We've had some moving and some shaking over the course of the past quarter, which I am happy to relay here in the combined Title Changes/Checking In column on the NASIG blog. So, without further ado:

I am very happy to share that I (Treasa Bane) accepted a position as a Copyright and Scholarly Communications Librarian at Washington University in St. Louis, starting August 18.

I (Daniel S. Brown) started as the Head of Technical Services at Lincoln Memorial University in Harrogate TN in mid-December 2021. I earned an MSI from The University of Michigan in 2001 and shortly after went on an academic career path. After realizing how difficult it was to get full-time, tenure-track employment, I decided to work my way back into librarianship around 2015. I worked with ProQuest for nearly three years before getting a job as a librarian at The University of the South Pacific in Suva Fiji in 2019. I was assigned as an electronic resources librarian and was essentially thrown into the deep end to figure out how to swim. Now, I've decided to take advantage of being back in the States to fully participate in NASIG. I'm looking forward to attending my first conference in June.

As a new professional to the field of libraries and information management, I (Erin Calhoun) am fortunate to have found NASIG! I am the Electronic Resources

Librarian at the University of Toronto where I also held a brief contract position as the Scholarly Communications and Copyright Outreach Librarian, prior to finding my place in eResources. I also earned my Bachelor of Arts (high distinction) and Master of Information at the University of Toronto, during which I worked in various part-time positions within the library system, including an internship in eResources and Collection Development. In 2020 I was awarded NASIG's John Riddick Student Grant and attended the virtual conference. It's great to come into work every day and not be sure what problems or issues come up!

I'll also be starting my first professional position as Liaison and Communications Librarian at A.T. Still University May 2022.

After 17 years at Mississippi State, I've moved to Atlanta to lead a strategic direction of the growing collections at one of the fastest growing universities in the United States. Effective September 1, 2022, Christine Radcliff will permanently hold the position of Library Director for the James C. Jernigan Library at Texas A&M University-Kingsville. Christine has been serving as the Interim Director for the past year. She has been at TAMU-Kingsville for over 16 years moving steadily up the ranks from Serials Librarian to Head of Technical Services to interim and now permanent Library Director. She has been a NASIG member since 2005 when she was chosen as one of several student grant winners.
