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

Northeastern, the most ethnically diverse university in the Midwest, held its International Day Festival on Thursday, November 9, 2000. The ethnic festivity was brought together by the Foreign Language and Literature Departments, as well as by the many ethnic clubs and student organizations on campus. This event is held every year to recognize and celebrate the diversity of ethic backgrounds

that Northeastern is composed of. Beginning at 10 a.m. Thursday, the university students, faculty, and staff had a chance to mingle with one another and learn about each other's ethnic backgrounds by bringing traditional dishes from their culture, performing native dances, and dressing up in native attire representing their culture.

One of the clubs that participated in this cultural event was the Chimexla Student Union. Chimexla stands for CHIcano. MEXicano and LAtino Student

student organizations on campus, Chimexla did not perform any type of cultural dance, did not sing a song, or perform artistically for their representation of culture. Instead, they stood on the platform in protest of the struggles that many of the Latin American countries are currently facing. Due to the rules of Northeastern's International Day Festival that Chimexla had exceeded, which are of not engaging in any political issues during the event, Chimexla was asked to leave the platform by Dr. Flora Llacuna, director of the festivity.

The next student organization to perform was the Korean American Student Association. They began with a traditional sword dance, which was performed by Keith Jennings, followed by a modern Korean dance by the president of the student organization and two other female members. The trio sang songs and incorporated dance to the melodies.

One student body against disease

Diabetes, breast cancer, heart attack, and strokes; these are just some of the diseases that were covered at the annual Northeastern Health Fair held on November 8 from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m.. Northeastern has been facilitating this event for the last seven years.

The main focus of this fair is the education of the community and students about dangerous but alarmingly common diseases that directly or familiarly effect people every day. Jessica Lettow, Director of Health Services, has been conducting the Health Fair for two years.

Why would it be important for students to worry about health issues at the young and "indestructible" college age? "Because we have done a good job of teaching students how to prevent diseases such as diabetes, breast cancer, et cetera," Lettow

At the fair, one could explore different tables dedicated to different afflictions and their treatments, including information on all sorts of diseases. One could also get a massage and see how well one

washes their hands to prevent manual spreading of germs to vulnerable areas, such as the eyes, nose, and mouth, or to others. Also available were flyers on heart attacks, strokes, breast cancer, diabetes, and other diseases. Experts were on hand to discuss the causes and prevention of these afflictions with Health Fair-goers on every level.

One informative handout in particular available at the fair was a self-care guide for students. The index included common health problems such as acne, asthma, colds, coughs, eating disorders, HIV, and other pressing health concerns.

According to the guide, Dave S. of the University of Michigan says, "Treat your symptoms before they get out of control. Don't feel too proud to get treatment. Know your limits! Remember to follow all of your doctor's instructions and don't be afraid to ask questions."

For colds and flu, the guide says that if you have meningitis, some of the signs are fever, stiff neck (you can't bend your chin forward to touch your chest), nausea or vomiting, sleepiness and/or confusion, headache, and occasionally a purple or red,

bumpy skin rash.

For coughs, coughing clears the lungs and airways. Coughing is only a symptom, not a disease. There are three kinds of coughing: Productive, which brings up mucus or phlegm; Nonproductive, which is just a dry cough; and Reflex, which is a cough that comes from a problem elsewhere on the body, like the ear or stomach.

Warning signs of a heart attack are uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing, or pain in the center of the chest that either lasts more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back. Pain that spreads to the shoulders, neck, or arms may indicate imminent heart attack, as well as discomfort with fainting, lightheadedness, sweating, nausea, or shortness of

Another student-oriented affair Health Services is holding later in the Fall semester is the Student Stress Free Zone during finals week, December 12 through 14 from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. in Room SU-214. 

The Program succeeded in promoting an opportunity to learn, respect, tolerate, and understand other religions as a renovating and constructive force in life. The Inter-Faith Program proved to revitalize cross-cultural experiences for many.

The two-day Art Gallery, located in Student Union 003 (Cafeteria Room), included a spectacle of Islamic artifacts from



The Consitution will prevail

It has been absolutely inescapeable, and it's hard not to surrender. The news anchors, talking heads, and journalists are whipped up into a frenzy trying to right the wrongs they did on Election Night by accurately covering every last second of the slowest developing news story in history, the recounts in Florida. Their attitude would have us think that the nation is in peril. The experts that they must get from local mental wards keep telling us we are having "a constitutional crisis." For those few of you who still care, there is no crisis. There is no turmoil. Everything is okay, at least, so far. For the most part, the process is under control, so turn off your TV, get off the political roller coaster, and do something productive with your life.

