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

We appreciate the coverage you give us, and we will do everything possible to assist you in your game duties. In order to create the best possible situation, please observe the following:

CREDENTIALS: All credential requests should be directed to Julia Eberhart, The University of Maine, 5747 Memorial Gym, Orono, ME 04469-5747 (207) 581-1086. Credentials to be mailed should be requested at least two weeks in advance. All other credentials can be picked up at the will call booth at the main entrance of the Alfond Arena.

INTERVIEWS: All requests for player interviews, either in person or via phone, should be coordinated through Julia Eberhart in the UMaine Athletic Media Relations Office.

A post-game news conference with Head Coach Dr. John Giannini and selected players will be held following each home game; please consult the game timeline and information sheets on press row for the exact location. The news conference will begin approximately 10 minutes after the conclusion of the game; visitors will go first followed by UMaine.

All practices are open to the media, and Coach Giannini and his players are available for interviews before the start of practice. Interviews conducted prior to practice MUST be concluded at least 15 minutes prior to the start of practice.

Players will not be available for interviews on gamedays prior to the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Credentials should be requested from UMaine Athletic Media Relations according to the same guidelines as other media. CREDENTIALS WILL NOT BE ISSUED TO FREELANCE PHOTOGRAPHERS.

Still and video photographers must shoot from the endlines during the game, and are allowed to shoot from the press row side of court during pre-game, halftime, and post-game only. Videographers for live broadcasts will have right of way in those areas. Photographers may NOT shoot from the player bench/scorer's table side of the court.

RADIO POLICY: Permission to broadcast may be obtained by calling the UMaine Athletic Media Relations Office. One phone line for a rental fee of \$75 will be available for the visiting school. Other lines may be obtained by calling the Athletic Media Relations Office. All calls on these lines should be collect or billable to the user.

Stations requiring an ISDN line should contact the UMaine Athletic Media Relations Office at least 45 days prior to the date of the contest.

PRESS PARKING: A section of VIP parking has been reserved for members of the media. Please contact the UMaine Athletic Media Relations office in advance for parking passes.

GAMEDAY PRESS SERVICES: Pregame notes, statistics, media guides, and programs/rosters are available prior to the start of the game. Halftime statistics, as well as a complete play-by-play, and final statistics will also be provided. Food and beverages are available at the concession stands in Alfond Arena.





The University of Maine is the state's center of learning, discovery, and service to the public. As the flagship university of the University of Maine System and the state's land-grant and seagrant institution, The University of Maine has the unique responsibility for providing high-quality undergraduate and graduate education programs, public service, and basic and applied research.


Located in Orono, within close proximity to the ocean, lakes, and mountains, The University of Maine offers an inspiring learning environment. There is plenty of open space on its 1,200 acres, where students are offered the diversity and the challenge of a large university in an invigorating atmosphere of a small college. The campus is located 10 miles north of Bangor, Maine's third largest city.

The University's undergraduate and graduate educational offerings are built upon a liberal arts and sciences foundation complemented by profession-oriented education in a wide range of disciplines, many of which are found nowhere else in the state. Because of their responsibility to teach, conduct research, and serve the public, faculty members are able to incorporate the new knowledge they uncover with classroom activities, often giving students hands-on experience in the research process.

The University offers its students, faculty, and staff, as well as the people of the community and the state, an outstanding athletic tradition. Several Black Bear teams have excelled to regional and national prominence, including the Black Bear ice hockey team, the 1993 and 1999 NCAA Division I national champions. In the last 17 years and 20 of the last 21, at least one Black Bear sports team has

competed in an NCAA Championship. UMaine's 19 Division I sports entertain more than 100 intercollegiate events on campus each year attracting 200,000 spectators.

Included on UMaine's athletic staff is an academic coordinator responsible for closely monitoring the progress of each of the over 450 varsity student-athletes. Last year 137 student-athletes earned scholar-athlete honors. Coaches also monitor and advise their student-athletes, frequently holding meetings specifically to discuss academic situations. Study halls and special tutorial sessions are scheduled daily as a way to enhance the learning process. This support and close scrutiny has been a significant reason the overall grade point average of student-athletes has been higher than that of the general student body. The primary goal of the University and the athletic department is to see each individual reach his or her academic potential.

The Maine Facts:

- Enrollment is on the rise at The University of Maine. First-year students enrolling at UMaine in the fall of 2001 totalled 1,645. The class is approximately 43 percent larger than the class that enrolled in 1997.
- The average SAT score of the 2001 entering class was 1,086, 66 points above the national average, and 80 above the state average.
- Nearly three quarters of the 2001 entering class cited The University of Maine as their first choice.
- The Maine Business School, one of 300 accredited by the American Association of Colleges of Business Administration, offers students innovative student-oriented programs such as SPIFFY, in which students manage a University of Maine foundation investment portfolio. Since the program began in 1993 the fund has grown from \$250,000 to \$735,634.
- The UMaine graduate forestry program is ranked in the top five nationally.
- UMaine's graduate program in secondary education is ranked 21st out of nearly 200 programs in the U.S.
- Over 178 degree programs, resulting in baccalaureate, master's and doctoral degrees, are offered by UMaine's five colleges.
- Each year over 90 percent of UMaine engineering graduates pass a nationally-standardized pre-professional examination, well above the national average of 74 percent.
- Thirty-eight members of the Maine State Legislature hold at least one degree from UMaine and five members of Gov. Angus King's cabinet hold at least one degree from UMaine.

