THE HOSPITAL OF ST. RAPHAEL—ANNUAL REPORT

In the following pages will be found an outline of the work accomplished by The Hospital of St. Raphael during the year 1925, which marks the completion of the hospital's eighteenth year of service for the benefit of the sick and the injured in the City of New Haven and vicinity.

Patients given care and treatment numbered four thousand three hundred fifty four. The list is sub-divided as follows: medical, two hundred fourteen; surgical, two thousand eight hundred eighty two; obstetrical, four hundred ninety; births, four hundred sixty eight; emergency, one hundred fifty four. The daily average of patients was one hundred seventy one.

Patients whose circumstances enabled them to meet hospital charges numbered one thousand one hundred thirty eight; partial pay patients, two thousand six hundred ninety six; those cared for gratis, five hundred twenty. The cost to the hospital incurred by the care of partial pay and free patients was met in part, by subscriptions from benefactors, discounts, State Appropriations, and an allotment from the New Haven Community Chest. Increased living expenses raised the deficit this year, to approximately eighty six thousand dollars, no small item assuredly, and the hospital earnestly solicits gifts for this very deserving purpose.

A much appreciated subscription of ten thousand dollars was given by Dr. E. LeRoy Thomson for a private room endowment for the benefit of the members of Christ Church, the beneficiaries to be nominated by the Reverend Rector of the congregation. Miss Ida Leete's bequest of five thousand dollars and a remembrance in the will of the late Rev. James J. Smith, were the special gifts of the year.

The hospital's quota of two hundred ten beds is insufficient at times, to meet demands; it is expected that forty additional beds will soon be available. They will be located on the fourth floor of the main building, vacated at the close of the year by the student nurses who have taken possession of the Selina Marie Lewis Memorial Home.

For many months, the electric call bells installed throughout the hospital, had been unsatisfactory, and the ringing of hand bells a source of annoyance to patients and of bewilderment to nurses; the Ladies Auxiliary, realizing our need of improved facilities in this line, volunteered to raise subscriptions to defray the cost of a dependable call system and they set to work with their usual efficiency. A series of entertainments, card parties and sales was inaugurated and at the final meeting of the season, the Treasurer of the Auxiliary handed the Treasurer of the Hospital a check which covered the original contract for the Silent Signal System which is giving excellent service and is a boon to the sick as well as to their attendants.

Another long desired improvement is the spacious, lightsome record room in the parlors of the administration building formerly used for chapel purposes. Furnishings in oak have been installed with every convenience for charting and filing, and a full time recorder in attendance. The Staff Board Room has also been renovated and refurnished and is now a bright comfortable place where

the doctors may congregate and carry on their deliberations in privacy. The former record room is now a reception room where friends may wait while their loved ones are undergoing operations, etc.

Electrical dish-washing machines have been placed in the scullery of the main dining room and a substantial woven wire fence has been erected on the east side of the grounds from Chapel to George Street.

The erection of the Memorial Home necessitated many special meetings of the Board of Trustees. All members with Bishop Nilan from distant Hartford, gave graciously of their time and helpful suggestions. The Rev. John J. McGivney and Mr. James T. Moran were appointed a committee on construction activities, and from the time the site was selected, until the Home was ready for occupancy, not a working day passed without a visit of inspection from these kind gentlemen. Mr. Walter J. Walsh, our own Legal Adviser, and Mr. Terence Carmody of Waterbury, were generously kind in donating much time and valuable attention to legal matters pertaining to the building of the Memorial.

The Rev. Austin B. Dignam, resident Chaplain, continues his work of shepherding the flock of Saint Raphael's with kindly solicitude. A congregation over the three hundred mark affords ample scope for his zeal and activity, and his ready understanding and tactful sympathy incline all hearts to him while his presence in the hospital is a consolation and a benediction.

There are few hospitals favored with a Staff as devoted to its interests as is Saint Raphael's. The ever filled wards both for adults and children, testify to the amount of gratuitous service bestowed on the sick poor. Another commendable work is the course of lectures and practical instruction given in wards emergency and operating rooms, to the student nurses. So thorough and up to present day requirements are the instructions given, the student nurses are thereby prepared to meet the exacting examinations of the State Board of Hospital Supervisors.

