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

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REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

The event of assembling to-day for the annual meeting of the Connecticut Training School for Nurses is over-shadowed by our sense of loss in the going from us into the unseen heavenly land of our beloved vice-president, Mrs. T. W. T. Curtis. In the ninth annual report issued January third, 1883, Mrs. Curtis' name first appears as a member of the executive committee. Upon the death of the president, Mrs. Noah Porter, she was elected to that office January sixteen, 1889, with the understanding that it was but a temporary arrangement and for that year only. After an interval of five years she was again made president and retained the office until 1901, when she realized that the state of her health would prevent her from engaging in active public work. In 1905, however, she consented to return as vice-president to the membership of the Board. This is a rapid sketch of a long period-thirty-five years-and in reverent affection we bear witness to a life which was one radiant example of kindly judgment and generosity and strength and friendliness and courtesy. She was seldom absent from the meetings of the Board. Endowed with natural gifts which were enriched by experience and cultivation, her able counsel was relied upon in all its plans and deliberations. Mrs. Curtis' attitude toward our Training School is made known by a legacy of \$1,000, and is best expressed in her own words which closed her address at the annual meeting of the last year of her presidency, that are to the point to-day and are worthily repeated. She said : "This school of ours is not really venerable but we would ever have it keep the heart of youth. We would ever have it a living power working along broad lines of thought. We would have it both wisely conservative and wisely progressive holding fast the best traditions of the past,

keeping in touch with the present and ever ready to be a learner. So may this 'child of our affection' grow in knowledge and in usefulness as it grows in years."

We record with regret the loss of Mr. Eli Whitney from our official Board. As president of the Hospital and Training School we have relied upon his support, have felt his sympathy in our purpose and aims and recognized his friendly co-operation. We are grateful that we may feel assured of his continued interest in our welfare. Dr. William H. Carmalt was elected president.

The chairman of our committee, Mrs. Henry A. Bumstead, has joined her husband. Prof. Bumstead is in England, where he is scientific attaché of the United States Embassy, and will be away through the year. Mrs. Winslow was appointed chairman during her absence. Mrs. Ely has resigned her place upon our committee as she is to be out of town. Mrs. Arnold L. Gezell, Mrs. John Day Jackson, and Mrs. Edwy L. Taylor are memberselect.

Almost an entire change has occurred in the staff of instructors. Miss Ann S. Butcher, connected with our school for seven years, for the last three as its head, resigned as Superintendent of Nurses in July. Her resignation was accepted with great regret and with a warm expression of appreciation of what she had accomplished. It will long be remembered by the nurses who receive its benefit that Rosemary Cottage as a place of comfort, rest and recreation, is provided for them through her forethought and initiative.

It was felt that her administration was characterized by devotion to the interests of the school and by an ambition modest but absorbing, for its growth and advancement which will still count in its future. Miss Koerber and Miss Davis, our own graduates, and her helpful and reliable assistants, resigned in August to accept responsible positions elsewhere.

Miss Maude Landis, A.B., R.N., is now superintendent of nurses, and has called to her aid new assistants and supervisors. Miss Landis has had a varied experience. Her theoretical and practical training was followed by post-graduate work and for some years she has been engaged in the management of Hospitals and Training Schools. Her record shows that for the last two years she has given intensive study to administration problems;

especially those bearing upon institutional work. She comes to us recommended by the Teachers College of Columbia University.

The number of student nurses October 1, marks an increase approximating twenty-five per cent. Ten have been received from the Vassar unit without which the number of admissions might not exceed those of last year, though we are quite ready to believe that the nursing profession is more and more coming to the front. The number of patients at the same date was 306, the daily yearly average being 211.

Eight of our nurses have had training in the work of the Visit-The class of 1918 took the state examination for registration in

ing Nurse Association during the year and under its auspices several of our graduates are pursuing the Public Health course. May, and passed with credit.

A group of nurses has been privileged to take the elective study course in English under Dr. Susan S. Sheridan, which they greatly enjoyed. This was the third season that the opportunity has been offered.

The influenza has dealt most unkindly with the health record of our nurses, which made such a good showing last year. Against forty-five cases of illness then reported there now stands twice that number. Forty-one nurses have been affected by the influenza. We note with sadness two deaths, a student nurse in her first year, beloved by her classmates, and a supervisor after only a month's service in which she had endeared herself to all who came in touch with her. We extend sincere and friendly sympathy to the sorrowing families.

