

| THE MACE | Traditionally, the ceremonial mace represents the authority vested in the highest officer of a governing body. In an educational institution, the authority symbolized by the mace derives from respect for the authority of knowledge and for the rights and value of the individual. Thus, the leader of an academic community assumes the obligation and challenge to ensure for its members a climate conducive to growth in knowledge and grace. The construction of the ceremonial mace of Loma Linda University evokes further ideas. Its two metals, bronze and aluminum, suggest the value of lessons both ancient and contemporary. Rather than lying prone, an instrument to be wielded, this mace stands upright in celebration of the free human spirit. Its open construction implies free exposure to questions, ideas, and conflict. The eight vertical supporting elements (at three points bound together as for strength and stability in unity) uphold a graceful oval that points outward to the universe, the province of inquiry. Within the oval, the University seal appears to float unfettered. The staff of Aesculapius on the left represents all fields of the healing arts and sciences. The Christian cross acknowledges the role of Jesus Christ as Savior and Redeemer. The open book symbolizes God the Word as the basis for all truth. The lighted torch suggests the illuminating power of knowledge and the University's central purpose of forwarding and perpetuating good through the enlightened, searching, caring mind and conscience of the individual. Carrying the University mace and batons, the University head marshal and associate marshals precede the president's party, members of the board, LLUH corporate officers, faculty of the school, and candidates for degrees. |

Significance of Academic Regalia

ORIGINS

of Coimbra in 1321 required that all "Doctors, Licentiates, and Bachelors" wear gowns. In England, in the second half of the fourteenth century, the statutes of certain colleges forbade "excess in apparel" and prescribed the wearing of a long gown. In the days of Henry VIII of England, Oxford and Cambridge first began prescribing a definite academic dress. The assignment of colors to signify certain faculties was to be a much later development—in the late nineteenth century—and one that was to be standardized only in the United States. European institutions have always had great diversity in their specifications of academic dress. In contrast, American colleges and universities opted for a definite system that all might follow. The American Council on Education periodically reviews and updates the code for academic costumes for American universities.

The origins of academic dress date back to the twelfth and thirteenth centuries. The ordinary dress of the scholar,

whether student or teacher, was the dress of a cleric. Long gowns were worn and may have been necessary for warmth in unheated buildings. A statute of the University

Gowns for the bachelor's or master's degree are untrimmed. For the doctor's degree, the gown is faced down the front with black velvet; three bars of velvet are used across the sleeves. These facings or crossbars may be of velvet of the color distinctive of the discipline to which the degree pertains. Red, one of the traditional colors of the church, went to theology. Green, the color of medieval herbs, was adopted for medicine; and olive, because it was so close to green, was given to pharmacy. Golden yellow, standing for the wealth that scientific research has produced, was assigned to the sciences.

The hoods are lined with the official color or colors of the college or university conferring the degree; more than one color is shown by division of the field color in a variety of ways. The color of the binding or edging of the hood indicates the subject to which the degree pertains.

The Good Samaritan

The Good Samaritan, the four-figure sculpture located on the mall of Loma Linda University, is a representation of the parable told by Jesus in Luke 10:30–37. Sculpted by Alan Collins, and dedicated and unveiled at Loma Linda University May 31, 1981, it speaks eloquently of the compassionate practice of the healing arts and of our mission—"to continue the teaching and healing ministry of Jesus Christ"—and of the motto of this health sciences University—"To make man whole."

The Good Samaritan has been incorporated into the diploma as a screened background since 2006.



University History Highlights







Loma Linda University is part of the Seventh-day Adventist system of higher education that adheres to and promotes its vision—"Transforming lives through education, health care, and research"—and its motto—"To make man whole."

Loma Linda University traces its beginnings back to 1905, when—through a series of divine providences the University, starting as a nurses' training school, was founded at Loma Linda, California, by the Seventh-day Adventist Church. The School of Nursing began in 1905. In 1909, the College of Medical Evangelists received its charter as a medical school with the express purpose of preparing physicians who could meet the needs of the whole person. Both schools emphasized the need for healthful living as a part of medical care—a revolutionary concept in 1905.

The University has steadily expanded its programs to meet the demands of a global environment. The original schools—Nursing and Medicine—have been joined by the Schools of Allied Health Professions, Behavioral Health, Dentistry, Pharmacy, Public Health, and Religion; and the Faculty of Graduate Studies. All the school programs are accredited by their respective accrediting bodies.

- 1997 Loma Linda University and Medical Center corporately linked together through Loma Linda University Adventist Health Sciences Center—LLUAHSC
- 2002 School of Pharmacy
- 2003 School of Science and Technology (restructured as School of Behavioral Health in 2012)
- 2005 LLU centennial celebration
- 2007 School of Religion
- 2015 Corporation name changed from Loma Linda University Adventist Health Sciences Center (LLUAHSC) to Loma Linda University Health (LLUH)

Today the original 1905 property is part of an expanding health sciences campus operated under the jurisdiction of Loma Linda University Health—which includes six Loma Linda University-named medical facilities: Medical Center, Children's Hospital, Medical Center-East Campus, Surgical Hospital, Behavioral Medicine Center, and Medical Center-Murrieta; ten LLUH institutes; three LLUH-related research centers; and various school-related research centers.

After more than a century of service, the University remains committed to the vision of its founders and is sustained by its close association with the Seventh-day Adventist Church. The University is recognized as a leader in the field of health sciences education, research, and service—locally and internationally.

Through divine providence and guidance, Loma Linda University continues to fulfill its mission: To prepare health professionals to continue the teaching and healing ministry of the Master Teacher and Great Physician, Jesus Christ.

James Appel—Global Service Award

B.A. Southern Adventist University 1996 M.D. Loma Linda University 2000 Family practice residency, Ventura County Medical Center 2003 A powerful testimony to Loma Linda University's unflinching commitment to and sustained engagement in global service, Dr. James Appel has been in mission service since 2004. He commenced medical work at the Béré Adventist Hospital, helping to revive a struggling district hospital and convert it into a reference with patients from all over the country fondly calling him "A Friend of the Place." He and his wife, Sarah, are spearheading a new Adventist Health International (AHI) project, the Eco-Dome Hospital, built from Cal-Earth super adobe technology in Eastern Tchad near the Sudanese border.