Like all progressive institutions, Saint Raphael's has needs awaiting extraordinary benefactions, the most pressing being a utility building to house the heating plant, laundry, ambulances and afford accommodations for employees. Such a building erected on the east side of the property, would guarantee a direct driveway, facing the main entrance, through from Chapel to George Street, and afford ample parking place for the ever increasing number of automobiles that flock to the hospital.

It is a source of gratification to those responsible for the hospital's administration, that the tiny seed sown eighteen years ago has flourished by God's grace, and is contributing in no small measure to that branch of Social Service that is as old as Christianity. Generous benefactors have made this progress possible and to all who have befriended Saint Raphael's by constituting it their almoners, for the benefit of the sick and needy, deep and abiding gratitude is cordially rendered.

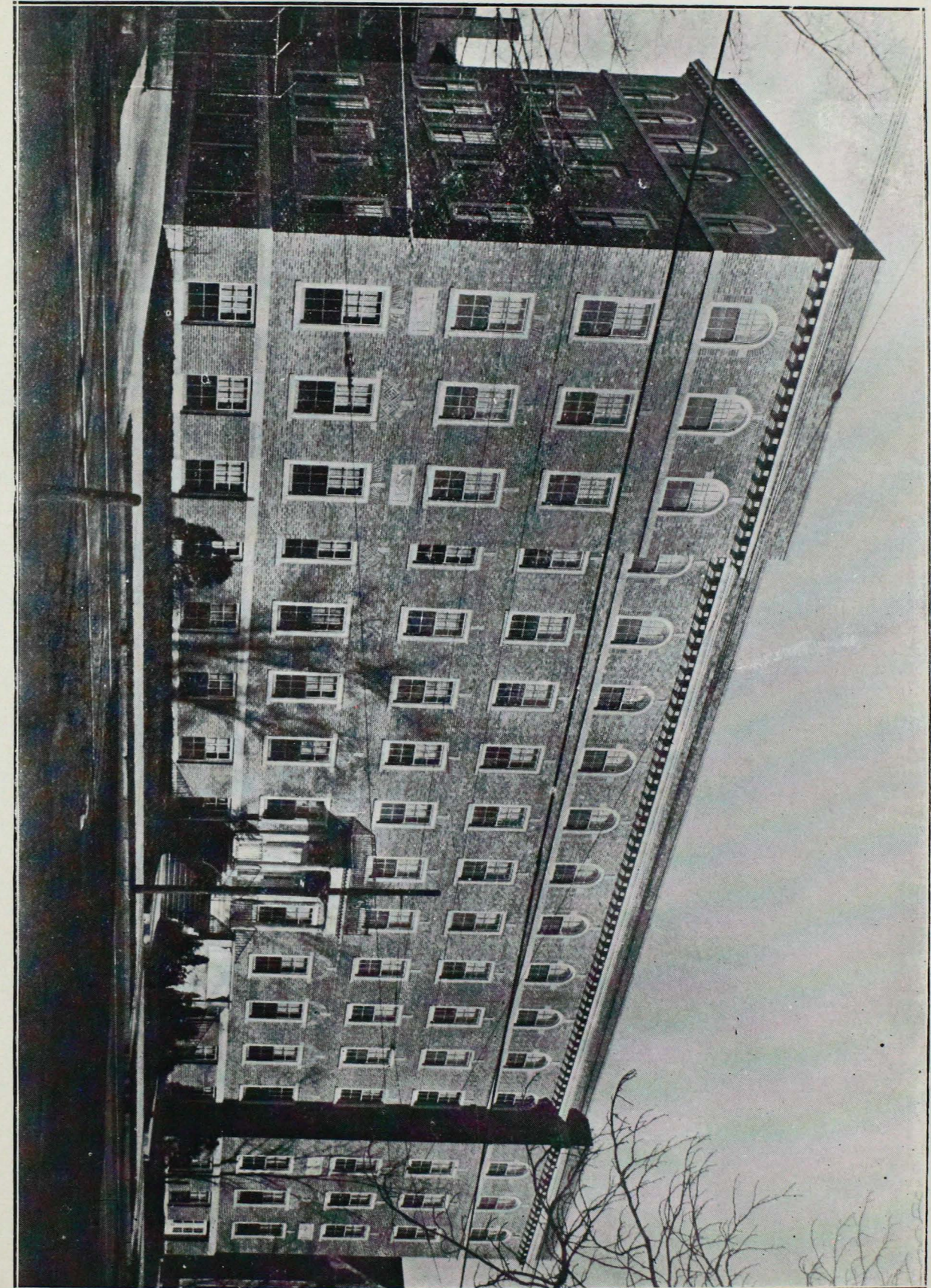

THE SELINA MARIE LEWIS MEMORIAL HOME FOR NURSES

THE SELINA MARIE LEWIS MEMORIAL HOME  
FOR NURSES

The Selina Marie Lewis Memorial Home for Nurses is now ready for occupancy and will be open to visitors on Tuesday, December 22 from 2:00 till 5:00 and from 7:00 till 9:00 P. M. The memorial is located on George Street between Orchard and Sherman Avenue and all those interested in hospital activities are cordially invited to avail themselves of the opportunity to inspect the building.

The HOME is the gift of Mr. Truman S. Lewis of Waterbury and has been erected in memory of his deceased wife, Selina Marie Lewis. The interest of both in The Hospital of St. Raphael, began several years ago when Mrs. Lewis was a patient in the institution. Their appreciation of the service was so marked, that the desire was mutual to befriend so worthy a cause. Both Mr. and Mrs. Lewis sensed the need of a separate dwelling for the student nurse body and when Mrs. Lewis passed to her eternal reward at her home in Waterbury, on January 30, 1924, one of Mr. Lewis' first deeds of benevolence was the arranging of preliminaries for the construction of a Memorial that would be in accord with the desires of his lamented helpmate. And thus, St. Raphael's was chosen as the beneficiary of his bounty.

The Memorial is a four story, basement building, one hundred and forty eight feet long and forty five feet wide. The exterior is faced with red, pressed brick with lime stone trimming in colonial design and is of fire proof construction throughout, with exterior brick walls, steel frame construction on the interior and reinforced concrete floor and roof construction.

In the basement is a recreation hall having kitchen and toilet rooms and showers adjacent. The recreation hall is forty two by sixty feet and has a separate, outside entrance. The basement also contains a large sewing and clothes room, laundry, trunk and boiler rooms.

