## NOTE

Arthur Schnitzler (1862-1931) combined literature with the practice of medicine. His plays have to do with the cultivated social life of Vienna in the days of the imperial Hapsburgs. Anatol was written in 1893 and has had frequent productions. Schnitzler's philosophy of life is said to be expressed in one of his own lines, "We all play parts, happy he who knows it."