In 2009, Dr. Appel helped organize and establish the Moundou Adventist Surgery Center, one of only two hospitals in Tchad's second largest city serving a region with a population of 500,000. In 2009, he was appointed director of the Baraka Adventist Hospital project in Abougoudam in Eastern Tchad near the Sudanese border. Moving there in 2011, Dr. Appel was the facility's sole doctor for two years and served as a consultant and liaison for the founding of the Adventist Dental Clinic in N'Djamena, Tchad's capital.

At the height of the Ebola epidemic in 2014, Dr. Appel spent six weeks volunteering at the Cooper Adventist Hospital in Monrovia, Liberia—one of only two hospitals providing medical care for the entire city.

Possessing a deep passion for sharing his knowledge and expertise, Dr. Appel has authored four books: *Nasara*: *Dispatches from a District Hospital in Tchad; Ebola-iculous: a Physician Encounters the Ebola Capital of the World; Children of the East: the Spiritual Heritage of Islam in the Bible;* and *Messiah: the Jesus of the Qur'an and the Gospels.*

Facing mission service challenges, Dr. Appel has been blessed with family support—his wife, Sarah Andersen, a Danish nurse he met at the Béré Adventist Hospital; and their children—Miriam, Noah, and Isak. Currently, Dr. Appel and his family are self-supporting volunteers for AHI's Tchad and Guinebor II Hospital, located near his farm on the outskirts of N'Djamena. He directs the Moundou Adventist Surgery Center and Baraka Adventist Hospital, Abougoudam, and serves on the board of AHI in Tchad.

For his exemplary, unselfish service and leadership and significant contributions to the international community enhancing our mission, "to continue the teaching and healing ministry of Jesus Christ," Loma Linda University Health honors Dr. James Appel with the *GLOBAL SERVICE AWARD*. This award will be presented to him at the Conferring of Degrees for the School of Medicine.

Dr. David Beach Cotton is the founder, president, and chief executive officer of Meridian, a family-owned, familyoperated group of health plans —the largest Medicaid managed-care organization in Michigan and Illinois. Meridian was created through a merger of two plans— Central Michigan Health Plan (CMHP) and American Preferred Provider Plan of Michigan (APPPM), which ultimately became operational as Health Plan of Michigan in May 1999.

Dr. Cotton's vision of providing high quality health care prompted the expansion of the Meridian healthcare entities from 1,400 members in 1997 to more than 900,000 today; and his extensive health-care experience and knowledge help Meridian maintain its rating as an excellent, nationally-recognized health plan.

Professionally, Dr. Cotton is one of the nation's leading specialists in maternal fetal medicine. A diligent scholar, he has generously shared his knowledge and expertise through research funded by major companies, including Pfizer, Glaxo, Healthdyne, Inc., the American Heart Association, the American Edwards Laboratories, and the University of Texas Biomedical Grant. To date, he has published 176 peer-reviewed papers, 38 book chapters, 6 books or symposia, and 226 abstracts. His thirty years of experience as a high-risk obstetrician/gynecologist and his dedication to excellence and innovation propelled Dr. Cotton into numerous leadership positions at prestigious hospitals and teaching institutions. Most recently, preceding Meridian, he served as the obstetrician-gynecologist-inchief of the Detroit Medical Center and as professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Wayne State University.

Upon graduating, Ms. Darling worked for five years in the Portland operating room before becoming Operating Room (OR) staff nurse at Loma Linda Sanitarium and Hospital, now Loma Linda University Medical Center (LLUMC).

Upon earning the master's degree in 1960, Ms. Darling was appointed supervisor of the LLUMC operating room, where she performed her responsibilities faithfully, and was active in the local chapter of the Association of Operating Room Nurses, serving as its president for three consecutive years.


As OR nurse and administrator, Ms. Darling was privileged to witness significant milestones in the early years of LLUMC's operation. In 1967, she presided over a move of the operating rooms from the hospital on the hill to the current facility. Under her watch, many first-time surgical procedures were performed at LLUMC, including open-heart surgery, transplants, separation of conjoined twins, and the Baby Fae baboon heart transplant.

A strict but loving supervisor who set and modeled high standards of performance, Ms. Darling combined a firm "old school" style with a sweet, positive, and inspiring influence on those she led. Her sense of humor and special care for everyone she worked with endeared her to the OR staff from the senior surgeons and anesthesiologists to the housekeepers.

Not ready for a rocking chair retirement, Ms. Darling continues to work three days a week in the operating room, exuding her usual air of excellence, diligence, and kindness.

Wolff M. Kirsch-Distinguished Investigator Award



Professor of Neurosurgery and Basic Sciences

Kirsch—scholar, neurosurgeon, and mentor—was born and educated in St. Louis, Missouri. He currently serves as director of the Neurosurgery Center for Research, Training, and Education that was established at Loma Linda University in 1998 after the United States Surgical Tyco Healthcare Group selected the University as a center for surgical excellence site, supported by a \$2.1 million grant.

During his distinguished career, Dr. Kirsch has been instrumental in obtaining \$10 million in research grants. He has also secured more than forty United States and international patents based on discoveries resulting from his research efforts, including a microfibrillar, high molecular weight chitosan-based textile that can be used as a hemostat; and the iron-regulating protein-2 (irp-2) as a diagnostic for neurodegenerative diseases including, but not limited to, Alzheimer's disease. He has investigated wide applications of the nonpenetrating, arcuate-legged clip for both open and laparoscopic wound closure and, in collaboration with the University of Colorado Boulder Chemistry Department, has identified two new amino acids in nature (β -carboxyglycine and α -carboxyaspartate). In addition, he has published nearly 200 papers in refereed journals.

Prior to his current position—in his capacities as professor of neurosurgery since 1989, and as chief and program director of the University's neurosurgery division in the School of Medicine (1995-1998); Dr. Kirsch mentored a host of graduate and medical students, finding particular satisfaction in their pursuit of noteworthy scholarship, publications, and ongoing careers in biomedical research.

For his invaluable contributions to academic and research excellence and the development of experimental and clinical microsurgery, which have promoted this institution's mission, "to continue the teaching and healing ministry of Jesus Christ," Loma Linda University Health recognizes and honors Dr. Wolff M. Kirsch with the *DISTINGUISHED INVESTIGATOR AWARD*. This award will be presented to him at the Conferring of Degrees for the School of Medicine.

Dr. Lee first served as assistant professor, associate professor, then later as chair of the LLU Psychology Department on the La Sierra campus (1976-1983). He has served LLU School of Public Health in leadership, research, classroom instruction, and community outreach for the past two decades. He has also been the primary methodologist and data analyst in studies on a variety of health-related research conducted in Peru, Saudi Arabia, Nigeria, China, and the Philippines. His research on the effects of early skin-to-skin contact on breast feeding was chosen as the best paper of 2010 by the *Journal of Human Lactation*.

