

WOULD YOU LIKE TO PREVENT DEAFNESS?

Then read exerpts of the following letter we received.

"Dear Father Egan: You may already be aware of the Temporal Bone Banks Program for Ear Research, but I am writing to you at the suggestion of one of your deaf, who is also one of our donors. . . I would like to give you information on our program and ask if there is any way that you could help us reach the Chicagoland Catholic deaf and hard of hearing.

"First, we are not asking for any contributions, but are anxious that all people who are hard of hearing or deaf be made aware of this national research effort which is being conducted to educate the public and especially the deafened public to the needs of ear research.

"This is a research effort to develop means of treating and preventing deafness through the acquisition and study of temporal (ear) bones of persons who have been deaf. If doctors knew exactly what happened in the ears of the deaf to have caused their deafness, they could help to develop ways to prevent this same problem from occurring in future generations.

"Only those who are deaf can provide this information which is essential for ear research. Of necessity, this must be a long-range effort since research can progress only as rapidly as temporal bones are acquired for study.

"The procedure is simple: A donor signs a legal pledge from donating his ear bones to medical research after death. This pledge must be signed by the nearest of kin and two witnesses. If a person has ever had his hearing tested or his ears examined, we ask for the name of the doctor so that we can write for a copy of the report. If not, we ask the donor a few questions about the early history of his deafness to make his pledge of greatest research value.

"Since it is important that we reach those who are severely deaf, I am appealing for your help. . . In order to reach the Chicagoland Catholic deaf, would it be possible to have a small item appear in your publication about the purpose of our research program and the importance and great need for the deaf to join in this effort. Perhaps it would be also important to assure them that there is no religious objection. . ."
