Severns speaks to Community News Class

Although fiscal problems, inflation, and urban sprawl are the major problems facing the city of Champaign, Mayor Joan Severns says the redevelopment of downtown Champaign is one of her primary concerns.

In an interview with Parkland's Community News Reporting class on Wednesday, Severns said, "Emphasis needs to be placed on center-city redevelopment so that the downtown area can become active again."

Severn said there is a great need for revised traffic patterns in the area to encourage more people to shop at the mall.

"Î am a great supporter of the downtown mall, and I feel that most people believe it should stay in," Severns commented.

In an effort to activate downtown Champaign, the city has agreed to pay a St. Louis consulting firm to design a taxing plan for the area.

One project already underway is the construction of a new Bank of Illinois facility in the block surrounded by University and Park avenues and Randolph and Neil streets.

Severns said architects are being interviewed for the \$3 million police station to be built at University and First Streets and ground breaking may be next fall. The Commercial Bank building presently occupies a portion of the land.

"The police station will be more or less a specialized office building and will only serve as a temporary holding place for offenders," according to Severns.

In terms of new services the city might offer in the future such

additional bike paths, Severns said the city's budget is extremely tight which makes it difficult to undertake one additional service. "If bike registration fees would cover the cost of such a program, then it might be posible," Severns explained.

Although Severns is involved inmany city projects, much of her time is spent dealing with liquor and social problems, as well as taking part in public relations activities.

She is in charge of issuing liquor licenses, which she says is a very difficult job because of strict city

ordinances and state laws.

Severns expressed strong feelings toward the change in the drinking age saying, "At 18 you can get married, buy a car, or even be drafted and at age 14 you can be tried as an adult, so why shouldn't you be able to drink at age 19?" Severns said she thinks it would take another national emergency for Congress to change the drinking age back to 19.


Severns had this advice for those interested in becoming a mayor: "If you don't like getting phone calls at 4 o'clock in the morning, don't run for mayor."


Sign up for student insurance

Instructors discuss oil de-regulation

Last week, President Reagan followed up on his campaign promise to de-regulate domestic oil prices. I talked with Parkland instructors Fred Johnson and Alan Hartter to get their impressions on the econmic and political impact of Reagan's decision.

Johnson: The effect will be to increase the price of home heating oil and gasoline. Standard Oil of California increased the price of gas by 6 cents. Other companies have increased their prices 1-3 cents a gallon. This will go into the consumer price index and raise the cost of living somewhat. This is not a major effect. That would have happened anyway between now and September, so it is not a major policy change. It is merely a moving up of the calendar that would have been followed anyway. It will increase oil company profits 8-16 billion dollars, while at the same time increasing government revenues by 8-10 billion. The longrange effect is more symbolic than economic. It tells the oil companies that they can reap the profits of their investments uncontrolled. That is they can invest money in exploration, and they can set a price in the market based on demand, and not by the government. We should remember that only 20-25 percent of domestic oil was decontrolled. The rest had already been de-controlled. Again, the long range is more symbolic for long run investments, which is what we need. Long run investments in all areas, not just oil. It has very broad implications for all kinds of investments.

Q: How do you feel about this, Mr. Hartter?

Hartter: As far as the long range benefits, which Fred covered so well, I think the re-investment aspect is certainly needed as far as correcting the economy. I also think that something like this would be hard to explain to the average consumer. The average consumer, from a political sense, will see it as yet another indication of a worsening situation. However, I think people are able to tolerate price increases of this sort much more easily than increases in other goods and the consumer price index. Buying gasoline is not as significant as seeing prices of other things, like food go up. But I think it can be absorbed in the short run.

Johnson: I think the point to make here is that gas is no different from any other commodity. When the price rises, people consume less, and that is for any commodity in a

market economy. When the price rises, people have a tendency to substitute other commodities for the one that went up. Fuel is just another example of that. We substitute small cars for large ones, used cars for new cars, polyester for denim. It's just another form of substitution, and in this case the government is getting out of the market and are letting the market work as it should. This is a major step, because the government has held fuel prices artificially low for 35 years, and therefore caused overconsumption in terms of what the consumption would have been had the government not been in the economy.