Dr. Peter S. Hoff

President

A dramatic and steady increase in student enrollment, improved state support and progress toward achieving his stated objectives for the future have marked Dr. Peter S. Hoff's tenure as president of The University of Maine.



Since assuming the presidency in August 1997, Hoff has crisscrossed the state as an advocate for education and, specifically, the numerous ways UMaine can contribute to the betterment of Maine and its people. In visits to schools, service or-

ganizations, and businesses around the state, Hoff has talked about the University's interest in serving as both partner and catalyst to address Maine's diverse needs and concerns. He has also spoken of the University's role in helping Maine's young people find educational and economic opportunities in Maine, and promoting high aspirations among those younger citizens.

During Hoff's five years as President, first-year student enrollment rose each year without lessening the university's admissions standards. In 1998, Hoff

was instrumental in gaining voter support for a \$20 million bond issue to support university-based research and development. In addition, he has worked successfully to help promote greater state investment in public higher education, promoting UMaine as an essential and valuable state resource.

Hoff is a strong believer in the special role The University of Maine plays in the lives of Maine people.

"As the state's flagship university and its landgrant and sea-grant institution, The University of Maine serves the entire state," he explains, "UMaine is actively working in every county with local businesses, industries, farmers, governments, and citizens to address their most pressing social and economic needs.

"Simply put, UMaine's role and purpose is to provide Maine citizens a world class education, and — through research and engagement — help create the kind of state where citizens can put their educations to work right here in their home state, at the highest and most rewarding level. That is a challenge we tackle in many ways every single day."

As President, Hoff has established seven objectives:

- maintaining UMaine's leadership position among public higher education in Maine
- continued recruitment of Maine's most talented and motivated high school graduates
- continued expansion of the University's research enterprise
- even greater engagement with Maine people, business, and industry through outreach and public service activity
- ongoing review of opportunities to better serve the interests and needs of today's and tomorrow's students and citizens

- increased national prominence as a university where student learning is integrated into all classroom, social, and recreational experiences
- commitment to providing all students with a strong liberal arts education preparing them for the personal, professional, and civic demands and opportunities of the new century.

A recognized national leader in public higher education, Hoff is one of 27 university presidents and former presidents who served as members of the Kellogg Commission on the Future of State and Land-Grant Universities, which works to define and draw attention to the current state of land grant institutions while helping to position those institutions for their future.

Prior to his appointment as UMaine's president, Hoff served as Senior Advisor to the Chancellor of The California State University. He joined the California system in 1993 as Senior Vice Chancellor, Academic Affairs, a position he held until 1996. President Hoff also served as Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University System of Georgia (1990–1993) and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at Indiana University Southeast (1987–1990).

He received a B.A. degree in 1966, from the University of Wisconsin in Madison. He began his career teaching English in 1970 at the University of Wisconsin System after completing his M.A. and his Ph.D. in English and Humanities at Stanford University in 1968 and 1970, respectively.

Hoff is married to Dr. Dianne Hoff, a faculty member of UMaine's College of Education & Human Development.

Paul A. Bubb

Director of Athletics

Paul A. Bubb, an administrator with 20 years experience in college athletics, became The University of Maine Interim Director of Athletics July 1.

Bubb had been serving as Senior Associate Assistant Athletic Director since November of 2001.



"Paul brings a variety of attributes that will help the UMaine athletics department continue to move forward while we undertake the process of looking for a permanent athletic director," President Peter S. Hoff says. "His combination of experience and knowledge

of the department make Paul highly qualified to lead the Black Bears during this period."

"I appreciate the opportunity to lead the UMaine

athletic department," Bubb says. "I came here as the associate athletic director with a goal to increase the fundraising efforts and I plan to continue with that agenda as the Interim Director of Athletics. I am looking forward to working with a great group of coaches, the staff and the student-athletes in the coming months as we prepare for an exciting year in Black Bear athletics."

As Senior Associate Director of Athletics for Advancement and Finance, Bubb's responsibilities included conducting major gift solicitations to achieve fundraising goals. He also managed the external relations of the department, including development, marketing/promotions and media relations.

Bubb, 45, held the position of assistant director for the Bronco Athletic Association at Boise State University from 1999-2001. He had direct oversight for a \$1 million annual giving program for Bronco Athletics. His responsibilities at BSU also included development of strategies for increasing members and dollars raised for the Bronco Athletic Association as well as participation in the planning for the university capital campaign.

Prior to Boise State, Bubb worked at the Cal State Northridge Department of Athletics from 1990 to 1998. He served as Director of Athletic Development from 1990–92, Associate Athletic Director from 1992–95,

and Director of Athletics from 1995—1998. As AD, he had direct oversight of a 21-sport NCAA Division I athletic program and he managed a budget of \$6.8 million. He oversaw a staff of 70 coaches and staff members. He developed long-range plans for meeting gender equity requirements and also a funding plan for maintaining a broad-based Division I athletic program. As associate director he oversaw the areas of development, marketing, sports information, camps, event management and corporate sponsorships.


Prior to his tenure at Cal State Northridge, Bubb served as Director of Alumni and Parent Programs and Director of Athletic Development at Drake University from 1988 to 1989. He was Director of Athletic Development at Southern Illinois from 1985 to 1988. From 1980 until 1985, he served as an assistant basketball coach at Monmouth College while also assisting with annual giving and alumni and parent programs.


Bubb received a bachelor of arts degree in history/ education from Monmouth College in 1979 and a master's degree from Western Illinois in sports management.

