Dr. Jarno Habicht, the World Health Organization (WHO) representative in Ukraine, confirmed a severe weapons attack on a Ukrainian healthcare facility, resulting in four deaths and ten injuries, including six medical workers. He called for the protection and preservation of healthcare integrity and neutrality [5].

The devastating humanitarian consequences of Russia's invasion of Ukraine are evident. According to the WHO, 52 Ukrainian healthcare facilities have faced assaults since the onset of hostilities. The country grapples with a shortage of vital medicines and struggles to maintain fundamental health services. Monitoring the health in the region is crucial, as it hinges on the prospects of a lasting ceasefire. Another study report found 707 attacks on Ukraine's healthcare system, damaging nearly 9% of its hospitals [5, 6].

Research has shown that children with cancer have experienced significant hardships. The onset of bombings further exacerbated their conditions, as they were relocated from clinics to basements. This relocation initially hindered their treatments before humanitarian efforts intervened to assist them [7]. The invasion of a sovereign country blatantly breached international law, and Russia has purposefully and indiscriminately attacked Ukraine's healthcare system amidst continuous assaults on civilian infrastructure and populations. The disruption of healthcare services is once again exploited as a cruel war tactic, contravening international humanitarian law [8].

Strategies for ICU Health Professionals in War Zones

Post-war challenges include addressing personnel shortages and implementing new management strategies in the field. This goes beyond recruiting specialists, as incorporating advanced technologies is crucial to compensate for staff shortages. A global dialogue on war as a public health responsibility is vital, emphasizing the fight against hatred and promoting tolerance to strengthen peace. Additionally, challenging and abolishing the right of the state to wage war is crucial [9]. Working as an ICU health professional in a war zone is an incredibly challenging and demanding job. These healthcare professionals face the same demands as their counterparts in more stable environments, but they also contend with added risks associated with conflict areas. Strategies must be developed to ensure that ICU health professionals in war zones are adequately compensated, insured, and supported in their vital roles.

Hazard Pay and Incentives

ICU health professionals working in war zones should receive hazard pay to reflect the increased risks they face. This additional compensation can help incentivize qualified health professionals to work in areas where their skills are most needed, while also providing financial relief for those who may be underpaid and overworked. This insurance should cover medical expenses, including treatments and medications, as well as long-term care for chronic conditions or injuries sustained while working in conflict areas. Additionally, mental health support and counselling should be provided, as working in war zones can significantly affect their mental well-being.

Safety Training and Equipment

Furthermore, their quality of life is affected by these traumatic war events [10]. Establishing support networks for ICU health professionals working in war zones is crucial. These networks can offer a safe space for health professionals to share their experiences, offer emotional support, and provide resources for coping with the stresses of their job. Mental health services, such as counselling and therapy, should readily help health professionals manage the emotional and psychological toll of working in high-risk areas [11].

This can enhance their ability to provide effective care to patients and improve their overall job satisfaction.
