Page 2

- 1. What is the wage gap
 - a. A differential in the relative earnings for a particular job that is not based on the job itself but rather based on gender. It measures the inequality for the earnings of men and women in their respective jobs.
- 2. History of the wage gap
 - a. From 1760-1840, during the industrial revolution in Great Britain, wage gaps among men and women were influenced by culture and the economy. Historians and economists view the gender wage gap disparity as a result of either: A lack of productivity by women compared to men or as an inferior view of men on women based on factors such as physical ability.
- 3. Includes 5 images of women either working in factories or of the factories themselves during the Industrial Revolution in Great Britain to represent and show that women were a part of the working force during this time (1760-1840).

- 1. Central Asia
- 2. 2 images of women working in Central Asia and 1 image of a protest for equal pay
- 3. The timeframe to close the wage gap is around 151 years
- 4. Bridged 69.1% of gender gap
- 5. Women are making 60-80% what men are making

- 1. East Asia and the Pacific
- 2. Image 17 shows members of a women's association in Daejeon South Korea protesting about equal pay at the city hall.
- 3. As of 2021, it will take 168 years to close the cumulative wage gap in the region.
- 4. Image 18 shows women on the move in the working world of Japan.
- 5. Internally, Japan and Korea are among the lowest ranked in terms of the percent (%) that their wage gaps are closed (56.4% and 59.2% respectively)
- 6. Ranked 2nd in economic participation/opportunity but are in the middle of the pack among other regions for bridging their overall wage gap (69%)
- 7. Image 19 shows a woman protesting for Asian women and their equality in a system that undermines women in East Asia and the pacific region with a large gender pay gap.

- 1. Sub-Saharan Africa
- 2. Image 20 is portrayed to show specifically how Sub-Saharan african women with children suffer from a larger gender wage gap.
- 3. Women are culturally pressed to stay at home and do unpaid house work, especially with children in the home.
- 4. With recent improvements, 98 years is the estimated timeline to close the region's wage gap
- 5. Image 21 shows women in the Sub-Saharan African region who remain at home working in agriculture and performing unpaid work to take care of their children.
- 6. Increases in the number of women in parliament positions has led to an increase in the (%) closing of the wage gap in the political sector (21.3%).
- 7. Image 22 shows Equatorial Guinea's Ambassador to the United States Angue Ondo.

1. Middle East and North America

- 2. The Middle East and North Africa have the second largest wage gaps. The timeframe to close the wage gap is around 115 years. Women are rarely offered roles in power.
- 3. The gender gap has closed by 63.4% as of 2022. In education, the gender gap has nearly closed throughout the region.

- 1. South Asia
- 2. Has the largest gender based wage gap in the world. The estimated time frame to close it is about 200 years
- 3. Some countries in the area are increasing opportunities for women while other countries are actively decreasing women's labor-force participation
- 4. South Asia has very low levels of education attainment. Many women are illiterate and do not have the means for education

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
