The student body will vote on Wednesday, April 29 and Thursday, April 30 rom 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. to elect the following: President, Vice President, Senator (elect 5), and Treasurer.

Requirements — Candidates will be currently enrolled students. Officers and Senators must be enrolled in not less than 8 hours with a grade point

average of not less than 2.0.

Campaigning Campaigning is permitted on campus Thursday April 23 at Noon. Candidates may request instructor's permission to speak to classes.

Approval of campaign material - All campaign material must be aprroved by the Election Board previous to distribution on campus. Materials should be left in the Activities Office and will be approved by the Board before 3:00 p.m. daily.

Elected to office - A candidate must receive a plurality of votes cast for the position in order to be elected to

Name Ballot on Candidate's name will appear alphabetically for each office on the ballot as written on the "Official Application" as submitted by the candidate. Any changes may be requested at the candidate's meeting.

Candidates Meeting Thursday, April 23 at 12:30 p.m. in X-161 is the deadline for petitions. Candidate who has submitted a completed petition by this date and time and has met all requirements for the office will have their name on the official ballot. Others may be write-in candidates.

Polls - Polls will be located

in the college center. The polls will be operated by 2 poll workers (preferred) assigned the Election Board Chairman. Candidates, write-in candidates, campaign managers & supporters are prohibited from campaigning on the wooden floor surrounding the voting area.

Audit - An audit of the election must occur within six hours of the following college day, May 1. Any candidate requesting an audit should submit his/her request in writing to the Election Board Chairman within the stated time. Requests submitted after this period will not be honored.

Tallying Ballots — Ballots will be tallied immediately upon closing of the polls on April 30. Due to limited area for tabulation, only members of the election board and candidates or their representatives will be permitted in the tally room.

Campaign Material Posters and campaign material are prohibited on any surface other than mounted bulletin boards, tack-strips, or wood posts (tack or nails are not permitted on the wood posts).

Posters may not be placed on glass surfaces, doors, vending machines, floors, ceilings or walls, or attached to wood posts by tape.

On Illinois Arbor Day, April 24, four tree planting ceremonies will be held at Parkland's Arbor Grove at 9, 10 and 11 a.m. and at noon.

The grove was established in 1986 and is located on the campus south of the barns near Bradley Avenue. This year black walnut trees, a variety once common to the central Illinois prairie, will be planted during the festivities.

Other activities scheduled include a Nature Lovers' Film Festival and a nature walk at Parkland. The series of short films will be shown at 11 a.m. Tuesday, April 21, and at noon on Thursday, April 23. Films included in the showing are: "The Prairie," "The Prairie That Was," "The Redwoods," "Red Men and Red Cedars," and "Barry Commoner's Viewpoint."

David Monk, director of Educational Resources Environmental Science, Champaign, will introduce prairie land forms and vegetation in a slidelecture at noon, Wednesday, April 22, under the Parkland Library steps. He will also conduct a nature walk around the Parkland campus. Natural and historical landmarks will be identified the walk. transportation will be provided for non-walkers. Those interested in the nature tour should meet under the library steps at 1 p.m.



Parkland celebrates Arbor Day in style

Since Friday, April 24 is rbor Day, it seems Day, Arbor seems appropriate to pass along some information and observations regarding the many trees we have on our campus.

First, the College was named Park-land because we are situated adjacent to Dodd's Park. With some early efforts at contiguous planning, one cannot really distinguish between Campus and Park District property except for the signs. I think you will agree that

the College's ambitious tree planting program has made us look more like a park than our

Although the many trees create a very asthetically pleasing atmosphere, they also are restoring part of the original landscape. Parkland is situated on a moraine, a pile of boulders and gravel left by the last glacier some 10,000 years ago. This slight rise in the landscape favors the growth of trees since the soil is somewhat landscape, with its wetter soil, was originally tall grass

Beyond the natural history of our trees, we have a mixture of many ornamental trees on our campus in addition to some native hardwood varieties. The ornamentals provide color, texture, fragrance, motion, and some can attract birds.

Flowering trees are the most conspicuous in spring. These include the White Flowered

Star Magnolia, Dogwood and Serviceberry. Dogwood and Redbud provide color contrasts along with the many shrubs on campus.

Tree bark combines elements of both color and texture. We have the black bark of the Honey Locust and the white barked Paper and European Birch. Smooth-barked trees such as the Birch contrast with the deeply furrowed bark of Northern Red Oak and the peeling bark of the Shagbark Hickory. Our parking lots are planted with London Plane (a relative of the Sycamore) which has a mottled bark.

Other trees on campus provide interesting leaf patterns while some trees offer beauty in their shape and

motion. The delicate leaves of the Ginko, Pin Oak and Birches contrast with our evergreen Spruces, Firs and Pines. Some of our trees have clusters of smaller leaflets, called compound leaves. These trees include the Hickory, Ash, Kentucky Coffee, and Walnut. Shape and movement are important attributes of the Weeping Willow and pendulous branches of the Norway Spruce.

One of the most appealing features of our campus is the grove of large Sasafras trees directly behind (north of) the Student Center. These trees provide a pleasant, shady spot for lounging on warm, sunny days. Besides these Sasafras

PC Theatre presents three one-act plays April 23

The tension mounts while the stage lights dim, and the actors come into their characters as the Parkland College Theatre presents, 3 In 1, An evening of three one-act plays.'

Opening on Thursday April 23, at 8:00 p.m. in C140, the "buffet of plays" as Director Jim Coates describes it, will consist of 'Sganarelle', 'The Happy Journey', and 'Passion, Poison, & Petrification'.

'Sganarelle' by Moliere is 'farsical fun based on false assumptions and misconceptions,' says Coates, and involves two lovers and much confusion.

"A one-act 'Our Town' " is how Coates describes the second play 'The Happy Journey' by Thornton Wilder. It is the story of a car trip, and is centered around four kitchen chairs. This is also a comedy.


Like the first play, the third and final play 'Passion, Poison, and Petrification' by George Bernard Shaw is also a farsical comedy. It involves a love triangle in which a husband, driven by jealousy, gives his wife's lover a poison for which the only antedote is lime. After a reconciliation with his wife, the husband tries to cure the lover by feeding him limestone, with disastrous results.

The plays will be presented where Coates calls "in the round." This is different from the procenium stage where the audience is in front of the stage.

Actors will perform with the audience surrounding them, and "this gives audience a taste of everything," according to Coates.

The play will be presented April 23, 24, and 25, and April 30, May 1 and 2; all performances begin at 8:00 p.m. Tickets will be available in the Student Center at a cost of \$2.00 for adults, \$1.00 for children under 12, and free for PC students with a current ID. Proceeds will go to the building of a Little Theatre on campus.

In addition to the Parkland College performances, Coates will take the show on the road to the Homer Opera House on May 9 at 7:00 p.m. The proceeds from this performance will go to the rebuilding and refinishing of the theatre in Homer.

Karr speaks at PC on "Tropical Ecology"

Dr. James Karr, Professor of Ecology at the University of Illinois, will speak on the subject, "Tropical Ecology: Contrasts with out Temperate World" on May 7, at 1:00 p.m. in Room L-111 at parkland College.

Karr, a graduate of Princeton, has had extensive experience with the Smithsonian Institute involving studies in Africa and Southeast Asia and is a former consultant for Organization of American States in Venezuela. He is currently researching ecology of tropical forest birds in Panama and Aquatic Ecology in the local area.

Karr teaches Fish and Wildlife Ecology, Ornithology, and Tropical Ecology at the U of I.