Hartter: I would like to add one final thing. I wouldn't want to put the blame entirely on the government. Consumption of goods gets right down to a dollar and cents type of thing. Availability, supply and demand, etc. But dependence on gas has become such a way of life in this country that it transcends say, polyester vs. denim. It has ramifications beyond that. I feel that the oil companies eannot be totally absolved of guilt and of encouraging people to consume through advertising, etc. More money is spent on advertising in the U.S. than on public education.

Johnson: But the advertising would not have been nearly as successful if cheap fuels were not available at the time. It was the availability of cheap fuels that allowed the auto industry to succeed as they did and oil companies to succeed as they did. We have become an automobilehighway-suburb economy because of cheap fuels.

Hartter: Well, I can't swallow the notion that availability "came of age" suddenly. I still believe that much of it wouldn't have happened if it were not for massive advertising campaigns to seduce the people into buying big cars and a basic overconsumption of gas. I think it all gets down to this:

> Pregnant? Need Help? We Care About You!

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Regulation certainly didn't hurt the oil companies profits by any means. If it weren't for the fact that they were out for as big a slice of the pie as they could get, say 10 or even 20 years ago, our country might be well on its way to a fairly self-sufficient energy lifestyle. With de-regulation in effect, we might be on that road, but it is far down the line.

As a child Muddy demonstrated a rem, arkable knack for writing and composing his own original material. Traditionally Bill Haley is given the title "The Father of Rock n' Roll." In actuality Muddy Waters with songs such as "Rolling Stone Blues" (which has been used as a name for a rock n' roll band from England and along with a newspaper in the USA) plus songs such as "The Blues Had a Baby and They Called It Rock n' Roll", "Rollin and Tumblin", "I Can't be Satisfied", "Trouble No More", and "Mannish Boy (I'm A Man)." 

Homer has big celebration for their hero: Paul Lewis

Over 3,000 people showed up in the little village of Homer, Saturday, to welcome back one of the 52 American Hostages held captive in Iran.

held captive in Iran.

Marine Sgt. Paul Lewis received a hearty welcome from State and Local Officials and the citizens of Homer.

Mayors from Champaign, Danville, Homer, and St. Joseph, as well as Governor James Thompson from Springfield, attended the ceremony honoring the safe return of the ex-hostage.

The ceremony got underway with a small parade through the village. Paul, his parents, Phillip and Gloran, brothers Bill and Pat and sister Annette rode on an antique American Legion Post 260 fire truck. Their little excursion took them through the main street of Homer where they received a warm welcome from friends, neighbors, and visitors from as far away as Australia.

Over 1,000 yellow balloons were released into the air when Paul approached the speakers platform. Paul said, "There wasn't this many people to visit me the last time I came home on leave."

A hostage flag designed by State Representative Phillip Bianco, Jr., of Chicago, and Ken Oglesby of Springfield, was presented to Paul during the ceremony. Other gifts were given from schools throughout the State as well as awards he received from local and state officials.

Governor Thompson said, "This celebrtion today is exactly what Paul wanted." The Governor seemed in high spirits when he presented Paul with a plaque to be placed in the State Capitol to commemorate the ordeal that the hostages had undergone.

Major Gen. Norma Brown, Commander for Chanute Air Force Base, presented Paul with a letter from the officers station at Chanute. After her presentation she embraced Paul and gave him a kiss on the cheek. She then approached the speakers platform and said, "The reason I make my speech shorter is because I like to kiss longer."





11 Amendments to Stugo Constitution

AMENDMENT #1

Student Government shall be composed of ten senators, a President, Vice-President, and Treasurer. The presiding officer of the senate is the President and all other members of the senate shall have voting privileges.