It is said that the organization under the command of Lieut. Colonel Joseph Marshall Flint of Yale University, has "worked splendidly." It is a gratification to recall that of the small central group containing 14 nurses, 11 of those nurses are graduates of our Training School and that they have the distinction of belonging to the pioneer American mobile hospital which rendered important service in the recent St. Mihiel offensive.

Early in the year the cottage upon the hospital grounds was given for occupancy to the supervisors, and a third house of residence, becoming a necessity for student nurses, has been secured. Amid the comings and goings of various incumbents of the office of housekeeper in the several halls Miss Stannard has proved

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herself a true home-maker, and we are grateful that she has added yet another year, the thirteenth, to her service in our behalf.

The summer cottage has gone somewhat beyond its original intent as a place of recreation for the student nurses. Circumstances made it for a time a House of Residence, a vacation house and a Convalescent Home. It has proved its usefulness for two summers and we have acknowledged our indebtedness to Miss Butcher for the inception of the enterprise and again give thanks to the friends who came forward to its support by contributing the amount of the rent, the Hospital assuming the running expenses. Mrs. Ida B. Walker was the painstaking and efficient director of the house, her care being supplemented by a faithful aid in Miss Mary Carey. We wish we could adequately make known to all donors the help and comfort the Recreation Cottage has afforded us, and we extend to them sincere thanks in behalf of our nurses.

Opportunities for social affairs are quickly embraced. Birthdays, Hallowe'en, Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's and other holidays have been celebrated with appropriate ceremonies and with the approval of the superintendent of nurses. An original play was given on one of these occasions and the dramatic art displayed was very creditable. Dancing parties both informal and formal have been allowed and have been a great source of needed relaxation, the inner circle being occasionally enlarged to embrace friends. Classes often exchange courtesies and the exhibition of the physical culture class under Miss Daly's able direction was given in honor of the Seniors. One of the traditions of the school is the singing of carols in the early Christmas morning by the nurses, who passing from ward to ward are cheered by the patients as they come and go.

Commencement week held many pleasant events for the class of 1918. At the vesper hour Sunday Mr. Scoville of Trinity Church delivered the baccalaureate sermon. He was assisted by the vested choir of the church in the inspiring service of sacred song. Monday afternoon the class was invited by the executive committee to an afternoon tea, and the ivy was planted. Tuesday evening was the class supper. Conservation being to the fore the class voted to keep this festive time in its own parlor. With the help of generous friends there was nothing lacking in the appointments of the table; neither was there any dearth of fun-provoking tales and laughter. The graduation exercises were observed May 29. Dr. William H. Carmalt, president, was in the chair. Rev. Mr. Swift offered the invocation. Delightful music in two numbers was rendered by our friends, Mrs. Joseph W. Derby, violin, and Mrs. Henry Hallam Tweedy, piano. An inspiring address, subject "Suffering and Opportunity," was given by Prof. Sneath. Dr. Carmalt presented the diplomas. The class sang their class song with spirit and the exercises were closed with "The Star Spangled Banner" by the school and assembled friends. The processional and recessional were as usual marked features of the program of the evening. In the decorations of the chapel "Our Flag," a gift to the school from the graduating class, was used for the first time and was a happy surprise.

This year has seen some important additions to the library, among them the Encyclopedia Britannica and the latest issue of the Century Dictionary.

We acknowledge with appreciation and thanks the many courtesies that have been extended by the Hospital Society and officials of the Hospital, by physicians and lecturers, by the city newspapers, and by all interested friends.

ANNUAL MEETING October 28, 1919

Another annual meeting of the Connecticut Training School for Nurses is a reminder that we hasten on to the rounding out of its fiftieth year. We were told, within a few days, that it was none too soon to begin thinking about and formulating tentative plans for its historic observance.

The years as they pass bring new perplexities and problems with necessary changes. We have missed Mrs. Bumstead from our counsels this year and welcome her return. Mrs. Winslow has most acceptably filled the position temporarily vacated. She now retires from the Board for urgent reasons greatly to our regret and with many thanks for her able, wise and tactful leadership.

The executive committee keep in touch with details by frequent conferences and regular semi-monthly meetings except in the summer months, and a system of weekly visits by members of the committee in rotation.

