SYNOPSIS

ACT ONE

Don Alfonso, a cynical philosopher, declares to his young friends Ferrando and Guglielmo that no women can be trusted, including their respective fiancees, the sisters Dorabella and Fiordiligi. Enraged at this slur, they accept his offer to wager 100 sovereigns that he can prove his point in twenty four hours if they will agree to follow his instructions unquestioningly. Don Alfonso then announces to the two sisters that their sweethearts have been ordered off to the wars. Following a touching scene of farewell, Despina—maid to the sisters derides their lamentations saying that one man is pretty much like the other. Enlisting Despina's aid, Don Alfonso introduces two young and wealthy "foreigners" who are, of course, Ferrando and Guglielmo in disguise. Fiordiligi and Dorabella, outraged at this intrusion upon their sorrow, angrily order the two foreigners to leave. When the young men pretend to take poison in their despair, the sisters relent somewhat. Despina—in the disguise of a doctor—revives the "foreigners" employing a rather questionable medical procedure. They renew their ardent suit for the young ladies' affections but as the act ends, the issue is still in doubt.

ACT TWO

Upon Despina's further urging, the sisters, weakening somewhat, decide that a mild flirtation will do no harm. Dorabella chooses Guglielmo and Fiordiligi Ferrando. As the couples stroll in the garden, Guglielmo wins Dorabella's love and gives her a locket in return for a picture of Ferrando. Fiordiligi, however, refuses to yield to Ferrando, but when Ferrando threatens to slay himself, she too gives in. Guglielmo and Ferrando are now utterly disillusioned by the clear evidence of their sweetheart's fickleness but the triumphant Don Alfonso promises that he will resolve the situation. He arranges a ceremony in which Ferrando is to marry Fiordiligi and her sister Guglielmo. In the midst of the ceremony conducted by Despina—this time in the guise of a notary, it is announced that the soldiers have returned. Discovering the marriage contract, the officers pretend to fly into a rage. The sisters blame Don Alfonso and Despina for leading them astray, whereupon their lovers reveal that they were the "foreigners." The couples are properly chastened and all ends happlily.
