

# Freedom from Fear event at U of I

Freedom From Fear, a three-day event to raise community awareness of sexual abuse and domestic violence will begin Friday (April 30) and continue through Sunday (May 2)

Presentations, discussions, and entertainment — all free — will be offered at the Illinois Disciples Foundation, corner of Springfield and Wright, Champaign.

The two-day, 20-event

awareness weekend will begin with Take Back the Night: a speak out at 6 p.m. on the UI campus, a rally at 7:15 p.m. on the South Quad, and a march on campus at 8 p.m.

Heather Tondini, coordinator of the event, a counselor at A Woman's Place, and part-time reading instructor at Parkland, said the main goals of the event are to educate the public in the problem of sexual and domestic violence and to make the public more aware of some of the programs available to battered and abused

women.

The event is free and will feature activities ranging from speaking and a theatrical performance to live music by local bands.

Speaking at two Newswriting classes, Tondini said men, women, children, old people, sick and disabled are all involved in various forms of abuse.

Lorena Johnson, Parkland instructor, will speak on Oppression at 3 p.m. Saturday at the Foundation.

At noon on Monday in the

Flag Lounge, Ross Wantland, RCS records clerk, will talk on the male role in abusive relationships.

Tondini said that one of three women are sexually assaulted at least once in their lifetime and that 95 percent of violators are male. She also said that one in five men have been sexually assaulted during childhood.

Every 15 seconds a woman is being battered in the U.S., Tondini said.

## Domestic abuse may hit 4 million in U.S.

Every year an estimated 2 to 4 million women are victims of domestic abuse, more than those who are victims of rape, muggings, and car accidents, according to freshman Tara Kohlbecker.

In a speech to Newswriting students last week, she said there is a common misconception that abused women

come only from low economic groups. However, she said, abused women are daughters, sisters, co-workers and classmates from all economic groups.

Kohlbecker said one third to one half of all women will be abused in their lifetime.

Domestic abuse comes in three forms: physical, sexual, and emotional. Kohlbecker stated that emotional abuse is

often the worst because it lowers the woman's self esteem.

So why don't women leave? According to Kohlbecker, they often feel trapped and are afraid that if they leave they will be killed. Also, she said, many women have no money and feel they have nowhere to go.

There are 1,500 women's shelters in the U.S., Kohlbecker said — compared

to three times that number of animal shelters.

Kohlbecker said in Champaign - Urbana, abused women have some options. These are the Mental Health Center that offers income based counseling, and A Woman's Place that offers shelter and escape from dangerous situations in which women could be abused.

# Blood drive offers you the chance

From 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Gallery Lounge on April 28 you can give a person the gift of life.

When I took the assignment to write this story, I had every intention of writing a story that would attract other people into giving blood, but I had no intention of doing it myself. There was just something about someone sticking a big needle in my arm that struck me as insane. No way.

But the more I looked through the enormous number of pamphlets I was given, the more I realized that what might be a minor pain and inconvenience to me would

mean life or death to someone

And while there are lots of people giving blood donations, there are many more who need them.

It's not just the blood donations they need though. They also need people who are willing to have a small portion of their blood donation tested for a possible marrow transplant.

Let me map it out for you: a small flask of our blood will be tested for tissue type or HLA type (this is used to determine the possibility of a match). Your name and type are put into a computer list called the pool.

If a match were to come up and you still agreed to go through with it, you would

have the chance to donate a small portion of your marrow to someone who may depend on your match for his or her life.

Chances of finding a match are slim, and it's a hit or miss situation as far as finding one goes, but just giving it a try is enough. The National Marrow Donor Program continuously brings up the point that the chances of finding a match for these people would be so much better if the pool of donors were larger.

Right now, the chances for a Caucasian are fairly decent, yet still not perfect. A Caucasian has about an 85 percent chance of finding a donor (up from 80 last year), but because tissue types are

different within different ethnic or racial groups, that doesn't help any of the minorities.

That's why, once again the NMDP is trying to encourage minorities to get involved in the program. The chances for an African American to find a donor match are about half that of a Caucasian's chances, and other minorities even less than that. The reason: the lack of minority donors.

It doesn't hurt. It does make you feel very good about yourself.

Finally, thanks to Jan Thom, Health and Safety Specialist, for helping me understand the need people have for our help and the power we have to help them.

## Parkland students, staff are regular movie goers

Eighty-five percent of 122 Parkland students and staff said recently that they attend movies in Champaign about once a

month.

Savoy 16 and the Beverly were the most popular theaters with attendance rates of 86 and 63 percent.

More than half (51%) of the respondents said they

go to a movie every two to three months. Sixty percent said they pay for their own ticket, and 28% pay for their ticket and someone else's.

