Mr. Eliot calls this play a comedy, and on the surface it is an entertaining comedy of manners. However, once the depth is realized, a sort of morality is discovered. Audience members will get various ideas from the play, depending upon their own interpretations. We are considering the theme to be the realization of the need for salvation and the doing of God's will - through the choice of the human way or the way of special dedication to God's service. We believe that the author is saying that on this earth there are degrees of attainment and fulfilment, and that the pinnacle of them both is sainthood. Both ways are ways of loneliness - and communion; but the road to sainthood through martyrdom is a terrifying journey. For the onlooker, martyrdom is tragic; for the martyr, it is triumphant. In The Cocktail Party, gin would seem to symbolize the spiritual way and whisky the worldly way. One-eyed Riley and the one-lensed spectacles seem to represent partial insight — as regards Sir Henry and Julia. The play has theological and ecclesiastical implications as well as philosophical ones. The psychiatrist's desk represents the altar and the two chairs indicate the congregation. One critic has wittily described the play as "a comedy, with tragic relief." The first production was at the Edinburgh Festival, 1949, with Alec Guinness in the role of the Unidentified Guest.