Changes in the staff of supervisors and instructors have been frequent. Miss Tarbox from the Massachusetts General Hospital, succeeds Miss Aldred, assistant superintendent, and Miss Strobel succeeds Miss Jolly. Miss Jamison, Miss Trisch and Miss Hazard, supervisors, have resigned and their places are filled by three of our own 1919 graduates. Miss Bruse as supervisor of Farnam completed her tenth year in this position.

The fourth House of Residence has been added for the accommodation of 30 probationers entering Sept. 1. Each house has its director. Of these Miss Stannard is the Dean, completing now her thirteenth year of invaluable faithful service.

The large room in the older portion of the nurses home has been renewed in paint and changed in use. It is now the assem-

bly room for the school staff of supervisors and instructors at their pleasure. It was most appropriately furnished by Mrs. Brewster and the "Blue Room" speaks eloquently of comfort and attractiveness.

A suite of rooms in Davenport is being made ready for the superintendent of nurses, one room being already in order for occupancy. A handsome gift from Miss Terry of several large upholstered chairs find appropriate place in this suite of rooms. Acknowledgment has been made to Miss Terry, but the gift is again mentioned to associate it in the minds of all with the beneficent service of her aunt, Miss Harriet Terry, a member of this board in the nineties.

The legacy of Mrs. Curtis of \$1,000 has been received and added to the missionary fund as she requested.

The influenza continued its sad course well into the new year and every nurse available was brought into requisition. This important service necessarily interrupted the course of study and has made it difficult to make up the time required. The volunteers who came in answer to the call, attendants and helpers whether in the care of the sick or in the homelier duties, were warmly welcomed and their service met with grateful recognition.

The organization of Alumnae Association of the Training School is now 26 years old having 267 members. The worthy objects named in its constitution should call into its membership each successive year a majority of the graduating class. The executive committee appreciates its purpose "to further the interests of the Connecticut Training School" as well as "to advance the standing and best interests of trained nurses," and trust it will not be forgotten that these two aims or purposes are inter-dependent.

To the over-seas unit of nurses of our school accompanying and in command of Dr. Flint, a formal welcome was tendered upon their return in February. Invitations were extended jointly by the Alumnae Association and the executive committee to a dinner served in the dining room of the Hospital. The tables were made attractive with plants and cut flowers contributed by Mrs. Flint, Mrs. Brewster and others. Mrs. Winslow presided and made a gracious speech of welcome to which Miss Johnson responded in behalf of her associates. Adjourning to the Chapel, Dr. Flint of their work abroad.

One afternoon was selected for successive weeks during the Spring months when the executive committee served tea quite informally in the parlor of the Home. The nurses who could take time for a little cheer in the midst of their round of duties found these to be helpful and pleasant occasions.

Several parties have been arranged for the nurses by Miss Landis and her assistants and the nurses themselves have planned their own evening festivities in gatherings in the parlor of the Home.

The recreation cottage for another season has met the return-The afternoon tea given to the senior class on the day preced-

ing need, the entire expense account being paid from the budget. ing graduation, has become an annual social event and was enjoyed as in other years. In the planting of the ivy, which followed, each member of the class participated, and at the close of the ceremony the decorated trowel which turned the earth was passed by the president of the class into the hand of the president of the succeeding class. The ivy under so felicitous planting is fast climbing a corner of the western wall of the Administration Building.

The graduation exercises June 4th held an interest all their own. Each year has presented some particular feature to mark its individuality. Choice selections of songs were rendered by Mrs. Lawrence Johnson Carmalt accompanied by Mrs. Pierrepont Bigelow which were received with appreciation by the large audience. The address given by Herbert E. Mills, Ph.D., of Vassar College was specially pertinent to the times, the subject being: "The Relation of the Nurse to National Wealth and Welfare." Twenty-five nurses received diplomas which were presented by the president, Dr. Carmalt. The class-song, written by one of their number, Miss Law, followed and was sung with fine effect. At the conclusion of the program congratulations from the committee and from friends, were received by the class. The chapel was simply and tastefully decorated for the occasion by Mr. John N. Champion.

