HIGH SCHOOL REPORT

The high school has had a successful year. This fall there were twenty-one pupils registered. Ten were in the Freshman Class. During the past five years, the school has doubled in size. Most of the pupils go on to other schools and complete a four years' course.

The high school building has had quite a few repairs and two coats of paint. The appearance of the high schoolroom has been greatly improved. It has been repaired, woodwork painted, room papered, ceiling whitened, and seats refinished. The work of papering and the whitening of the ceiling was all given by people living near. The improvements are much appreciated. There is still work unfinished, but repeated efforts failed to get help to finish before the cold weather. It will be done as early as possible this spring.

There ought to be a larger amount voted for the support of high school and high school tuition. The tuition

alone, is \$665 this year. Next it will doubtless be more. Six expect to graduate from the four years' course, but out of the nine or ten completing our two years' course, as many more will go away. Owing to the greater number of the pupils living near the high school, not so much transportation has been required. One hundred dollars with what we now have on hand, will be sufficient for next year. You have been voting \$300. The \$200, not needed for transportation is badly needed for high school and tuition. In the amounts recommended for next year, the \$200, not needed for transportation, is added to the amount usually voted for high school and tuition away.

COMMON SCHOOLS REPORT

Our schools seem to be improving a little each year. Several of the teachers have made very special efforts to improve their pupils' scholarship. Many of the parents have noted this and tried to help all they could. As a whole, the teachers have been interested and worked well for the advancement of their pupils.

The Nortley School pupils have been transported to the Church School. The two schools together grade up very well, and make a more profitable school, than either alone.

The North Whitefield School registered thirty-five pupils last fall, thirty-three this winter. Twenty single desks were bought when that school-room was furnished. Old desks have been put in until there is hardly chance to walk around the room. Still there are not enough seats for all. Single seats, like the ones bought at first, will have to be provided to make seating room for all.

At the Fowles School, the shed has been connected this year. With seven connected, we are getting along very well with that work. It seems as though we ought to have no difficulty in connecting the others by the time required, 1927.

The North Whitefield School has bought a good talking machine this year, and that school and the Cooper's Mills have bought physical training records.

The pupils in the ninth grade at the Cooper's Mills School had a pretty graduation and a well carried out successful program.

Last spring the State examinations were given. The following passed: Doris Hughes, Fred Hickey, William Hickey, Mertie Hopkins, Ursula Reilly, Laurice Avery, Robert Nelson, Edmund Croxford, Donald Blair, Lore Ford, Jr., Harold Jewett, Lillian Carleton and Martha Potter.

As stated in the high school report, it has been impossible to get as much work done on repairs, as we planned. Help seemed unusually scarce. The finishing of the work at the high school building and the Fowles' School, will come first this spring. Our general plan, is to make repairs that are needed to preserve the buildings, and at the same time try to make the property look better. Neglected town buildings are not a good advertisement for a town. Buildings left without being painted, soon decay and in a few years there are heavy repair bills.

Town Warrant

To Frank C. Jewett, a constable in the town of Whitefield in the County of Lincoln. Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Whitefield qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the town house in said town on the second day of March, 1925, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a clerk.

ART. 3. To hear and act upon the report of the several town officers.

ART. 4. To elect Selectmen, Assessors and Overseer of the Poor.

ART. 5. To elect a Treasurer.

ART. 6. To elect an Auditor.

ART. 7. To elect one or more Road Commissioners.

ART. 8. To elect a Collector of Taxes.

ART. 9. To see what time the taxes of 1924 shall be paid in full.

ART. 10. To elect one or more members of the School Committee.

ART. 11. To elect all other necessary town officers.

ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 13. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Aid Highway during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provision of Section 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote yes or no, on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

ART. 15. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$1066 for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission for the Care of Ways, Highways and Bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913, together with an equal amount under the provisions of Section 21 of the same Chapter.

ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the poor, for repairs of roads and bridges, for snow bills, for patrolman and to defray all other town charges.

ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Free High School and for transportation of High School pupils.

ART. 18. To see what sum of money the town will raise to decorate the graves of soldiers buried in town and how the same shall be expended.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repairs of school buildings and for the purchase of school books.

ART. 20. To elect one or more fire wards, fix their compensation and raise money for the same.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town, should the same become necessary.

ART. 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the salary of Superintendent of Schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote the wages to be paid men and teams on the highway and the salaries of the several town officers.

ART. 24. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the payment or part payment of the Cooper's Mills bridge debt.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the School Committee to open the Northey school should the same become necessary.

ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to buy one or more road machines and what sum of money they will grant and raise for that purpose.

ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise \$250 to be expended on the road from Keyes Corner to Chelsea line, \$100, at town house corner, \$150, on road from Whitefield Plains to Pittston line, via. David Matthews.

ART. 28. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to remove the stone wall near Percy Chaney's, and the wall near Frank Orcutt's, to prevent drifting.

ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the town road leading from the Keyes Corner road to the Hatch place, so called, and to see if the town will vote to give Messrs. Markham and Dunford their real estate tax to keep said road in repair as a private way.

ART. 30. To see if the town will grant and raise \$100 to be expended in gravelling the Sinnott road, so called.

ART. 31. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen, Treasurer and Clerk.

ART. 32. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions under the provisions of Chapter 4, Section 59 of the Revised Statutes of Maine, the same to be expended by the Maine Development Association.

The Selectmen will be in session at the town house in said town at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town.

Hereof, fail not and have you there and then this warrant with your doings thereon.