A co-worker of mine came back from a trip to London where the presidential elections dramatically made the front page of every daily (But that's another story.) She said that when people found out she was American, they joked, asking her if we were ready to "rejoin the commonwealth."

Although the news media would probably like there to be a dramatic constituitional crisis and often try to make it look as if we are a confused mess, Queen Elizabeth shouldn't count on the colonies returning to her. The Constitution is pretty clear about what the law is, regarding presidential elections. There is a process and it is intact, although imperfect. The framers thought of just about every possible situation and gave us a general guide with which to work. The words of the law are clear and inargueable, but few people know of them, either because they are ignorant and eat only what is spoon-fed by CNN or because they prefer the exciting chaos and speculation that has been ruling the airwaves.

The Constitution (also known s "the law") gives states the job of choosing electors to represent them. Most states today do this by election. When you vote for a candidate, as you know, you are actually casting a vote for a group of electors loyal to a particular candidate. Each state's laws and procedures are different and that is beauiful and the way it should be in a federal nation. (The presidential election you know and love is actually a state-wide election. This is why ballots in Florida

look little like they do in Illinois.) Basically, the Constituion says each state has to decide who to appoint as electors before, what this year will be, December 18th, and most states have already done so. Florida has a little less than one month to pick out electors. There is no need to rush and no need to run around like madmen unless Florida has not appointed anyone on December 18th.

Even if this does happen, everything will be okay and democracy will remain intact. The Constitution has provided for this. All fifty states do not need to be represented in order for there to be a president. We can do this without Florida. The election of 1864 saw eleven Southern states including Florida fail to appoint electors, but we still had a president and the Constitution remained intact. Three states sat out the election of 1868. If Florida does not send electors, Al Gore will have a majority of the electors appointed on election day (Dec. 18) and so will legally win the election. (Article II, Sec. 1) This could be why he is trying to forstall the certification in Florida and why Bush, the winner by over three hundred votes last time I checked, is trying to hurry it along. If the certification is tied up in court then Gore will win.

The presidency legally will not go to the Speaker of the House if things aren't cleared up and I really am not sure where this talk of Strom Thurmond as president came from. The man with the majority of trunk. Bags of ballots have been discovered. Jesse Jackson is nearby (always a good indicator of fiasco). Chads are being taken off by election judges. Spoiled ballots are being counted. Florida's election process is a mess and I would suggest that the Florida state legislature picks electors on its own, without the mandate of the people. I do not think the vote in Florida reflected the true will of the people. It has been tampered with and with each recount, it gets fuzzier and

The vote in Illinois was nothing near a true reflection either. Almost every county went for Bush, but Cook County, the biggest by far, went overwhelmingly to Gore. I worked as an election judge in the city. The polling place included two precincts. The precinct I was responsible for had almost 80% voter turnout, the precinct captain representing machine politician Alderman

Mell's ward across the room boasted 130% voter turnout.

Eveyone in Alderman Mell's ward got to vote at least once. I saw as they filled out afidavit after afidavit to allow people unregistered and one, who was a citizen of Ecuador, to vote in the election. I saw as the judges in Mell's district allowed politicians to electioneer at the polling place, at one point electioneering themselves. I watched Mell's judges help people punch their ballots (and not the sample ballots as mandated by law) in what I thought was a secret election. A precinct captain told me that the city politicians had a lot riding in this election. He excitedly told me that because Mayor Daley's brother would probably be Gore's chief of staff that it might mean federal jobs for a lot of city politicians.

This is the same precinct captain who poured food out for the election judges. When one of them tried to uphold the law by disallowing an unregistered person to vote, the captain told him, "I bring you food and am gracious to you and what do you do for me?" We were upholding the law, but the law seems to mean nothing to the Democratic party (The author cites the impeachment of perjurous President Clinton.) Alderman Mell, uncle of Congressman Rod R. Blagojevich (your future governor, if Mell can help it), pulled out all the stops. It would be a lot easier if they just asked Alderman Mell to sit in the polling place and vote for everyone in his ward. 130%! Only in Chicago. De Tocqueville would have a field day.