One half of the first story is given over to offices, parlors and a combination lecture and demonstration room; the other half is divided up into nurses' private rooms with toilet and bath rooms.

The second, third and fourth stories contain nurses' rooms with large toilet, bath and shower compartments. Each bed room has a lavatory with a built-in medicine cabinet above it, also a built-in closet for each nurse, with a Garry pull-out clothes hanger for garments. There are sixty two private and twenty seven double rooms.

All floors throughout, including bed room closets, are of terazzo with terazzo sanitary base. Partitions are of gypsum blocks. Stairs are of iron with marble treads. Wood finish and trim are of oak. Walls and ceilings are of hand finished plaster; the walls are painted



with washable paint, while the ceilings are tinted in cold water paint. There are two stairways and an automatic electric elevator. At the rear is a sun parlor, eighteen by thirty feet, running up through the four stories with access from each floor at the center stair hall. On the first floor are two large, open verandas.

The magnitude of Mr. Lewis' gift can be fully understood and appreciated only by those conversant with hospital management; for while the needs of an institution increase, its resources seldom or never, keep pace with the demands. Extraordinary benefactions alone, make possible the erection of additional buildings, and Mr. Lewis has been the author of such a benefaction to Saint Raphael's. Small wonder that he has the grateful appreciation of the Board of Directors, the Medical Staff and the Student Nurses. For this Memorial is no bleak, lifeless monument of stone and steel, but a spacious, handsome dwelling for the faithful auxiliaries of the Sisters in caring for the sick and needy, while pursuing the course of study that will fit them for their chosen profession.

The crowning glory of the Memorial is the superb furnishings. When on its completion, Mr. Lewis inspected the building, he quietly directed the Sister in charge to select the furniture and send the bill to him. Such munificence is indeed extraordinary and as prince of benefactors, the name of Truman S. Lewis is gratefully inscribed in the annals of The Hospital of St. Raphael. The completed gift coming as it does at this season, is a singularly beautiful manifestation of the Christmas spirit and will body forth to future generations the thought that inspired it—the happiness and welfare of others.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

### AMBULANCE

The ambulance is under the control of the Superintendent and application for its use should be made directly to the hospital.