Academic Support/Life Skills Programs

The University of Maine has a commitment to offering a comprehensive academic support program for student-athletes. The University of Maine Academic Support Program for Student Athletes Services includes a variety of progressive and proactive support programs to assist the student-athlete in developing academically, professionally and personally.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

All student-athletes receive academic support upon committing to The University of Maine. After the signing of a letter of intent, student-athletes are given information regarding admission and registration procedures.

Orientation. The first-year student-athlete participates in an orientation program informing them of athletic and eligibility issues, in addition to resources available on campus. This orientation draws together many campus constituencies and provides first-year student-athletes with the opportunity to discover all that The University of Maine has to offerboth academically and culturally.

Academic Monitoring. Throughout their college career, student-athletes are monitored by the academic counseling staff to ensure academic progress toward their degree program. In order to enhance knowledge of the academic progress of student-athletes during the semester, grade reports are sent to faculty twice per semester. In addition, the student-athletes receive information frequently regarding the requirements of their degree program as well as the academic requirements of the NCAA.

Academic Mentoring. When deemed necessary, academic mentors are made available to student-athletes. These mentors teach and reinforce skills necessary for high academic achievement, focusing on time management, study and test-taking skills.

Tutorial Program. All students at The University of Maine have access to tutors free of charge for 100 and 200 level courses through the Tutor Program. Tutorial support is also provided on a limited basis to student-athletes through the Academic Support Programs.

Computer Facilities. In addition to the computer facilities available to all University of Maine students, the Sam Sezak Academic Lounge houses a computer facility for the exclusive use of student-athletes. This facility is open at accommodating hours to fill the needs of student-athletes' hectic schedules. Twelve laptop computers are available on loan to traveling sports teams. Additional areas on campus are used to provide quietstudy areas for monitored study sessions available at night for underclassmen.

LIFE SKILLS

The goal of the life skills program is to assist studentathletes as students, citizens and aspiring professionals

Life Skills Seminars. Student-athletes work with the Life Skills Coordinator and campus members to design and participate in life skills workshops covering a variety of areas: career development, alcohol and drug education, team building, nutrition and study skills.

Multicultural Programs. The University of Maine and its Athletic Department have a commitment to supporting diversity within the campus community. A liaison relationship involving full-time staff members has developed between the Office of Multicultural Affairs and the Department of Athletics to promote an appreciation of diversity and to serve the student-athletes of different cultures.

Student-Athlete Advisory Board. The board is comprised of members of intercollegiate sports teams. This group meets with athletic and academic administrators regularly to discuss issues relevant to the student-athlete community.

Outreach. Opportunities exist through the Community Outreach Program for student-athletes to gain valuable public speaking experience while they give back to the community. Student-athletes speak at numerous schools and community groups throughout the year. In 2000, the UMaine Student-Athlete Outreach Program received the 12th Annual Barbara Bodwell Community Service Award.

Scholar-Athlete Recognition. In addition to providing academic support to the student-athletes at UMaine, the staff also recognizes their academic accomplishments. Each spring a recognition reception and ceremony is held, at which those athletes who have earned a 3.0 minimum grade point average are acknowledged and presented with medallions. The ceremony is held during halftime of a basketball game, so members of the community can recognize the academic achievements of the student-athletes at The University of Maine. Last February, a record 137 medallions were awarded.


Sport Psychology. Performance enhancement training is available to teams and individuals from the accredited sport psychology consultant, Dr. Bruce Hale. Student-athletes are instructed in mental training skills such as goal setting, imagery and visualization, anxiety management, concentration, building self confidence and team cohesion, which can be practiced to improve psychological preparation for practice and competition.

Harold Alfond Sports Arena

Home of the Black Bears, the Harold Alfond Sports Arena is one of the finest all-purpose facilities in the Northeast.

he Harold Alfond Sports Arena, one of the finest all-purpose facilities in the Northeast, was completed in February of 1977. The generosity of Mr. Harold Alfond allowed for basketball to return to campus in a modern, upgraded facility on January 17, 1992, when UMaine met Drexel University.

Mr. Alfond, who has donated over \$6 million to the University since 1968, contributed \$2 million for the expansion in 1991. Mr. Alfond's gift at that time was the largest one-time (non-posthumous) cash contri-

bution ever bestowed upon the University. Over 2,000 people, headed by Mr. Alfond, contributed funds for the original construction of the complex.

The expansion created 70-foot by 140-foot additions to the east and west sides of the Arena allowing for the installation of 1,200 seats. The construction raises the capacity to over 5,200 for hockey and nearly 6,000 for basketball.

Included in the Arena expansion are additional concession areas and rest rooms, locker rooms, ticket offices and souvenir stands. A storage area was also

built for the new basketball court used in the facility.

Aside from being UMaine's home court, the Arena is used by high school and youth hockey leagues, and for concerts and graduation ceremonies. In 1994, Hillary Rodham Clinton greeted over 6,000 people from the University community in Alfond Arena.

The complex is a modern facility with virtually no obstructed-view seats, and an excellent view of the court. Bleachers have been purchased to be used on the floor level allowing fans an even closer view of the game.


Michael B. and Georgia D. Latti Fitness Center

The Michael B. and Georgia D. Latti Fitness Center was dedicated at a ceremony on October 6, 1989.

In 1995, the center underwent a complete renovation, upgrading the space as well as the equipment inside it. The 6,000-foot facility next to Wallace Pool contains a weight room and training facility which serves an estimated 500 students, faculty and members of the surrounding community each day.

