WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

*To F. C. Jewett, a constable in the town of Whitefield
in the County of Lincoln, Greetings:*

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Whitefield, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town on the fourth day of March, 1918, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a Clerk.

ART. 3. To hear and act upon the report of the several town officers.

ART. 4. To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

ART. 5. To choose a Treasurer.

ART. 6. To choose an Auditor.

ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to have more than one road commissioner.

ART. 8. To choose a Collector of Taxes.

ART. 9. To see what time the taxes for 1918 shall be paid in full.

ART. 10. To choose one or more members of the school committee.

ART. 11. To choose all other necessary town officers.

ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year and to see what action they will take in re-

gard to transportation of scholars.

ART. 13. To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State Aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town under the provisions of Section 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

ART. 15. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under provisions of section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

ART. 16. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the poor, for the repairs of roads and bridges and to degray all other town charges.

ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free high schools and where they will locate the same.

ART. 18. To see if the town will appropriate \$25.00 to Erskine Post, G. A. R., for Memorial Day.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repairs to school buildings.

ART. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the purchase of school books.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the destruction of the nests

of the brown tail moth and how the same should be expended.

ART. 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payment of snow bills.

ART. 23. To select one or more Fire Wards, fix their compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.

ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town should the same become necessary.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to establish a school at North Whitefield and provide a place for the same, or take any other action relative thereto.

ART. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of Schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 27. To see if the town will grant and raise \$300.00 to be expended for gravel on the road beginning at the south line of the Roy Hapgood farm, so called, and go south.

ART. 28. To see what action the town will take in regard to rebuilding the town house bridge and to raise money for the same.

ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the S. S. Committee to establish a school in Plains district.

ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the town road leading from the driveway leading to the residence of H. M. Crocker to the driveway leading to the residence of A. B. McDonald.

ART. 31. To see if the town will vote the wages to be paid men and teams on the highway and the salaries of the several town officers.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town and hearing and deciding upon the applica-

tion of persons claiming to have their names entered on said list, at the town house at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