Dr. Lee also served as the primary methodologist employing structural equation modeling in several recently published studies on religion and health. He also participated in research funded by the National Institute of Health (NIH), and is currently principal investigator for a research study on the biological and health effects of religious belief and practice originally financed through a grant from the NIH National Institute of Aging. Author of more than 100 studies published in peer-reviewed journals, he has also served as chair and member of over 100 Doctor of Public Health dissertation committees and has participated in collaborative research with faculty from other LLU schools and departments.

As military combat medic and clinical specialist, Dr. Lee received commendation from the US Army for his work with lower extremity amputees—mostly Vietnamese. He had become an agnostic in college, but a fellow soldier and his readings from C. S. Lewis convinced him that one could be intellectually honest and still be a Christian. A turning point in his life came later when he joined the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

After passing the California Registered Nursing board examinations, he served as a nurse at LLU Medical Center (LLUMC) where he met Verna Lynn Walker, his wife. In 1981 his daughter Valinda Mae was born at LLUMC. Dr. Lee believes that since it was at LLU where he was born, where he met his wife, and held his first major job; he would like to live out his days at LLU.

For his significant contributions in the field of research and for exemplary service and leadership that promote our motto, "to make man whole," Loma Linda University Health honors Dr. Jerry Winfield Lee with the *DISTINGUISHED INVESTIGATOR AWARD*. This award will be presented to him at the Conferring of Degrees for the School of Public Health.

Throughout his career, Elder Lemon has modeled faithful stewardship and effective financial leadership in various positions—as union auditor, conference and division treasurer, under-treasurer, and treasurer of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists for fifteen years (from 2000 to his retirement in 2015). He shares his expertise and guidance with more than a dozen boards, including those of Loma Linda University (LLU) and the LLU Medical Center; and currently serves as finance committee chair for both LLUH entities.

Born in Bigobo Mission, Shaba, Democratic Republic of Congo, he spent his first fourteen years primarily in Africa with his missionary parents.

After completing undergraduate studies and serving two years in the US Army, Elder Lemon accepted an accounting position with Hackettstown Community Hospital in New Jersey, where he experienced the financial challenges of a fledgling hospital. In 1985, he returned to North America to serve as director of financial records at Andrews University. After earning the master's degree in business administration, he was elected treasurer of the Alberta Conference and the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada.

Dorothy N. Nelson-University Alumna of the Year

Special Commendation from the Commanding General of the Philippine Air Force Presidential Commendation, United States Surgeon General Dorothy N. Nelson, "flying nurse of the Philippines," has dedicated herself to humanitarian service. Seeking to reach people in need, the then 45-year-old secured a pilot's license and flew countless missions to remote areas in the Philippines. Her transpacific flight in a twinengine Piper Aztec (Oakland to Manila) earned her a special commendation by the Commanding General of the Philippine Air Force, who subsequently provided free fuel for her mission flights. Her book, *Mayday Over the Arctic*, relates the story of a shy little girl who dreamed of becoming a flying missionary and experienced a miraculous rescue after a crash on an ice floe in the Arctic.

After twenty years of mission service in the Far East, Mrs. Nelson completed the Master of Public Health degree at Loma Linda University and then served as clinical health educator and nurse for the Department of Preventive Medicine. She was also a professor and director of nursing at South China Union College, and director of Weimar Institute's NEWSTART Outpatient Program. Her work as a health educator for programs on smoking and health in California earned her a Presidential Commendation through the United States Surgeon General.

In the Philippines, Mrs. Nelson created *Health Expo*, a versatile and integrated health program for the Seventhday Adventist Church. She shared *Health Expo's* message of total health and wholeness in North and South America, India, Nepal, Africa, Papua New Guinea, the Solomon Islands, the Caribbean, Micronesia, Indonesia, the Philippines, Europe, Central Asia, China, and the former Soviet Union.

After her husband, Wilbur Nelson, died in China in 1996, Mrs. Nelson continued his work with *It Is Written* as the China project coordinator. Collaborating with the Chinese government, she coordinated health presentations for television programs featuring Mark Finley that aired throughout China. In 2010, she joined the Loma Linda/ Griggs University satellite programs for five years in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, teaching respiratory therapy to a selected group of young women. Mrs. Nelson recently completed the *Little Ellen Library*, a book series for children.

For her exemplary service and commitment to this health sciences institution's mission, "to continue the teaching and healing ministry of Jesus Chrsit," Loma Linda University recognizes Dorothy N. Department of Occupational Therapy—Community Engagement Award

School of Allied Health Professions



The Department of Occupational Therapy (DOT) of the School of Allied Health Professions (SAHP) has embraced the community as an essential classroom for student learning. The DOT began interweaving community engagement as an integral component of its curricula in 2002. Originally built into its professional portfolio, community engagement has progressed as an intentional component of the curricula at all levels. The program provides opportunity for collaborative work between faculty and students, and a partnership with twenty-five local community organizations.

Major DOT program initiatives that positively impact the community include (1) Gentle Care Guest Home, Loma Linda, a weekly program designed to increase quality of life for patients with dementia and chronic conditions; (2) Westside Kinship Support Services, San Bernardino, which aims to increase attention, improve self-esteem, regulate emotion and self-expression of children ages 1-11; and (3) Inland Caregiver Resource Center, Colton/San Bernardino/ High Desert, for both care recipients and caregivers.

The SAHP DOT's passion for community service continues through additional partnership programs: the Legacy Building Project in collaboration with the LLUMC Palliative Care Center, the Interdisciplinary Community Outreach Clinic (ICOC), San Bernardino County Preschool Services (Family Literacy Program), and collaborative activities with Altus Academy, the Option House, Yvonne Harmon Elementary School, Blue Mountain Senior Villas, Poplar Street Apartments, and Inland Regional Center. In addition to instilling Christian values, these community initiatives have resulted in the establishment of clinical sites, as well as presentations at the regional and national levels.

In recognition of the DOT's significant contributions to the community and the promotion of this institution's mission, "to continue the teaching and healing ministry of Jesus Christ," Loma Linda University Health names the Department of Occupational Therapy recipient of the *COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AWARD*. 
The generosity of the tribe has been expressed in many ways, including funding for innovative programs at the Behavioral Medicine Center; being the founding sponsor of PossAbilities; enabling world-class care through the Children's Hospital, and establishing the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians Oncology Center and a Biospecimen Laboratory, so pivotal to the LLU Cancer Center's fight against cancer.