The skylighted facility is home to tons of free weights, a Universal gym, life cycles and other exercise equipment.

Baseball

• UMaine won 40 games, the fourth-most in school history, took the America East regular season and tournament titles, and advanced to the NCAA tournament for the first time since 1993. Mike MacDonald was named America East Pitcher of the Year and DH Aaron Izaryk was named Louisville Slugger freshman All-American by Collegiate Baseball.

Basketball (Men)

• The Black Bears advanced to the America East title game for the first time since 1994. In playing their fourth league semifinal in four years, Maine defeated the conference's top seed to reach the championship. Junior Justin Rowe and senior Errick Greene were All-America East choices.

Basketball (Women)

• Coach Versyp's team improved its overall win total by four games over the previous season. The program continued its academic success with six scholar-athletes, including three seniors who were three-time winners. First-year forward Monica Peterson was named America East Rookie of the Year and Heather Ernest was an All-Conference choice.

Field Hockey

• The Black Bears posted a 7-2 record at Alfond Stadium, finished 6-3 in America East, and appeared in the conference tournament for the first time since 1997. Morgan Brady was named All-American and teammate Jen Johnstone was a National Field Hockey Coaches Association Northeast Region All-America selection.

Football

• Atlantic 10 Co-Coach of the Year Jack Cosgrove led his team to a share of the league championship and the program's first NCAA playoff victory in school history. The squad went undefeated at home (5-0) and placed Chad Hayes, Stephen Cooper and Lennard Byrd on All-America teams. Cooper earned Atlantic 10 Co-Defensive Player of the Year honors. He and Cosgrove were also finalists for national coach and defensive player of the year honors.

Hockey (Men)

• Maine overcame the loss of their legendary coach at the start of the season, advanced to their third Frozen Four in four years, and played in the national championship. Coach Tim Whitehead was named National Coach of the Year while seniors Peter Metcalf and Niko Dimitrakos received All-America honors. Goalie Mike Morrison joined Dimitrakos and Metcalf on Hockey East all-league teams. Colin Shields was an All-Rookie team choice.

Hockey (Women)

• The team competed in the ECAC Playoffs for the first time and completed its second straight .500-plus season, and third overall in the five-year history of the program. Seven Black Bears were on the ECAC All-Academic team, tying for the most in the league. UMaine also earned wins over nationally-ranked New Hampshire and number-2 Northeastern. Team member Raffi Wolf redshirted the season while playing for Germany in the Olympics.

Soccer (Men)

• Six members of the men's soccer team earned America East Academic Honor Roll recognition, two of which were commissioner's honor roll recipients (3.5 GPA or higher). Senior Mat Cosgriff was a gold medallion scholar-athlete.

Soccer (Women)

• UMaine completed the season with the fewest losses (6) and the second highest win total (7) since the program's inception in 1990. The Black Bears earned the highest team GPA among UMaine women's programs and were recipients of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and Adidas Academic Achievement Awards.

Softhall

• America East Coach of the Year Deb Smith led UMaine to the league tournament. Leigh Ann Hlywak, Jessica Brady, Erica Sobel and Jenna Merchant were first team All-Conference choices. Hlywak and Rachel Bain were district Academic All-Americans, while Hlywak also earned second team national honors.

Swimming and Diving


• The UMaine women's and men's swim teams placed third and fifth in the America East Championship. The women's placement was the highest in the history of the program while the men earned dual meet wins over Vermont, Central Connecticut, and Providence College. Ten team members received the Scholar-Athlete Recognition Awards. Krystal Fogler earned the department's top female athlete honor.


Track and Field

• The men cross country team placed third at the America East Championships and finished eighth overall among 42 teams at the New England Championships. Each member of the senior class was named to the fall Academic Honor Roll. The women's cross country team, third at America East, had nine of the 14 team members on the Fall Academic Honor Roll with a grade point average of 3.5 or better. Both teams finished fifth at the league indoor championship and the women were tenth at the New England Championships. Viktoriya Rybalko was named Outstanding Performer at the America East Indoor Track and Field Championship. She set a school record in the triple jump and competed in that event, placing 16th, in the NCAA Indoor Championship. The UMaine men's outdoor track team set school marks in the 4x200-meter relay and the Distance Medley Relay at the Penn Relays. The UMaine women placed third at the America East Championship, just 2.5 points out of second place.

Volleyball


• UMaine defeated No. 1 seed Towson in the semifinals of the America East tournament to advance to the conference title match for the first time in the program's three-year existence. The Black Bears went 9-3 in their last 12 contests and won six in a row before falling to Northeastern in the Championship. Dr. John Giannini

Head Coach - Seventh Season - North Central College '84



Heading into his seventh season at the helm of the Black Bear basketball program, Dr. John Giannini has transformed UMaine into a perennial contender for the America East title. Giannini has guided the Black Bears to 73 victories over the past four seasons — the most wins in a four-year span in UMaine basketball history. His Black Bears have advanced to the semifinals or beyond in the America East Championship in each of those four seasons — the only team in the conference to make that claim.

During the 2001–02 season, a resilient Black Bear team overcame seven unexpected personnel losses and injuries to reach the America East Championship game, playing in front of a national television audience on ESPN.

Giannini has followed the perfect prescription for winning as evidenced by his success at both UMaine and Rowan College. In both cases, through outstanding recruiting, Giannini has pushed programs to new levels. With time to recruit his own players, his record has been impressive. Having completed two years of recruiting at UMaine, he compiled a record of 61-27 over the next three seasons (1998–2001), breaking school records along the way. After two recruiting seasons at Rowan, his teams went 131-19 during the rest of his tenure. Together, Giannini-guided teams are 204-64 (.761) after he has been able to coach players recruited by his staff.

