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Examining the Association between Awareness and Acceptance of Impermanence and Humility





What is humility?

- Individuals who view themselves as secure, accepting, and open as well as viewing others with value and acceptance²
- Humility can be measured as either a state approach or a trait approach²

What leads to humility?

- Individuals can become humble by detaching themselves from their ego^{2,10}
- There are personal and relational hallmarks of humility²



What are downstream consequences of humility?





- Interpersonal benefits:
 - Healthier social relationships⁹ and more helpful⁸
- Personal benefits:
 - Greater health⁶ and more resilient⁵



What is impermanence?

- Impermanence refers to the fleeting nature of time
- Comes from within the Buddhist tradition⁴
- Impermanence can also be examined in psychology⁴

What leads to impermanence?

• Impermanence awareness and impermanence acceptance⁴



What are downstream consequences of impermanence?

 Provide different psychological benefits for outcomes of impermanence⁴



Why might impermanence lead to humility?

• Impermanence and humility share the benefits of relationships



Current Study

- Examined the association between humility and impermanence.
- Proposes that humility is much more than the relative size of the ego but also how long the ego exists.
- Hypothesis: impermanence and humility will be positively correlated

Methods

- 257 adult participants (N = 257; Mage = 37.38, SDage = 10.85; 37.4% female)
- Participants were asked to complete four different scales:
 - The Impermanence Awareness and Acceptance scale (awareness, α = .75; acceptance, α = .91; overall, α = .78; Fernández-Campos et al., 2021)
 - Relational Humility Scale Global Humility Subscale (α = .70; Davis et al., 2011)
 - State Humility Scale ($\alpha = .65$; Kruse et al., 2017)
 - HEXACO Honestly-Humility Subscale ($\alpha = .66$; Ashton & Lee, 2011).

Results

	Awareness	Acceptance	Overall
Relational Humility	.33**	-0.12	0.03
State Humility	.37**	.40**	.55**
HEXACO- HH	.16**	.54**	.59**

- Impermanence awareness was related to Relational Humility Scale Global Humility Subscale (r = .33, p = < .001), State Humility Scale (r = .37, p = < 0.01), and HEXACO Honestly-Humility Subscale (r = .16, p = .01).
- Impermanence acceptance was related to the State Humility Scale (r = .40, p = < 0.01) and HEXACO Honestly-Humility Subscale (r = .54, p = < .001).
- Impermanence acceptance was not related to the Relational Humility Scale Global Humility Subscale (r = -.12, p = .05).

Discussion

Findings


- Relative size and time of the ego are important
- Humble people are more likely to be aware and accepting of impermanence
- Contribute to the understanding of impermanence and humility

Limitations and Future Directions

- Lack of previous research
- Experimental data needed

Take Home Message

- Not only is the relative size of the ego important but also how long the ego exists
- Humble people are more likely to be aware and accepting of impermanence
