John Lee Johnson: Solve racial problems

John Lee Johnson, a ship. community activist, spoke on racial problems during a student forum sponsored by the Student Government.

Although he addressed mainly African American people, he didn't limit his discussion to them.

According to Johnson, people simply refuse to address race issues, and he said they have to come to grips and face racial policies, quickly solve the problems, and move on to a higher level of relation-

"We are a nation," he said, "and there shouldn't be racial preferences."

One of his goals is to end the mandatory assigning students to certain schools, depending on their race. "If a child is forced to attend a school, there is a problem."

He encouraged the students attending his discussion not to depend on laws and regulations to break the racial structure, but to take advantage of school Cont. on Page 3




Thursday, January 15


ing opportunities and work their way into the mainstream of America.

He also encouraged the students to get their four and six-year degrees so they can have a part in making laws.

According to Johnson, there is a structural problem in American life, and it needs to be reshaped. He said that immigrants from other countries can, with hard work and knowledge, be successful in America however he said because of structural problems left over from when African Americans were slaves, they are often kept from success.

He encouraged them not to further that image by adopting an attitude of not caring, but to help themselves and not depend on others for advancement.

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

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