Whoever becomes president will have to contend with a lot of criticism from at least half the nation that will label him a tyrant. It has happened before. John Quincy Adams, who lost both the popular and electoral votes to Andrew Jackson in 1824, was never able to take control of his presidency. He gained the presidency by way of the House of Representitives. Benjamin Harrison, who lost the popular vote in 1888, but won the electoral against Grover Cleveland, endured a forgotten four years and, like Adams, was succeeded by the man he

Presidents who attain the presidency by such questionable elections meet great adversity and move nowhere fast. A President Gore or a President Bush may already find himself in Clinton's place as a lame duck. Whatever the case, boys and girls, rest assurred that the Constitution will prevail and will be back intact and complete with the fairness of the electoral college in 2004. Just be sure next time to study the ballot a little more carefully and never to believe Tom Brokaw again.

Registered Nurses wonder how they'll handle more work

This story may sound familiar to you. A friend you know went to the doctor for her test results and was told that everything was fine. Then she visited the doctor again two months later after being rushed to the hospital. You find out that your friend has had a terminal cancer for some time. You wonder why the nurses didn't catch this sooner. Well, I have a news flash for you: Mistakes like that will continue to happen.

Once again, we hear that the University of Chicago Hospitals are further cutting the already overworked staff trained to assist registered nurses. Officials decided on October 31 that they are eliminating the jobs of 140 nurses' aides. This is a dramatic experiment undertaken by the University of Chicago, as well as other hospitals, to replace highly trained registered nurses with less costly, unlicensed assistants, many whom are high school dropouts. Wait a minute. . . high school dropouts being hired as nurses' assistants? That sounds very scary, unethical, and disgusting. Why should we trust these hooligans to treat us and trust them with what they say? If reality slapped them in the face, they wouldn't know what to do, let alone help you if you were choking to death.

There are no plans to hire more nurses to compensate for the fired aides. The cutbacks are already placing a great burden on existing nurses, as well as, compromising patient safety. According to Hospital spokesman John Easton, "Patient care will be maintained by improved efficiency." To suggest that the remaining staff can continue to provide excellent care through "greater efficiency" is lunacy. University of Chicago registered nurses fear that increased workloads caused by the absence of aides will raise the potential for fatal medical

Nursing, the profession of caring for the sick, injured and the elderly,

is a monumental job for one person to tackle. No matter how welltrained, two hands are not enough. Caring for more than one patient at one time is impossible. Paperwork is neverending and the hours on the clock are not enough for work that never ceases.

That's where the aides come into play. Aides' duties included monitoring patients, answering patients' calls, delivering hot meals and transporting patients. They provide a second pair of eyes and ears for nurses who find themselves overburdened with daily duties. Now that the aides are gone, that's more work on the nurses already overflowing, never-ending plate of work.

Nationally, hospitals are struggling to pay for staffing and to provide patient services. A third of all hospitals have sunk to dangerous levels with staff reductions. If practitioners are concerned about the rate of medical errors, they need to place emphasis and money where it is needed most: retaining and hiring more health-care staff. The one portion of any budget that should never be cut is the medical staff, be it physicians, nurses or their assistants. Instead, savings can be achieved by eliminating two or three of the top administrators' positions. It is likely that this action would have no negative effect on patient care. What's more important: the administrator having a luxurious car to show off to the beggars in the streets, or the commitment to good medicine of paramount importance to patients?

Hospital officials said they have implemented numerous improvements to assure that doctors' medication orders are properly cross-checked by nurses. How can they assure anything when the remaining staff they have are burned out? This leaves the door open for more fatal mistakes to be made. What business do these hospitals have to stay open? Cheaper is not better, not when it's at the patients' expense.

Letter to the Editor November 15, 2000 Re: Racist editorial on page 5 of November 7 issue of the Independent

We, the undersigned, are appalled at the mean-spirited, bigoted, racist and evil article that the Independent chose to run on November 7 (page 5, entitled "Palestinians are unpeaceful"). We are appalled at the sweeping generalization used that claimed that all Palestinians are of the mind-set that they must kill to get what they want. We are also appalled that the Independent chose to run such an atrocious article.

