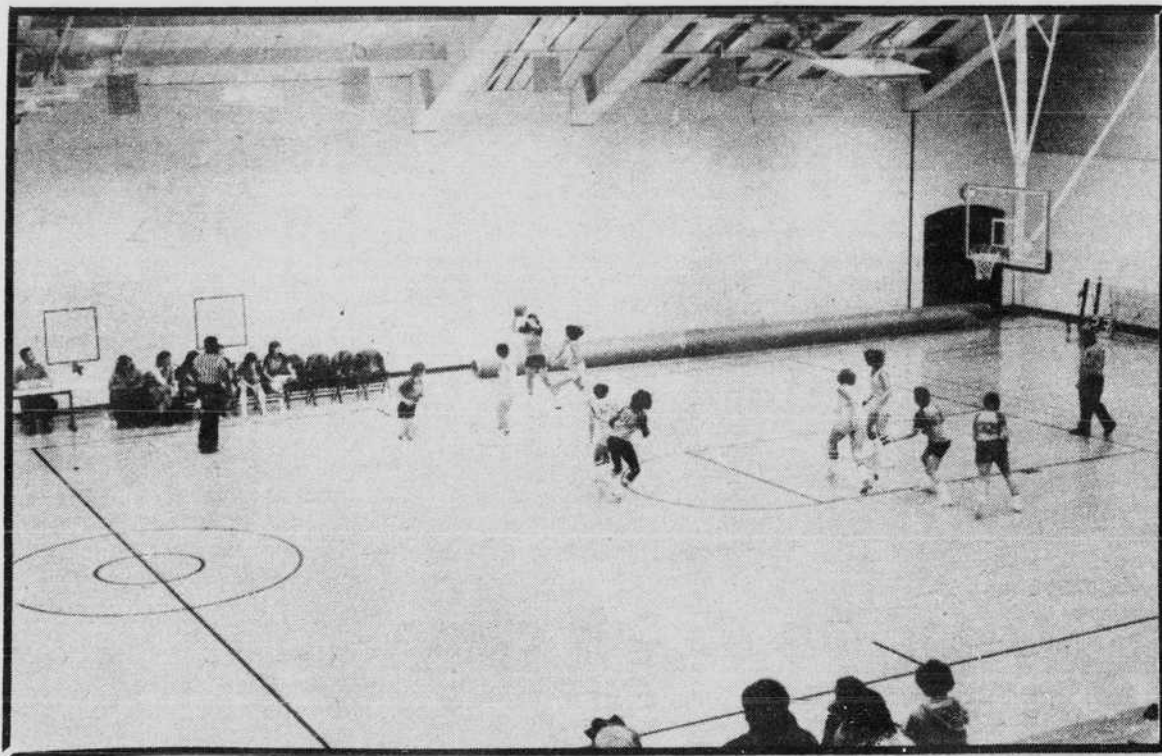




Parkland women's team rated 15th in nation

The Parkland Cobra women's basketball team has finally been rewarded for their outstanding play.

The latest National Junior College Athletic Association Coaches Poll rates Parkland at No. 15.

"The trip to Florida gave us the national recognitions, plus we also play good statewide competition," said Coach Tim Wulf on how they were recognized in this NJCAA Coaches Poll. "Also, they looked at the statistics and found how we were dominating everybody," said Wulf. The Cobras are outscoring their opponents by an average of 20 points per game. Many teams are lucky if they can win ONE game by 20.

What kind of effect will this have on the players? Coach Wulf is philosophical. "I hope the effect will be positive, in that they realize that there is recognition given to hard work."

Hard work is a trademark of this team. Wulf adds, "We're a good team, not a great team. We do things well as a unit, especially defense. It helps us compensate for the things we lack." And this means hard work on defense and a good, disciplined offense. Although Abby Ingram is averaging 25 points per game, this team is by far not a one player team. "We have more balance this year, and we also use our bench heavily. We really mix our starters depending on the opposition. We have more weapons to use since everyone can score," said Wulf.

The Cobras will compete in the Sectional Tournament which will be on February 27 and 29 at Robinson, Ill. Wulf says, "Danville will give us some competition. We only beat them by nine the last time we played them, so we're expecting a good tournament."