Giannini's recruits have earned all-conference honors 11 times in the last four years—the most of any team in the conference. He also has been recognized by his peers as one of the best recruiters in the nation.

The 1999–2000 Black Bears (24-7, 15-3) shattered school marks for overall and league wins. In 1998–99, the Giannini-led Black Bears notched a record-tying 19

wins, a new standard of 13 league victories, while accomplishing one of the best turnarounds in the nation.

In 2000-01, UMaine finished with an 18-11 recordthe third consecutive season the Black Bears recorded 18 or more wins.

Recent UMaine teams have also played an exciting and aggressive style of basketball as evidenced by the Black Bears' increased attendance and rankings in national statistical categories.

Attendance for UMaine basketball has increased and ranked among the league's best the last four seasons.

Further, UMaine's 1999–2000 season finale crowd was the largest group to witness an America East game on a member campus.


UMaine led the conference in scoring for the second time in three years in 2000—2001. In 1999, UMaine finished 13th in the nation with 80.6 ppg. UMaine's 47.1 percent field goal percentage ranked 25th, its 74.1 percent free throw percentage 13th, and its 7.57 three-point field goals per game was just outside the nation's top 30.


Maine's 1999–2000 48.8 field goal percentage ranked seventh in the country. The Black Bears were

also eighth in free throw percentage (75.2) and 20th in winning percentage (.774).

Four of the last five seasons at least one UMaine player has earned first team all-conference honors. Four Black Bears earned all-conference honors led by first teamers Andy Bedard and Nate Fox in 1999—2000. That same year UMaine won its first in-season tournament in 30 years, taking the Stony Brook Holiday Express Invitational.

Other highlights of Giannini's tenure are impressive road wins at Providence (NCAA Tourn.), Marquette (C-USA Champions, NCAA Tourn.), Northwestern (NIT) and St. Louis.

Named the 19th head coach of the UMaine basket-ball team by former director of athletics Suzanne Tyler, Aug. 2, 1996, Giannini, 40, came to UMaine after seven years at Rowan College (N.J.) where he led his squad to the NCAA Division III national championship in 1996. The championship earned him Sears Division III Coach of the Year honors as selected by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC).

His .816 winning percentage (168-38) was ranked first among active Division III coaches and included trips to the Division III Final Four in 1993, 1995 and 1996. His mark over the last four years at Rowan was an amazing

110-12 (.902). Each of those seasons he compiled 20 or more wins and received top ten national rankings. In 1993 and 1995 he led the Profs to national third-place finishes.

Also in 1993, his squad finished the regular season ranked number one in the nation, led the country in winning percentage and set a school record for wins at 29-2. He was named Kodak Atlantic Region Co-Coach of

the Year.

Giannini previously served as a staff member under the guidance of Lou Henson at the University of Illinois from 1987 to 1989. The Illini participated in the NCAA Tournament in 1988 and 1989, advancing to the Final Four with a 31-5 mark in 1989. The previous year Illinois was 23-10. He also enjoyed coaching stints at Parkland Community College in 1986–87 and at Division I North Texas from 1984–86.

A native of Chicago, Ill., he is a graduate of Fenwick High School. In 1984, he graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in psychology from North Central College in Naperville, Ill., earning four letters in basketball.

He earned his master's degree in physical education with a specialization in sports psychology at the University of North Texas in 1986. In 1992, he completed his doctorate work in kinesiology with a specialization in sports psychology at the University of Illinois.

He has made presentations at several national conferences. He is a former member of the NCAA Division III Men's Basketball Regional Advisory Committee. At Rowan, he served on the Faculty Senate. He currently serves on the National Association of Basketball Coaches Congress and is the coaches chairperson fore the America East Championship and Competition Committee.

Giannini and his wife, Donna, have two daughters, Brianna (9) and Jamie (4).

Ted Woodward is in his seventh season as John Giannini's top assistant at Maine. With 16 years of Division I coaching experience, Woodward provides leadership to the UMaine staff.

Woodward, 38, has used his experience

and contacts to serve as recruiting coordinator for the program. He is respected as an accomplished recruiter and has played a key role in bringing top level talent to UMaine. In addition, he has valuable expertise in the technical and administrative aspects of the program. He has an excellent record as a teacher of basketball, as he has worked with five players in his career who have reached the NBA. Woodward will continue his work with coach Giannini's perimeter players this season.

Before coming to UMaine, Woodward was the top assistant and recruiting coordinator for Mark Adams at Central Connecticut for five seasons. During his tenure, CCSU set a Division I era school record for wins. Woodward also recruited CCSU's former NBA Los Angeles Clipper, Keith Closs, the NCAA season shotblock record holder.

Prior to his stint at Central, Woodward was a full-time assistant and recruiter at Harvard University during the 1989—90 and 1990—91 seasons, where he also served as Director of Athletic Promotions.

He began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of Connecticut under Jim Calhoun from 1986—89. While he was at UConn, the Huskies achieved one of the greatest rebuilding projects in college basketball, culminating with three straight postseason appearances in four years, including the 1988 NIT Championship.

Woodward has recently been recognized by his peers in *rivals100hoops.com* and *TheInsidersHoops.com* surveys as one of the top assistants in the country. He also served this summer as a specially invited guest of the Portuguese Basketball Coaches Association at their annual clinic in Lisbon.

