## 4 Parkland PROF students honored

Four Parkland PROF Scholars were honored at a reception last week.

To become a PROF Scholar, "A student must have compelling academic promise, plan to continue his/her studies at a four-year college or university and set a career goal of teaching in a community college," Karen Keener, Department Chair/Humanities, said.

Brenda Benton, a senior in English at UIUC, one of the four students, said the program "gave me direction and made me more focused to succeed."

Benton will become part of the Parkland teaching staff after she completes her Master's degree

in 2001.

Marlon James, a senior in Sociology at ISU, said PROF has "opened a lot of doors" for him. He said it gave him access to programs that he would not have known about.

Melissa Pearson, a graduate student in English, will complete her Master's degree in English at UIUC this fall. She will begin teaching full time at Parkland in January 2000.

Pearson said her mentor and instructors at Parkland helped her "tremendously." She said she loves Parkland for the "close connection the teachers had with me while I was a student here."

Larry Taylor, a graduate student in counseling Psychology at EIU, said the most enjoyable part about

the program, for him, was the commitment he made with the community.

His future goals are to teach psychology and related subjects at Parkland. He said he also wants to get involved in OASIS (Office for African and African-American Studies, Information, and Services).

He always has had the desire to teach, he said, even though his major is counseling, and he thinks teaching is good training for his future.

To apply for the PROF program, a student must complete 60 transferable hours by the end of the semester in which the student has applied.

An applicant must earn at least 15 credit hours at Parkland with a minimum of a 3.2 GPA. An applicant must be a member of a racial or ethnic minority, have academic promise, plan to continue her/his studies at a four-year college or university, and set a career goal of teaching in a community college.

After acceptance, the student must complete bachelor's and master's degrees and teach at Parkland for one semester for each

semester the PROF scholar received the grant.

While the student is in college, PROF supplies supportive mentoring plus a \$3,000 to \$5,000 annual stipend.

To reduce those possibilities, she provides information on choosing child care and referral and consultation for students with child care needs.

Minyard also works frequently with relevant Parkland departments including Child Development, Admissions, Advising, Counseling, Adult Education, and Financial Aid.

"Parkland provides an excellent variety of specialized help," Minyard said. "Every child care problem is slightly different, so the range of help from Park-

providers also can get her help in getting licensed, enrolling children, and contacting subsidizing agencies.

Minyard will assist providers with site visits, one-to-one problem solving assistance, locating resources, and recognition/award activities.

*Runaway Bride*, starring Richard Gere and Julia Roberts, is the type of movie almost anyone could fall for. Even the cynical people who didn't find anything charming about a corporate raider romancing a Hollywood hooker will find this movie an unexpected treat.

Sure, the film is unabashedly sen-

timental and set in one of those quaint New England towns that only exist in the movies, but it's funny and entertaining right from the opening scene.

Gere plays Ike Graham, a *USA Today* columnist who rants about relationships and doesn't connect much with the opposite sex himself.

Even his ex-wife/editor is threatening to can him over factual inaccuracies in his latest indictment of "the

runaway bride" from rural Maryland. To keep his job, Ike journeys to cozy Hale, the hometown of the famous "runaway bride," Maggie Carpenter (Roberts), with a man-eating reputation.

I won't give away the inevitable ending, but in a refreshing twist, the ever-baffled Mattie teaches Ike some lessons of the heart too, and we actually see their attraction building in the process.

Garry Marshall directs with his usual conventional confidence, but this film has a lot more satisfying snap than his last goo-fest, *The Other Sister*.

So with all things considered, I give this movie three stars for its script full of clever surprises.

## Parkland Honors Founding Father

On the afternoon of August 13th the President of Parkland College, Dr. Zelema Harris, along with the help of guest speaker William Froom, dedicated Parkland's central fountain and garden in honor of Raphael 'Ray' Braun.

Mr. Braun was one of the five founding members of Parkland

College. The five founders brought together members from throughout the community and beyond to support the creation of Parkland Community College.

Mr. William Froom, himself one of Parkland's founders, remembers Ray Braun as "...the kind of guy that when you met him, you automatically liked him. If you knew him for an

hour, you felt like you'd known him all of your life."

A stone near the fountain bears the name and dates of Mr. Braun's life --1912 to 1993. The fountain and garden area itself has seen improvements thanks to the efforts of Mr. Braun's family.