He is the director of Loma Linda University's (LLU) Center for Christian Bioethics, and is a faculty of the School of Religion. Prior to his present administrative role, Dr. Winslow was the founding director of the LLU Institute for Health and Policy Leadership. He also served as vice president for mission and culture, and as vice president for spiritual life for Loma Linda University Medical Center; and chair and dean of the LLU Faculty of Religion.

Recognized for his excellent scholarship in ethics and religion, Dr. Winslow has served as a visiting scholar at Cambridge University, the University of Virginia, and the University of Tübingen (Germany). He has also presented papers at university seminars and professional assemblies throughout North America as well as in Australia, Europe, Russia, Africa, and Asia. For more than forty years, he has specialized in teaching and writing about ethics, especially in the biomedical area. His published books include Triage and Justice (University of California Press) and Facing Limits (edited with James Walters) from Westview Press. He has also published in academic journals, such as the Western Journal of Medicine, the Journal of Pediatrics, the Hastings Center Report, the Journal of Medicine and Philosophy, and General Dentistry. At present, he is studying the intersection of social ethics and health policy.

In addition to his published works, Dr. Winslow has shared his expertise as a member of several prestigious professional associations, including the American Society for Dental Ethics, the American Society for Bioethics and the Humanities, the Society of Christian Ethics, and the California Technology Assessment Forum, a public venue for the evaluation of new health-care technologies. He has served as a consultant in biomedical ethics for major health-care systems and for research conducted by pharmaceutical companies.

Professor Winslow is married to Dr. Betty Wehtje Winslow, a research methods and community health nursing professor at LLU School of Nursing. The couple has two daughters— Lisa, a computer software engineer and Angela, an occupational therapist.

The oldest son of a working class Adventist family, Dr. Zuccarelli attended a high school in Yonkers that excelled in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) education. His pursuit of biology was nurtured by a teacher who assigned reading in scientific journals, exposing her students to recent discoveries: the generation of ATP in the Krebs cycle, the horizontal transfer of genetic material between bacteria, and the structure of DNA.

Arriving at Loma Linda University (LLU) was a life changer for Dr. Zuccarreli as he grappled with questions about God and science. He spent almost as much time in religion courses, especially classes taught by Dr. Graham Maxwell, as he did in the microbiology academic program. With five School of Medicine faculty members, he helped develop the Medical Scientist Program—serving as director from 1991 to 2006 that integrated a Ph.D. program with the Doctor of Medicine degree. In 2006, he was appointed dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies and associate vice president for Research Affairs.

During his almost forty years at LLU, Dr. Zuccarelli has contributed to the University's graduate education and the development of a vigorous research culture. An indefatigable researcher, he has been a resource person for significant professional symposia and seminars worldwide while guiding many graduate students. In 1986 his focus moved from DNA replication to tracking the spread of methicillin-resistant *Staphylococcus aureus* (MRSA) strains in the LLU Medical Center by analyzing the plasmids (accessory DNA molecules) they contained. This study opened a rich field of investigation, because the rapid increase of antibiotic resistance represented a significant clinical threat. A significant finding of this study is that most antibiotic traits imposed a burden on the cells they inhabited, causing them to grow more slowly than did the same bacteria without resistant genes.

Dr. Zuccarelli anticipates an active retirement in Southern California and greater opportunities to enjoy his family especially the five grandchildren he plans to pamper.

In recognition of his exemplary leadership and invaluable contributions to the University's academic program, and for encouraging a strong, productive research environment, Loma Linda University names Dr. Anthony Joseph Zuccarelli recipient of the *DISTINGUISHED UNIVERSITY SERVICE AWARD*. Dissertation: Surviving in the Tumor Microenvironment

Metabolic disturbances in Schwann cells (SC) have recently emerged as the primary cause of demyelination and peripheral neuropathy, a painful disease afflicting approximately 20 million people in the US. Lipotoxicity, or lipid overload, is the most injurious metabolic disturbance—leading to SC dysfunction and, consequently, to demyelination and neuropathy. However, while fatty acids like palmitic acid (PA) lead to disease, other fatty acids such as docosahexaenoic acid (DHA) confer protection. An important aspect of Schwann cell health is myelin formation and maintenance, made possible by Schwann cell-produced myelin proteins. Peripheral myelin protein 22 (PMP22) is significant due to its putative contribution to SC proliferation and death. This study shows the differential effects of fatty acids on Schwann cells: PA induces cell death and decreases proliferation, whereas DHA promotes survival and normalizes proliferation. Moreover the research shows that PA and DHA regulation of PMP22 indeed correlates with SC viability and proliferation.

Grace Edosewe Esebanmen B.S. Babcock University 2007

Dissertation: The Role of TGF-beta in CTB-INS-mediated Induction of Tolerance in Human Dendritic Cells

A vaccine composed of the cholera toxin B subunit fused to proinsulin (CTB-INS) was recently shown to stimulate human dendritic cell (DC) tolerance. Proteomic analysis of CTB-INS-treated human DCs revealed that the tryptophan catabolic enzyme indoleamine 2, 3-dioxygenase (IDO1) was upregulated and potentially responsible for stimulating immunological tolerance. While transforming growth factor beta (TGF- β) appeared to be involved in signaling upregulation of IDO1 in mouse DCs, its function in human DCs with respect to IDO1 induction is unknown. These present experiments showed that integrin avß8, TGF-ß1 and activin-A, mRNA biosynthesis, and Smad2/3 phosphorylation were upregulated in vaccinetreated, monocyte-derived DCs (moDC). However, additional experiments suggested TGF- β synthesis was unrelated to IDO1 upregulation in human moDCs. While vaccine activation of TGF-β-stimulated DC tolerance may differ between mice and men, novel CTB-INS-induced functions in human DCs were identified that may participate in vaccine induction of human dendritic cell-mediated tolerance.