An ambulance surgeon accompanies all calls for the conveyance of patients to the hospital.

### ADMISSION OF PATIENTS

Application for the admission of patients should be accompanied by a certificate from a reputable Physician and should be addressed to the Sister-in-charge.

The charge per week for accommodation in the general wards is \$17.50, private wards, \$19.00, which includes medical and surgical attendance together with medicine, nursing and laundry.

It is recommended that medical cases unless urgent, be sent to the hospital not later than 5:00 P. M.

All cases of sudden injury are received day or night.

Private corridors are devoted to private rooms where persons who are taken ill may enjoy the comforts of home and have the attendance of their own Physician, if preferred.

Private room charges are from \$25.00 to \$60.00 per week. The fees of Visiting Surgeons and Physicians are independent of hospital charges and must be arranged in advance.

The hospital does not furnish meals or lodgings for friends of patients.

The hospital does not launder personal clothing.

### REGULATIONS FOR PATIENTS

Patients who are well enough to be up will rise in time for breakfast, after which they will vacate the wards, as far as possible so that they may be aired and put in order.

Patients must be in their respective wards and places during the rounds of Physicians.

Patients must not sit on beds, talk loud or make any unnecessary noise in the wards. Silence should be observed during the visits of Physicians.

Patients must not enter the laundry, kitchen or other private apartment unless by permission.

No patient is to leave the premises without the permission of the nurse in charge of his ward.

Any patient who leaves the hospital before being discharged

by the Physician in attendance, must sign a paper to that effect and assume all responsibility for the act.

Patients must leave in the office, for safe keeping, any money or valuables they may have; in case of failure to do so, the hospital will not be responsible for any loss that may occur.

No smoking allowed in wards or corridors.

All lights must be lowered at 9:00 P. M.

All complaints should be made to the Superintendent.

#### RULES FOR VISITORS

The friends of the sick are allowed to visit them on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 3:00 to 4:00 and from 7:00 to 8:00 P. M.

Sunday and legal holiday hours are 2:00 to 4:00 and 7:00 to 8:00 P. M.

Not more than two visitors will be admitted at once to see any patient. No children allowed.

No article of food or drink may be carried into the wards; all such must be left with the nurse in charge and if approved by the Physician, will be given to the patient named.

Visitors must observe perfect order while in the hospital; must confine their visits to their immediate friends and must leave the building promptly at the expiration of visiting hours.

Visiting hours to private corridors are from 10:00 A. M. to 9:00 P. M. Visitors will be admitted during these hours with proper discretion.

## THE SCHOOL FOR NURSING

## Announcement

The hospital is prepared to give a two and one-half years' Course of Training to young women desirous of becoming professional nurses. Affiliation with the Visiting Nurse Association and with a hospital for contagious diseases affords students, who so elect, practical work in these branches of the service.

Application to obtain this course should be made to the Superintendent of the Hospital. Candidates between twenty and thirty years of age are preferred. Unblemished character, sound health, unimpaired faculties, good education and a readiness to conform to the rules of discipline are required.

At the close of the preliminary term of three months, probationers, if deemed fit for the work, are admitted to membership in the School. An allowance for necessary expenses incidental to training is given, but this is in no way regarded as remuneration for services rendered, as the profession acquired is deemed an ample equivalent.

Pupils reside in the Hospital and serve as assistants in the various departments and are expected to perform any duty assigned by the Superintendent.

A vacation of two weeks will be allowed each year. All pupils are cared for gratuitously when ill, and receive the professional services of the Physician of the School. Time lost through illness or for any other cause, must be made up.

When the full term of thirty months is completed, students who have passed the examinations and whose department has been satisfactory, will receive the diploma and badge of the School. The diploma and badge of any graduate of the School may be revoked for cause, by the Committee of School for Nursing.

## THE SCHOOL FOR NURSING, ANNUAL RECORD

Saint Raphael's School for Nursing this year, graduated its fourteenth class consisting of seventeen members. Our graduates now number one hundred and seventy: of these, one hundred and eighteen are in actual service, forty-six have married and six are deceased.

