- 9th. To choose a Collector of Taxes. *H. ...*
- 10th. To choose one or more members of the School Committee.
- 11th. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 12th. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year and to see what action they will take in regard to the transportation of scholars. *1200*
- 13th. To see what action the town will take to have less number of schools in town and to adjust for the transportation of scholars to the same.
- 14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money

necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1909.

15th. To see if the town will raise, appropriate, and set apart, for the permanent improvement of the main highways, within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5, of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of \$73.00. *See*

25th. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to construct an iron fence around G. A. R. Hall.

26th. To see if the town will authorize the S. S. committee to open a school in the Choate school house.

27th. To see if the town will authorize the S. S. committee to open a school in the Carlton school house.

28th. To see if the town will authorize the S. S. committee to open a school in the Northey school house.

29th. To see if the town will vote to build a school house at Turner's Corner to take the place of the one that was burned