Oliver Eshun

B.S. University of Cape Coast 2007

Dissertation: Behavioral Ecology and Associated Virology of Mosquito-Host Interactions in Southern California

Characteristics of mosquito-host interactions are critical for understanding the ecology and epidemiology of mosquito-borne diseases. This research explored potential interactions in three studies. First, mosquito captures at CO2-baited traps decreased with height above ground at both riparian and nonvegetated wetlands, but decreased with distance from water only at the former. Birds might, therefore, prefer elevated nests or roosts to avoid mosquitoes. Second, mosquitoes tested in a laboratory showed no preference for freshly exposed compared to previously exposed parakeets (*Melopsittacus undulatus*). Anti-mosquito behaviors of the birds remained consistent over a two-hour period of exposure, but the combined number of mosquito landings on the birds' head, trunk, and feet correlated with anti-mosquito behavior. Finally, primary serum antigen-antibody tests for

viruses were negative in rattlesnakes (genus *Crotalus*) for West Nile virus and Western Equine encephalitis but positive for St. Louis encephalitis in 10% of sampled snakes. Therefore, rattlesnakes may be reservoirs of flaviviruses in Southern California.

Ijeoma Esiaba B.S. University of Ilorin 1997 M.S. University of Ibadan 2000

Dissertation: Platelet Activation and Oxidative Stress Markers in the Preterm Newborn: Implications for Intraventricular Hemorrhage

Improved survival of preterm newborns comes with increased morbidity and mortality risks. Intraventricular hemorrhage (IVH) is the most frequent bleeding disorder in newborns, occurring within the first 10 to 20 days of life. Because the etiology of IVH is not well understood, possible links with inflammatory and hemostatic responses were investigated. Urinary allantoin, an inflammation marker, was elevated 36 to 72 hours after birth in preterm newborns who were subsequently diagnosed with IVH at 11th day of life. This suggests a strong association of IVH with inflammatory processes. Additionally, platelet-neutrophil interactions were found to be reduced in premature newborns, who are at increased risk for IVH. Such interactions are components of effective immune and hemostatic responses. Together, these findings suggest that IVH is likely the result of a confluence of increased physiological stressors, such as inflammation, and a reduced capacity for effective hemostatic response.

Darysbel Garcia-Perez B.S. Universidad Adventista de las Antillas 2009

Dissertation: Two PAS-HAMP Signaling Mechanisms Identified in the Aer and Aer2

Bacterial chemoreceptors orchestrate bacterial responses to environmental changes. These receptors sense environmental changes and then signal via coordinated movements between domains within each receptor. Two domain superfamilies, PAS and HAMP, can form a signal input-output module for signal transduction. I studied the PAS-HAMP linkage in the Aer aerotaxis receptor of *Escherichia coli*, as well as in the Aer2 receptor of *Pseudomonas aeruginosa*. These receptors have different structural architectures. Biochemical and genetic studies were conducted to evaluate critical residues for Aer and Aer2 PAS signaling. Results showed that the Aer PAS domain is in close proximity and interacts laterally with its HAMP domain, suggesting a "side-on" PAS-HAMP signaling mechanism. In contrast, Aer2 studies revealed conserved PAS domain residues that support a unique oxygen-binding mechanism and a linear PAS-HAMP signaling mechanism. These data provide two distinct models for PAS-HAMP signaling that will be relevant to other pathogens.

Whitney Shardé Evans, DEC B.S. Oakwood University 2008

Dissertation: Anti-Tumor Mechanisms of HPV16 E6*

High-risk types of the human papillomavirus cause nearly all cases of cervical cancer mainly through the actions of viral oncoproteins. Yet, the role of the splice isoform of E6 oncoprotein, E6*, in HPV carcinogenesis was unestablished. This study proposed that E6* had the potential to reduce tumor formation *in vivo* was tested by overexpressing E6* in HPV+ and HPV- cervical cancer cells and grown in nude mice. E6* reduced growth in both cervical cancer tumor types *in vivo* compared to control tumors. Proteomic analysis further revealed the cellular pathways influenced by E6* in attenuating cervical cancer tumor growth. Ultimately, the β -Integrin and the mitochondrial dysfunction/oxidative phosphorylation pathways in the HPV+ and HPV- cells were most altered, which was confirmed by *in vitro* techniques. These findings will assist in the quest for understanding the fundamental driving forces behind HPV-mediated and non-HPV-mediated cervical cancers and introduce novel ideas for small molecule inhibitors.

Leslimar Rios-Colon B.S. University of Puerto Rico, Rio Piedras Campus 2010

Dissertation: Targeting the Stress Oncoprotein LEDGF/p75 to Sensitize Chemoresistant Prostate Cancer Cells to Taxanes

Prostate cancer (PCa) is associated with chronic inflammation resulting in activation of stress and pro-survival pathways contributing to disease progression and chemoresistance. The lens epithelium-derived growth factor p75 (LEDGF/p75) promotes cellular survival against environmental stressors and its overexpression has been associated with features of tumor aggressiveness. The study showed that LEDGF/p75 is upregulated in PCa cells selected for their resistance to docetaxel (DTX). These cells also showed resistance to cabazitaxel (CBZ) and paclitaxel, but not to the inducer of apoptosis TRAIL. Silencing LEDGF/p75 sensitized these resistant cells to DTX and CBZ. While TRAIL induced apoptotic blebbing, caspase-3 processing, and apoptotic LEDGF/p75 cleavage, in both taxane- resistant and -sensitive PCa cells, treatment with DTX and CBZ failed to robustly induce these signature apoptotic events. These observations suggested that taxanes induce both caspase-dependent and -independent cell death, and that maintaining the structural integrity of LEDGF/p75 is critical for its role in promoting taxane-resistance.

Sherrefa Raceen Burchell B.S. Northern Caribbean University 2011

Dissertation: The Role of Slit2/Robo Signaling in Inflammation and Blood-Brain Barrier Preservation after Intracerebral Hemorrhage

Physiology

Intracerebral hemorrhages (ICH)—the most fatal stroke subtype, with mortality rates greater than 40% at one month—occur when weakened blood vessels rupture and bleed into the brain, leading to significant vascular disruption, edema, and inflammation. Despite this outcome, no effective therapy has been approved to date. Slit2, a potent chemorepellant that binds and activates the roundabout (Robo) receptors, has been found to preserve vascular integrity and have anti-inflammatory effects in several injury models. To identify the mechanisms of Slit2 in ICH, this research evaluated outcomes after administering recombinant (r)Slit2 and inhibitors of its downstream GTPase signaling. This study found that treatment with rSlit2 resulted in significantly reduced edema and behavioral deficits after ICH, concomitant with preservation of the vasculature (blood-brain barrier) and reductions in inflammatory markers. Inhibition of GTPase signaling reversed these effects. Based on our findings, Slit2 could be an effective therapy for ICH, targeting several pathways involved in its pathophysiology.