You are supposed to be learning how to be professionals, and to exercise at least a small degree of professionalism. This article showed none of that. The author of this article cannot in good conscience support such an untenable position. We feel that the Independent should have exercised common sense and pulled the issue from the shelves. But money, I guess, speaks louder than fairness.

Making such a statement does nothing to help this situation, in fact it exacerbates it. How can you expect the two sides to come to terms when you legitimize namecalling by one side or the other?

We recognize fully the right to free speech. However, all rights inherent come with responsibilities. The right to free speech is accompanied by the responsibility to not yell "fire" in a crowded theater, among others. In the case of the newspaper, the paper has the responsibility of administering a public trust, for all of the public, not all of the public with the exception of the Palestinians. In this case, the newspaper disregarded its responsibility to the public by condoning, both tacitly and actively, hate speech. We expect better from a newspaper funded at least in part by our student fees.

If the author truly believes these things about an entire race of people, then he or she is truly ignorant, and has no place working for a publication that should be dedicated to fairness and objectivity. We understand that this was an editorial, but even editorials should be written in such a way that they don't offend people for no good reason.

As an aside, let's take the merest of moments that it takes to refute such an ignorant statement by an obviously feebleminded writer. On Monday, November 13, there was a Muslim protest down by the UIC Pavilion. Of this group, there were certainly some Palestinians in attendance. Not only didn't anyone get killed, but there were not even any arrests. It seems that all Palestinians are not of this mindset after all.

One of the considerations we've heard for the editor not pulling this issue off the shelves is the concern that the advertisers expect their ads to run for a certain length of time. How do you think your advertisers would feel if they knew their ads were running in the same issue as an article that could very well enrage a large segment of potential consumers? That might also cause you to lose advertising revenue, and deservedly so. Boycotts of association are not altogether unheard of.

The Independent not only owes the Palestinian race an apology, but also owes one to the entire NEIU campus community. Such a blatantly racist, bigoted and prejudiced article has no place in an institution of higher learning. We expect an apology to the entire NEIU community, and we hope you will exercise more discretion in the future.



Movie Review

Seeing red

And you will, trust me. After realizing the err of your ways (spending cold cash on a flop like this at the box office might one day become a Federal offense), symptoms could definitely include a rush of blood to upper bodily regions induced by anger, frustration and feelings of utter shame.

Much like fellow Martian-minded Hollywood romp *Mission to Mars*, this flick causes considerable harm to NASA's attempts at persuading both public and officials of Mars' centrality to our future in space. Judging by *Red Planet*, the fourth rock from the Sun's main attribute must be an uncanny knack for boring visitors.

It follows a team of scientists, pilots and engineers sent from a dying Earth to scout Mars with hopes of finding out why humanity's terra-forming initiative has gone awry. In a reversal of H.G Wells' *War of the Worlds*, this time humans seek to invade Mars. My advice would be, "Good movies first. THEN space conquest".

At least we have been mercifully spared the traditionally monotonous boot camp routine. Here they thrust viewers straight into the action, what little of it exists.

Following a massive mishap while preparing to land on Mars (a more worn-out scenario than this, you couldn't ask for), the team finds itself on the surface with little chance of survival or mission completion, led by Commander Bowman (Carrie-Ann Moss, the fabled *Matrix* lady),

mechanic Robby Gallagher (Val Kilmer) and smart-ass physician Burchenal (Tom Sizemore, *True Romance, Private Ryan,* etc.). Gradually assessing their dire predicament, the guys have to get to grips with something that has gone horribly wrong with their scheduled objectives. This movie


Second but first

One of the coolest aspects of having cable in the last five years or so, other than an occasional spot of Hot Spice Network, has regularly been the Sci-Fi Channel.

Sure, most subscribers have other priorities, alas science fiction and fantasy devotees have held it close to their hearts almost religiously. This loyalty can be largely traced to the network's exclusive domination of all things futuristic and fantastical. It has no real opposition, even though major movie providers such as HBO, Cinemax and ShowTime enjoy much leeway in keeping with premium channel, limited access standards (allowing them to air more "mature" material).

Here lies the problem. Despite remaining THE junction for classic TV shows (from *Star Trek* to *Swamp Thing*) as well as innovative new productions (seductive, sexually charged *Lexx*, for instance), Sci-Fi suffers from a serious shortcoming with regards to their motion picture broadcasting policy.

