





Toyon welcomes work in Spanish and English, and in translation from any other language. All writers and artists are welcome.

Our editorial team is made up of undergraduate students. We read submissions in October, November, and December only. We are open to submissions year-round, but please expect a response time of 3-16 months.

We ask that writers and artists submit in only one genre each annual cycle, ending on September 30.

- Critical analysis
- Visual art
- Original translations
- Spoken word / Multimedia
- Environmental justice writing & art

Poetry: Three poems per author. Each poem no more than two pages in length. Please submit poems in the format you wish them to be published.

Art: Three pieces per artist. All mediums considered. Submit a scan or photo or the original piece.

Please proofread carefully, *Personas* will not copy edit your work.