The year is signalized by an earnest appeal for aid to the citizens of New Haven and vicinity in behalf of the allied interests of the Hospital, the Training School and the Dispensary. It was

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It is again our privilege to extend thanks to the physicians who have contributed to the course of study by lectures; to members of the medical, surgical and house staff for professional attendance upon the nurses when sick; to the Hospital executive committee, and to Dr. Cox, for kindness and co-operation; to the managers of the city newspapers for courtesies; and to all who by gift of money, time or service have added to the efficiency of the work of the school.

Dr. Cox laid down his office July, the seventeenth. Many improvements and additional conveniences will long show his oversight and his regard for the comfort and well-being of the nurses as well as of the sick, for which we would express our grateful appreciation. To Dr. Hersey, his successor, we extend the welcoming hand.

ANNUAL MEETING October 25, 1920

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

The Connecticut Training School for Nurses from the viewpoint of its Board of Administration shows many features of interest though to a casual observer they may be quite commonplace. The old and the new combine easily and some of the changes if noticed seem but the gradual outgrowth of time. The régime governing the executive committee in procedure does not noticeably vary. Monthly business meetings have been held as usual; frequent and regular visits are made by members of the committee to Hospital and School in supervision of the work done by the student nurses; weekly informal "afternoon teas" for the nurses have been given during the Spring months. It is with regret Mrs. Townshend's resignation was accepted, also that of Mrs. Slemons, as she has removed from this city. From the School Staff Miss Clark and Mrs. Ruckel resigned early in the year and are much missed, having won worthy places as class instructors. Miss Daly, Miss Demers and Miss Roop, ward supervisors for upwards of two years, also resigned during the year. New instructors and supervisors have taken up their duties with enthusiasm. We have heard no words but those of commendation of our nurses. They have met the most difficult situations cheerfully and during the influenza epidemic they worked overtime and yielded their recreation hours without complaint. Our nurses shared in the Florence Nightingale centennial celebration with other local nursing organizations, May 12. They carried their part most successfully. Each Training School was represented by its student nurses, graduated staffs and alumnae members in their respective uniforms, the school banner being borne in advance of each group. The C. T. S. banner was generously contributed by Mrs. Bumstead. A pleasant accompaniment of

the event was the presentation to the School by Miss Susan E. Daggett of a picture of Florence Nightingale, showing her seated on the porch at Scutari, Constantinople. The picture is rare, there being few copies. It is highly valued by the nurses and commands the best light and most conspicuous place in the parlor of their home.

The events of graduation week were of a high order. Prof. Weigle gave the Baccalaureate sermon. The Monday following the committee remembered its annual function and invited the class to an "afternoon tea," which was followed by planting the class ivy. Class Day occurred on Tuesday and was observed with a class supper, a class history and a class prophecy. Wednesday, May 19, occurred the exercises of graduation. Dr. Carmalt presided and Miss Isabel M. Stewart gave the address "Tradition and Ideals of Nursing." A class song was rendered by the class, which numbered twenty-four.

This year finds the Vassar camp students of two years ago graduate nurses. Dean Mills arranged for a reunion of these students and invited Training School superintendents who had admitted them to join them as guests of Vassar College. While the occasion was wholly delightful, it was instructive as well. Dean Mills thereby showed his genuine interest in the Vassar plan and pointed the way by which educationally prepared young woman may satisfactorily enter the field of nursing.

Hallowe'en, Thanksgiving and Christmas have each had its festivities planned by the nurses themselves, though they acknowledge with thanks the interest and help of members of the committee. Other non-festival days have had their pleasures and when time and opportunity allowed more formal dancing parties were arranged.

Theater parties have been planned through the courtesy of the Shubert management and tickets to Prof. Jepson's organ recitals have been provided. The nurses have often expressed their thanks for such favors. They are pleased to receive again a local paper for which a subscription has just been made by a friend and also the Atlantic Monthly by another friend.

The value of Recreation Cottage is recognized by its absence. "Rosemary" passed into other hands which forbade the renewal of the lease. We may well believe the health conditions have suffered in consequence. Four houses beside the central Home within the Hospital grounds afford accommodations for the nurses, each with a competent chaperon, and each with distinctive attractions and comforts. Miss Stannard still serves most graciously and faithfully.

Greater publicity has been given this year to the need of an enlarged nursing force. Advertisements have been placed in Connecticut papers and many hundred folders have been distributed throughout New England and other sections of the United States and Canada.