Trying to stay faithful to their credo, channel programmers repeatedly put on past blockbuster science fiction and horror movies during peak viewing hours (they call them Scinematic Events). Blessed a policy it may be, but it does contain one hell of a catch: the channel still retains an infuriating ABC-like agenda prohibiting "foul" language, vivid sexual imagery and gross violence.

Such a strict set of regulations would go down well if we were Lifetime or Biography groupies, but, do tell, what exactly can be the point of watching *The Terminator* minus all the good, explicit segments? Why would we bother with a soaped-up, watered-down, Prohibition-grade take on Stephen King's *The Stand* milestone miniseries if it was cut down so brutally we can no longer identify the body with any degree of certainty?

Just like sugar-free chocolate, these only serve to tease and anger. Channel authorities must understand butchering hallowed masterpieces achieves nothing but alienating usually mellow, addicted fans. For one, I wouldn't object to paying a premium (most cable customers do so as to get HBO et al) if it meant a steady supply of uncensored, true to its origins, science fiction feed. For all I know they should take out those damn commercials, slap on a \$10 monthly and be done with this whole charade. Until that day comes, Sci-Fi stands as a huge missed opportunity.

Definitely, we won't forget their authentic dedication to the genre and its supporters when they kept running shows long forsaken by mainstream television. And no one can deny their being a uniquely stylish operation with a genuine look and feel. Also, in recent months we have been spoiled by their surprising gift for coming out of leftfield with these amazingly well-produced, expensive features. Coming December 3rd, the channel will debut its latest mega-production, another remaking of Frank Herbert's *Dune*. Judging by available trailers, it may surpass David Lynch's awesome film rendition with respect to effects, attention to detail and overall adherence to source material. Not a lot has been said about this (the channel does a poor job of advertising itself beyond its own modest bandwidth), but expect a real stunner.

Even so, I can't take my critical comments back. Science fiction aficionados already know what those guys can do when they try, however, we need proof there exists a willingness to go beyond the observable. Wasn't that the point to begin with?

Like Rutger Hauer said in *Blade Runner*'s closing moments: "All those things... like tears in rain." Without more resolve the channel's distinctions will continue to wash away unnoticed.

Nearly Delicious

Wanting to convey a posh British look, Caviar, actually a Chicago band (or so we gather) fool you for a little bit. Looking at their debut, self-titled album, one could easily be persuaded into thinking these guys happen to be lads from Old Blighty. Caviar attempt a sort of Oasis/Stone Roses external veneer, with lots of cocky attitudes all around and this presumably jet-setting chic (note private plane on cover shot) expressed by wearing tons of designer skins

First track *OK Nightmare* (Radiohead's *OK Computer*, maybe?) really does sound like something straight out of Greater Manchester, with appropriately jangly beatnik guitars. Sadly for Caviar's egos, the illusion lives a short span. Soon thereafter they reveal themselves to be not only a full-blooded American group, but one that, ironically, embodies pretty much every strand of US alternative rock in existence.

For hit single *Tangerine Speedo* they model themselves on fellow would-be eccentrics Bloodhound Gang, Cake (the horror) and The Eels. Despite eventually forcing listeners to like it, that song does suffer from some irritating quality which eludes classification.

Later, two impressive rock numbers roll out the heavy alternative ballad cannons. *The Good Times are Over* and *I Thought I Was Found* both stay with you and beg for repeated listening. Unfortunately for Caviar, these too have more in common with compatriot rockers Semisonic, Filter and Everclear than with cricket and coffee biscuits. What a royal shame.

The English influence resurfaces for *Flawed like a Diamond*, an electorocker reminiscent of Blur circa 1994's *Park Life*. It may not lay a claim to the Crown jewels, but all the same proves just how musically nimble Caviar can be in terms of genre

Further down the list, we happen upon their last across-the-pond initiative (for this album, at least). A bona fide heartfelt song that'll roll off your tongue quite easily, Looked So Hard I Nearly Wrecked My Eyes brings hope to all who wish for an effective cure to the modern boy band as we know it. 

Like anything else in the universe, so does PS2 suffer from certain flaws. When put next to its countless gifts, though, all





It is plain to see that the spirit of the late Meir Kahane is still alive and well on the editorial board of the Independent. "Palestinians are unpeaceful (sic)" is the most reprehensible piece of racist, anti-Arab trash I have ever seen in any American newspaper. Given the fact that the US press is overwhelmingly pro-Zionist (even more so than the press, in fact), Israeli "Palestinians are unpeaceful" wins out over some pretty stiff competition.