The winner advances to the state tournament March 5-7 at Elgin.

The Cobras, if they make it that far, will undoubtedly have to go up against the No. 1 team in the state and No. 6 team in the nation, Illinois Central. ICC thrashed the Cobras 89-58 at East Peoria; but that was in December! Now it is February! Parkland will give it their best in trying to dethrone a team that's only loss was a one-pointer to Illinois.

Week in Review

Ireland—An early morning fire in Dublin's Stardust Cabaret resulted in 49 deaths and 130 injuries. The fire broke out shortly before 2:00 a.m. on Saturday morning. Dublin Police are investigating the possibility of arson.

POLAND—Labor unrest continues in Poland despite a Polish Government request for a 90-day moratorium on strikes. Solidarity Union leader Lech Walsea in response to the request said that "I can't promise anything, but I don't want strikes." Walsea also indicated on Saturday that he was relenting on an earlier demand that farmers be included in a new national labor code.

U.S. Secretary of State Alexander Haig unofficially says that he believes Soviet intervention in Poland is inevitable. Haig bases his theory on the idea that faced with the possibility of losing a satellite country, the Soviets would choose to intervene.

RUSSIA—The Soviet News Agency Tass responded Saturday to charges by the Reagan administration that the Soviets are violating a 1972 code of conduct limiting the superpowers in their pursuit of global objectives.

"The imperialist policy of the United States has recently seen a transition from creating isolated hotbeds of tension to spreading conflicts and military confrontations to whole regions", the official news agency said in its commentary.

WASHINGTON—President Reagan plans to seek immediate action on tax and budget cuts he will propose this week. Reagan Press Secretary James Brady said the President's address to Congress would "emphasize the need for a comprehensive approach" to America's economic problems.

LAS VEGAS, NEV.—A busboy arrested in the arson fire at the Las Vegas Hilton confessed last week to accidentally setting the fire. Eight people were killed and scores of other injured in this, the second major hotel fire in less than 6 months.

WASHINGTON—In spite of President Reagan's Plans for massive cuts in federal spending, the administration sees little hope that the budget can be balanced by 1983. Inside sources have stated that Reagan administration economists indicate that the earliest a balanced budget may be achieved is 1984.

SPRINGFIELD—Education can expect a record state budget next year but school officials may be disappointed by the size of the recession restricted budget Gov. James Thompson said on Thursday. Thompson declined comment on his budget recommendations but assured that aid to higher education will pass the 1 billion dollar mark for the first time in Illinois history.

CHAMPAIGN—Four different proposals for boundary changes were heard last week by the Champaign Board of Education. A team of five consultants assembled the four boundary proposals as a means of establishing a racial balance in Champaign schools. Public hearings on the proposals are scheduled for February 23 at Central High School and March 2 at Centennial High School.

SPRINGFIELD—The Illinois Supreme Court last week ruled that a new presidential election must be held in the State Senate. By this action the court overturned a republican takeover of the senate which resulted from the absence of democrats at the election.

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He's ramblin'; Journey album well worth it!

Last week I got up the nerve to go buy some new albums. I hesitate each time because I end up doing what I did this time around and that is blowing about fifty bucks. The money was well spent though because number one on my list of albums that I bought was Journey's brand new live album entitled "Captured."

For the opening notes of "Majestic" I couldn't help but close my eyes and remember back to the night of May 1, 1980, when Journey and The Babys put on the best concert I have ever witnessed (I haven't seen Springsteen and yes, even better than REO). As the stage opens up the members appear to the shouts and screams of 15,000 fans. Quickly they take their place on stage and launch into "Where Were You" and "Just the Same Way." Steve Perry frolics around the stage in very tight pants and you realize how he can sing so high during "Line of Fire." The tempo slows down a bit for "Lights" and I can almost imagine myself in the city by the bay. Very smoothly

"Lights" blends into "Stay Awhile" and side one ends and unfortunately so does my flashback. With the beginning of side two I really start to listen to the album.