A native of Suffern, N.Y., Woodward received his bachelor of arts degree in economics from Bucknell in 1986 and his master's in education with an emphasis in sports administration from UConn in 1989. He is married to the former Linda Emery and they have two children, Jillian, 8, and Tommy, 5.

Bailey, a native of Chicago, Ill., was an assistant coach at Chi-

cago State last season, where he was involved in recruiting and all phases of the program. Prior to Chicago State, Bailey was a graduate and student assistant for the UAB. The Blazers made an NCAA Tournament appearance in 1998, when Bailey served as a student assistant. At UAB, Bailey was responsible for film exchange, individual player development and monitoring the academic progress of the student-athletes

Bailey played two years at UAB where he served as team captain in 1996–97. He was named the team's Best Defensive Player in 1997, the same season the Blazers made an NIT appearance. Bailey was the men's basketball representative to the Student Athlete Advisory Committee from 1995–97.


Bailey came to Birmingham from Parkland Community College in Champaign, Ill., where he averaged 19 points, eight assists and four steals per game. He was named first-team All-Region, the NJCAA All-Star Team, and to the preseason All-America squad, and was a member of the Dean's List. Parkland was ranked the No. 1 team in the nation in 1993—94 as Bailey led Parkland to the NJCAA Tournament. The following year, Bailey finished in the top-five nationally in assists and was named to the first team All-Region Team.

Bailey played for Fate Mickels at Chicago's Dunbar Vocational High School where he averaged 18 points, four rebounds, six assists and four steals per game as a senior. He was selected the team's MVP, a Chicago Public League All-Star, and first team All-Conference. The Dunbar High School team reached its conference finals in each of his four varsity seasons (1990–93).

Bailey plans to receive his master's degree in health & physical education in December 2002, after earning a bachelor's degree in criminal justice in 1998, both from UAB.

Bedard returns to the UMaine coaching staff after playing for one season professionally in Portugal. He was an assistant coach for the Black Bears in 2000—01 after a standout career at UMaine. During the 2000—01 season, he assisted the

program to a 18-11 mark.

Arguably the best point guard to ever put on a UMaine uniform, Bedard was UMaine's floor general for two seasons (1998-00). A 6-1 senior guard, he averaged 6.9 assists per game to rank 13th in the country. As a junior, his 6.5 assists per game rated 12th-best in the nation. He set the school record with 181 assists as a junior then bettered that total with 193 his senior season. During Bedard's tenure as a player, the Black Bears had a 43-16 overall record.

An excellent outside shooter, Bedard was also a top scorer for the Black Bears. In his first UMaine game, he tallied a career-best 39 points, tying an Alfond Arena record. He averaged 16.9 points as a junior and 12.7 as a senior. He also ranked among the league's best in steals in his two seasons at UMaine. Bedard earned first team All-America East honors as a junior and a senior.

He received his bachelor's degree from UMaine in May 2000 after studying sociology as an undergraduate. He was a member of the America East Honor Roll as a senior. While playing professionally in Portugal, Bedard coached and organized youth basketball camps for the Portuguese Basketball League.

A native of Rumford, Maine, Bedard attended Mountain Valley High School and led its basketball team to the Maine Class B state title in 1993—94. Bedard averaged 35 points per game and holds set the state record for most points in a game at 53. He was named Gatorad Player of the Year after his junior season and was a three-time All-State selection and state champion in the triple jump. Bedard played for Max Good and the highly-regarded Maine Central Institute in 1994—95 and served as team captain. He averaged 16 points and 10 assists while at MCI.

During 1995–96 and 1996–97, Bedard attended Boston College and participated in two NCAA Basketball Tournaments as the Eagles advanced to the second round in both seasons. Bedard also helped Boston College win the Big East Championship in 1996-97.

Preseason Outlook

With a roster combining backcourt depth with frontcourt experience, the Black Bears believe they have a team ready to challenge for the America East championship in 2002–03.

Maine's biggest weakness in 2001–02 was pretty glaring, and it didn't take long for opponents to see it. A lack of guards due to unexpected off-season losses and injuries. Head Coach Dr. John Giannini believes he and his staff addressed that issue as they head into 2002–03 with backcourt depth to go with the nucleus

"We've signed four guards that we think are all very talented," said Giannini. "When we won 61 games over three years, we had excellent guards, and I feel that the guards we now have compare favorably with the outstanding guards we've had in the past."

of a team that reached the America East Championship game last season.

"I think we'll have good outside scoring, and guards who can penetrate and create shots," said Giannini.


Juniors Eric Dobson (Immokalee, Fla.) and Thomas Hill (Milwaukee, Wis.) will provide immediate help in the Black Bear backcourt. The 5-10 Hill was a 42 percent three-point shooter at Arkansas-Fort Smith last season, and was recipient of the Bud Obee Most Outstanding Small Player Award at last year's NJCAA National Tournament. Dobson averaged 12 points at St. Petersburg (Fla.) Junior College last season. Both players led their teams to regional titles and berths in the NJCAA National Tournament, while earning all-region honors.

Newcomers also include freshman **Kevin Reed** (Yarmouth, Mass.), who was an All-Prep guard at St. Thomas More School last season, and junior Ludmil "Udo" Hadjisotirov (Sofia, Bulgaria), who enrolled at UMaine last spring after transferring from Boston College. He becomes eligible to play at the end of

the fall semester.