Brandon Joseph Dixon B.S. Oakwood University 2012

Dissertation: Neuroprotective Molecules and Strategies in a Rat Model of Neonatal Hypoxic Ischemic Encephalopathy

Neonatal hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy (HIE) is a devastating disease that primarily causes neuronal and white matter injury and is among the leading causes of death among infants. Currently, there are no wellestablished treatments that provide protection after HIE; therefore, it is important to understand the pathophysiology of the disease and to elucidate complications that are creating a gap between basic science and clinical translation. Numerous limitations and challenges remain to be mastered in the development of neuroprotective strategies and translation of experimental results in HIE-based on an appropriate study design, drug delivery properties, dosage, and use in neonates. In three separate studies, we evaluated the efficacy of interferon beta (IFN_β), granulocyte-colony stimulating factor (G-CSF), and osteopontin (OPN) in reducing apoptosis and inflammation following neonatal hypoxic ischemic encephalopathy; and we have outlined the cellular pathways involved in their abilities to provide neuroprotection. This study showed that intranasal administration of IFNB could be detected in the central nervous system, reduce brain infarction volumes, and improve neurological behavior tests 24 hours after HIE. Administration of G-CSF played a pivotal role in attenuating neuroinflammation and BBB disruption 48 hours following.

Lara Michaele Durrant B.A. University of Southern California 2009

Dissertation: Maternal Food Restriction and Offspring Vulnerability to Ischemic Stroke

Independent of other lifestyle factors such as poor diet and exercise habits, individuals who have been exposed to stressful conditions in utero show an increased risk of health problems, including hypertension, stroke, type II diabetes, and cardiovascular disease. This research hypothesized that fetal overexposure to stress hormones may play a role in the permanent anatomical changes seen in adulthood, and that these changes would be apparent in the developing cerebrovasculature. The researcher designed a series of experiments to test the effects of altered nutrition and glucocorticoid status during gestation. Altogether, we found that food restriction as well as perturbations in early glucocorticoid exposure are critical to development of the cerebrovasculature, and that pharmacological glucocorticoid inhibition via Metyrapone during gestation can alter the vulnerability to mild hypoxic ischemic injury. Future work is in progress to determine the ultimate effects of food restriction on the cerebrovasculature, especially during the neonatal period.

Manuel Luis Montero B.S. Universidad Adventista de las Antillas 2000

Dissertation: DHA Attenuates Neuronal Cell Injury from Hypoxia and Palmitic Acid Injury

Lipotoxicity is triggered by lipid overload that leads to oxidative stress, cellular dysfunction, and cell death. This cellular phenomenon is part of a metabolic syndrome, obesity, and type II diabetes. Nerve growth factor-differentiated pheochromocytoma 12 (NGFDPC12) cells served as a neuronal model to study this process. When cells are subjected to a concentration of 300uM of palmitic acid or a low concentration of oxygen, the cell increases reactive oxygen species, stress-response genes like HIF- 1α and BNIP3, as well as apoptosis. Caspases inhibition only diverts the dying cell from apoptosis to necroptosis. The inhibition of necroptosis and the induction of autophagy rescues the cell from both mechanisms. DHA protects the cells from saturated fatty acids and from hypoxia and reverts the expression of those stress genes and apoptosis. Moreover, DHA induces autophagy as a way to protect the cells against reactive oxygen species and damaged organelles, giving the cell a survival advantage. 



Dr. Rashid Mosavin has diligently and indefatigably dedicated himself to the growth and success of the Loma Linda University School of Pharmacy (LLUSP). He joined LLUSP in 2004—four years after the School opened and taught in the Department of Pharmacotherapy and Outcomes Sciences. Known for his hard work and a keen sense of humor, Dr. Mosavin has been a prime mover and an active participant in efforts that have resulted in significant developments in the school.

As LLUSP faculty, Dr. Mosavin became the first to go on an international mission trip—to Afghanistan in 2005. Upon his return, he was inspired to create the International Pharmacy Outreach Program (IPOC) to assist with the pharmaceutical needs of other Loma Linda University international missions. While living with his family in Ethiopia for several years, Dr. Saba focused on health education—providing guidelines to pharmacists and other health-care professionals in Africa, while advising them how to prevent, manage, and treat diseases. He also collaborated with African pharmacy boards to develop laws governing pharmacies, pharmacists, and the administration and use of drugs. With assistance from many Seventh-day Adventist donors in the United States, Dr. Saba developed a new, one-off, state-of-the-art pharmacy in Ethiopia.

Dr. Saba currently resides with his wife and their five children in Beaverton, Oregon, where he works as a part-time pharmacist for Rite Aid; and owns and runs two medical care homes—one of which is equipped for mechanical ventilation. The following year, he returned to the West Coast and joined a group practice until 1977, when he began private practice in San Bernardino, California. In 1979, he joined Loma Linda University's School of Dentistry faculty and subsequently became coordinator of its temporomandibular joint (TMJ) Clinic.

His interest in research began early in his career while he was studying the use of advanced imaging modalities to identify temporomandibular disorders. In the early 1980s, Dr. Christiansen completed an externship at the Loma Linda University Medical Center's Radiology Department, exploring magnetic resonance imaging and computed tomography related to TMJ imaging and interpretation. It is of note that LLU was identified as a leader in the field of TMJ imaging during the 1970s and 1980s.

Dr. Christiansen has continued his research and has published over 60 scientific papers and abstracts in peerreviewed journals. In addition, he has presented more than 40 papers and posters at scientific sessions of national, state, and local professional organizations. His publication record has helped form the basis for co-authoring two textbooks on TMJ imaging; furthermore, he has coauthored six textbook chapters – all relating to advanced imaging of head and neck anatomy.

In recognition of his outstanding scholarship and for his invaluable contributions to the dental profession in the field of head and neck research and treatment, the School of Dentistry names Dr. Edwin Christiansen recipient of the *SCHOOL DISTINGUISHED RESEARCH AWARD*. When recruited in 1997 by Loma Linda University (LLU), Dr. Li was serving as director of: Indiana University's Cell Culture Research Laboratory, the Biocompatibility Core Facility of its Biomechanics and Biomaterials Research Center; and the Electron Microscopy/Confocal Microscope Facility.

At LLU School of Dentistry (LLUSD), Dr. Li joined the Biocompatibility and Toxicology Research Laboratory at the Center for Dental Research, becoming its director in 2004. He has worked tirelessly to update and upgrade the Center, ultimately designing and overseeing installation of its new facility in the Chan Shun Pavilion, which opened in February 2015—a year after he was appointed LLUSD associate dean for research.

