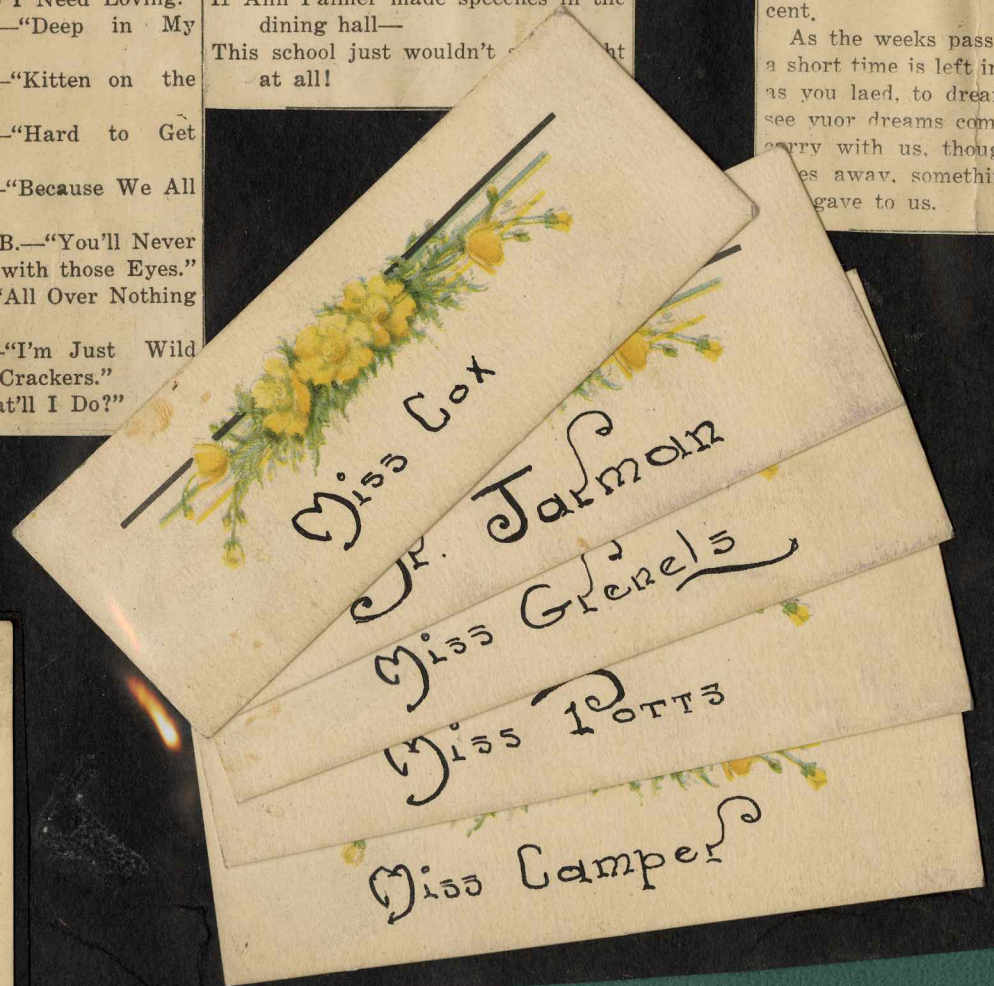
VIRGINIA VINCENT