Notwithstanding the yearly increase of registered nurses, the hospital is often hard pressed to secure special nurses for its private patients as well as for patrons who elect to remain in their own homes.

Eighty applications for admittance to the School were received; twenty-seven were received on probation; thirty were admitted to membership. There were ten resignations and dismissals. The school now has sixty-five students on roll.

There is no scarcity of volunteers for the Visiting Nurse course and contagious disease course. These branches of the service are elective; students entering the Visiting Nurse Association here in town; the contagious disease course is acquired in the Hartford Isolation Hospital.

Graduation exercises were held in the hospital chapel on the afternoon of June 10th. The sanctuary was resplendent in its superb altar service glowing waxen tapers shed their soft light on a background of stately palms and ferns, interspersed with floral baskets laden with blossoms of deep blue and golden yellow harmonizing with the class colors. The graduates radiated joy and thanksgiving on the happy termination of the arduous course of study and practical work that had to be mastered before the honored badge of the School and its precious diploma could be conferred.

The address to the graduates was delivered by the Rev. Ernest Wilson, Rector of St. Mary's Church, Bridgeport, Conn. Father Wilson, who is an able and eloquent speaker, made clear to his audience the sacredness and the nobility of the nursing profession. He charged the nurses to ever keep in mind that the patients who came under their care were created to the image and likeness of God, and while ministering to the ills of the body, to remember that the body is the temple of an immortal soul which should hold no second place in a nurse's estimation. He then entreated them to be faithful to the lessons inculcated during the years of preparation for their career and ever to reflect credit on their Alma Mater. Our own Father Dignam called the roll, presented the diplomas and was master of ceremonies during the solemn benediction. Former internes with Doctor James J. Gettings, chairman, were ushers and Master John J. Lenihan served as acolyte.

The choir for the occasion was selected from the student nurse corps with Miss Viola Carey at the organ and Miss Mary Catharine Sullivan, violin. The Class Hymn was sung by the entire school and the enunciation of the touching words and the harmonious effect was deeply inspiring. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament concluded chapel services after which the Class of 1925 repaired to the assembly room to receive the congratulations of relatives and well wishers. Refreshments were served and vocal and instrumental selections rendered. A call to pose for the Class picture terminated the delightfully informal reception.

The lecture course, an important item in a nurse's education, is given by members of the hospital staff. When one considers the busy life our doctors lead, the giving of their time unstintedly for this purpose, as well as other helps in the training is a much appreciated gratuity for which the nurses and the authorities of the School are duly grateful. As Physician of the School, Doctor Luby has in it a clientele of no meager proportions and calls for minor ailments have been numerous. Doctor Verdi, our Surgeon-in-Chief, takes care of the operative cases of which there have been several during the past twelve months. Early in the year, Miss Kehoe, a first year student, was stricken with pneumonia and died after a few days' illness. All others having happily been discharged with the coveted clean bill of health.

The Ladies' Auxiliary, affectionately known as the School's God-mother, has attended cordially to festivities and entertainments, providing also a beautiful Christmas tree laden with individual gifts. The ladies have kindly remembered the

household and the Special Branch Service nurses with delicacies and holiday cheer. The cardinal-red letter day dawned for the School on December twenty-second, when it was announced that the SELINA MARIE LEWIS MEMORIAL HOME was ready for occupancy and that the nurses were to take possession of the new building on that day. Their delight at the prospect was unbounded, and the privilege of being the first group to occupy such a palatial dwelling, beyond the telling. The Home was open for public inspection during the afternoon and evening and a large number of friends of the hospital availed themselves of the opportunity to go through the Memorial. Mr. Truman S. Lewis was among the callers and an impromptu reception was tendered him by the Sisters, students and visiting graduate nurses.

To all who have contributed to the progress of the School and to the welfare of its personnel, cordial appreciation is sincerely rendered.

A gift of ten thousand dollars endows a free room in perpetuity for such a number of weeks each year, as the income of the endowment will provide for.

A gift of five thousand dollars shall entitle the donor during lifetime, to nominate a patient to a free bed for such a number of weeks each year, as the income of the endowment provides for.

A gift of one thousand dollars shall entitle the donor to nominate a patient to a free bed for five years, for such a number of weeks each year, as the income from the endowment provides for.