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The American Nurses' Association which has a membership of 50,000 met at Atlanta, Georgia, April 9-17. More than 2,500 nurses were in attendance. Miss Landis was privileged to be of the number and reports it all so worth while. Connecticut sent thirty-four representatives, seven of them from our own school. To radiate the enthusiasm and inspiration they received is their golden opportunity.

The new plan of having the Dispensary and Hospital under the same Medical Staff unifies their respective facilities. The nursing service is largely assigned to the Connecticut Training School with a supervisor for the instruction as well as for the service rendered. It has been said that a good Training School includes Dispensary, Hospital, Visiting Nursing and Social Service Training in its course, so that the students may see the whole picture of disease and distress, health and comfort, the abnormal and the normal.

The survey of events of any year of our history brings before us anew many acts of courtesy and helpfulness from the public and the circle with which we have most to do, the Hospital executive committee, the Hospital medical staff, the office staff, the superintendent and others who show a kindly interest in our work or our recreation. To these we again speak our grateful appreciation.

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

ANNUAL MEETING October 24, 1921

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

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The names, Mrs. Otto G. Ramsay and Mrs. Lewis S. Pitkin were added to the list of our executive committee the first of the year and these ladies have been most helpful along special lines. In mid-year we were fortunate to secure the return of Mr. Thomas W. Farnam to our number with his cordial co-operation and wish to be of service. Mrs. Bumstead, chairman, had been absent since June, 1920, but her return was welcomed October 4. Mrs. Winchester Bennett acted as chairman, and upon her retirement from the office received from the committee hearty thanks for her most acceptable service. Mrs. Winternitz was elected a member of the committee in March.

During the year the personnel of the staff has had many changes. Miss Landis, superintendent of nurses, was called to a like position in the Leland Stanford University, San Francisco, California. She decided to accept it and so informed the committee May 10. A special meeting was called to consider the situation and the committee voted to accept her resignation with many thanks for her conspicuous and laborious efforts to promote the uplift and growth of the school. We read in the Pacific Coast Journal of Nursing that "Miss Landis was welcomed at the meeting of Lane Hospital Alumnae Association, and at the close of the business an informal reception was held and a basket of California flowers presented her." Miss Dorothy M. Tarbox, assistant, was made acting superintendent of nurses. Miss Tarbox of the Massachusetts General Hospital came to us more than two years since and we are glad to note here that she has fulfilled the promise of her first entrance upon her official duties. Miss Bruse we can hardly fail to mention as she has been our support in the operating room service for a long period round-

ure to mention. The refrigerator for the Kennedy appeared at an opportune time; the completion of the equipment of the new tennis court was much appreciated; a floor lamp with mahogany standard, several large pictures and two jardinieres, add to the home-like appearance of the assembly room in the Davenport: a large shapely tree, wreaths, garlands, table decorations, helped make Christmas merry for the nurses, and tickets have been provided them for the Prof. Parker musical concert, the Glee Club concert and Wellesley entertainment, Mary Garden concert, Jepson concerts, and Joseph Hislop concert Easter evening.

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The week opening May 15 is known as Commencement week. A formal party was given the preceding evening. The baccalaureate sermon was preached in Trinity church by Dr. Scoville, with the full Sunday evening service. The usual Tea was given the class by the executive committee followed by planting the Ivy. The freedom of an entire day known as class day was accorded them. The class dinner was served at the Taft.

Mr. Martin T. Cornwall, Yale 1916, was much interested during his stay here in the New Haven Hospital, its wards and its nursing. To stimulate competition and enthusiasm in the student group, he offered a silver prize which took the form of a loving cup to be given to the best student of the graduating class. This offer was accepted gladly. Judges were appointed and everything in line to carry out the wishes of Mr. Cornwall. This explains a new number in the Commencement program.

Commencement was May 18, and the services were held in Sprague Memorial Hall. Twenty-three nurses constituted the graduating class. Miss Jessie Myrtle McFadden was the happy winner of the cup, which was presented before the company assembled amid great applause. The program of the evening opened with music by the Yale University Orchestra followed by the processional. The favorite hymn of Florence Nightingale, "The Son of God goes forth to war," was sung and Dr. Scoville offered prayer. Dr. Joseph B. Howland, Superintendent of Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, gave the address, which followed along Hospital lines but in an unusual spirited way. Mrs. Oliver rendered "Happy Song" accompanied by Mrs. Baldwin. The friends of the graduates greeted them quite informally as they left the hall.