Returnees to the Black Bear backcourt include senior defensive specialist Derrick Jackson (Columbia, S.C.), is a team captain and has three years of starting experience. Sophomore Freddy Petkus (Plunge, Lithuania) returns after finishing third on the team in three-pointers with 32.


The frontcourt offense will revolve around 7-0 senior center Justin Rowe (Springfield, Mass.). A first

team All-America East selection last year, Rowe has the ability to dominate the inside both offensively and defensively. He averaged 12.6 points and a team-high 8.0 rebounds, and finished 2001-02 eighth in the nation in field goal percentage (.594) and fourth in blocks (121) in the final NCAA statistics. He also set a new UMaine single season blocks record with 121, and, in only one season in Orono, already ranks third in career blocks.

Joining Rowe in the front court will be senior Clayton Brown (Palmyra, N.J.), who displayed flashes of brilliance throughout the season, highlighted by a 28-point outburst against Brown, and hinted at the ability to be an all-conference power forward in America East in his final season. He returns with the best heal and conditioning of his career. Senior Rickey White (Topsham, Maine) should be an excellent all-around player on Joe Campbell



the Black Bear roster; he combines speed and quickness, explosive leaping ability, and deadly shooting accuracy (.519 FG%). Sophomore Joe **Campbell** (Bangor, Maine) stepped into the lineup last season after three starters where sidelined with injuries, and quickly became one of the premier three-point shooters in America East. Campbell, who began the season as a redshirt candidate, connected on 49.4 percent of his three-point attempts, and averaged 6.5 points and 3.6 rebounds as a rookie.


Junior Mark Flavin (Weymouth, Mass.) and sophomore David **Dubois** (St.-Gabriel, Quebec) saw minimal playing time last season, but both are high potential players who should see the floor more in 2002-03. At 6-10 and 6-9 respectively, Flavin and Dubois will battle for playing time in the post position.

UMaine's 2002–03 schedule is dominated by appearances in four regular season tournaments, two of which will be hosted by the Black Bears. Maine will open the season by hosting Georgia Southern, UM-Fort Kent, and John Jay College in the Maine Tip-Off Classic on Nov. 23-24 at Alfond Arena. The Black Bears will host their second tournament on Dec. 21-22 at the Alfond, where they will be joined by Jacksonville State, UM-Machias and Husson College.

Maine will head to New Orleans on Nov. 29-Dec. 1 for a three-day, eightteam tournament hosted by Tulane University, and will also participate in a tournament hosted by UT-Chattanooga on Dec. 29-30.

Other non-conference games for the Black Bears will be December road games at Clemson, Rhode Island, and Morgan State, and a home game against Indiana-Purdue Fort Wayne to close out February.

UMaine's 16-game America East slate begins January 4 at Alfond Arena against Albany. The America East Championship will begin March 8-9 at Boston University's Walter Brown Arena, with the title game on March 15 at the site of the higher seed.

Merica East begins its 15th year of all-sports championship competition with a reputation as one of the most comprehensive NCAA Division I conferences in the nation.

This commitment to broad-based, competitive Division I athletics programs complements the academic integrity of the nine distinguished member institutions: University at Albany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Hartford, University of Maine, University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University, Stony Brook University, and University of Vermont. America East also has an associate membership with Quinnipiac University in the sport of men's lacrosse.

America East's proven record of success in its sports will enable the conference to earn admission to 12 NCAA Championships in 2002–03. Student-athletes in the sports of baseball, men's basketball, women's basketball, field hockey, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, men's soccer, women's soccer, softball, men's tennis, women's tennis and volleyball, will receive access to NCAA Championships via the conference's automatic qualifiers. Individual champions at the America East Outdoor Track and Field Championship will receive bids to that NCAA Championship. In addition, several America East athletes in individual sports like cross country, indoor track and field and swimming and diving will have access to NCAA Championships.

Recent Success...

America East's success in each of its championship sports has been a benchmark for the conference since its inception as a basketball conference.

Basketball continues to garner much of the conference's attention with the 2002 men's and women's basketball championships played before large crowds and national (men's championship on ESPN) or regional (women's championship) television audiences. This attention should come as no surprise thanks to the conference's recent accomplishments in that sport. Since 1999, each of the six charter members of America East have appeared in either the NCAA Men's Basketball or Women's Basketball Championship, the National Invitation Tournament or the Women's National Invitation Tournament. Last year conference champion Hartford made its first appearance in the NCAA Women's Basketball Championship while regular-season champion Vermont was invited to the WNIT and advanced to the quarterfinal round. America East has sent multiple teams to the postseason in either men's or women's basketball five of the last six years.

Basketball has not been the only sport to garner national attention. America East sent two teams to the NCAA Women's Soccer Championship for the second-straight season on the heels of Hartford's trip to the quarterfinals in 1999. America East has also sent multiple teams to the NCAA field hockey and men's lacrosse championships in recent years.



Academics...


The graduation rates for student-athletes at America East institutions exceed that of the general student bodies at those schools.

The America East Conference annually recognizes it's student-athletes' success in the classroom. All varsity team members who compile a grade-point average between 3.0 and 3.49 during their playing season receive conference recognition by being named to the Academic Honor Roll. Those outstanding student-athletes who compile a grade-point average of 3.5 or higher are named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll. More than

1,500 student-athletes received honor roll recognition in 2001–02.

Additionally, the conference annually determines the top scholar-athlete in each of its 21 championship sports. The scholar-athlete must maintain a minimum 3.2 cumulative grade-point average and be a starter or prominent reserve on the team for the entire duration of the playing season. From the pool of 21 outstanding scholar-athletes, one male and one female America East student-athlete are further honored as the conference's Scholar-Athletes of the Year for that academic year.

