hen **Bianca Cornacchia '13** participated in the Bryant Alumni Shadow Program at TJX Companies and Travelers during the winter break of her sophomore year, she discovered a passion for the retail and fashion industries.

"That spring, I attended the Amica Center Career Fair and secured a summer internship with Ross Stores, a department store chain with more than \$9 billion in revenue," says Cornacchia. She was the youngest of 50 participating interns that summer. She was so

successful, in fact, that she was offered a full-time position as an assistant buyer at Ross in her senior year.

"What I enjoyed most was interacting with people," she says. And that





Bryant Hillel – One of Bryant's oldest student organizations

At Bryant, students have the opportunity to form clubs and organizations that align with their interests. Through the years, many clubs have come and gone, but Hillel is now one of the strongest presences on campus with an active student population.

Engage talked to Rabbi Steve Jablow about the history of Jewish life and Hillel at Bryant and the University's vision for the future of Hillel.

Rabbi Steve: Hillel is the world's largest Jewish student organization and serves on 550 campuses in North America and 56 more around the world. Bryant's first formal Jewish organization was the Bryant Hebrew Co-ed Club in March 1947, which became the Hillel Counsellorship, and in October of 1948 the Bryant Hillel received its Charter from the National B'nai B'rith Hillel foundation. At that time, Bryant was the 179th chapter recognized.

Engage: How long have you been involved with Hillel here at Bryant?

Rabbi Steve: I started in the spring semester of 2011 as the Jewish Chaplain and Hillel Director in a part-time position, and I was smitten by Bryant and the amazing community that exists here. In July 2015, I transitioned to a full-time position with the support of President Machtley

Engage: What are some of Hillel's plans for this year?

R.S.: One of my goals for this year is to broaden the impact Hillel has on Jewish experiences on campus. Religious activity is important, but we want Hillel to reach out in many different ways. We now hold weekly meetings that include social time, discussions and movies about Israel, educational opportunities of many kinds, and more.

Engage: What future plans are you working on for Jewish life at Bryant?

R.S.: I'm happy to say that President Machtley shares my vision for increasing Jewish life and Jewish student enrollment at Bryant.

With this in mind, we hosted a community forum on November 9 to publicly share plans to meet these two goals at Bryant. It was attended by Rhode Island Jewish community leaders, rabbis, board members, alumni, and parents of students who were introduced to our vision for continued growth at Bryant. Many outstanding Bryant professionals in University Relations, University Advancement, and faculty members, as well as many key volunteers helped

prepare and hosted the community forum. We hope this meeting will be just the beginning of tremendous growth and support for Jewish life at Bryant University.

A vibrant Jewish life on campus with a larger Jewish student population is a winwin situation for Bryant. We are all familiar with the many diverse ways that President Macthley has raised the profile, reputation, and success of Bryant over his illustrious tenure here. Each fall, our students who have received scholarships write thank you notes to their donors.



New gift strengthens scholarship fund established by Bryant alumni and CPA Partners


more than half of the employees – work for the firm, with many in senior positions.

Endowed scholarship reflects commitment of a lifelong learner

"I wanted to support the campaign and also bring the scholarship fund to the \$100,000 mark to generate a strong endowment," explains Piccerelli, who has seen firsthand the fruits of the scholarship opportunity. His firm's

commitment to hiring Bryant students for internship and employment opportunities has mutual benefits. "Students benefit from exposure and experience in public accounting and we have the opportunity to evaluate their abilities and make offers to top candidates."

Piccerelli's trajectory of success began at Bryant, where he graduated Summa Cum Laude and received the highest honor for an accounting major, the Gold Key. In 1973, he and fellow alumnus Gilstein founded their firm, where he specializes in technical financial accounting, general business dealings, succession of closely held businesses, business valuations and litigation support, and real estate development issues.

He has been recognized by his peers in the Rhode Island Society of Certified Public Accountants with its Distinguished Service to the Profession Award. This year, Bryant presented Piccerelli with an Alumni Achievement Award to honor the outstanding contributions he has made to his profession, to his community, and to the University. They were donors to Bryant's first capital campaign as well as the historic *Expanding the World of Opportunity: The Campaign for Bryant's Bold Future.* In 1991, the couple established the Richard and Geraldine Capobianco Scholarship Fund, an endowed scholarship that provides aid to academically strong Connecticut students with financial need. 1863 SOCIETY Ron '61 and Linda Mosca: A legacy of gratitude

As special guests at the September 23 dedication of the Academic Innovation Center, part of this year's Reunion celebration, **Ron '61** and **Linda Mosca** were amazed and impressed by the transformation that has taken place on campus.

"It is beyond my imagination to think this is my alma mater," said Ron, who built a successful finance career in the insurance, real estate development, and aerospace industries.

The couple decided to make Bryant part of their estate plan through the 1863 Society. "I owe Bryant a lot because they took

me in, so to speak," says Ron.

Adds Linda, "Everything has followed from what Ron learned at Bryant. We are so grateful for that."

IN THE BEGINNING

Ron Mosca worked in construction for a few years before deciding to go to college. When he reached out to his high school principal in Old Saybrook, CT, the principal said he knew someone he could call, though it was late summer. That person, Dean Nelson Gulski, met with Ron and invited him to join the incoming class. Though he did not feel as confident and accomplished as the other 19 freshmen he lived with, he was among only four who graduated. "The best thing about Bryant were the professors," says Ron. "They had real-life experience, industry-practical experience. They could spout a theory and talk about it because they had done it. At Bryant, we applied what we learned, and that really stood out for me." After graduation, Mosca headed to New York City with \$100 and no job prospects, taking a bank teller position so he could eat and pay his bills.

"I'm so blessed that she puts up with me," says Ron with candor. Linda smiles and her eyes fill. "He's an adventurer," she explains. "It takes a little patience."

