EDITORIAL COMMENT

Once, not long ago, a town would fight attempts to build any bypassing highways around the town. Today, with traffic so heavy on our area highways, we often invite a bypass highway to relieve local traffic.

We've noted traffic along Rt. 422. All reports indicate that we have one of the most heavily traveled roads in the Commonwealth here. Because many of us live and work along this highway, we can personally verify the fact that vehicle traffic does increase year by year.

Collegeville has a problem in Evansburg. controlling the traffic over the week-ends when sometimes sudden spurts of extra-heavy traffic backs up along Rt. 422 and Rt.

This points to one obvious solution to us—we do need some kind of additional facilities to help relieve local traffic. A bypass route is not particularly desirable to us. But another solution may be possible.



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

The big danger of world domination may not be from Communists after all, but rather from machines. The newspapers report, for example, that an IBM machine which had been taught to play checkers by a company scientist was biting the hand that fed it the feedback and was roundly beating its teacher every time they faced each other across a checkerboard. What is even more ominous, the machine was improving with every game, and the beatings it was giving its benefactor grew steadily worse. With machines invading so many different fields, nobody knows where it all will end-or whether the machines, in their increasing wisdom, will want it to end. Already today machines project election returns, solve all sorts of mathematical problems, regulate cooking, feed livestock and milk cows. Machines keep

books and send you bills. They are handling, in far less time than human beings take, hundreds of jobs in households. in factories, in businesses and on farms. To some of us old-fashioned human beings, whose checker games never improve, who sometimes let the potatoes burn and add up our check stubs wrong, all this is somewhat frightening. We sometimes wonder if machines are not getting a little too big for their britches. But we don't say this aloud in the hearing of any machines. After all they already now know how to slaughter animals—and a machine ambitious enough to improve his checker game might look for more challenging victims. No, we'll be very polite to machines, and hope for some warmth in their little mechanical hearts.

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
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