A prolific researcher, Dr. Li has generated 305 publications (including 127 articles/book chapters and 178 abstracts) during his professional career. In addition, he has given more than 139 presentations worldwide.

Dr. Li has served his profession in many capacities including teaching in predoctoral and postdoctoral classes. He has also kept abreast of trends in his field through active membership in major professional organizations, including the American Institute of Biological Sciences, the International Society for Neuroethology, the New York Academy of Sciences, *Sigma Xi*, the Society for Neuroscience; as well as attendance at local and international conferences on biological sciences and education, and continually engaging new technology to enhance his teaching.

In addition to his administrative role as associate dean serving as chief academic administrator for nine academic departments, 52 academic programs, 97 full-time faculty and 1,200-1,400 students—Dr. Schwab has continued to pursue his passion for interacting with students in the classroom by teaching anatomy and physiology at LLU for the past twenty years.

Dr. Schwab has recognized over the years that visual learning, note taking, and the use of analogies to help teach difficult concepts are keys to student success. Further, taking a Jet Ski ride through the chambers of the heart helps students visualize and learn concepts in a very creative way. He credits his students for his success, saying that the "optimistic lens" through which they view the world is the sustaining force that keeps him in the classroom. Hearing a different viewpoint or question for the first time brings him great joy, confirming that he is making an impact and challenging students' critical thinking skills.

For his significant contributions as administrator and mentor—inspiring his colleagues and encouraging his students' active engagement, the School of Allied Health Professions honors Dr. Ernie Schwab with the *FACULTY OF THE YEAR AWARD* to be presented during the Conferring of Degrees for the school at 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.

Environmental Systems Research Institute (ESRI) Geographic Information Systems Excellence Award 2006 Inducted into the Inland Valley Hall of Fame Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice 2013 Dr. Samuel Soret—professor, researcher, and friend to colleagues, students, and others who interacted with him—served Loma Linda University faithfully for twentyone years. Among his many accomplishments, Dr. Soret will be remembered for spearheading the establishment of the Health Geoinformatics program at the University in 1996. Through the development and growth of Loma Linda University's Geographic Information Systems (GIS) program, he incorporated GIS technology in academics, workforce development, research, and health-care practices.

Exploring the use of GIS to improve community health, Dr. Soret designed and taught the first health geoinformatics course offered at an accredited public health school in the United States. The curriculum became a case study included in the Smithsonian National Museum of American History's permanent collection.

Dr. Soret was involved in the Environmental Railyard Research Impacting Community Health study which focused on health effects associated with people living near the San Bernardino Railyard. Prior to the Railyard Study, rail lines' impact on community health had never been directly studied. In recognition of this study's significant improvement of nearby residents' lives, Dr. Soret was inducted into the Inland Valley Hall of Fame Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice in 2013.

An academician with a wide range of interests, Dr. Soret spoke eloquently on a broad spectrum of topics, consistently sharing his philosophical views.

Dr. Soret died on August 23, 2016. His colleagues, students, and friends considered him a valued member of the school and the University. He left an amazing legacy of hard work, unselfish service, compassion, eternal optimism; and the SPH will remember him for his positive influence in the lives of those he touched.

Through his professional and personal successes, Dr. Soret considered his greatest treasure his role as a loving and supportive father to his two children—Carmen and Adam.

For his unselfish service and generously sharing his knowledge and expertise; and for his dedication to the promotion of Loma Linda University's motto, "to make man whole," the School of Public Health posthumously honors Dr. Sam Soret with the *SCHOOL DISTINGUISHED FACULTY SERVICE AWARD*. With a degree in psychology from Union College, Lincoln, Nebraska, Serena Danielle Stevens began work on a doctorate in clinical psychology in 2011. Concurrently, she earned a master's degree with a thesis on the effects of current weight-and childhood overweight-on depression and body image dissatisfaction that explored lifetime weight stigma as a mediator of these relationships in college women. For this work, she received the Psychology Department's William James Clinical Research Award. A manuscript based on her thesis was published in the Journal of Health Psychology. Her article on negative weight-based attitudes, negative appearance commentary, and depression has been accepted for publication in *Stigma* and Health. Recognizing the need to identify different ways of framing public health information that addresses obesity and poor health without increasing weight stigma, her doctoral research expanded her previous study.

As first author and co-author of poster presentations, Serena focused on weight stigma, binge eating, and body image. She also co-authored a manuscript examining dietary adherence, glycemic control, and psychological factors associated with binge eating in native and nonnative Chileans who suffer with type 2 diabetes (published in the *International Journal of Behavioral Medicine*). As coauthor of another manuscript recently accepted by *Body Image*, she investigated ethnic differences in appearancerelated commentary. She is also an ad hoc reviewer for the *Journal of Health Psychology, Eating Behaviors*, and *Body Image*.

Serena used extensive eating disorder assessment training for a study that examined a cognitive behavioral treatment approach for binge eating disorder in Hispanics with overweight/obesity. As an assessor for Operation Fit, a four-day obesity camp for special needs children, she administered assessments focused on eating and exercise behaviors. Most recently, Serena conducted in-person screenings with individuals interested in nutrition-based weight loss programs at the Center for Health Promotion, as well as with bariatric surgery candidates at the Loma Linda University Surgical Hospital.

In recognition of her dedication to excellence in research, her remarkable work ethic, her demonstrated compassion, and her commitment to promote this institution's motto, "to make man whole," the School of Behavioral Health names Dr. Serena Danielle Stevens recipient of the 2017 *PRESIDENT'S AWARD* to be presented to her at the Conferring of Degrees for the school.

The academic experience left him highly fulfilled and prodded him a year later to pursue a similar, public academic environment at the University of Washington (UW) in Seattle. After a year at UW, he registered for Adventist Colleges Abroad to study in Spain for three months. Seeking a more religious atmosphere, he transferred to Walla Walla University (WWU) for the remainder of his undergraduate studies.

At WWU, Ryan pursued a double degree and graduated *magna cum laude* in 2015 with the B.A. in Spanish and the B.S. in biology degrees. Hoping to further integrate his newfound humanitarian concerns in the rapidly advancing discipline of medical science, he sought entry into the Loma Linda University School of Religion master's degree in bioethics program for the 2016-2017 academic year. As part of his scholastic endeavors, he had the privilege of interacting with a number of School of Religion (SR) faculty and became involved in their research protocols relating to cardiac rehabilitation, transgender health, healthcare delivery in the US prison system, and the ethics of expressing uncertainty in clinical settings. In addition to his studies in bioethics, Ryan was also employed at the Center for Christian Bioethics, where he helped with research regarding trisomy 13, trisomy 18, Seventh-day Adventist perspectives on health care; and the biological basis for freedom and determinism.

