Donors meet scholarship beneficiaries

Parkland scholarship recipients had the opportunity Tuesday to meet the scholarship donors who are assisting them in attaining their educational goals.

"The scholarship reception recognized Parkland students who have received some sort of scholarship from the Board of Trustees, the Parkland College Foundation, and the community," said Carol Steinman, the associate vice president of student services and dean of students. "It also gave faculty, staff, and members of the community who

have donated scholarships the opportunity to meet with the students who received them."

There is a wide range in the amount and type of scholarships awarded.

"The scholarships may be \$500 to help with books and tuition, or a year's tuition, or something in between," said Steinman. "There's a lot of variety."

Criteria for scholarships also varies.

"We look at achievement for some, financial need for others, and a combination for others," said Carl Meyer, the executive director of the Parkland College Foundation.

"Some scholarships are for specific academic areas and some are general scholarships."

Both scholarship donors and scholarship recipients

enjoyed the opportunity to meet.

"The donors were just as excited as the recipients," said Meyer. "There was great satisfaction between all parties."

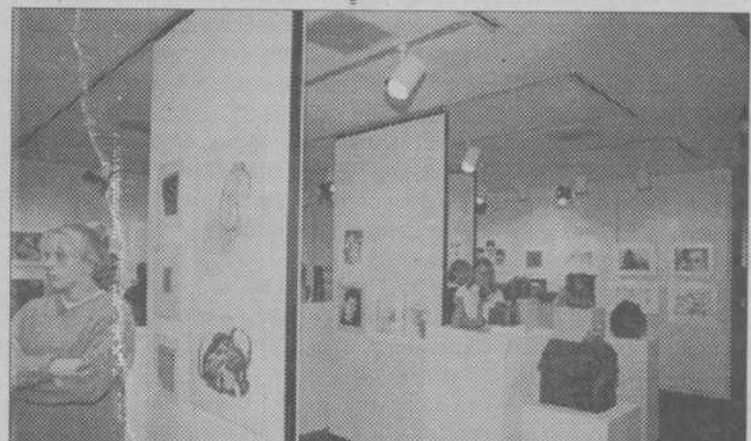

Orientation set for May 7

Computer networking class begins

The first step toward a career in computer networking can be taken by attending a Cisco Academy orientation meeting at 7 p.m. May 7 in room C118.

Last summer, Parkland entered into an agreement with Cisco Systems, Inc., a provider of hardware and software support for the Internet,

to prepare students to pass the Cisco Certified Network Associate (CCNA) networking certification exam.

Passing the CCNA exam qualifies a person for employment in the field of computer networking.

Thirty people will be accepted in Parkland's first Cisco class. The program will

consist of four courses that can be taken in two semesters. Participants in the program can take course during the way or in the evening. The tentative day schedule is Mondays through Fridays from 9 to 10:50 a.m.; the tentative evening schedule is Mondays through Thursdays from 5:30 to 8:45 p.m.

As a Cisco Training Academy with both regional and local status, Parkland prepared students to take the CCNA exam and supports the local Cisco networking academies at area high schools.

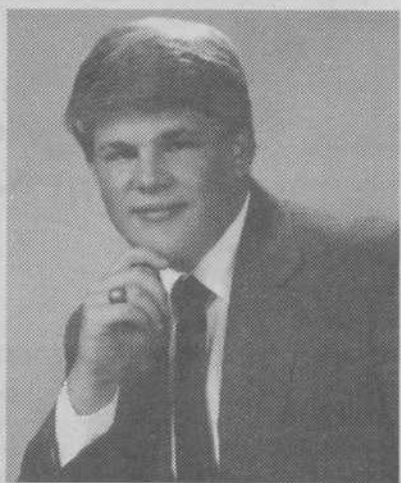
Directed by Randi Collins Hard, with musical direction by Tim Schirmer, the cast

