



According to Jan Thom, health specialist at Parkland College, the fourth year flu vaccinations have been given at the college was a big success.


One hundred people attended the vaccination, which was held in the quiet lounge on Wednesday, Oct. 8.

# Bus Proposal topic of discussion in Stu-Go

On October 7, Will Rawlings and Joshua Kanowitz, senators on the Student Government, met with Bill Volk, Senior manager for Mass Transit District (MTD) which operates in Champaign and Ur-

At the meeting they discussed ways to make traveling by bus a feasible and economical way to travel for full- and part-time Parkland Students, and other topics such as putting on more buses during peak rider times during the day and service availability.

The terms of the proposal are as follows:

1. A flat fee of eight dollars a semester would be imposed on all full time students.

2. Part time students will have the option to buy into the program for eight dollars.

Rawlings said that it was unfortunate that the fee must apply to all students, but MTD's contract with the University of Illinois states that U of I students must pay 25 dollars regardless of whether they ride the bus. Therefore to be fair with the U of I they

must charge all Parkland students also.

He also added that it still is a great bargain to those who ride the bus because they would save 72 dollars during Spring or Fall semesters, and 17 dollars during the Summer semester. That same eight dollars would only buy them 13 rides without the program.

The idea of community involvment was also discussed. The availability of an inexpensive bus pass and unlimited rides may be an incentive to lower income students to attend Parkland.

uring out problems and had a sound knowledge of the law. She also had to learn to take comments such as "you are so articulate" and "you hardly have any accent" as compliments.