Sixty-seven percent said they buy refreshments

when they attend movies. One respondent said he pays about \$15 for refreshments.

How do they find out what's on at the movies? Ninety-one replied: newspaper ads.

And would they movie ads if they were in the Prospectus? Forty-eight percent said yes.

The survey was conducted by Newswriting 105 students during the past three weeks.

◆ If you have symptoms of a heart attack, such as chest pains, chew and swallow one adult aspirin tablet (325 milligrams) immediately while you seek medical help. If you only have baby or "low-strength" aspirin at home, chew four of them.

◆ Skipping on sleep may do more than just darken under-eye circles--it also appears to raise your blood pressure and may increase the risk of heart damage over time, according to a report in the January *American Journal of Hypertension*. The study of 36 men and women with untreated mild-to-moderate hypertension found that restricting sleep to just four hours a night raised blood pressure by about 15 points and heart rate by about 8 beats a minute during the hours when people would normally be sleeping. The next day, both measurements stayed somewhat elevated. People with diagnosed hypertension should strive to get seven or eight hours of sleep a night, says Michael Weber, M.D., president of the American Society of Hypertension. For those who are chronically short on sleep, switching to a long-acting blood pressure medication may help blunt the rise in blood pressure that naturally occurs in the early morning.

◆ 84% of adults say they always wash their hands after using the restroom. But a recent observational study of over 63,000 adults in public restrooms in New York, Chicago, Atlanta, New Orleans, and San Francisco found that only 74% of women and 61% of men wash their hands. Note: to be effective, you must wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds (for kids, that's two rounds of "Happy Birthday to You).





## Three elected to Parkland Board

The Parkland College Board of Trustees will be welcoming back two of its members for a second term -- and will be joined by a brand new member -- following the districtwide board election April 13.

Incumbents Wayne Busboom of Urbana and Paul Quinlan of Champaign and newcomer Dana Trimble of Newman will begin their six-year terms in November.

The unofficial totals from Tuesday's election showed Paul Quinlan with 20,220 votes, Dana Trimble with 19,806, and Wayne Busboom with 17,685. Also running for the board positions were John

Maloney of Urbana with 15,552 votes and Buzz Alan Langhofer of Champaign with 6,741 votes.

Mr. Trimble, president and CEO of the First National Bank in Georgetown, has also worked on a grain and livestock farm and in seed production facilities. He has a bachelor's degree in agricultural economics and a master's degree in beef science, both from the University of Illinois.

"While truly grateful for the opportunity to serve on the Parkland Board," Mr. Trimble said, "I realize there is much to learn, many people to meet, and a lot of homework to be

done, but I sincerely look forward to it all."

Mr. Trimble will fill the seat held by long-time board member and current chair John Albin when Mr. Albin completes his term in November. Mr. Albin, also of Newman, was appointed to the seven-member board in 1968 and has served as chair since 1990.

Mr. Busboom, a farmer, attended the University of Illinois, and Mr. Quinlan, a retired teacher, has a B.S., M.S., and Ed.D. from the University of Illinois. Both were originally elected to the Parkland board in 1993.

# Mayes talks about his job at WICD

J.D. Mayes says he likes the opportunity to be creative in his job as a promotions director at NBC News Channel 15 (WICD).

Mayes promotes the newscasts, individual anchors, reporters, and the station by creating 30-second commercials and running them throughout the day.

His other job is to promote NBC programming such as *Days of Our Lives*, *Seinfeld*, reruns, and prime time shows including *Friends*, *Mad About You* and *ER*. He promotes the shows by running promos that NBC sends and tagging those with WICD graphics at the end.

Mayes started out at WICS in Springfield as an intern in the production department. From there, he became a full time photographer. "Then I moved back into production, commercial production. Then an assistant promotions director job opened here at WICD, and I took that as a way of moving up the ladder."

Since then, he has moved farther up the ladder. Doug Quick was the head promotions director at the time and was offered an anchor job on the *Sunrise* show. He no longer had time to be the promotions director, "So that job opened up, and I took a chance at it. It's been working out okay," Mayes said.

Did he want to be a promo-

tions director from the start? "No," he said. "I originally wanted to be a sports broadcaster, so I went into radio, but I found out how much money they made and got out."

He said in promotions he can be more creative and have "a little leeway in what I put on the air. You don't have to be a strict news person. It was an opportunity to do something different, and it turned out to be fun."

Mayes said when he got into television, he did not really have future plans. "It wasn't something that I wanted to do since I was little. But basically, I take what comes. And right now, I'm enjoying what I'm doing."