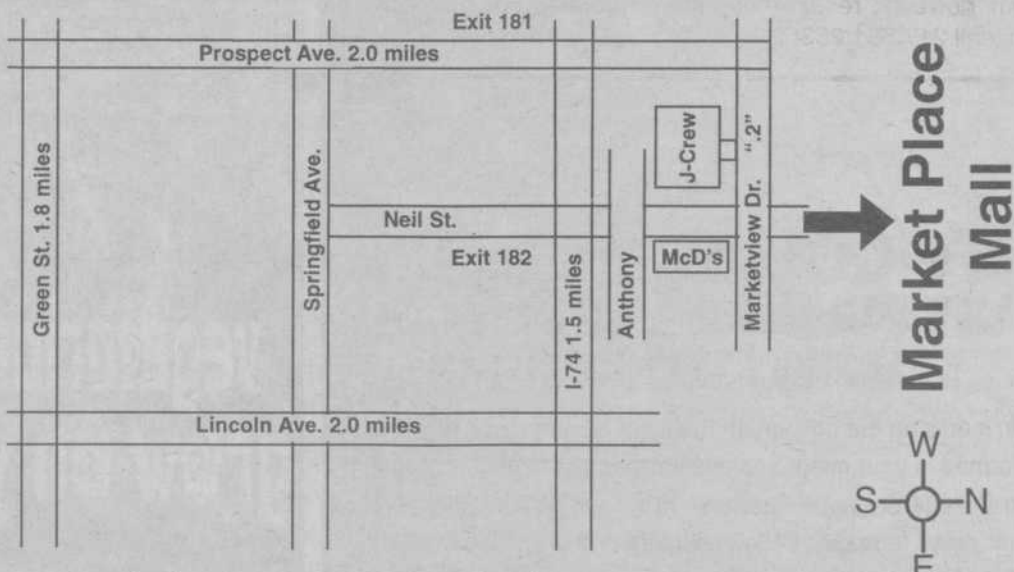

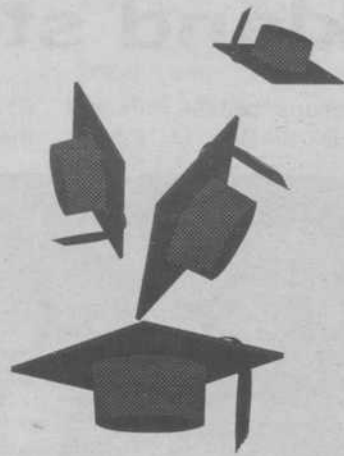

Students scramble to finance tuition

Company fails to honor scholarships

HOUSTON (CPX)- Some of the best and brightest high school seniors in the country are feeling the most burned by what appears to have been a bogus scholarship program.

Straight-A students National Merit Scholars and the class valedictorians competed for a chance to win a \$10,000-a-year scholarship, renewable for four years, from Houston-based AdamsVision USA. One winner from each state and the District of Columbia was chosen.

There was just one little

problem: AdamsVision now admits there is no money to give away and there never was.

Now students, who were turned down for other scholarships after being named winners for such a hefty award, and their parents are searching for answers, and in some cases, attorneys.

"I'd like to believe that it was just an unfortunate mistake but I kind of think I've been had," Amber March, a student at Eckerd College in Florida told the Associated Press.

Wise assumption, Texas prosecutors say. They describe Val Adams, the compa-

ny's founder as a career-criminal who has been convicted of theft for writing bad checks.

"His schemes were fairly grandiose," John Boone of the Harris County prosecutor's office told AP. "He had some sort of fake business, and he would use checks from the business to basically just to live well."

Adams acknowledges his criminal past but insists the scholarships were legitimate. He is quick to point out that neither students nor their parents were required to pay application fees- information that many scholarships recipients and their parents confirm.

Adams said he founded

AdamsVision in 1997 with the intention of providing much-needed college scholarships. He sent applications for the business' "Scholar-Leadership Award to every high school in the country and encouraged eligible students - those with at least a 3.0 grade-point average and combined SAT score of at least 1160- to apply.

He then hired a former teacher to assemble a panel of 15 educators who would choose the finalists. The teacher said she grew suspicious in January of 1998 when Adams failed to pay her and the panel of members for their work.

After announcing the win-

ners early last year, Adams was forced to follow up with a letter confirming to students and their parents that funding for the scholarships wasn't complete. The final blow came last month when he sent a two-paragraph letter to the university of each winner's choice explaining that AdamsVision "will not be financially capable of honoring the Student-Leadership Award at this time."

Adams told the Associated Press that he's still trying to get corporations like Ford, Sony, and Time-Warner to fund the scholarships. He also acknowledged that he has yet to receive money from any company.

A five hundred dollar (\$500.00) award will be made in cash to the community college student and/or employee whose design is selected from a panel of State Foundation Board members, the CEO, selected Illinois Community College Board employees and some local Foundation Executive Director's.

The logo should be simplistic as possible and capable of being marketed to corporations, businesses and individuals. The design would be recognizable on its own reflect to reflect the State Foundation (as for example the McDonald's Golden Arches logo). The logo maximum size should be 4"x4" which will allow for reduction to 1"x1".

Other criteria to reflect on when designing the logo are:

1. Symbolize the spirit of the Community College philosophy.
2. Represent the statewide system of 40 community colleges.
3. Pay tribute to the community college student, dedicated to the desire to study and enter the job market to become leaders and experts in the technology age of the new millennium.
4. Have appeal for the corporate and business community, along with individuals who will view the State Foundation as an entity savvy enough to provide dollars to move the system to a higher level of success.
5. Create a simplistic logo that can be marketed with increasing recognition.
6. Represent a level of continuing education (life-long learning) that enhances a changing and increased challenging job world.
7. Recognize the community college transfer student pursuing additional years of education.
8. Represent a Statewide Foundation that provides multiple scholarships for students in all 40 local community colleges.
9. Symbolizes the uniqueness and success of the community college in higher education, the fastest growing.
10. Reflects the one million community college students that continues to grow dramatically in the new century.
11. Recognizes a segment of higher education that is the "college of the people."
12. Will be easily marketed in the various media, as well as on an individual basis.
13. Symbolize the power of a system yet to be fully recognized and thus respected.
14. Is and will continue to be the major training sector for corporations and businesses world wide.
15. Symbolize the unity of 40 local community colleges joining together to maximize non-public dollars.