"Captured" was recorded during Journey's world tour of 1980 with the album crediting every city on the tour instead of the actual city a particular song was recorded in. Neal Schon sparkles on the note perfect reproduction of "Too Late" from "Evolution." Next is the yet unreleased "Dixie Highway" which if ever recorded on a studio album it will probably sound much better. Journey has been regarded as more of a studio band than a live band but this

album will dispell that tag. All of the songs here are reproduced just as good if not better than their studio recordings and some have more punch to them since it is a live recording. Side two finishes with "Feeling That Way" and "Anytime" with both songs featuring Greg Rollie on lead vocals. It's a nice change too because Rollie's is a much deeper and soothing voice as compared to Steve Perry's often shrill and banal tinted

vocals. This combination though when blended together is harmony and melody at its best. Toward the end of "Anytime" Neal Schon takes off on an earth shattering solo that proves he is in a class by himself as a rock guitarist.

Side three includes only three songs that contain a lot of jamming between the members of the band. "Do You Recall" does not fit that description but it starts off side three. Greg Rollie on the Hammond b-3 organ and Neal Schon on the Fender Stratocaster guitar trade off blues riffs next during "Walks Like a Lady." This is definitely a high point of the album as it displays Journey's roots and versatility. It's a much better representation of the song than the studio recording on "Departure." Ending side three is the powerful "La Do Da Do Da..." with drummer Stevie Smith and bassist Ross Valory finally being given a chance to step up front and display their solo talent.

Side four could be titled the greatest hits side. The songs featured here are "Lovin',

Touchin', Squeezin'; "Wheel in the Sky" and "Any Way You Want It." Finishing the fourth side is "The Party's Over," a song previously unreleased. It seems that most groups are doing something like this nowadays with greatest hits packages and live albums. All you have to do is include an unreleased song on the album and it becomes an instant hit. Such is the strategy of music's giants.

"Captured" is a great live album. It will be heard at many parties for months to come (I was getting kind of tired of REO Live and Frampton Comes Alive at parties anyway). From an audiophiles standpoint this album is not recorded that well because the mix is fuzzy at best and does not always bring out the intricate parts of many of Journey's songs. That does not get in the way of the album though. If you missed Journey at the Assembly Hall on Friday, May 1st, give "Captured" a listen. It's almost as good as being there. Whoa! Things to do and people to see, gots to get ramblin'.

Clash album 'not too good'

There's quite a bit that can be said about the Clash's new album, SANDINISTA. It's too bad; however, that all that can be said is not good. They may be revolutionizing the recording industry by continually offering multiple record albums at discount prices; SANDINISTA is a three record set and retails for about \$10. They might have made people happier though if they had cut out the little kids singing "Career Opportunities" and "Guns of Brixton" and the rest of the garbage that, taken at face value, looks like it was used primarily to take up space.

All this doesn't mean that there isn't some great Clash music in here. Songs like "Police on my Back" and "Somebody got Murdered" come through as real Clash rockers. The problems with the album are due to the multi-layered vocals and sparse playing which

cause the sides to get progressively worse, with sides 5 and 6 being almost unbearable because of the Clash's bout with impressionism.

Don't get me wrong, I like the Clash; I always have, but who do they think that they are, the Beatles? Each time that I listen to this, it seems more and more like an epic album with heavy political overtones but the problem is that the Clash is not an epic-type band nor is the buying public ready for something like this. If you can sift through this three record set, there are two or three good sides in it and it might be worth money. They've got a good idea with bringing the price down but not at the expense of good music. Some say that the Clash is on the cutting edge of rock music, well if they are I'm going to stay away because I don't want to get hurt.

They all bounce, jump, sing, and shout until all of Mabel's is pumping to the beat of "Dr. Doctor." By the end of their show, Tuesday, which lasted until 1:30, the audience was begging for more.

The Busboys can sing, they can dance, they can even make fun of themselves, but the thing that the Busboys do best is give people their money's worth. "It's the best five bucks I've ever spent," lamented one participant in the Minimum Wage concert that night.

