this is the work we


day we pay them for what they have done. It is up to them. They know the dangers they face.'

And there's another reason Fadoul prefers female employees.

"Men don't work," he said. "They say that the wage is not high enough for them. Women come to us and they say they have nothing and they need to work, so we pay them. We can't raise the wages because the economic situation here is weak."

Simple, realistic solution to fixing the U.S. economy

Few would deny that the U.S. economy is badly damaged or that the party with the more plausible plan for fixing it is likely to win the coming election. Yet neither has proposed a plan that realists can believe in. While Republicans advocate yet more tax cuts and deregulation, Democrats propose further stimulus and deficit spending. Both are futile.

Tax cuts will fail because they reduce government revenue, thereby necessitating additional layoffs at the state and local levels among police, firefighters, teachers and others. Outside the beltway, budgets have to balance, and deficit spending is not an option. In any case, firing people is a poor way to create jobs. The victims swell the ranks of the unemployed, even as their insolvency erodes demand for their services.

History suggests that deregulation isn't the answer either. As it affected the airlines in the late 1970s, deregulation served mainly to create shareholder value by decreasing the compensation of pilots, flight attendants, and airline mechanics. As it affected the trucking industry a few years later, it led to mass terminations coupled with (vastly) increased workloads for the few drivers fortunate enough to keep their jobs.

Stimulus and deficit spending are even less promising. Though widely believed to have halted the economic free fall of late 2008 and early 2009, the combination has yet to generate a recovery worthy of the name. Economist Nouriel Roubini, together with colleagues Daniel Alpert and Robert Hockett, has recently released a proposal for further economic stimulus leading, it is hoped _ after five to seven additional years of massive deficit spending _ to genuine recovery. But a substantial portion of their report

is devoted to policies the Chinese government must be persuaded to adopt (including universal health care, education, retirement benefits, and substantial disposable income), lest the benefits of American deficit spending accrue primarily to that nation. How realistic is that?

Will the Chinese agree to abandon strategies that appear, from their perspective, to be working famously, in favor of policies that have stopped working for the United States? Is the Chinese government about to provide its citizens with a standard of living comparable to that enjoyed by the already developed nations? Will China even agree to stop devaluing its currency, as American diplomats have begged it for years to do? And if by some miracle China should agree to all that, is it likely that it will prove willing and able to honor the agreement?

The changes Roubini proposes would have many of the same effects as a simple protective tariff on imported goods, increasing federal revenue and rendering U.S. manufacturers more competitive in domestic markets. Yet such is the power of the free-trade lobby forged in the campaign to pass NAFTA and the WTO that every remaining presidential candidate has explicitly disowned

"protectionism." Should they?

Protectionism is the antithesis of the "free international trade" that American leaders have been preaching at least since Woodrow Wilson made it one of his "14 points." As long as it received only lip service, the doctrine had little effect on the U.S. economy. But that changed soon after it became official policy.

The turning point, according to trade expert Ravi Batra, came in 1968, with the conclusion of the so-called Kennedy Round of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade ne-

gotiations. Before then, he argues, the U.S. economy had been relatively self-sufficient, with combined imports and exports rarely exceeding 12 percent of GDP. Only after 1973, when the OPEC oil embargo fell like a wet blanket on the growth prospects of energy-poor industrializing nations such as Japan and South Korea, did foreign firms and products begin to enter U.S. markets in force.

Low-tech products such as textiles and footwear came first, soon to be followed by radios, televisions, automobiles, motorcycles, refrigerators, air conditioners, generators, turbines, cameras, and others long supplied by U.S. firms. Often, the invaders used tactics that would have violated U.S. antitrust law had they been deployed by domestic firms. Little of this "export-led growth" would have been possible, according to Batra, without the draconian U.S. tariff reductions of the Kennedy and Tokyo

The enactment of a protective tariff of, say, 30 percent on most imported goods and services could increase government revenue as much as half a trillion dollars annually. The resulting scramble to reopen or replace mothballed U.S. factories could hardly fail to create a welcome flood of new (albeit temporary) jobs. No other feasible reform would have as large an impact on either the nation's finances or its employment prospects.

Yet no serious candidate dares to mouth those words, for fear of being ridiculed by the media and denied access to corporate campaign funds. As a result, voters seem doomed to 10 more months of econobabble about tax cuts, deregulation, and (Keynesian) stimuli.

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Movie Review: This Means War

Dating turns deadly in *This* Means War, the new romanticaction-comedy from director McG. Zipping along in a purposely silly fashion, the film tells the story of two best friends and secret agents (Inception's Tom Hardy and Star Trek's Chris Pine) who begin dating the same woman (Reese Witherspoon), only to have it cause a tremendous rivalry between the two for her affections. This Means War is certainly not a perfect film, but it is not meant to be – it is meant as a crowd pleaser, and it succeeds in doing that, offering laughs in typical rom-com style, with some added explosions and gunfights for good measure. Sure, the action is completely non-essential to the plot, existing as a footnote to the real relationships onscreen; however, the action is welcome when it does arrive, providing for more comedic moments and exploring the friendship-turned-rivalry between Tuck and Franklin. And it is refreshing to see that these roles were given to Tom

Hardy and Chris Pine, both action movie veterans who show they have comedy chops too.

This Means War coasts along on the charisma and chemistry of its three lead actors. With enough witty dialogue and breezy comedic scenes to satisfy the average moviegoer; the film succeeds by not even pretending to be anything it isn't, existing simply as a fun, if incredibly lightweight, film for a rainy day. And here is where the film is disappointing. With a first half full of inconsistencies, it is baffling as to why Paige does not even TRY to reconnect with her husband, pushing him away and not even giving herself a chance to get to know him, despite the doctor's advice that it may jog her memory. Because of this, I

Thankfully, the second half does contain a shift of events that start to propel Leo and Paige's journey forward at a more brisk pace, giving the audience (finally) cause to root for them. However, this shift causes the film to be very disjointed, seeming almost as if a large chunk of the middle of the film that would bridge the inconsistencies is missing.

The pacing of *The Vow* is all over the place, but the film is still not a complete failure. Rachel McAdams does a great

job with her role, beautifully conflicted, if not entirely consistent (though that is just the way Paige was written). And Channing Tatum is fine as Leo, though occasional scenes of bad acting show that he still has a long way to go before he can break out of his shell and into more challenging roles – at least this one is a step in the right direction for him.

Another standout is Jessica Lange as Paige's mother, a character with more depth than we at first believe when introduced to her. While the film has a fine cast, nothing else really stands out, save for a few cute scenes of the central couple's budding relationship and a few other tear-jerking moments that show the film's more sincere side.

Sweet, sappy, and ultimately forgettable, this is a movie for the date night crowd, those looking to invest two hours into the lives of an attractive and likeable couple you want to see end up (back) together. For a romantic night out that may make you smile, shed a tear, or bring your significant other just a little closer to you, *The Vow* succeeds; but as a consistent journey or emotional statement

about the power of love and commitment, the film in the end falls flat.