INFO: Presently, the senate is composed of ten senators, with the Vice-President is presiding officer. The Treasurer cannot vote. This has caused difficulty with lack of voting privileges for the officers of the senate.

AMENDMENT #2

The ten senators shall be senators at large for the student body. The President shall appoint students as directors of each of the standing committes upon a 2/3's affirmative vote of the senate.

INFO:Presently, students are elected as chairpersons of standing committees. This has caused concern as many chairpersons are not qualified for the position. This amendment will improve the quality of students who will direct these standing committees and offer greater opportunity for the students.

AMENDMENT #3

All officers, senators, and directors shall maintain a grade point average of not less than 2.0 for the previous semester and/or cumulative grade point average and shall enroll and complete not

less than 8 credit hours.

INFO: At present, the officers must be enrolled in a minimum of 12 hours and the senators must be enrolled in 6 hours. This amendment will offer the parttime student greater opportunities for participating in the government.

AMENDMENT #4

A quorum of the senate shall be sixty percent.

INFO: At present, the quorum of the senate is two-thirds of its membership.

AMENDMENT #5

The Election of the president, vice-president, treasurer, and 5 senators shall be during the fourteenth week of the Spring

The Election of another 5 senators and to fill vacancies shall occur, during the fourth week of Fall Semester

INFO: This amendment is necessary to elect the officers and senators to office. The election in the Spring has been changed to the fourth week (presently the third week). This will offer greater opportunity for students to be a candidate for office and publicize their campaign.

AMENDMENT #6

Repeal of the following: A candidate for a specific Student Government post shall not hold another Student Government position at the same time.

INFO: The repeal of this section will allow an officer or senator the ability to run for a different position, without fear of losing their previous position should the person lose in their bid for the different post.

AMENDMENT #7

Decrease the number of signatures necessary for an amendment to the constitution by the student body from 25 percent to 10 percent.

INFO: This would allow greater student input, but also reduce the of frivolous possibility amendments.

AMENDMENT #8

Decrease the percentage of votes that the Senate must obtain to place an amendment on the constitution. Presently, the percentage is 75% of the membership of the senate. The recommended amendment would decrease the percentage to 66%%.

INFO: This amendment would bring the student constitution amendment requirements into line

with the present State and National Constitutional requirements.

AMENDMENT #9

Realign the duties and responsibilities of the president to include:

-preside at all meetings of the senate.

-have speaking privileges ONLY during president's report, open discussion, and to respond to questions, but no voting rights at

senate meetings. -represent the student association as a non-voting member of the faculty senate.

Realign the duties and responsibilities of the vicepresident to include:

-have voting privileges on the senate and not preside at the senate meetings.

-coordinate and assist senators relative to projects, activities, interest areas, and office hours.

Realign the duties and responsibilities of the treasurer to include:

-have voting privileges on the senate.

-must be enrolled in 3 credit hour course in accounting; or completed a college accounting course; or had 3 months of accounting work experience.

AMENDMENT #10

Deleted section 5 of Article XII

and insert the following:

a. The Senate shall establish a

Student Government Review Board to evaluate officers, senators, and directors, and recommend removal of a member if necessary to the Senate.

b. The Review Board shall consist of the president, vicepresident, senior senator, an elected senator, and three students elected by the Association.

c. A two-thirds vote of the board is necessary to recommend removal. The Senate shall vote at the next Senate meeting, or a special meeting of the Senate to determine removal.

d. A two-thirds vote of the Senate accept the board's recommendation shall result in immediate removal of the individual.

INFO: This amendment would expedite the procedures and methods used to remove any officer, senator, or director who is no longer fulfulling his/her obligation to their respective position.

AMENDMENT #11

Each committee shall meet at least twice a month and submit copies of its minutes or a verbal report to the senate at the next

regularly schedule meeting.

INFO: The purpose of this amendment is to allow more freedom in their meeting structure-




"Images," a magazine of writing and art by Parkland students, is being assembled and is due to hit the presses by spring break.


UCLA vs. Notre Dame