1 + 30 zeroes = 1,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 — one nonillion

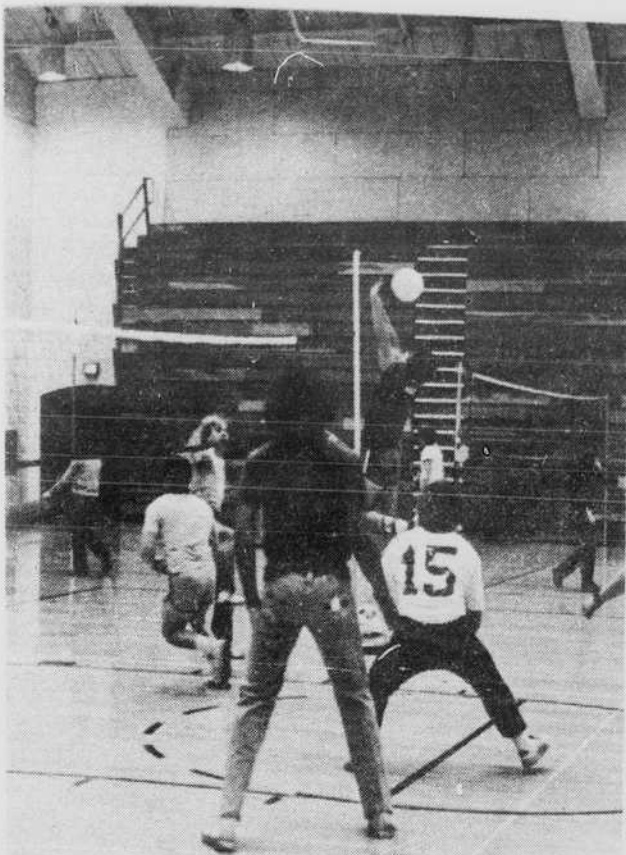

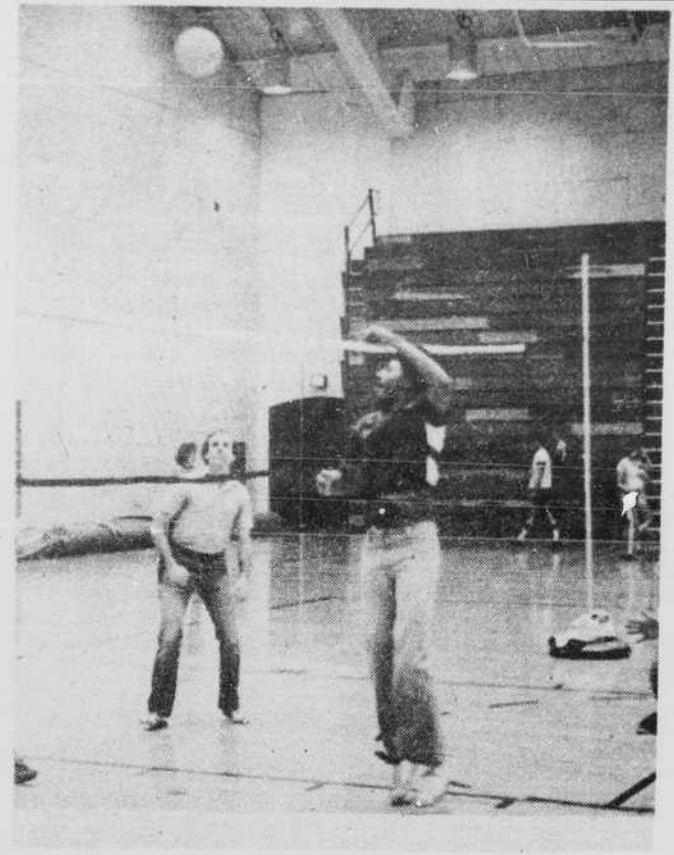


The Volley-thon is a success

LaBadie sees tight finish in finals

Looking forward to the Region IV Indoor State Track Meet at the U. of I. Armory this weekend, Parkland coach Lee LaBadie sees a tight finish—with Wright, DuPage, and the Cobras all fighting for the title. The title, for Parkland, would be a repeat.

The PC trackmen and women have been busy preparing for the State Meet, participating in Illinois Invitational, the Strider Meet, and the Parkland Invitational last weekend.

LaBadie says his athletes are competing well, and adds, "The team that wins the state indoor title will simply be the team

who's athletes perform up to their potential on Saturday." With an especially small squad this year, the Cobras, more than any other, will have to have good performances from each of their competitors.