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ing out her thirteenth year as supervisor in Farnam Operating Room. The entire number of supervisors is six. Occupying other important positions are three instructors and twelve head nurses.

In December the Connecticut Training School was included in an invitation given by Mrs. Osborne of the Bellevue Hospital Board to a dinner complimentary to members of thirty Hospital and Training School Boards with their superintendents. Miss Wilson of Chicago, a member of the Children's Memorial Hospital Board, was asked to open the discussion upon the publicity that has been given Nursing by the Central Council of Nursing Education in that part of the country. This council is establishing standards of nursing education to which twenty-two Hospitals and Training Schools in seven states near Chicago have subscribed. Great interest was shown in the discussion and a committee was appointed. In case any plan is perfected along the line mentioned, it was asked by our representative that the Connecticut Training School be considered an applicant for membership in the council.

The survey of the Rockefeller Commission was made January 2-9. The two representatives showed their satisfaction in the housing of the students, their meals, and the content of the instruction given. They were pleased with the interest taken in the school by members of the Training School Board and were gratified with the tentative plan of affiliation with Yale University put into such definite form by Dr. Winternitz. "A 'School for Nurses, Yale University' could satisfy the highest requirements in nursing education." Does this saying forecast the future? The formal report came some weeks later and was thought to be a very fair and honest report. As we all know our own good points they were not mentioned which left the matter chiefly critical, therefore disappointing.

Tentative plans for a recruiting campaign were made in January and were in a growing and active state far into the Spring. Immediate results in the way of nurse applicants were not outwardly observed but a general interest in nursing and health were apparent and twenty-five probationers entered in September. It is possible that some of these were inspired in their purpose to enter upon this work by the Spring campaign.

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The members of the class on the eve of graduation made for themselves a most honorable place by a gift of \$25 to the Alumnae Association as the foundation of an Endowment Fund.

Re-union Commencement week was greatly enjoyed by one hundred and seventy-five alumnae. The program was well planned and embraced short speeches by the graduates representing different lines of service. Dr. Winternitz explained the proposed School for Nurses. Dr. Hersey described the building program.

Hallowe'en was celebrated as usual, the nurses making merry among themselves with a program short but to the point, while Hallowe'en decorations lent a witching spell.

A Thanksgiving party was enjoyed in due time. For both those parties ice cream was provided by a member of our committee.

The custom of singing carols in the wards by the nurses early Christmas morning is not allowed to lapse. The chorus was happily increased this year by the voices of the house doctors.

At the Christmas party the seniors were hostesses. They put on "The Birds' Christmas Carol" cleverly arranged by one of their own members and one gave a Christmas solo dance. The home talent was supplemented by Mrs. Wallace of White Plains giving five solo dances representing in costume, the Irish Boy, the Irish Lassie, the Maid of 1860, the Spanish Dancer and the Russian Maiden. Mrs. McClure, with great charm, sang between the numbers and all were delighted. Mrs. Louis Hemingway accompanied both artists. A profusion of thanks was awarded these friends.

This full account is the more justified as we learn that the Modern Hospital Magazine considers the subject of enough importance to ask for a description of our School's Christmas customs. Representatives of the senior and intermediate classes replied to the inquiry.

Mrs. Degermark, recreational director of Community Service, offered her help for a while during the winter to teach our students how to play and to get into the spirit of class competition and school loyalty. She directed some gymnasium work and folk dancing and seemed glad of this recreational opportunity.

Average number of patients 189 per day. Average number of nurses per day 69. With a record each day of patients and nurses caring for them and an average for the month we are able to determine the average for the year which is 189.6.

We record with sorrow the death, January 5, of Sarah Fisher, class of 1922, after an illness of five days. Her home was in Branford and being near by her family consisting of father and mother and sister, were able to be with her. We proffer them our sympathy and pay tribute to Miss Fisher's fine qualities as a young woman and as a nurse.

It is with some difficulty nurses are spared for training with the Visiting Nurse Association but thus far the coveted privilege has been enjoyed for each six weeks by at least one nurse, to the mutual benefit of the Association and the School.

