PROGRAM NOTES

Vaughan Williams was of course intimately associated with the music of the English church throughout his life. Indeed, it is a constant presence in all English composers' lives and work, hence the wonderful body of sacred and liturgical from those composers. The Mass in G Minor, composed in 1920, was dedicated to the Whitsuntide Singers and their conductor, Gustav Holst, Vaughan Williams' lifelong friend and companion. The Mass is the most outstanding musical example of the composer's attitude toward the worship music of the Anglican church. It is neo-renaissance in musical technique and structure, and yet unmistakably Vaughan Williams in tone and musical language, particularly the artistic and highly colorful use of modal tonalities. It is one of the only works of the twentieth-century which belongs exclusively in an ecclesiastical atmosphere rather than concert hall.

Salli Terri and John Biggs are, and have been for several years, two of the outstanding singers-composers-arrangers in the professional vocal and choral society of America. Salli Terri was the principal arranger and soloist for the Roger Wagner Chorale in the fifties and sixties. Her numerous arrangements, particularly of folk songs, have been mainstays in the choral repertoire for many years. And her unique and wonderful style of singing, as exhibited in several recordings with the Wagner Chorale and with guitarist Laurindo Almeida, has been a strong influence upon countless artists and teachers.

John Biggs is founder and director of the John Biggs Consort, an outstanding performing group of four singers and instrumentalists. The Consort specializes in chamber vocal and instrumental music of the medieval and renaissance eras, and is equally at home in nineteenth-century and modern music. Mr. Biggs is a marvelously gifted musician, fluent on a large number of string and wind instruments, and a fine singer. In addition to their individual lives as artists, Salli and John are husband and wife, and parents of two lovely daughters.
