Part-time job fair a success

"The Part-time Job Fair (hosted by Parkland for more than 40 companies last week) was a complete success," said Gerry Hough, director of Career Planning and Placement.

The fair lasted only three hours, but it is estimated that more than 500 students investigated the part-time jobs available.

Many applications were filled out, quite a few on-the-spot interviews took place, and some students found themselves with new jobs prior to the day's end.

The large number of companies flocking to Parkland campus in no surprise in Champaign-Urbana's current job rich (at least in the part-time spectrum) market.

"We always see a large number of part-time positions open up around town when

the students get back," said Mike Harrison, a spokesman for the Champaign mayor's office. "There are companies looking for good help all over town."

Some of the largest employers in town, Kraft and Hobbico are unaffected by the student cycle. However, for the majority of businesses, the student body, which comprises about 25 percent of the Champaign-Urbana population, is extremely important.

Hough added that student job hunters who may have missed the Fair can get help from Parkland's Career Planning and Employment Center. Its personnel provides help in filling out applications, writing resumes, and responding to interview questions.

Internet outranks beer

A survey of 1200 students at 100 colleges and universities nationwide, conducted by research firm Student Monitor LLC, shows that when asked what was "in" on campus, 72.5% of the respondents answered "the Internet," whereas only 70.8% named "drinking beer." Up until now, beer-drinking has held the top spot since the biannual surveys began in 1988.

Value cards

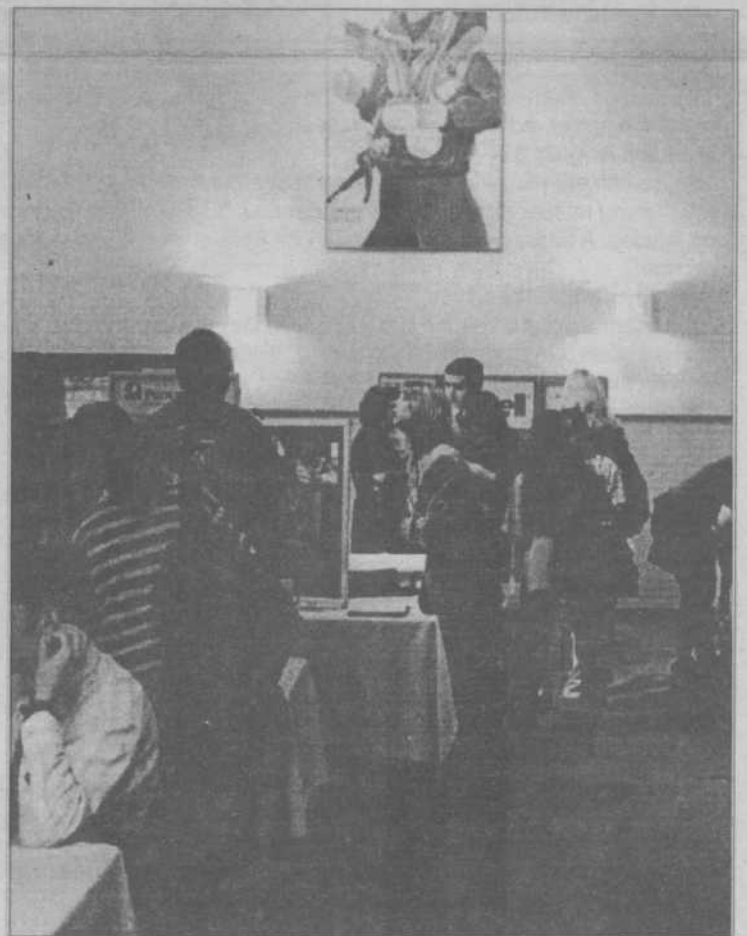
Student government will begin selling value cards next week.

Monday, August 24

The Ten-Minute production has become an annual event after its success last year.

Originally, they were performed to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the Parkland's theater. "They were such a big hit that people wanted them back," said cast member Mindy Reed.