Among those adventures: buying a sapphire mine in Montana, where Ron would spend weeks happily digging for gemstones. the past 16 years in their other, 200-yearold historic home in Savannah, GA.

After the frustrating experience of finding a place to live, Linda became a Realtor, a career she enjoyed for 26 years, and Ron worked on the finance end of secret laser development projects in Florida. After the laser project was cancelled, Ron began working on experimental jet engines.

Throughout the years, the Moscas had diversified. "My goal was to retire at 50," says Ron. "We built apartment houses and developed land from Cape Canaveral to Palm City while working full time." Adds Linda, "We never wanted to rely on anyone." Ron achieved enough financial security to retire, but stayed at Pratt & Whitney until stress began to take its toll. When a retirement offer came through, Linda encouraged him to take it at age 52 and he did, though they had two children in college. Ron and Linda threw themselves into real estate investing. Ron began to renovate the apartment buildings they had bought, doing much of the manual work himself. "It was therapeutic," he says. "There wasn't anything I was afraid to do – from demolition, plumbing, electrical, to sheetrock."

At this year's Reunion in September, it was evident that the Moscas are still deeply in love, completing each other's sentences with humor and kindness. They have been visionaries, seizing opportunities and taking chances while creating a rewarding and adventurous life for themselves and their family.

AN EXTRAORDINARY ART COLLECTION

Over the years, the Moscas have collected paintings by the original "Florida Highwaymen," artwork that caught Ron's eye long ago. The group of 26 self-taught African-American artists painted and sold their work, mostly iconic Florida landscapes, for \$15 to \$25 at roadside stands, out of car trunks, and door-to-door. They would use Upson board as their canvas (similar to today's drywall), completing a piece in under an hour and often selling it before it was dry. Forty years ago, the paintings were called "motel art" or "throw-away art." It is estimated that the Highwaymen, who faced racial and cultural barriers, created and sold more than 150,000 paintings. The original group - which includes one woman – was inducted in the Florida Artists Hall of Fame in 2004. Their work hangs in museums and the White House, prized by people ranging from U.S. presidents to Steven Spielberg. Part of the Moscas' collection was recently exhibited in Beach Institute in Savannah, and they have been approached by The Martin Luther King Civil Rights Museum in Memphis, TN, to exhibit the collection. It's important to the Moscas to share their collection so that others may enjoy its beauty.

Ron left the bank after he found work at a Park Avenue insurance company, and he and Linda married. MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Benefiting from multiple perspectives

hen Lois A. Wims '77 recalls her proudest achievement, it isn't one of many accolades conferred during her distinguished academic career. Instead, she recalls a two-year appointment as executive director of the Rhode Island Select Commission on Race and Police Community Relations in 2000-2002. There Wims led the development of comprehensive plans to improve policing in Rhode Island. "Real changes were implemented from our work," she recalls. "It is an example of a dedicated group of people with divergent opinions who joined together to problem solve."

Wims' career path merged her Bryant education in criminal justice and her eight years of service as a police officer in Central Falls, RI, with a doctorate degree in psychology and her passion for higher education. She

applied her unique perspective and skills to each of her leadership roles – at institutions as varied as Salve Regina University in Rhode Island, the University of South Alabama, and Community College of Rhode Island.

Along the way, her appreciation for team work and commitment to diversity were continually strengthened. "Leaders need to know and understand themselves and realize that they see the world from a set of incomplete lenses. The value in a team is completing that world view with multiple perspectives," explains Wims. She adds, "A leader needs most to populate a team with folks who are decidedly different from herself."

Today, Wims is the provost and vice president for academic affairs at Worcester State University in Massachusetts. Devoted to students



and academic pursuits for decades, she knows that learning is a lifelong endeavor. "A college graduate most needs to know that the workforce will be a continuing teacher," advises Wims. "Learning is never static and truly never 'complete.' During my time at Bryant I was in a huge hurry to 'get finished.' Little did I realize that I would never be 'finished' with learning."

BUNMI AKINNUSOTU '03: Environmental protector

Bunmi Akinnusotu '03 describes herself as "globalist, public servant, and future ambassador." She merged the computer information systems and marketing skills learned at Bryant with graduate studies in sociology and urban policy. The result: a trajectory of success that has positioned her at the frontlines as environmental policy is developed and implemented by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

As a special assistant in the agency's Office of Land and Emergency Management, Akinnusotu supports international climate change initiatives related to resource efficiency and wasted food. She also has developed a systematic way to track and report the implementation of a presidential executive order issued to protect communities from chemical accidents. "I learned how to use data and evidence to drive

decision-making and tell powerful stories at Bryant," she explains. "Those are invaluable skills I use every day." For Akinnusotu, it's critical to

keep learning – and re-learning – what you think you know. Sometimes, she explains, that means you'll be in an uncomfortable position or an unfamiliar place. She earned a spot on Bryant's women's volleyball team – and went on to become a star player – by working relentlessly, challenging herself to learn from her high-performing teammates, and embracing new ways to play the sport.

"You'll never know it all," she explains. "But when you learn new



things, you not only remain relevant, it keeps you energized. Learning new skills and information builds confidence."

Akinnusotu has achieved a career highlight many would envy. "I am most proud to have worked for the first Black President, Barack Obama, and likely the most important figure in my lifetime. Public policy is not easy work, especially at the federal level where one has to consider the needs of the entire nation – a nation with vastly different cultural, political, economic, religious, and social perspectives. It has been a life-changing experience, not only to serve the President, but to be a public servant."

That close-up view has fueled another goal: Akinnusotu aspires to be appointed the nation's first Nigerian-American ambassador and, in the meantime, to use her experience to create more opportunities "for people of color to become globally-minded thinkers and doers."