America East honors the member institution whose student-athletes compile the highest overall team grade point average in each of its conference-sponsored sports with the America East Academic Cup. Binghamton won the 2001–02 Academic Cup to join Hartford, New Hampshire and Vermont as institutions to have earned that distinction.

America East in the Pros...


Several America East athletes have extended their athletic careers beyond the collegiate level. Hartford's Vin Baker, now of the Boston Celtics, continued the legacy of the late Reggie Lewis (Northeastern) when he participated in the NBA All-Star game. Former two-time America East Players of the Year Craig Claxton and Malik Rose are now teammates on the San Antonio Spurs. Former Player of the Year Norman Richardson completed his rookie season with the Chicago Bulls while former conference Rookie of the Year Rick Carlisle was the NBA Coach of the Year after leading the Detroit Pistons to a second-place finish in the Eastern Division during the regular-season.

Present Hartford head coach Jennifer Rizzotti plays for the Cleveland Rockers in the WNBA while former America East Players of the Year Cindy Blodgett (Maine), Jamie Cassidy (Maine) and Katasha Artis (Northeastern) also once played in the top women's professional league.

Deidre Enos, a two-time America East Player of the Year at Boston University, played the inaugural season in the Women's United Soccer Association (WUSA) for former Hartford head coach Mark Krikorian and the Philadelphia Charge.

Hartford's Jerry Kelly was third on the 2002 PGA Tour's money list, behind only Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson, following the British Open. Former Hartford golfer Tim Petrovic is also on the PGA Tour.

Former Hartford star Jeff Bagwell of the Houston Astros is a perennial All-Star, while Mike Bordick of the Baltimore Orioles, who led Maine to its most recent College World Series appearance, represented America East

in the 2000 Major League Baseball All-Star game. Former Northeastern star Carlos Pena is now with the Detroit Tigers while former America East Players of the Year Mark Sweeney (Maine) and Kevin Mench are also in the majors. Several other former America East players, including 14 draft choices from the last two seasons, are presently in the minor leagues.

America East also has a number of former men's soccer and men's lacrosse players in various professional leagues.

History...

To see how far America East has progressed, consider the conference was established in 1979 as the ECAC North. The conference at that time consisted of 10 institutions and sponsored league competition only in men's basketball, with the champion having an automatic bid to the NCAA Championship.

Men's basketball remained the lone league sport until the 1988-89 academic year. At that time, the Board of Directors made a new commitment to an all-sports league, creating the North Atlantic Conference by establishing an office, hiring a full-time commissioner, and embarking on a building program.

The North Atlantic Conference merged with the Seaboard Conference (the league in which Boston University, Hartford, Maine, New Hampshire, Northeastern and Vermont, among others, competed in women's basketball) in 1989 and the NAC looked to establish conference championships in several men's and women's sports.

The conference changed its name to America East prior to the 1996-97 academic year and later that year hired Chris Monasch as its second full-time commissioner and moved the conference headquarters to its present location in downtown Boston.



merica East has recently drawn notoriety with the selection of players such as Speedy Claxton, Malik Rose, Vin Baker, and Spencer Dunkley in the NBA draft. Claxton was a first round pick selected by the Philadelphia 76ers in the 2000 draft. Rose was selected in the second round by the Charlotte Hornets in the 1996 NBA draft. Baker, an NBA All-Star, was selected in 1993 by the Milwaukee Bucks.

University of Maine players have also advanced to play professional basketball. Most notably, Jeff Cross, Maine's all-time shot-blocking leader, and Rick Carlisle from the early 1980's played professionally in the National Basketball Association. Carlisle is now the head coach of the NBA's Detroit Pistons. He was named NBA Coach of the Year after leading the Pistons to a second-place finish in the Eastern Division during the regular season. Maine has seen several national team players and another former player, Jim Boylen, advance to the NBA as an assistant coach.

Recent UMaine players have been invited to NBA Rookie/Free Agent camps including Andy Bedard (Boston Celtics), Nate Fox (Houston Rockets) and Julian Dunkley (Philadelphia 76ers). Fox and Dunkley are enjoying successful European careers in Germany and Turkey respectively. Bedard, now an assistant coach at UMaine, and Allen Ledbetter, have played in Portugal. Erik Greene, a standout on the 2001-02 squad, is playing in Norway.

Francois Bouchard and Ed Jones, 1994 graduates, have prospered in foreign professional leagues. Last year Bouchard played his fifth season in France, while Jones, after playing for a year overseas, joined the UMaine coaching staff from 1995-02. Matt Moore, a native of Australia, returned home to play professionally in 1997 while his teammate Casey Arena has played in Spain and England.

The Walter Byers Scholarship Program was established in 1988 as a means of recognizing the contributions of the NCAA executive emeritus through encouraging excellence in academic performance by student-athletes.

Under this program one male and one female athlete are annually awarded a postgraduate scholarship in recognition of his or her outstanding academic achievement and potential for success in postgraduate study. An individual named a Byers scholar will have combined the best elements of mind and body to achieve national distinction, and promises to be a future leader in his of her field of service.

Smith combined the top grade-point average among senior electrical engineering majors with the North Atlantic Conference scoring title as captain of the 1989–90 Black Bears.





- Graduating senior Jamar Croom was named to the America East Academic Honor Roll and earned UMaine Scholar-Athlete Awards last vear.