Ryan will join members of the SR faculty to present papers later this month on the ethics of American prison health care and on the expression of medical uncertainty at both the International Bioethics Retreat and the Cambridge Consortium for Bioethics Education in Paris, France.

In August of this year, Ryan will join the Loma Linda University School of Medicine's class of 2021.

He also strongly supports the Family Life Saving Foundation that has assisted more than 47,000 families in the Los Angeles area.

Passionate about physical exercise for healthy living, Mr. Forrester volunteers as a state-certified tennis coach at Redlands East Valley High School, for which he has received awards from the California Social Work Education Center, the Child Welfare Training Academy, and the *Phi Alpha* Honor Society.

Mr. Forrester also served as marketing consultant which transitioned to director of marketing and recruitment for the School of Behavioral Health.

Daniel S. Sandy—Commencement Speaker and Alumnus of the Year (SBH)



President, Sierra Leone Conference of Seventh-day Adventists Program Manager, Adventist Development Relief Agency (ADRA) Sierra Leone-USAID Project

Sandy completed his early education in the capital city of Freetown (one of Britain's first African colonies). While pursuing post-secondary education, Dr. Sandy joined the Seventh-day Adventist (SDA) Church and trained for the ministry at the Adventist Seminary of West Africa (now Babcock University). For almost two decades, in both Sierra Leone and Ghana, he has served as evangelist, district pastor, union departmental director, and mission president.

During the Sierra Leone civil war in 1966, Dr. Sandy and his family sought refuge in the United States and through his friends' support, he earned the Master of Public Health degree at Loma Linda University (LLU) and worked as a researcher and program evaluator at LLU and at the University of Colorado in Denver. He began his doctoral studies at LLU School of Behavioral Health, while completing an internship at California State University of San Bernardino (CSUSB)—an opportunity that paved the way for his employment as a parent educator—teaching parenting classes in San Bernardino for individuals from diverse backgrounds.

Believing that charity begins at home, Dr. Sandy accepted an offer—after completing a doctorate in family studies at LLU, to serve as program director of the "*Mamie en pekin well bodi*" with ADRA in Sierra Leone, a project funded by USAID—part of the post-Ebola intervention to improve primary health care in underserved areas, which allowed Dr. Sandy to apply his education and background. For significant contribution during the post-Ebola recovery effort, he was appointed president of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Sierra Leone, a position he continues to occupy.

As chief executive officer of the Sierra Leone Conference, Dr. Sandy is responsible for the general functions and activities of the church in that region. Also, as program manager of the Adventist Development Relief Agency (ADRA) Sierra Leone-USAID Project, he ensures that projects comply with standard regulations and ensures collaboration among staff, stakeholders, and donors.

In recognition of his exemplary service and promotion of behavioral health that reflects this institution's motto, "to make man whole," the School of Behavioral Health names Dr. Daniel S. Janelle Marie Warren-President's Award

For three decades of nursing service, she has cared for varied types of patients, experiencing God's guidance when seeking to alleviate pain and provide care, especially to those with terminal illnesses. She codeveloped the palliative care consultation service at Loma Linda University Medical Center (LLUMC).

As part of Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) Cohort 5, she has been a leader and an exceptional student throughout her doctoral work—performing well beyond minimum requirements. In 2010, Janelle embarked on a D.N.P. project, which significantly and positively impacted the LLUMC Urology Department. The project resulted in standardized care through the development of an algorithm for difficult male Foley catheterization and provided training—including simulation on use of the Coude catheter—for 200 nurses on four internal medicine units. She continues to track the incidence of injuries and difficult catheterization calls on the units through the electronic medical record for data trending and follow-up.

Janelle Warren's interest in medicine and nursing began through her father, a physician, who exposed her to medical work during her formative years. Believing that Loma Linda University could provide the best doctoral education, and determined to identify with her Seventhday Adventist heritage, she returned to this university for the Doctor of Nursing Practice program. For her diligence, attention to details, clinical interventions, and problem solving skills, she has earned commendations from her supervisors, colleagues, patients and their families. She continues in a leadership role as an advanced practice nurse in the LLUMC Urology Department.

For academic and clinical excellence, outstanding leadership; and for modeling the core values of Loma Linda University, the School of Nursing is pleased to name Dr. Janelle Marie Warren recipient of the 2017 *PRESIDENT'S AWARD*. This award will be presented to her at the Conferring of Degrees for the school.

Dr. Patricia E. Benner, professor emerita at the University of California San Francisco School of Nursing, is an internationally noted educator, researcher, and health lecturer whose nearly four decades of outstanding service have greatly influenced nursing education and practice both in the United States and abroad. Her initiatives have provided the basis for new legislation and design for nursing practice and education for three states in Australia.

An honorary fellow of the Royal College of Nursing and fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, Dr. Benner has made significant contributions to the nursing profession, particularly in the areas of clinical practice and clinical ethics. She also served as director of the Carnegie Foundation's Advancement of Teaching National Nursing Education Study—the first of its kind in forty years. Further, she collaborated with the Carnegie Preparation for studies on the clergy, engineering, law, and medicine.

A multi-awarded scholar whose books have been translated into twelve languages, Dr. Benner has published many peer-reviewed journal articles and nine books, including, From Novice to Expert, named American Journal of Nursing Book of the Year (1984) for nursing education and nursing research; and The Primacy of Caring, coauthored with Judith Wrubel, named Book of the Year in 1990. She also co-authored and co-edited other books, namely: Interpretive Phenomenology: Embodiment, Caring and Ethics in Health and Illness, and The Crisis of Care with Susan Phillips, both published in 1994; Expertise in Nursing Practice: Caring, Clinical Judgment, and Ethics with Christine Tanner and Catherine Chesla, also named Book of the Year in 1996; Caregiving, with Suzanne Gordon and Nel Noddings (1996); and Clinical Wisdom and Interventions in Critical Care: A Thinking-In-Action Approach (1998) with Pat Hooper-Kyriakidis and Daphne Stannard.

Dr. Benner has directed more than fifty doctoral dissertations and pioneered the use of interpretive phenomenology in nursing.

For her significant contributions to the nursing profession, Dr. Benner has been designated a "Living Legend of the American Academy of Nursing."