The friendly feeling always existing between the Hospital and the School has developed into a yet closer co-operation with the same interests more clearly defined and acted upon. Still closer affiliation with Yale University is in process of evolution. The interest in the School by instructors from the Yale School of Medicine is considered a great asset and we feel greatly indebted to the teachers for their service. We recall many favors during the year from the Hospital Board of Directors, the Hospital Staff and many others who have proved friends. To all these we return our thanks.

ITEMS OF INFORMATION

The Connecticut Training School for Nurses offers a three years' course of training to high school and private school graduates, or to those with educational equivalent. For candidates with satisfactory scientific preparation, who have had two or more years of college or university work, credit may be applied, shortening the three years' course.

The three years are divided into Preliminary Course, 4 months; Junior Year, 8 months; Intermediate Year, 12 months, and Senior Year, 12 months.

The hours of duty in the wards will be arranged in accordance with the required class work. During the four months of the Preliminary Course, the hours of duty will not average more than five hours daily.

The Connecticut Training School is registered in Connecticut; and in New York, by the University of the State of New York.

While great emphasis is placed on theoretical instruction, it does not overbalance the practical training which the nurses receive in the wards and departments of the New Haven Hospital.

THE COURSE OF STUDY.

The theoretical and practical courses of instruction conform closely to the standard curriculum, prepared by the Educational Committee of the National League of Nursing Education and are recommended by the Dean of the Yale University School of Medicine who appoints the Training School instructors and provides the laboratory facilities when indicated.

The time allotted to the various subjects will be divided between lectures, demonstrations, classes, quizzes, and laboratory work.

The subjects included in the Preliminary Course will be:

Anatomy and Physiology. Applied Chemistry. Bacteriology. Personal Hygiene.

Hospital Housekeeping. Nutrition and Cookery. Drugs and Solutions. Nursing Principles and Practice. Bandaging. Historical, Ethical and Social Basis of Nursing.

The subjects following the Preliminary Course will include:

Materia Medica and Therapeutics. Diet in Disease. Massage. Surgery. Orthopedics. Diseases of the Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat. Operating Room Technic. General Medicine. Communicable Diseases. Occupational, Venereal and Skin Diseases. Nervous and Mental Diseases. Diseases of Infants and Children. Gynecology. Obstetrics.

Public health nursing, social service and other subjects relating to the problems of the several fields of nursing and modern social conditions, will be taken up during the course.

ACT OF INCORPORATION

An act incorporating the Connecticut Training School for Nurses, by the General Assembly, State of Connecticut.

Resolved by this Assembly:

SECTION 1. That Mrs. Noah Porter, Mrs. Theodore Woolsey, Mrs. Charlotte Weatherbee, Mrs. Jeremiah A. Bishop, Mrs. William A. Larned, Mrs. Edwin Harwood, Mrs. B. G. Northrop, Miss Leffingwell, Dr. Francis Bacon, Dr. Moses C. White, Dr. Leonard J. Sanford, Mrs. Samuel Colt, Mrs. John S. Butler, Mrs. George M. Bartholomew, Mrs. James Hadley, Mrs. William Fitch, Mrs. Heman B. Allen, Mrs. Francis Bacon, Hon. Morris Tyler, Mrs. Arthur D. Osborne, Dr. George B. Farnam, Charles H. Thompson, be, and they are hereby constituted, a body politic and corporate under the name of the "Connecticut Training School for Nurses"; and by that name they and their associates and successors shall and may have perpetual succession, may sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, in all the courts of this state and elsewhere; may adopt a common seal, and use and alter the same at pleasure; may take by purchase, gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, and have, hold and enjoy to themselves and their successors, both real and personal estate, of whatever nature; and may sell, grant, alien, invest, use and dispose of the same, and the income thereof, for the uses and purposes hereinafter set forth; provided that the amount of real estate which the corporation shall own shall not exceed in value fifty thousand dollars.

SEC. 2. The objects for which this corporation is hereby created are to train and provide nurses for public institutions and private individuals.

SEC. 3. Said corporation shall have power to elect such officers as it may find convenient, and to make by-laws for the regulation of its affairs, and the disposition of its property; provided, said by-laws are not contrary to the constitution or laws of this State, or of the United States.

SEC. 4. The first meeting of this corporation shall be held within six months after the passage of this act, at such time and place as the first two corporators named herein shall appoint.

SEC. 5. This resolution may be at a by the general assembly.
