Poster causes controversy: **Discrimination against men?**

A sign posted by Connie Hosier, reading coordinator, has ruffled some feathers among the faculty.

The poster, which says:

Anything women do, they must do

twice as well as

men to be thought

half as good. Luckily this is not

difficult. -Mayor Charlotte Whitton

Ottawa, Canada has caused some faculty to suggest that discrimination is all right when leveled against males, while other faculty suggest that there are many other things worth getting upset over.

The faculty who oppose the poster do so for the following reasons:

One, male students could be offended.

"What do our male students think every time they

walk by?" asks Vicki Beitler, math professor. "Would anyone suggest that putting up a poster that simply said, 'Women are better than men' is a good idea?"

Two, some faculty fear posters such as this polarize different factions in our community.

"I have always taken pride in the way Parkland accepts, even embraces diverse population groups on campus." said Joyce Baldwin, programming director of the computer training center. "It puzzles me then, how a poster such as the one hanging in the C wing has remained on display without comment for several weeks."

Finally, some faculty wonder why discrimination is accepted against some people but not about others.

They have asked, "What if the poster mocked black people, or homosexuals- it would not be tolerated. Are white males the exception when it comes to receiving acceptance, respect and sensitivitv?"

Prof. Bret Fuller, though supportive of the sign, seems to concede this point. "Could any of us get away with saying things about women or African Americans? Of course not. It's allowed to take pot-shots against those in power, but it's never funny to make fun of those not empowered."

However, those faculty who support the posting of the sign have also put forth reasons for their beliefs.

First, they say the sign is not discriminatory, merely a commentary on the disparity between the way men and women are perceived in the workplace.

According to Jeff Kohmstedt, English professor, this seems evident enough just by looking at society.

Second, they argue all opinions deserve respect and consideration.

"We must realize that much of this simply boils down to

opinions," states John Moore, biology professor. "We should be considerate and acceptant of all points of view."

Professor Fuller agrees. "If we truly valued diversity, then we'd let people post whatever they want on their office doors. We'd learn to accept other people's opinions for what they are. Opinions."

Hosier, who posted the sign, has also responded, "Since freedom of speech is one of our rights for both men and women, I posted one of my beliefs. No ill will was intended. In fact, I enjoy the interest and dialogue that this poster has generated. I also have a sense of humor, am married to a man, and a man gave me this poster ten years ago."

Dermott speaks to news class

Although Becky Dermott's son suffers from cerebral palsy, she believes fully including him in a class without disabled students as the right decision.

Dermott's son, Orville, was diagnosed with cerebral palsy at age three. The treatments that followed were occupational therapy, physical therapy, and speech therapy. "We lived at the clinic four days a week," Dermott said. She is now a

When Orville was five years old, he went to school in Champaign where he was in

special education classes and regular classes. Less than a year later, Dermott received a grant for a project that would enable Orville to attend regular class full-time in Urbana, the town in which the family lives.

Orville became the first child to be brought back from out of district to be fully included in a regular class. With the help of an aid who adapts the material to fit Orville's needs,

he has been successfully included in regular classes for eight years.

Orville, who now is in the eighth grade, works at a hotel three hours a week. He uses symbols to communicate because he is 50 percent nonverbal.

As high school approaches, Dermott plans to observe the teachers to decide where the best place is for Orville. She said, "Every parent has the right to choose if they want their children to be fully included."







he movie, "Meet Joe Black," starring Brad Pitt and Anthony Hopkins has made its way into theaters. Now people are going out of their way to see this movie. Well, I'm sure your time can be better spent watching "The Wizard of Oz" for the thousandth time rather than seeing this movie.

For a serious drama, this movie was a comedy. Bill Parrish (Hopkins), a successful business man from New York is about to die. Death, taking the name Joe Black (Pitt), visits him to prepare him for the final event.

In Pleasantville, everything is, well, pleasant. People treat each other nicely; they go about their living and, of course, they do it all in black and white.


You see "nice" is boring. You can't be nice and colorful; you can't be nice creatively.

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


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
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Police Blotter: A look at campus police beats

NORTHRIGDE, Calif. (CPX)--According to the Daily Sundial, a woman at California State University at Northridge reported to police on Sept. 15 that she saw a man on campus clutching his abdomen as if in pain. The woman said she ran in the direction of campus police to get the man help. As she looked over her shoulder, she spied the man unzipping his pants and exposing himself. The woman said the man chased after her while yelling obscenities. She told police she ran home and was unharmed.

BOULDER, Colo. (CPX) -- A couple living near the University of Colorado at Boulder told police on Sept.18 that they awoke to find a drunk student passed out in their bathroom. According to the Campus Press, the student, a 19-year-old who lives on campus, apparently opened the couple's front door, unlatched a chain lock to let himself inside and wandered into the bathroom, where he passed out. One of the victims told police that he heard a loud noise in the middle of the night but went back to sleep. He found the student when he awoke to use the bathroom at 6 a.m. The student was treated for a cut on his head and charged with first degree criminal trespassing.

