

Rhetoric and the Audience of Ashley's War



"A speech [text] consists of three things: a speaker [ethos] and a subject on which he speaks [logos] and someone addressed [pathos], and the objective [telos] of the speech relates to the last." 1

I argue that despite the celebratory nature of author Gayle Tzemach Lemmon's appeal to a public audience, the rhetoric of her book *Ashley's War* continues to instrumentalize women's bodies and stories, relying on many of the misogynistic tropes that contribute to the continued marginalization of women in male-dominated spaces such as combat.

"Tactical Femininities" Calls For:

- A reclamation of the ownership of the strategic aims of femininity.
- A view of women in the miliary as free to choose their own presentation of masculinity or femininity.
- A careful examination of the language we use to tell the stories of women in combat to varied audiences.
- A more nuanced navigation of the use of misogynistic tropes and an awareness of their presence in our common storytelling practices.
