Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to begin developing proficiency in Spanish in all four skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing). While grammar topics are covered, the importance of using language for communicative purposes is emphasized. Since acquisition cannot take place without input in the target language, instructors will use Spanish *almost exclusively*.

Learning Outcomes:

The successful student will be able to:

- 1. Understand spoken and written Spanish in the context of common situations and in a basic range of grammatical structures and expressions, specifically, those emphasized in *Portales*.
- 2. Produce comprehensible spoken and written Spanish, including short paragraphs and brief verbal responses to a range of communication topics, also specified by *Portales*.
- 3. Acquire knowledge of the geography, culture and people of regions where Spanish is spoken, as indicated by the cultural units provided in *Portales*.

Your responsibilities in this class:

*Spanish 101 is a cumulative and fast-paced course, therefore, your success in grasping the material presented one week will depend on your having mastered material presented in previous weeks. It is *essential* for you to keep up with the topics covered and assignments. (For those of you with executive function disorder or procrastination tendencies, please see me for assistance.) Do not leave everything for the last minute before a deadline. Succeeding in a language course requires utilizing your organizational skills at their best, and showing up prepared benefits all.

*Keep in mind that any classroom is an artificial simulation of the natural foreign language environment most conducive to learning the target language. To build communicative fluency, you must take responsibility for out of class learning. In addition to completing all assignments on time, we recommend that you read Spanish-language magazines or stories, watch TV/movies/series, or converse with native speakers one to three times weekly. Take every opportunity to use your new skills in Spanish: read bilingual product labels; start a journal in Spanish; write notes and lists to yourself in Spanish; visit a Spanish-speaking country if possible; spend time speaking Spanish outside of class with other students studying Spanish... Above all, make your extra activities fun and incorporate them into your daily life.

Required Class Materials:

• **Textbook:** Blanco, J. *Portales 1*. Only the electronic version is required (eCompanion). We will use the Supersite that contains the ebook and activities. Your textbook is used for both SPNS 101 and 102. You can purchase the access code (or both access code + print copy) at https://vistahigherlearning.com/school/umontana

Homework:

Supersite assignments: Use the CALENDAR tool on the Supersite to find out which assignments are due each week. Although deadlines for <u>Supersite</u> exercises will be at 11:59 PM on Fridays, you are expected to complete assignments every day, and be familiar with the topics covered in class according to the course calendar. Most of the assignments are automatically graded. Be aware of these **weekly deadlines**. **Writing Assignments:** You will be assigned written work at home to bring to the next class. These are opportunities to practice Spanish with the physical act of writing, a crucial practice in language acquisition.

Participation, Preparation, and Attendance:

Preparation: A satisfactory preparation grade assumes that you come to class each day prepared to be actively engaged in all class activities. If you would like to succeed and feel confident in class, I highly recommend that you read over a new grammar point or learn new vocabulary on your own *before* we go over it in class, so that class time can be used to answer questions and practice rather than simply reiterate what is explained in the book. *This also allows you to create a "scaffold" of the content in English before you learn about it in Spanish*. If you are assigned textbook activities, these must be completed prior to class so that you arrive ready to ask questions and review. You should have access to your textbook during class on some portable device..

Participation:

-To receive participation points, students must demonstrate an attentive, alert, and engaged attitude during class as well as respect for others by contributing to a classroom atmosphere conducive to learning. Come prepared so that you are able to comfortably participate in partner and class practice in a manner that befits a university student. You will be graded on a "pass/no pass" basis with most participation assignments or group activities, which I generally choose randomly. Students who demonstrate that they were ready and able to participate will receive full points, provided that they give their best and remain in class throughout the entire activity or assignment.

-Please note that these assignments cannot be made up, so if you miss class and miss these assignments, you will not receive credit for them.

-Be advised that late arrivals, early departures, bathroom breaks, phone breaks etc. will result in a lowered attendance/participation score.

-Electronics: Please mute your cell phone and keep it packed away during class unless specifically requested by the instructor. You may use a laptop or tablet in class *exclusively for Portales access*.

Attendance: Arrive to class on time, and take care of bathroom visits before or after class. Attendance will be recorded daily, typically at the very beginning of class. More than four absences will result in a lower participation grade, as will unexcused late arrivals or early departures. If you miss class, it is YOUR responsibility to check Moodle or contact a classmate to learn what you missed. Lessons, interactions, conversations and discussions in class are impossible to make up, which is why it is crucial to be in class every day. Find an accountability partner now. Exchange contact information with at least two other classmates for this purpose.

Four absences or fewer are allowed for personal use/illness and considered perfect attendance (100%;) you will want to "spend" them wisely. If you become ill with COVID or another serious illness, please contact your instructor as soon as possible; we make exceptions for reasonable health complications. Quizzes:

There will be frequent quizzes on the material covered in each of the lessons. All electronic devices (including smart watches) must be packed away for the duration of the quiz. Bathroom breaks, baseball caps, or hats with visors are strictly prohibited.

One missed quiz is allowed <u>if you contact me prior to the quiz with an excuse I find acceptable</u>. In most cases the subsequent quiz grade will be entered in the grade book in place of the missed quiz grade, however, you might also be to make up certain quizzes should you prefer; some may not have that option.

Midterm & Final Exams:

There will be two exams: Midterm and Final. For official UM-sanctioned absences, you must take the exam before the exam date; there will be no makeup exams for absences without official UM status. All electronic devices (including smart watches) must be packed away for the duration of the exam. Again, baseball caps or hats with visors are strictly prohibited and cannot be worn during any of the exams. Bathroom breaks are not allowed during exams.

Oral Final Exam:

There will be one final interview with your instructor toward the end of the semester. More details will be provided in class.