The State Meet could be an instant replay of the Junior College Relays in Chicago, with Parkland finishing first, scoring 63 points, and Wright and DuPage tied for second with 60.

In that meet, P.C. had two individual winners and two winning relay squads. Paul Blissard captured the shot put title with a heave of 13.45 meters, and Junior Cox won the long jump, leaping 22-2½. Casey

Laughlin, Benny Clark, Oscar Thomas, and Mark Patrick combined efforts to give the Cobras a win in the Sprint Medley Relay, and Steve Buchholz joined Laughlin, Patrick, and Thomas for a victory in the Mile Relay.

In the Illini Invitational, Mark Patrick ran a 1:12 600 meters and finished fourth overall. Patrick was the only Cobra placer.

In the Stiders Meet last week in the Open Division, Junior Cox was a double winner in the 60 high hurdles and the long jump, and Benny Clark set a new Parkland indoor school record in the triple jump with a winning leap of 46'6. Clark also finished

second in the long jump. Paul Blissard set a new personal best in the shot put with a toss of 47'10½.

Cheryl Krutsinger and Sarah Grove made a good showing in the Women's Open Division. Krutsinger took second in three events: the 220, with a 27.9 clocking; the 440, with a 61.7 clocking; and the 60, with a time of 7.5. Grove finished second in the 880, running a 2:47.5, and took third in the 440, with a 73.7.

The Cobras will host the Region IV State Meet this Saturday and the National Junior College Indoor Meet on March 6,7 at the U. of I. Armory.

Cobras make strong showing in Parkland Invitational

The Parkland track team tuned up for the State Junior College Indoor Track Meet by placing five in second place and one in first place in the Parkland Invitational held at the Armory last Sunday.

Benny Clark was the lone first place finisher as he won the triple jump with a leap of 46-4¾.

Mark Patrick placed second in the 600 yard dash behind Ken Calhoun of Jackson, who took home the most first place finishes (7). The mile relay team placed second behind Jackson with a time of 3:22.7, while Eric Foster finished second behind Jackson in the high jump. Foster jumped 6-5 while Brad Stockard of Jackson high jumped 6-7. Junior Cox was second in the long jump with a jump of 22-0.

In the shot put Paul Blissard set a school record with a throw of 48-

3¾. That, however, was not good enough to win as he finished second behind Rich Baader of Illinois.

The Parkland women's track team also placed in three events. Cheryl Krutsinger finished sixth with a time of 7.8 seconds. The winner of the dash was Sonya Brown of Wright College with a fast time of 7.0. Krutsinger was also third in the 330 yard dash with a time of 39.1, while Sarah Grove placed fourth in the 60-yard hurdles as she posted a time of 10.8.

The mile relay team qualified for the National Junior College Athletic Association championships March 6-7 with the time of 3:22.7. The mile relay team consist of Steve Buchholz, Casey Laughlin, Mark Patrick and Oscar Thomas.

Marquette vs. DePaul

Overall: This is one of the very few games that will test DePaul. Thus far, only UCLA and Louisville are the only real national contenders the Blue Demons have faced.

I may have overestimated Marquette. Last Saturday they were trounced by a supposedly "down" Louisville team, 79-60. After seeing them play an impressive game against a fine Illinois team earlier in the year, I thought the Warriors were legitimate contenders. But after a couple of big losses in the past couple of weeks, they may be lucky to make the NIT.

There is no doubt DePaul has the talent. They have enough talent to stretch across metropolitan Chicago. Their problem is getting mentally ready. Numerous unemotional victories have raised many questions about their desire.

Who to Watch: When you talk about DePaul, you think about Mark Aguirre. Averaging 24 points and 10 rebounds per game, Aguirre can go pro any time he wants to. Terry Cummings is also an up and coming star. Along with Teddy Grubbs, the Blue Demons are already in good shape for the future.

Marquette is as quick or quicker than DePaul. But they don't, however, have the muscle underneath to match the Demons. Oliver Lee is 6-7 but is not a strong rebounder.

The Warriors' guards could tell the story. If they (Wilson, Green and Rivers) use their quickness and penetrating ability, this will be a good, explosive game.

Game Edge: There may be a surprise here, but I'll still go with DePaul by six points.

