Bienvenue à la classe de français 101! Over the next 15 weeks, we will explore the French language together. From learning to count and greet people to talking about your weekend activities, the main goal of this course is to get you speaking French, understanding social practices associated with its diverse communities, and learning how the language is structured. Did you know that there are 40 different countries and territories that speak French? It is also one of the six languages spoken at the United Nations.

Objective: In this course we will spend the year exploring different themes to work towards fluency in French and ease of use, as well as creating a safe environment to make mistakes and get messy. We do not learn a language by having all the right answers, but by trying something new.

Student Learning Objectives:

Successful students will acquire the skills necessary to:

- 1) Understand spoken French within a number of limited social contexts,
- 2) Communicate in French, with some mistakes, in a number of social situations,
- 3) Read basic texts in French,
- 4) To write simple but correct French for a variety of situations,
- 5) Have an elementary understanding of French and Francophone cultures.

Classroom Policies:

Attendance

Coming to class prepared with materials you need for taking notes, your completed assignment, and showing up on time is essential to a successful course! Attendance will be taken regularly and count towards your final grade. Absences may be excused only because of illness, injury verified by a doctor's statement, family emergency, religious observance or an officially documented excuse for a University sponsored activity (e. g. field trips, ASUM service, music or drama performances, and intercollegiate athletics), military service or mandatory public service. More than 4 absences will result in your final grade being lowered by 10% (with an additionaly 5% for each additional absence). Missing more than the equivalent of three weeks of class shall be grounds for an automatic F. Also, tardiness will not be tolerated. Being late 3 times = 1 absence.

Make-up exams

No make-up exams or quizzes will be given without prior arrangements.

Assignments

Students are expected to complete all online assignments, review material covered in class, read the textbooks, prepare activities and complete all written assignments on time. Only homework

assignments completed on time will be given a full grade. Late work will be graded down one letter grade per day, homework later than one week will not be accepted for a grade.

Students should arrive on time and not leave until class is over. Students may use laptop computers, tablets, or phones to take notes and access their course materials. Homework and Essays

Homework will be used as a baseline for the practice, activities, and games we do during class time. Homework can be collected at any time. These assignments will include work from the professor, the book, and the Cengage MindTap platform. Additional Cengage MindTap exercises can be done for extra credit. Short doses of study several times a day are best for becoming skilled in a language. I highly recommend studying the language for a minimum of 40 minutes a day, in 20 minute increments.

Participation & Preparation

Regular and active participation is required of all students and is part of the course grade. You can best learn French by coming to class on a regular basis and being involved in classroom activities. Note that you are not expected to speak perfect French! For many activities, your

participation grade will be based on your willingness to ask questions and your effort to make yourself understood even if you make mistakes. If you are particularly timid and fear that you will have difficulty participating, do not hesitate to contact your instructor. They will be glad to give you suggestions on how to best take advantage of class time. Quizzes will be given most weeks with no exam, and at any time if preparation and participation are not adequate.

Once a month, you will bring in an ITEM OF INTEREST related to current events, history, culture, pop culture, etc. in the Francophone world for a total of 4 items over the course of the semester. Half (7) of your items must be about non- European, Francophone countries and regions (Caribbean, Africa, SE Asia, Canada, Louisiana, etc. FYI-- European French- speaking countries include France, Switzerland, Belgium, Monaco, and Luxembourg). Items must be turned in on Moodle.

Exams: Three-unit exams, a midterm and a final.

There will be four unit exams that cover the grammar, themes, readings, and vocabulary for each part of the semester. Exams will include listening, reading, and writing sections. Each exam with be cumulative for the content taught during that part of the semester (except to the extent that language learning is inherently cumulative).

Oral activities or interviews

Within the units there will be opportunities for an oral assessment with a group, or with the midterm and final there will be an interview exam with the professor.

Quizzes

There will be small quizzes that cover specific vocabulary, grammar point, or theme from the chapter. You can anticipate a quiz on a weekly or bi-weekly basis. Unlike an exam they will only take 5-10minutes.

Extra Credit

There activities in Cengage marked 'practice' these activities can be done to improve overall grade. Additionally, you may ask your professor for some films, tv shows, or other activities that may count towards extra credit.