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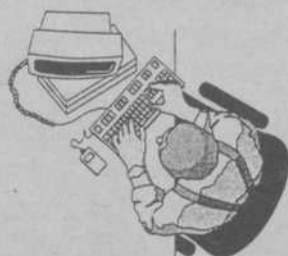
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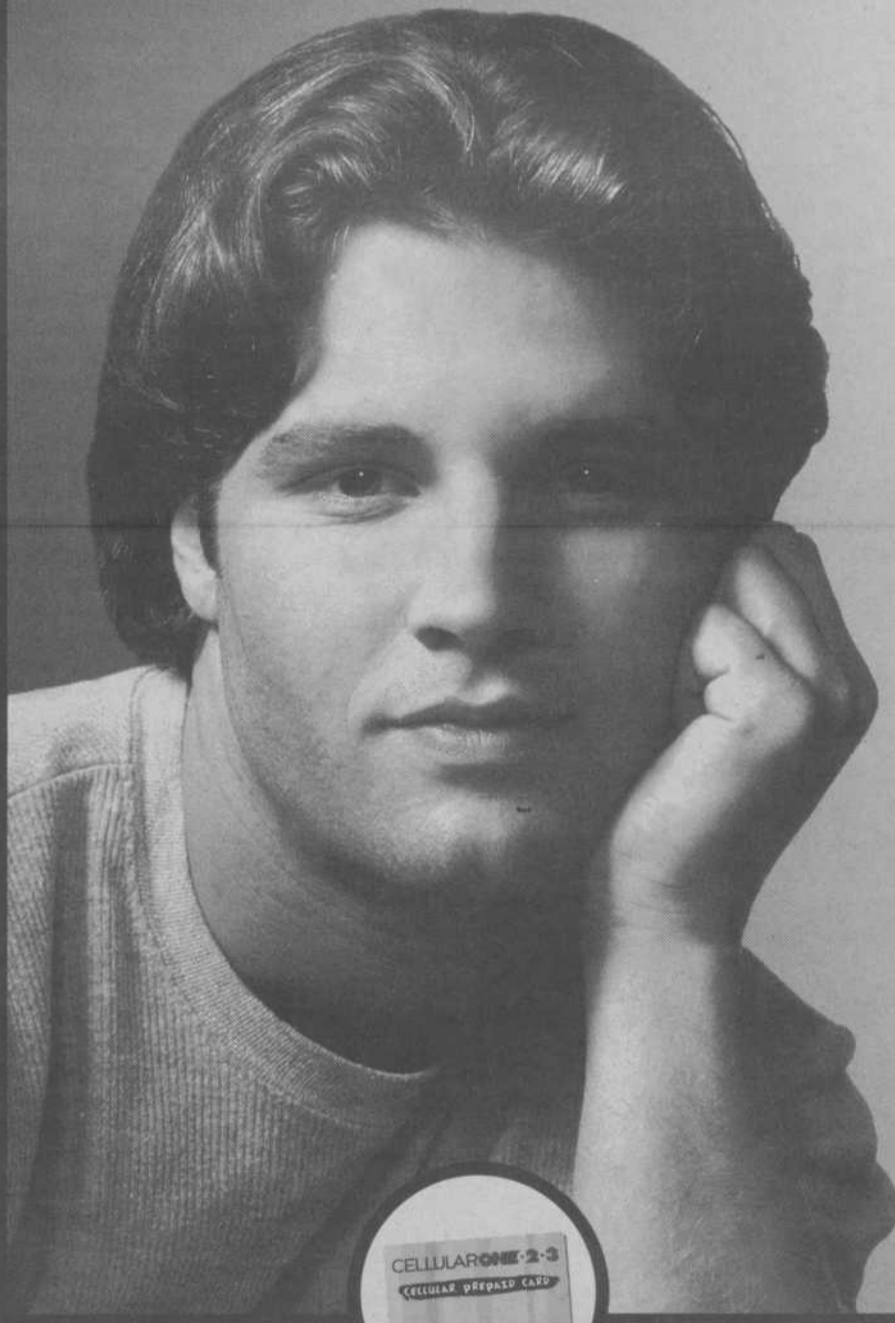

Lady Cobras get sssweet revenge

With almost effortless style, Parkland's Lady Cobras polished off defending conference champion DACC 4-2 and 4-1 on Wednesday (Sept. 2).

The Cobras had some sweet revenge on the Jaguars, who upset Parkland last year in the conference championship with a score of 9 - 8, stealing the title from the two-year defending conference champions.

However, Head Coach Argie

Johnson was a bit skeptical of the Wednesday win. "A fall win is misleading because we may not see the best players a team may have. This game answered questions about how tough our team could be defensively."

The defense is getting a lot of help this year with the addition of key players such as catcher LeAnna Lugo, member of the Puerto Rican National Olympic team of 2000, and the improved skills of returning players like outfielder Teniel Seifert and pitcher Amelia Williams. "There are a few that

are looking real well early. We just want to put ourselves in a position to take conference," said Johnson.

Fatigue is also another big determinant of defense and was a problem last year that the coaching staff is trying to remedy this year.

With three freshman pitchers, Amerlia Williams will have some relief that she did not have last year when she pitched around 90% of the time during her freshman season.

The new pitchers will help on mistakes defensively and give the Cobras

more depth in the pitching area.

They will try to carry on this depth into the next season by having all 22 players come out ready to go without nagging injuries from the fall. The Cobras play most of their 40+ games spring season between spring break and the end of April, so intensity is a big factor in every game.

The task now before the coaching staff is to get these players ready for the fall season and turn the word "individual" into "team."