The unnamed author informs us that, "Palestinians do not know how to settle things peacefully." They "are of the mentality that if they want something, they have to kill to get it." The Muslim Student Association

During the 1930's and 40's European Jews suffered and died in the millions by the hands of Europeans led by Nazi Germany. In 1948 the United Nations under the leadership of the United States and the European powers offered reparations by giving statehood to "the Jewish people" not in Germany, Poland, or France, but in Palestine. Not all Jewish people then or now believe that statehood on Arab land was a wise or just decision, nor do all Jews support Israeli policy, nor share the views expressed by one Jewish student in The Independent (Nov. 7, 2000)

The fear expressed in that article, that the State of Israel faces the threat of being driven into the sea- Palestinians, it claims, want "all of Israel"- is an old one and disregards the obvious historical fact that since 1948 Israeli borders have never been pushed back but have regularly expanded into more and more Arab territory. Israel, as the article acknowledges, has continued to win "additional lands." The state of Israel presently constitutes, in places like the West Bank, Gaza, and Jerusalem, a foreign power maintained through an army of occupation on foreign land. In that respect (though not in all others and not to the same degree) it needs to be considered in the same light as we considered Nazi Germany or Soviet Russia when they occupied neighboring lands and oppressed people not their own.

That some Arabs resort to and support terrorism should come as no surprise and is no indicator of a people's "sick mentality." When you lack a standing army equipped with sophisticated weaponry (as Israel does) you resort to rocks and homemade bombs. The French did it in what we referred to as a resistance movement under the Nazis, as did the Czechs, or Jews from the Warsaw ghetto; so did a friend of mine who blew up power lines in South Africa in the 60's.

If Arabs willingly send teenagers to confront Israeli forces, we have to remember that the draft age in the U.S. is 18, and when our boys die in action we too call them heroes. That even younger Arab teenagers are dying in these confrontations attests not only to the willingness of the Arabs to send the young into battle (no country I know of ever sends its old folks to war), but it also attests to the willingness of the Israelis to fire upon the young with lethal force. There have been ruthless and unjustifiable atrocities committed by both sides, but when the bodies are counted, the deaths of Arabs and Arab civilians is far in excess of anything Israeli citizens have suffered.

Since their emancipation, the Jews of Europe and America have been justly famous for their liberal views, their sense of tolerance, and their fight for justice and equality. Once given statehood, some have shown themselves ready to kick ass like everybody else. It demonstrates once more the evils of state religion and the overwhelming difficulty of resolving conflicts

"Hello, you have reached Northeastern Illinois University...

The new telecommunication system for all Northeastern office phones, fax numbers, and extensions begins January 1, 2001. In the following month, NEIU students and faculty are reminded that changes are already underway.

As of December 22, the voice mail system will be shut down, but by the following day, December 23, the new numbers will be in service and Ameritech recordings will provide the new number (and automatic transfer) for 120 days for all NEIU numbers that had a 794 prefix.

The Telecommunications Department will be open during the holiday break from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The Hotline number, extension 5600, can be contacted any time during the holiday break with questions.

On November 13, department heads will receive a final list of phone and fax numbers for their area. The university will provide one ream (500 sheets) of letterhead for each department currently using letterhead. The university will also provide 500 new business cards to all employees currently using cards. Please send a copy of your departmental letterhead and/or individual business cards with your new phone number to the Publications Office, Room C-409, between November 14 and January 12. Reprinting costs for requests received after January 12, 2001 will be charged to departments.

The new phone mail dial in number will be 442-4800, effective January 1, 2001.

From Friday morning to Saturday night, December 22-23, while the voice mail system is shut down for programming changes, all university phone mail messages and greetings will be unaffected by the work performed on the system.

The Telecommunications Department also reminds the Northeastern community to provide new 7-digit telephone numbers to outside callers and inform them of the effective date. Ameritech will provide them with the new numbers for 120 days, however, no such service is available for fax numbers. Departments, organizations, and offices should also remember to update the telephone numbers listed on web pages. On-campus speed dial buttons and lists should be changed before the holiday break. The old numbers will not be in service after December 23.