Michigan State vs. Illinois

Overall: Illinois is playing very good basketball. As compared to past years, the Illini find themselves being the aggressors in the Big 10 Conference. Playing a combination of good defense, perhaps the best in the Big 10, good rebounding, and key offensive production, the Illini should be heading for a high finish. Their 'El-foldo' act of the past has disappeared.

Michigan State is better than what their record shows. Jay Vincent is playing at his natural position of forward and is averaging 21 points per game. The Spartans also have guard Kevin Smith who has had

Game Edge: Illinois by eight. Especially since they are in the Assembly Hall.

Overall: This is the Sunday classic. This nationally-televised game features two teams with different styles. Virginia has a big front line and they use it to advantage.

Notre Dame plays a very tough schedule. They have faced at least one Top 20 team usually every week. Digger Phelps, who at 40 years of age, seems like he has been around forever, has his usual Top 20 team. Relying on that good pressure defense and patient offense, the Fighting Irish have the knack of staying in a game even when they are not playing well.

Who to Watch: Be sure and watch this guy! He's a rare breed! He's 7-4 Ralph Sampson. At his gigantic height, Sampson can do many things a person 6-5 or 6-6 could do.

Undoubtedly, Notre Dame will try and sag on Sampson. But if they do that, then they have to contest with sharpshooters Jeff Lamp and Lee Raker. The Cavaliers are a sound basketball team who are currently carrying the longest winning streak in the nation (26).

The Irish rely on balance. Kelly Tripucka and Orlando Woolridge are the catalysts while John Paxson and Tracy Jackson play key roles, too.

Game Edge: I think Virginia is ready to be upset and Notre Dame is the kind of team to break long winning streaks. Just ask UCLA. I'll go with the Irish by two points in overtime.

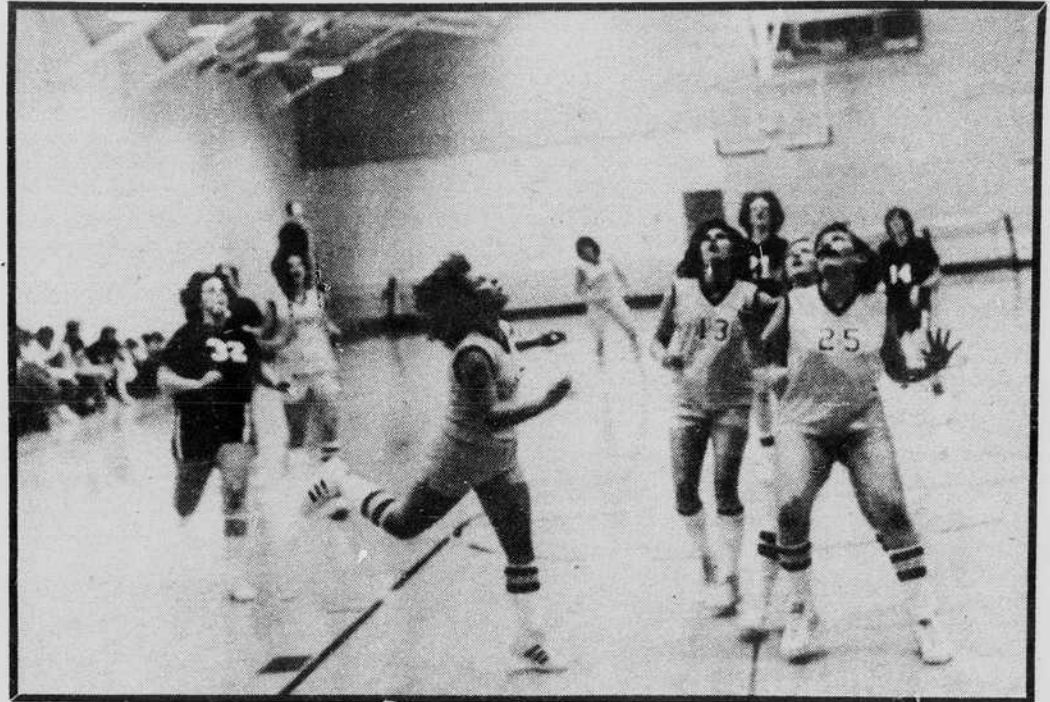