CINCINNATI, Ohio (CPX)--Five students at the University of Cincinnati who were accused of breaking into the Cincinnati Zoo to ride the camels pleaded no contest to criminal trespassing Sept. 28 and were fined \$150 each. At about 3:30 a.m. on the previous night, the students managed to scale two fences -one surrounding the camel pit -- before security guards caught them, police said.

tled. Ben Manski, a senior known for his campus activism, has pleaded not guilty to the charges. He was arrested after police said he repeatedly shouted "What about democracy, Governor?" during a Sept. 10 speech Thompson delivered at the university. Manski said he shouted during Thompson's because the governor has denied student's requests to meet with him. The ruling allows Manski to participate in protests and to write editorials against Thompson, said his attorney, Jordan Loeb. " But, if you were thinking about going golfing with the governor, it is off." Loeb joked with Manski after the hearing.

ATLANTA, Ga. (CPX)-- Police at Emory University said one student could have avoided a whole lot of trouble on Sept. 20if he had simply walked home afterhaving too much to drink. According to the Emory Wheel, police spied the man lifting bicycles over his head and throwing them to the ground. Officers said the student broke into a run as they approached him. Once caught, police said the student told them he was "born in 1980", but produced a driver's license stating he was older. Police charged the student with public intoxication and possession of a fictitious license and jailed him for the rest of the night. "Usually it takes behavior other than the appearance that you have been drinking before we will arrest (you)," said campus police Chief Craig Watson.

AUSTIN, Texas (CPX)-- A junior at the University of Texas at Austin has been charged with manufacturing fake IDs and selling them to high school and college students for \$100 each, the Daily Texan has reported. Travis Wade Scott, a computer science major, was arrested Sept. 28 after police searched his apartment and found several fake driver's licenses and computer equipment believed to have been used to make them, said Tela Goodwin Mange, a spokeswoman for the campus' department of public safety. According to the Daily Texan, police had investigated Scott for nearly a year after fake IDs bearing certain similarities turned up throughout the Austin and San Antonio area. Several minors also named Scott as the person from whom they purchased the fakes, Mange said. If convicted, Scott faces up to 10 years in prison and a

LOS ANGELES, Calif. (CPX)-Students living near the University of California at Los Angeles are worried that their lingerie will be pilfered by a man who obviously has a thing for women's underwear. According to the Daily Bruin, Los Angeles police have followed a string of unusual burglaries since January 1997. In each case, a burglar has entered an apartment, sorted through the victim's belongings and taken lingerie and other personal items, leaving behind no mess and little evidence that he was ever there. "He seems to like Victoria's Secret, but he is not limited to that," Los Angeles police Det. Charles Dempsy told the Bruin. "He has also taken a cocktail dress; he has taken phone numbers and called the apartment; he takes personal items. I think he's trying to reach out to them (the victims)." At least two have come home to find the suspect in their apartments. He told both women he was looking for a female friend. The suspect who is also reported to be a peeping tom - tries to blend in with the campus surroundings. When the man attempted to pay with a \$1 bill. he was told it wouldn't be enough. The man - carrying a wallet with a \$5 bill clearly in sight - tried to pay with \$100 bill and got upset when he was told th coffeehouse would be unable to make change. THe man responded by pulling a knife out of his pocket and holding it at his side. A police officer who tried to calm the man arrested him on charges of public in-

BLACKSBURG, Va. (CPX) -Police have arrested seven members of the Phi Kappa SIgma fraternity chapter at Virginia Tech in connection with the September 20 abduction and robbery of an exotic dancer and her escort. According to the Collegiate Times, the fraternity members held the dancer, Michelle Russell, and her escort, David Cheresnowsky, against their will for 30 to 40 minutes after Roberts refused to perform a full body strip. When Russell also refused to provide other requested forms of entertainment, she and Cheresnowsky said a fraternity member reached into Cheresnowsky's pocket to retrieve \$325 - the amount the fraternity had paid for Russell's performances, said campus police officer Jerry Olinger. THe case remains under investigation, and more arrests are possible, Olinger told the Times.

LAWRENCE, Kan. (CPX) -Four Lawrence, Kansas residents, including three students at the University of Kansas, were the victims of two separate robbery attempts in which the suspect made off with more than anything else. According to the Daily Kansan, a 20-year-old man not enrolled at the University told police that he was awakened around 4:00, a.m. on October 18 by a man wearing a yellow T-shirt who was standing in his living room. "The victim's dog began to growl, and the victim told the man to leave,' Lawrence Police Sgt. George Wheeler told the Kansan. "Before the man left, he took some food from the victim's fridge" - some cheese and a burrito. Three female students living in the same off-campus apartment complex reported that they were awakened only moments later by a man matching the same description. One woman said she saw the man trying to steal her stereo and told him to leave. The surprised burglar dropped dropped the stereo and ran out the back door to the apartment. 
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
